Reagan tells 'gravediggers' budget not dead

Reagan said Friday the "gravediggers" on Capitol Hill who try to dispose of his proposed spending cuts every time he sends them up "better put away their shovels...because we're not burying our budget.'

"I've heard our budget will be DOA — dead on arrival— maybe even dead before arrival," Reagan told a group of business and trade representatives at a meeting set up to win public support for his spending package, which he will submit to Congress early in February.

"Well, the gravediggers better put away their shovels and get out their hammers, because we're not burying our budget," Reagan said. "We intend to get that budget passed and to build a prosperity that lasts for all the American people.

Calling the federal deficit "one of the last major obstacles blocking America's path to permanent prosperity," Reagan pledged his budget proposal would cut the deficit "while protecting Social Security and the safety net" of government programs for the needy

"I know there are some who claim that we're spending too much on defense, that defense is somehow being allowed to escape the scrutiny of the

budget process," he said. Forgive me, but the modest de-

WASHINGTON (AP) - President fense growth that we're calling for already represents a major compromise with the Congress. Indeed, while doing our best to improve the nation's defenses, we've compromised with the Congress on every defense budget since 1981. They have all been reduced.

'We've compromised so much that this year," Reagan said, "that for the first time in more than a decade, the defense budget has actually fallen below what it was the year before."

The Pentagon's estimate of the money it will actually spend in the current fiscal year shows a continued increase in defense spending. despite the cuts imposed by the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing bill adopted during the last session of Congress

However, the Defense Department's figures do drop in terms of its budget authority, which includes not only money it will spend in the year ending Sept. 30 but funds approved for down payments on ships and major weapons systems that may take years to build.

Budget authority for fiscal 1985 In the door was \$285.2 billion compared to \$278 billion the Pentagon said will be the maximum permitted in fiscal 1986 under the Gramm-Rudman law. Outlays, which were \$244.1 billion last year, are expected to total \$254.3 billion this year

Libyan jets fly in direction of U.S. Navy jets

from two American aircraft carriers conducted flight operations off the Libyan coast Friday in what U.S. officials described as a quiet but tense Navy exercise. Libya branded it an "aggressive provocation."

Pentagon sources, discussing the matter only on condition they not be identified by name, said the first flights off the carriers Saratoga and Coral Sea had been conducted Thursday night and Friday "without incident.

On Friday evening, an administration source disclosed a group of four Libyan fighters had flown northward into the Mediterranean earlier in the day, apparently to observe the Navy force. A group of U.S. F-A-18 fighters, already up in the air, were directed toward the Libyans, the source continued.

But as the Navy fighters moved within vision of the Soviet-made Mig 23s and Mig 25s, the planes peeled off and returned to Libya without making any threatening moves. The source dismissed the meeting of the planes as "insignificant."

Earlier, Pentagon sources declined to specify what routes the U.S. fighters had been flying beyond saying they were not over the Gulf of Sidra. a large, contested body of water that cuts into Libya's coast. Libya claims the gulf part of its territorial waters. But in a confusing turn of events,

WASHINGTON (AP) - Fighters the Pentagon appeared to reverse itself on whether future flights might extend over the gulf. On Thursday, the Pentagon said publicly that no such flights were planned. In a prepared response to the same question on Friday, however, the Pentagon was not so adamant

> "The United States will be conducting operations in the Tripoli Flight Information Region (FIR), in international airspace over international waters," the Pentagon said.
> "The Gulf of Sidra is in the Tripoli FIR, but we are not discussing specifics of our operations, including locations within the FIR.

The United States refuses to heed Libya's claim to the gulf, applying a standard 12-mile limit on coastal waters. The last time the United States and Libya engaged in combat was in 1981 when Navy fighters shot down two Libyan jets over the Gulf of

The Tripoli Flight Information Region extends more than 720 miles in length off the Libyan coast - all of it within 70 miles of the coast line.

At the White House, spokesman Larry Speakes indicated the U.S. sition on Libya's claims had not changed. Asked if the lack of operations over the gulf on Friday reflected U.S. acceptance of Libyan's claim, he responded: "No. Not the Gulf of Sidra line.

Egyptian airliner hijack victim says she's 'walking miracle'

PASADENA, Texas (AP) — Jackie Nink Pflug still vividly recalls the nightmare of the November day she was shot and left for dead by terrorists who hijacked an Egyptian airliner, and she says today she's a "walking miracle.

'People just don't get shot pointblank in the head with a .38-caliber pistol and live," said Mrs. Pflug, who is visiting her parents in the East Texas city where she was born.

