NRCS Announces 2018 Deadline for Conservation Assistance Funding

TEMPLE, Texas - March 22, 2018 - The USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas has announced the first funding application deadline of April 20, 2018 for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

Applications are taken year around for NRCS programs, but deadlines are announced to rank and fund eligible conservation projects. Producers interested in signing up for EQIP should submit applications to their local USDA service center or if already a USDA client, on-line via Conservation Client Gateway (CCG).

EQIP is a voluntary program that provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers. Technical assistance is provided without a fee from NRCS specialists to help landowners and land managers plan and implement conservation practices to help them meet their land management goals, address natural resource concerns and improve soil, water, plant, animal, air, and related resources on agricultural land and non-industrial private forestland.

New medicare cards are to be issued within the year which will not contain social security numbers. She warned members to be very careful to whom they give their identity numbers to so as to help prevent fraud and identify theft.

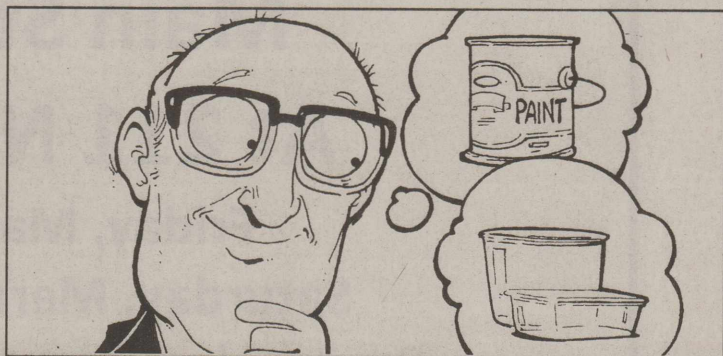

Medicare Program presented at Legacy

Legacy Assisted Living was happy to host a Medicare Fraud program on Monday, March 19, 2018. Lauri McAfee, a representative of Area Agency on Aging, located out of Amarillo, brought a very informative lecture about the new Medicare cards and how to detect and report Medicare fraud.

The new Medicare cards will no longer have one's Social Security number on them. The new cards will have a number consisting of letters, numbers and symbols. The new cards will be sent by mail and will start being received in April 2018 and will continue through April 2019. Once the new card has been received, place it in a safe place and shred your OLD card. Your medical providers will need to see your new card at your next visit.

Medicare fraud wastes about 1/10 of all Medicare medical claim money. After a visit to a medical provider, hospital or other services, one will receive an explanation of benefits for you to review. If you see something that is not correct, please contact the provider first and ask for review of the bill. It could simply be a coding error and could be corrected. If you cannot get the issue resolved, then contact Medicare to help resolve the issue. Another resource could be the Texas SMP - a statewide program to empower senior in resolving mistakes in Medicare/Medicaid/or private insurance payments for senior. Their number is 1-888-341-6187. Legacy is proud to be able to offer community enrichment programming. Legacy is located in Dalhart, Texas.

Multi-use exemption applies to some taxpayers.

Texas Property Tax Code Sec. 11.254, provides for an individual to exempt one passenger car or light truck from personal property taxes if the vehicle is used for both business and personal purposes.

11.254. Motor Vehicle Used for Production of Income and for Personal Activities

- (a) Except as provided by Subsection (c), an individual is entitled to an exemption from taxation of one motor vehicle owned by the individual that is used in the course of the individual's occupation or profession and is also used for personal activities of the owner that do not involve the production of income.
- (b) In this section, "motor vehicle" means a passenger car or light truck as those terms are defined by Section 502.001, Transportation Code.
- (c) A person who has been granted or applied for an exemption under this section may not apply for another exemption under this section until after the application or exemption has been denied.
- (d) This section does not apply to a motor vehicle used to transport passengers for hire.

To qualify for the exemption individuals need to fill out an application form available from the appraisal office at 402 N. Third Street in Stratford. **The exemption form must be filed prior to April 30.** Annual Renewal of this exemption is no longer required (Sec.11.43c). However the exemption is for a specific vehicle, so if you change vehicles or replace the tag you must file a new exemption form.

