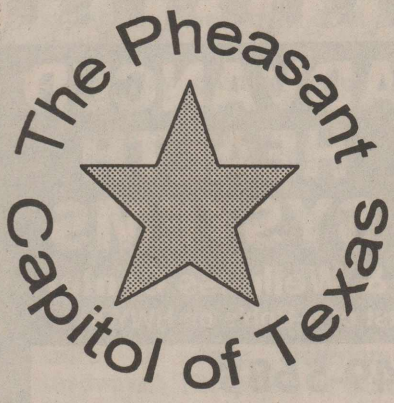

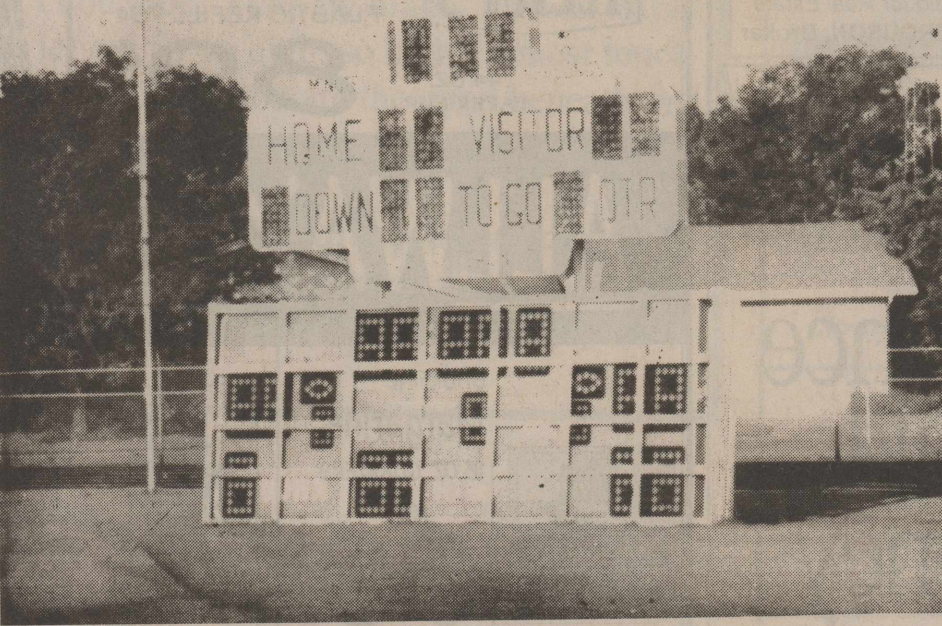

Family Reunion In Germany Held

Hattie Chesmer and daughter, Bitsey Crismon, of Lake Charles, Louisiana, have returned from a two-week trip to Oldenburg, Germany where they attended a Worldwide Meeting and Reunion of Hattie's German ancestors, the Ohlenbusch family.

The day-long affair was attended by 150 family members from Germany, Holland, France, and the USA. Also attending from the USA were two of Hattie's cousins.

Highlights of the meeting were a speech of welcome and greeting by the Mayor of the City, a formal dinner in the hotel ballroom, and a tour in large buses of the family's holdings, past and present, in the area, including streets named Ohlenbuschweg in two separate cities.

The history and origin of the family name was related and plans made for future reunions every 5 years in Western Europe.

The official hosts for the gathering were 96 year old Wilhelm Ohlenbusch and his 93 year old wife, Gertrud, of Oldenburg-Eversten.

In addition to the meeting Hattie and Bitsey traveled to Ireland for a week, then flew home on a plane crowded with Olympic athletes from Italy and the Czech Republic.

Starnes Awarded Scholarship

Winfield, Kan., July 16, 1996-- Brandon Starnes, Stratford has been awarded a major scholarship to attend Southwestern College in Winfield.