Besides her memories, the 31 yearold teacher is reminded daily of the Nov. 23 hijacking by the eye problems that resulted from the gunshot

The peripheral vision in her left eye is gone, and her depth perception is distorted after surgery to remove a part of her brain, which was pierced by shattered bone

Mrs. Pflug was on her way from

hijacked at the Luqa Airport on the island of Malta. Two other Americans were shot, one fatally, but most of the 60 people who were killed died when Egyptian commandos stormed the plane

In a copyright interview Thursday with the Houston Post, Mrs. Pflug described being led down the aisle by the hijackers behind other hos-

Two Israeli women were before her, and she heard a gunshot and the "thump, thump" of a body tumbling down the Egyptian plane's metal staircase.

sound I've heard before in my life," Mrs. Pflug said she thought about escaping but instead walked down

sensation and a loud noise in my head," she said. She was left to die as she lay face down on the runway. "I thought I was going to die. So I

cles approaching. Mrs. Pflug, a specialist in learning disabilities who taught at Cairo American College, was returning to Egypt from Athens, where she had gone to watch the school's girls volleyball team compete in a tournament. The team was coached by her husband, Scott.

Mrs. Pflug, who now lives near Minneapolis, said she hopes to go back overseas in a few years, preferably to Japan.

Bush pays tribute to Falwell, supporters

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush, paying tribute to the Rev. Jerry Falwell and his supporters, said Friday he welcomes a recent surge of fundamentalist Christians into politics as "a great revival of an old American tradition

Bush said government should never tell citizens what religion to belong to. And he praised the principle of "a solid wall between church and

"But there was never and should never be a solid wall between church or synagogue and politics," he said. "Some have lost sight of this truth, at least when they consider the political participation of conservative rather than liberal forces."

The vice president spoke to more than 500 people at a lunch sponsored by the new Liberty Federation. which Falwell started this month to take the place of his seven-year-old Moral Majority as the flagship for his conservative religious operations. Its goals include registration of 1 million new voters this year and 20 million by the 1988 elections.

Bush's appearance, following a Thursday night speech to the New York State Conservative Party in New York City, was the latest in a series of visits to conservative groups as the presidential campaign season draws closer.

Falwell, who endorsed Bush last year for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination, steered clear of such talk on Friday. But the television evangelist's wife, Macel Falwell, got cheers when she introduced the vice president as "the next president of the United States.'

In a secret straw vote earlier Friday among about 200 Liberty Federation state leaders, Falwell said, Bush got 57 percent of the votes for president, trailed by 22 percent for Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., 11 percent for Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., 9 percent for the Rev. Pat Robertson, a religious TV talk show host who has said he's considering running, and 1

percent for Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo. Bush said with a smile that he welcomed ministers such as Robertson and the Rev. Jesse Jackson into presidential politics though "I don't want to wish either of them too much

As for Falwell and his Liberty Federation, Bush said, "America is in crying need, crying need of the moral vision you have brought and your new organization will bring to our political life."

He said America's founding fathers wanted "a union that formed one nation under God, a moral as well as a political union.

"Now that's not to say a union under one religion. We have and always will have many denominations, many faiths," Bush said.

"We're pluralistic, but whatever denomination, whatever the faith, all Americans were united around one core of principles: principles of love, of tolerence, of respect for others and decency, of reverence for a loving God who we all acknowledged, however we conceived of him, was the creator of us all," he

"But what had happened to this great America?" Bush asked. "Had we lost our faith?'

"One of the great losses of American political life in this century was with the withdrawal, largely in the '20s, of many fundamentalists and other religious leaders from political life," he said.

phone-answering service.

The call was forwarded to the

Report of the threat was made to the Midland County Sheriff's Office about 9:30 p.m. The station's ABC programming continued, while KMID's staff left the building and remained outside for about 1% hours. Regular programming re-

sumed about 11 p.m. No bomb was

Though entrances to KMID via U.S. Highway 80 and Farm-to-Market Road 1788 were blocked off by law-enforcement officers, other entrances to the Airport Terminal Building were open. No travelers reportedly were cut off from their flights. No egress and ingress problems were reported by the city of Midland's Aviation Department. Though entrances to KMID via

A special bomb unit from the Ector County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to the station to ferret out any explosive device. None had been found by near midnight Friday.

Sheriff Gary Painter had ordered deputies to block off an area around the station and to search for any bomb. Participating in the search-and-secure mission were deputies from the Midland County and Ector County Sheriffs' Departments, troopers from the Texas Department of Public Safety, officers of the Midland Police Department, and airport security personnel.

"It was a bomb threat," said John Foster, KMID-TV's general manager, "and we just made sure the building was secure and that no one was in jeopardy.'

An unidentified woman had called in the threat, said the bomb was inside the building but offered no reason for making the threat.

The station was vacated for about 11/2 hours, local television news was postponed and ABC telecasts were fed to the station and broadcast while the news staff, technical staff and management was out of the building. The station was not off the

A law-enforcement officer noted that the Midland Police Department does not have "bomb-sniffing dogs" and that the closest bomb-detecting dog is at Fort Sill, Okla.