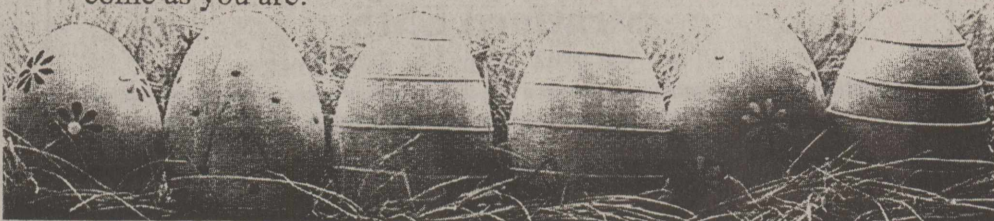

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Word From Washington

How To See Actual Government Documents

(NAPS)—You may have been hearing a lot about the workings of your government and its official documents lately—but often they're much easier to see than most people realize.

That's because the Federal Depository Library Program of the U.S. Government Publishing Office partners with 1,150 nationwide federal depository libraries to provide the public with free access to U.S. government documents and informational resources, both current and historic.



You can explore all sorts of government resources online and in person.

There are federal depository libraries throughout the United States and its territories offering all sorts of U.S. government resources. Information is available on such subjects as science, history, health, careers, the military, statistics, travel, citizenship, environment, education, genealogy, and small business management, among others.

The libraries also provide access to official U.S. government documents from the Congress, federal agencies, the White House, and the U.S. courts.

They come in a variety of formats including databases, U.S. government websites, e-books, print books, maps, journals, periodicals, handbooks, pamphlets, charts and more.

In addition, federal depository librarians can provide expert research assistance to help you make the most of these U.S. government information resources.

To find a nearby federal depository library, go to <http://catalog.gpo.gov/fdip/dir/public.jsp>.

To find a particular U.S. government document, search for it online using the Catalog of U.S. Government Publications. You can then locate a library that has your document or link to it if it's available online at <https://catalog.gpo.gov>.

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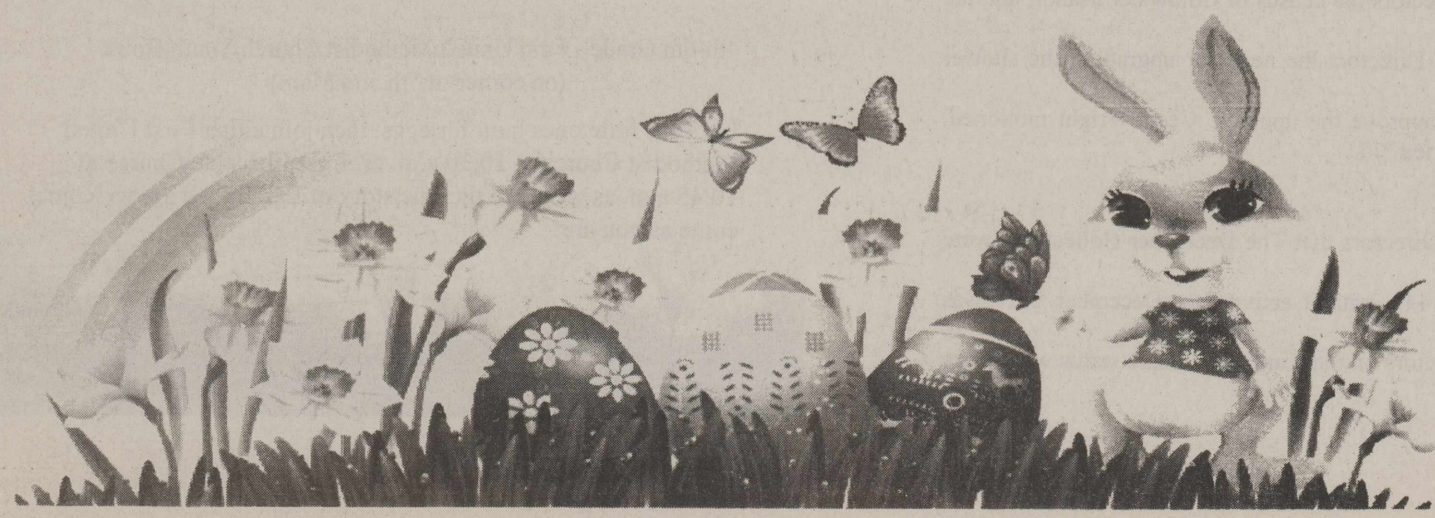

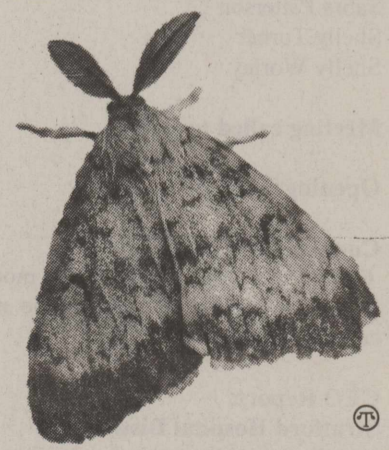

Our Insect Enemies

Don't Move With Moths
 (NAPS)—According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 12 percent of Americans move to new homes every year. The next time you're among them, there's something you need to remember NOT to pack: gypsy moths.

