There are many factors that determine who will develop osteoporosis. The first step in prevention is determine whether you are at risk. The risk factors

*Age--the older you are, the greater your risk of osteoporosis. Your bones become less dense and weaken as you age.

*Gender--Your chances of developing osteoporosis are greater if you are a woman. Woman have less bone tissue and lose more bone more rapidly than men because of the changes

*Race--Caucasian and Asian women are more likely to develop osteoporosis. However, African-American and Hispanic women are at significant risk developing the disease.

*Bone structure and body weight--small-boned and thin women are at greater risk.

naturally or because of surgery) increases your risk of developing osteoporosis. In addition, women who stop menstruating before menopause because of conditions such as anorexia or bulimia, or because of excessive physical exercise, may also lose bone tissue and develop osteoporosis.

*Lifestyle--by drinking too much alcohol, consuming an inadequate amount of calcium or getting little or no weight-bearing exercise, you increase your chances developing osteoporosis.

*Medications and diseases--Osteoporosis is associated with certain mediations (e.g. cortisone-like drugs) and is a recognized complication of a number of medical conditions, including endocrine disorders (having an overactive thyroid), rheumatoid arthritis, and immobilization.

*Family history--susceptibility to fracture may be in part, hereditary. Young women whose mothers have a history of early vertebral fractures also seem to about have a reduced bone mass.

responses were recorded during normal springlike conditions, where rains occur and soil moisture has not been drastically depleted.

"With this year's drought, we essentially have no stored soil moisture and little prospects of a good rain," the specialist said. The results of a good downpour, or a full inch of water, would likely be

Farmers can check for midgrain fill be looking for a fully expanded wheat kernel, which still contains water. This generally occurs two weeks after flowering. A positive return should be gained from furrow irrigation at this stage. Once the grain endosperm obtains a soft dough consistency the benefits of a furrow irrigation become more questionable.

Producers using sprinkler irrigation should certainly keep watering wheat for an additional 10 days after mid-grain fill, especially if no rainfall is received.

"The plant itself is the best indicator on when to quit irrigation," Bean said. Look for the stem florets, and awns to start losing their color.

"In most years, producers will start reducing the amount of irrigation water being applied to wheat around the middle of May," the specialist said. However this is clearly not a

normal year, considering the present weather conditions along with the current price of wheat.

"Even now, it would be a mistake to quit watering the crop too early," Bean said.
