Breast Cancer Screening To Be Held

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at the Stratford Medical Clinic, 1220 Purnell, on July 16, 1996.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-on-one instruction in breast self-examination by a registered nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. Our program is certified by FDA, American College o Radiology and the State Health Departments of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Calvin Coolidge was born on July 4, 1872, in a very small town in Vermont. He went to college to study law and soon became a lawyer. He married Grace Anne Goodhue in 1905. They had two sons, John and Calvin.

Coolidge was elected vice president of the United States in 1920 when Warren G. Harding was elected president. In 1923, Harding died, and Coolidge immediately stepped in to become president. He was re-elected in 1924 by a large majority. The country was very prosperous during the time Coolidge was president. He is the only president in American history to reduce the national debt.