The Danger
 It's not just the right thing to do—it's the law. The gypsy moth is one of the most destructive pests of trees and shrubs in the country. Gorging themselves on leaves, gypsy moth caterpillars defoliate, weaken and can kill more than 300 different species of trees. Since 1970, they've defoliated more than 75 million acres.



When you move, preserve your new neighborhood. Don't bring in gypsy moths.

The Answer
 That's why the U.S. Department of Agriculture requires homeowners to inspect and remove gypsy moth egg masses from household goods prior to moving—and get an official certificate of inspection.

Here's how:
 • Inspect outdoor household goods—lawn furniture, grills, outdoor toys, camping equipment—for egg masses.
 • Use a putty knife, stiff brush or similar hand tool to dispose of the egg masses into a container of hot, soapy water, or place them in a plastic bag, seal it, and set it in the sun.
 To get the certificate, you can perform a self-inspection or hire a state-certified pesticide applicator. Give the inspection certificate to your moving van driver, advises the American Moving and Storage Association.

Health Matters

Protecting Your Privacy

(NAPS)—Some people are taking an unhealthy interest in your medical information—but they can be stopped.

The Problem

With data breaches occurring across many industries, even sensitive data pertaining to patient health care records is at risk. A recent University of Phoenix study of 504 registered nurses and administrative staff found that only a quarter of registered nurses have seen changes in the way their companies handle data security and patient privacy over the past year despite increased data breaches across all industries. The survey also found that 20 percent of registered nurses and 19 percent of administrative staff admitted their facilities have experienced a breach of private patient data.

Furthermore, the Identity Theft Resource Center notes that, as of November 2017, there had been nearly 5 million data breaches in the health care industry. These breaches can be detrimental to organizations: According to IBM's 2017 Cost of Data Breach Study, health care is the most costly industry for data breaches, with the average cost per affected record at \$380.

The issue is further compounded by a lack of trained cybersecurity professionals to combat hackers, especially in health care, where professionals make less and are responsible for not only protecting systems, but lives. Without trained experts, the onus falls on RNs and administrators, who may be unaware of how to identify or prevent breaches.

Expert Advice

"Patient safety transcends physical, emotional and electronic bounds and, in our increasingly digital world, it is important for health care professionals to be prepared for the possibility of data breaches," said Doris Savron, executive dean for the College of Health Professions, College of Education and College of Humanities & Sciences at University of Phoenix. "Everyone in the health care industry must work together to establish protocols and implement training to secure and protect all patient data to reduce the risk of being compromised."

Nurses and administrative staff agree, with 23 percent of RNs and 34 percent of administrative staff stating that additional support and training is needed for health care privacy and security.

"Health care organizations are extremely susceptible to human error. If

one employee accidentally invites malicious malware into a system, the impact can be catastrophic. To limit the amount of breaches, cybersecurity governance must improve," said Dennis Bonilla, executive dean for the College of Information Systems and Technology at University of Phoenix. "Without improved training and robust cybersecurity response plans incorporated into information technology strategies, the health care industry will continue to bear the brunt of these attacks."

What's Being Done

Current steps being taken to ensure the protection of patient data include:

- Updated privacy and access policies, according to more than two-thirds of RNs and administrative staff;
- Role-based access, according to 59 percent of RNs and 60 percent of administrative staff; and
- Data surveillance, according to most RNs and administrative staff.

Bomb Cyclone Preparedness: Four Easy Steps To Help Prevent Water-Pipe Damage

(NAPS)—The unusually cold temperatures that the country is currently experiencing will cause all kinds of chaos, including frozen water pipes. If the pipes burst as a result of the cold, this can be a major nightmare—but something that can be prevented with the proper precautions.

For climates that rarely see extremely cold temperatures like what we're currently experiencing with the 'bomb cyclone' weather system, water pipes are particularly vulnerable to freezing due to a lack of insulation around the pipes.

Prevent Problems

Here are a few tips from Johns Manville to help prevent frozen water pipes:

1. If you know temperatures are going to be extremely cold, keep thermostats high and open cabinet doors under sinks that are located on outside walls.

