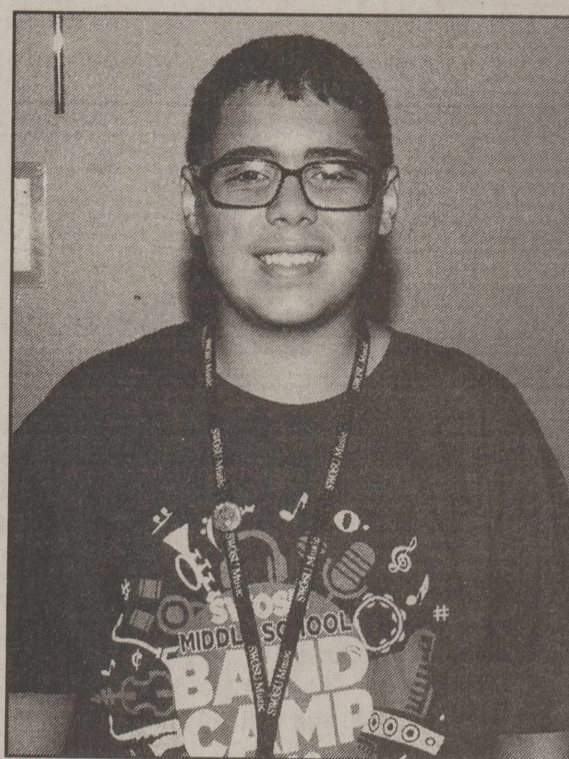

COUNCIL MINUTES May 22, 2018

Stratford City Council met in regular session with Mayor Reed presiding and the following:

Public Works Supv: David Tollison
ACCE Officer: Jessica Thompson

Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance

- Mayor Reed called the meeting to order at 6 pm and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Consent Agenda Items

- Minutes from Council meeting on April 24, 2018
- Accounts Payable for April 2018
- Financial Statements for April 2018
 - Ann Johnson motioned to approve as presented, Greg Wright seconded, all in favor, motion carried.

Council Business

- Discuss and consider action re: livestock permit request by Robert McGinnis at 819 N. Chestnut
 - After discussion, Council does not want to have these type of animals/fowl within City limits. Anyone having these animals/fowl within City limits without an approved permit will receive some form of notice and/or a citation. Joe Zak motioned to deny the request, Greg Wright seconded, all in favor, motion carried.
- Discuss and consider action re: sub-standard structures located at 620 N. Poplar
 - This structure has been turn down. No action necessary.
- Discuss and consider action re: storm shelter
 - CM Tommy Bogart spoke with Cactus Administration regarding the shelter they built in 2010. The cost of the project was \$275,000 and will only hold 50 people. It has had very minimal usage by citizens – approximately only 5 people per instance. The project cost in 2018 would be approximately \$400,000. The City's financial responsibility would be approximately \$100,000. The Council does not see that this would be a viable project at this time. It will be tabled for consideration in the future.
- Discuss and consider action re: financing considerations for projects
 - CM Tommy Bogart reported that the pump and motor went down on Well #2. Well #3 is still down. The City's financial responsibility for the CDBG grant is \$75,000. Civil litigation is a possibility in the future and attorney fees estimated for that will be \$50,000-\$55,000. The City would like to submit for sealed bids for financing for these projects, not to exceed a loan of \$150,000. Joe Zak motioned to approve requesting bids, Ann Johnson seconded, all in favor, motion carried.

Police Department

- A verbal report was given for both the police department and ACCE. ACCE Officer Jessica Thompson also reported that she has completed FEMA training.

Public Works Report

- A verbal report was given.

City Manager Report

- Dustin Meyer with PRPC is anticipating CDBG funding in June or July. CM Bogart has spoken with Mike Dominguez concerning filling the open Council position. He is interested.

Citizen Comment Period

- There were no citizen comments.

Items from the Council

- Joe Zak commented that TX DOT is requested written comments regarding their Hwy. 15 project through town. Copies will be available at City Hall. He thanked Public Works for spraying the streets for weeds.
- Ann Johnson commented re: length of time the weed spray lasts, how to address vehicles that haven't been moved and have weeds growing under them, and the road to the cemetery is definitely an improvement due to the repairs.
- Greg Wright commented regarding street repair improvements are better due to millings being used.
- Mayor Reed commented on the TX DOT meeting. TX DOT reported that a 30% increase in regular traffic and a 50% increase in truck traffic is anticipated after completion of the Casino project in Oklahoma. Consensus of the citizens at the meeting was for the Highway to remain as is. If it were to be widened, the City would be responsible for 10% of the cost of moving the utilities.

Adjourn

- Ann Johnson motioned to adjourn at 6:50 pm, Greg Wright seconded, all in favor, motion carried.

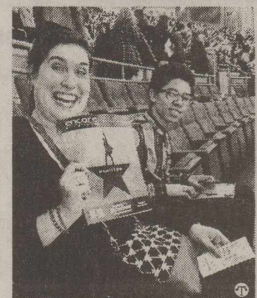
Making Life Better

'Hamilton' Inspires Youth In Foster Care

NAPSA—A generous donor recently opened up the worlds of theater, music and history to a group of deserving young people, especially picked for their passion and involvement in performing arts.

The Kids—Students in Treehouse's Graduation Success program experienced the Tony Award-winning, hip-hop musical sensation "Hamilton."

Treehouse gives youth in foster care a childhood and a future. The nonprofit has increased the extended graduation

rate for youth in its program to 89 percent. Nationwide, less than 50 percent of youth in foster care earn diplomas.

Shayla, a high school junior who wants to pursue a career in theater, was overjoyed to learn about the tickets.