Baptist church gives more than \$1 million

DALLAS - The First Baptist Church, Midland, gave more than a million dollars for missions through the Cooperative Program in 1985 to lead Texas Baptists.

The Midland church, which gave 30 percent of its undesignated church receipts for the Cooperative Program, had led Texas and the Southern Baptist Convention for a number of years except in 1982, when First Baptist Church, Dallas, gave in excess of \$1 million.

Total gifts by the Midland church in 1985 were \$1,008,035. Park Cities Baptist Church, Dallas, was second in Cooperative Program giving with total contributions of \$666,547, followed closely by First Baptist Church, Amarillo, with \$666,233.

Two Houston congregations rounded out the top five. Tallowood gave \$566,456, and First Baptist, Houston, contributed \$516,093 for the missions support lifeline of Texas Southern Baptists.

Texas Baptist churches gave a total of \$58,397,270 for missions through the Cooperative Program in 1985, topping the budget of \$57,000,000. The top 100 churches in 'dollar" amount gave about a third of the total receipts - more than \$19.3 million.

Of the total gifts, 36.3 percent (\$21,198,209) has gone for worldwide Southern Baptist mission causes including 7,000 Southern Baptist missionaries in the United States and more than 100 foreign nations. The remainder of the church's Cooperative Program funds went to help support eight Texas Baptist universities and San Marcos Academy, eight hospitals, four child care

homes, a number of homes for aging, and a variety of Mission Texas ministries to reach people, develop believers, and strengthen missions and help to bring spiritual awakening to Texas. The Rev. Daniel Vestal, pastor of

the Midland church, said announcement of the church having reached the million dollar plateau in Cooperative Program coincided with the celebration of its 100th anniversary. Through the years, there has

been a growing commitment of our people to missions," he said. "We believe that percentage giving is consistent and faithful giving.

He noted that besides the 30 percent that the church gives for the Cooperative Program it gives another 14 percent for special mission

"Churches which do the extraordinary in supporting Texas and Southern Baptist misison causes gain a special sense of identity and involvement with the missionary, educational and benevolent work they help support through the Cooperative Program," said Robert F. Polk, director of Cooperative Program Promotion.

AUSTIN - Farmers and ranchers wanting loans from bonds that Texas voters approved in November can call a toll-free number to find out about the program.

A Constitutional amendment approved bonds to help farmers and ranchers buy 50 acres or more. The General Land Office will provide loans up to \$100,000 for eligible applicants starting after September, Land

Commissioner Gary Mauro said Fri-

The Farm and Ranch Program will not solve all the problems facing those in Texas agriculture today, Mauro said. "But we hope that many producers who are wishing to purchase land will be able to use this new low-interest program as a partial solution in making agriculture profitable again."

To be eligible, the applicant must be a Texas resident for at least five years, have a net worth less than \$250,000 and have at least 35 percent of their household income generated from agriculture during the last three years. "Texas farmers and ranchers who

obtain the loans — not Texas taxpayers — will repay all of the bonds and the expenses of the program," Mauro said. The toll-free number for loan in-

Traps set for bulldog which mauled boy

LONGVIEW (AP) - Authorities set traps on Friday for a pit bulldog that escaped from a pack of dogs which severely mauled a 6-yearold boy, and state health officials examined the remains of other canines for rabies.

Steven Mark Fiengo Jr. remained in critical condition Friday following surgery at Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas, a spokeswoman said. The roving pack of eight bulldogs attacked the child on Wednesday, inflicting about 100 wounds, relatives said.

A Gregg County sheriff's investigator killed one of the animals with a 12-gauge shotgun as it lunged at him and officers captured and later destroyed six other animals. But one dog escaped, said Sgt. B.W. Acker.

"Officers are checking the area as often as their other duties will allow," Acker said Friday. "A number of traps have been placed in the area. And the owner of the dogs is cooperating in trying to find the

He said the heads of the six ani-

mals destroyed by county officials were sent to the Texas Department of Health in Austin for rabies analysis.

The boy was attacked near the Gregg County Livestock Auction Barn off Farm-to-Market Road 2087, Acker said. His mother, Brenda Sue Fiengo, found the child after he did not answer her calls.

Relatives said the dogs dragged the boy about 40 feet before he was rescued. He received more than 25 pints of blood during several operations at Parkland's Pediatric Trauma Unit for injuries to his legs, buttocks, arms and chest.

The attack occurred just before dusk while the boy played outside a house where he and Mrs. Fiengo were visiting friends who live on the western edge of Longview in East

She rushed her son by private vehicle to Good Shepherd Medical Center, and the child was then transferred by helicopter to Parkland.

The dogs, not pure-bred pit bulls, were "semi-wild" and belonged to a neighbor of the friend. He said the owner agreed to destroy the dogs.