2. Leave water dripping on all faucets, for two-handle faucets, have hot AND cold water dripping.

3. Wrap exposed water pipes with insulation.

4. Add insulation to walls to help keep the hidden pipes protected as well.

"Adding insulation to exposed water pipes is one of the easiest DIY home-improvement projects to do," says Tommy Knappich, VP and General Manager of Building Insulation at Johns Manville. "If you take further preventative measure in the future, adding wall insulation is not a difficult task and will help protect those pipes that are not exposed, and keep your home more comfortable in all types of weather."

How To Tell

How will you know if your pipes have frozen? You'll turn the faucet on and nothing will happen. This is the best-case scenario because it can be easily remedied. What you don't want to happen is for the pipes to burst as a result of being frozen.

If you notice that a pipe has frozen, search exposed pipes for the frozen area:

- Feel the pipes with your hand to find the area of the pipe that is colder than others.
- Look for drips coming from the pipe, or frost build-up on the pipe.
- Use a screwdriver handle or another blunt object, to gently tap the pipe listening for a "solid" sound.

What To Do

Quick action to thaw the pipe will help prevent bursting. Once you've found where the pipe has frozen, here's how to unthaw it:

• Turn the faucet on, also turn on nearby faucets to a trickle. The water from adjoining faucets may get to the frozen section and help thaw the ice.

• Use a hair dryer and run it back and forth along the pipe. Make sure to keep it moving any uneven or sudden heating can rupture the pipe.

• Add salt to the frozen drain.

• Wrap the pipe in hot towels, replacing them ever 5–10 minutes until the water is running.

• DO NOT add boiling water to the pipe—a sudden temperature change will cause the pipe to burst.

"Adding insulation can be a week-end project that will create peace-of-mind during these extreme weather situations," said Knappich. "Installing the insulation properly can be just as important as adding insulation. For instance, ensuring the insulation is split around pipes so that a portion of the insulation is between the pipe and the wall will keep the pipe from being exposed to more cold."

(NAPS)—Each year, more than 1.5 million Americans develop a life-threatening condition called sepsis and at least 250,000 die as a result. That's why the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is urging everyone to *Get Ahead of Sepsis*: know the risks, spot the signs and act fast.

What Is Sepsis?

Sepsis is the body's extreme response to an infection. Without timely treatment, sepsis can rapidly lead to tissue damage, organ failure, and death.

Sepsis happens when an infection you already have—in your skin, lungs, urinary tract or somewhere else—triggers a chain reaction throughout your body.

Who's At Risk?

Anyone can get an infection, and almost any infection can lead to sepsis. Some people are at higher risk:



- Adults 65 or older
 - People with chronic conditions, such as diabetes, lung disease, cancer, and kidney disease
 - People with weakened immune systems
 - Children younger than one.
- The most frequently identified germs that cause infections that can develop into sepsis include *Staphylococcus aureus* (staph), *Escherichia coli* (E. coli) and some types of *Streptococcus*.

What Are The Symptoms?

Symptoms of sepsis can include any one or a combination of the following:

- Confusion or disorientation
- Shortness of breath
- High heart rate
- Fever, or shivering, or feeling very cold
- Extreme pain or discomfort
- Clammy, sweaty skin.

How Can I Get Ahead of Sepsis?

Talk to your doctor or nurse about



Pay attention to infections. If an infection doesn't get better, seek medical care immediately.

how to prevent infections. Some things they might suggest are to take good care of chronic conditions and to get recommended vaccines. Also, remember, to practice good hygiene, such as handwashing and keeping cuts clean and covered until healed. If you or your loved one has an infection that isn't getting better or is getting worse, ask your doctor or nurse "Could this infection be leading to sepsis?"

What Is CDC Doing?

CDC will continue to study the risk factors for sepsis; help healthcare professionals, patients and their families recognize the symptoms of sepsis; develop more reliable ways to measure the effects of successful interventions; and encourage infection prevention through vaccination programs, chronic disease management, as well as antibiotic use programs.

Antibiotics are critical tools to fight infections and sepsis. Healthcare professionals should ensure patients receive the right drug at the right dose and time. It is also important for healthcare professionals to reassess the need for antibiotics and be sure the medicine given is the safest and most effective for the patient.

What Can You Do?

Act fast: Get medical care immediately if you suspect sepsis or have an infection that's not getting better or is getting worse.