Starnes will receive the Honor Scholarship. Recipients of this \$1,750 scholarship typically have at least a "B" average in high school work and a score of at least 25 on the ACT college admission test. It is renewable as long as the student maintains at least a 3.4 cumulative grade point average and is enrolled fulltime.

Southwestern is a private, four-year liberal arts college with an enrollment of about 750 students. It is related by covenant to the Kansas West Conference of the United Methodist Church.

A "Sick Plant" Clinic will be held on Monday, July 29th to assist Sherman County homeowners with disease and insect problems on their ornamental plants. Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension Plant Pathologist from Lubbock, will be in Stratford to diagnosis plant problems and identify proper control practices. The clinic is sponsored by the Sherman County Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The "Sick Plant" Clinic is designed to help homeowners identify and control insect and disease problems in their lawns, trees, flower beds, and gardens. Homeowners can bring plant samples to the Sherman County Extension Office from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. on July 29th for Dr. Kaufman to identify problems and answer questions. Dr. Kaufman will also be available for home visits in the Stratford and Texhoma area. To schedule a home visit, call the Extension Office at (806) 396-2081 before 11:00 a.m. on the 29th.

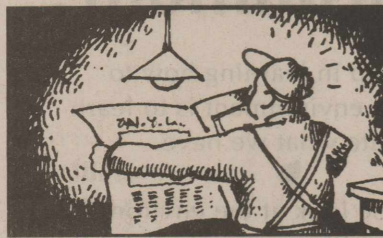

Newly redesigned, this book offers updated information on thousands of offices in the Washington area and full details on more than 170 new listings.

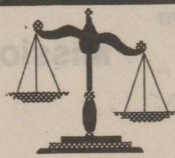

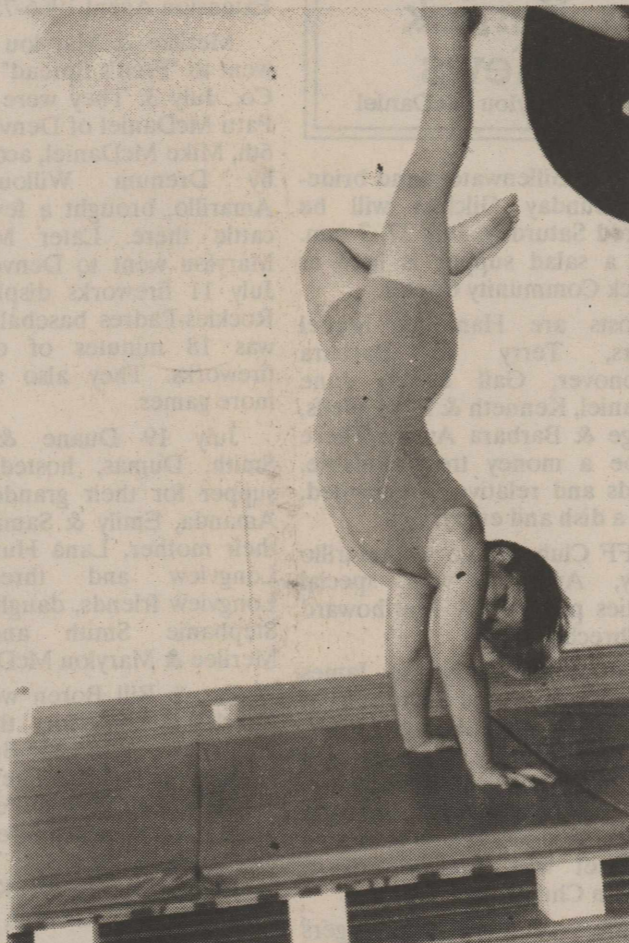

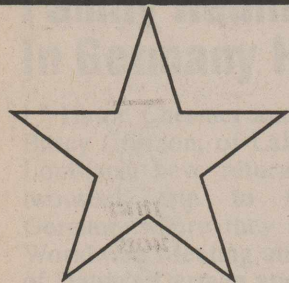