"I screamed. I started crying. I was on the ground hyperventilating," she said. "I couldn't even say thank you because I couldn't breathe."

The Show—The musical would prove to be everything Shayla hoped.

"The sets were beautiful, the costumes were gorgeous and the actors did an amazing job," she said.

"Hamilton" is based on the story of the nation's founding fathers and has one of Broadway's most diverse casts. The national tour for 2018 will perform in 20 cities around the country.

The play's creator, Lin-Manuel Miranda, cast white historical figures—including Alexander Hamilton and Thomas Jefferson—with African American, Latino and Asian American actors. This decision has inspired young theatergoers across the country, including Treehouse youth.

"The best part for me was that Chris, my student, could envision himself playing a number of amazing characters," said Mary Iannuzzi, Treehouse Education Specialist.

The Organization—Treehouse is based in Washington, operates statewide and provides guidance to organizations serving youth in foster care all over the country.

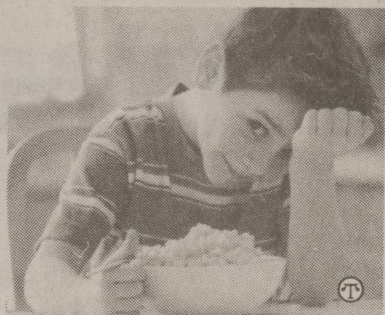

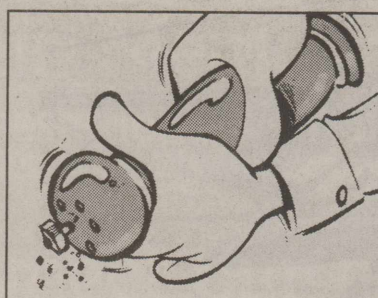
Other helpful snacking hints include:

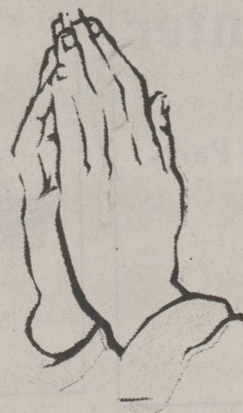

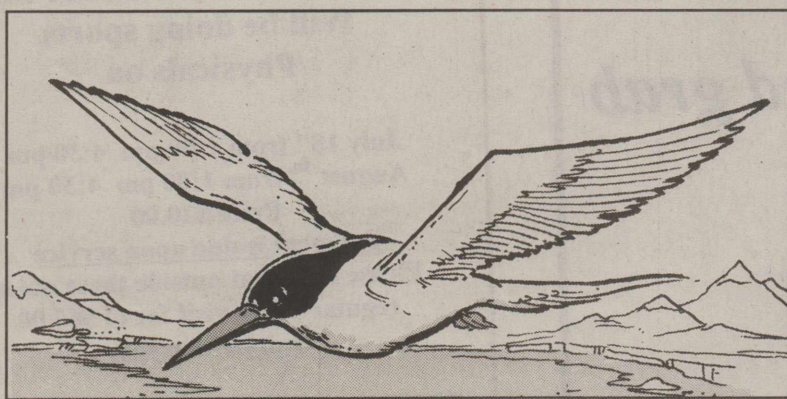

Private water well screening set for July 17 in Stratford

STRATFORD — The Texas Well Owner Network is hosting a water well screening from 8:30-10 a.m. July 17 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service office for Sherman County, 701 N. Third St. in Stratford, to give area residents the opportunity to have their well water screened. The cost for each sample is \$10.

A meeting explaining screening results will be held at 6:00 p.m., July 24 at the Sherman County Extension office.

The screening is presented by AgriLife Extension and Texas Water Resources Institute in partnership with the AgriLife Extension office in Sherman County.

"Private water wells should be tested annually," said John W. Smith, AgriLife Extension program specialist. "It is very important that only sampling bags and bottles from the AgriLife Extension office in Sherman County be used and all instructions for proper sampling are followed to ensure accurate results."

Smith said area residents wanting to have their well water screened should pick up a sample bag, bottle and instructions from the AgriLife Extension office in Sherman County. Bottles and bags will be available at least a week before the turn-in date.

The samples must be turned in by 10 a.m. on the day of the screening. Samples will be screened for common contaminants, including total coliform bacteria, E. coli, nitrate-nitrogen and salinity.

In addition, the samples also will be screened for arsenic.

Research shows the presence of E. coli bacteria in water indicates that waste from humans or warm-blooded animals may have contaminated the water. Water contaminated with E. coli is more likely to also have pathogens present that can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea or other symptoms, Smith said.

"Water with nitrate-nitrogen at levels of 10 parts per million is considered unsafe for human consumption," Smith said. "These nitrate levels above 10 parts per million can disrupt the ability of blood to carry oxygen throughout the body, resulting in a condition called methemoglobinemia. Infants less than 6 months of age and young livestock are most susceptible."

Salinity as measured by total dissolved solids will also be determined for each sample. Water with high levels may leave deposits and have a salty taste, and using water with high levels for irrigation may damage soil or plants, according to Smith.

Long-term consumption of arsenic in water increases the risk of skin cancer and cancer in the liver, bladder and lungs. In addition, chronic exposure to arsenic may lead to gastrointestinal irritation and cardiovascular disease.

He said it is extremely important for those submitting samples to be at the meeting to receive results, learn corrective measures for identified problems and to improve understanding of private well management.

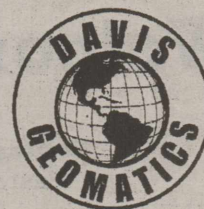