"Investigator Robert Harshaw located one of the dogs and it tried to attack him," said Acker. "Harshaw had to kill it with a 12-gauge shotgun before it got him..

TCTA head: Teachers tired of being scapegoats

AUSTIN (AP) — As Gov. Mark White announced his re-election bid in a school classroom Friday, a statewide teachers' group stepped up crit-icism of White's call for limited drug ployees, including teachers. He said testing of teachers and other

The Texas Classroom Teachers Association said White is trying to blame the news media for creating a misunderstanding over his remarks, and it said teachers know exactly what White proposed.

"Teachers are just plain tired of being the scapegoats for every single social issue the governor uses as a campaign platform. There are plenty of real issues out there to occupy the governor's time if he is truly concerned about education in our state," said TCTA president Thomasine

"It's high time somebody had the gumption to tell the man that 'the emperor has no clothes,' " Ms. Sparks added.

On Thursday, the day before launching a re-election campaign that will emphasize his education reforms, White said leaders of some teacher groups failed to understand his drug-testing remarks of last week. He said they distorted his proposal when responding to it.

"I'm concerned that two or three of the association leaders thought so little about this statement that was made that they wouldn't even consult - or even when delivered the information - wouldn't even read or understand what was said in that regard," White said.
The governor said he only meant that Texans have a right to expect a 'drug-free workplace" in both private industry and among public em-

he never implied that drug use is a

problem among teachers.

Ms. Sparks noted that White referred several times during those comments last week to teachers and educational leaders.

"Had the governor not maligned professional educators by calling for

a 'drug-free educational leadership,' he would not be in this quandary

Now, she said, White is "charging that they are incapable of understanding written or spoken English
— all but calling them illiterate."

Convict finally captured after he escaped in November

ORINDA, Calif. (AP) — A convicted killer who escaped from a Los Angeles court building last November was recaptured Friday after police chased him and shot him three times during a gunfight.

James Hawkins Jr., 40, was captured after leading police on a high-speed chase that ended about 20 miles outside San Francisco with a fierce, 20-minute gunfight involving officers from three police agencies, said Contra Costa County sheriff's Sgt. Wayne Willett.

Hawkins, who escaped while awaiting trial for the killings of two cocaine dealers, had said after he

cocaine dealers, had said after he fled, in a telephone interview broad-cast by KNBC-TV in Los Angeles: "What I am doing is for the best and

I am quite sure that with time I can prove my innocence."

Hawkins had a long criminal record, including a voluntary manslaughter conviction in the 1963 shooting of a 19-year-old gang member during a struggle outside the Hawkins family store in South Central Los Angeles. The family's struggle with gangs drew national attention and support from Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley but a witness' testimony later led to the manslaughter conviction. slaughter conviction.

Friday's early-morning chase began when a sheriff's deputy investigating a suspicious parked vehicle found a man sleeping in the car, Willett said. He said that when the officer returned to his car for a radio



check, the man drove off.

Willett said the deputy called for help when he discovered the man was believed to be Hawkins, and that after a wild pursuit Hawkins crashed just outside Orinda.

"The deputy ordered him out of the car, and Hawkins responded by

Hawkins didn't surrender until he was wounded three times, Willett said. Authorities listed the wounds as minor. No officers were injured. Willett said Hawkins would be booked in Martinez on the outstanding Los Angeles charges and for attempted murder of police officers. "Thank God they didn't kill him," James Hawkins Sr. said after being told of his son's capture. "All along

my wife and I have been urging him to give himself up. Now at least we can rest, he's OK and alive."

Hawkins and two other county jail inmates escaped from the Criminal Courts building in downtown Los Angeles the night before Thanksgiving. One inmate was recaptured quickly but Hawkins and the other man disappeared.

The death of gang member Anttwon Thomas on Sept. 11, 1983, occurred during a struggle with Hawkins outside the family's gro-cery store. Hawkins maintained that Thomas drew a sawed-off shotgun and the weapon fired during the

Gang members firebombed the Hawkins home, fired up to 40 bullets it with a car during ensuing weeks of violence. Seventeen gang members were eventually convicted of crimes

against the Hawkins family. The shooting of Thomas was first seen by some as a heroic response to gang intimidation.

But during Hawkins' trial, prose-cutors produced a witness who said he saw Hawkins take the gun from a trailer near his father's store. Hawkins was sentenced to six years for manslaughter, two for using a deadly weapon during commission of a crime and a total of 20 years for four separate prior felony convictions on which he had been paroled.

Hawkins was later charged in the killings of the two cocaine dealers, who died before he was tried and





Bad weather may delay shuttle launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) Bad weather, which scrambled Columbia's launch schedule earlier this month, now is threatening to disrupt Challenger's liftoff on Sunday with schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe in the crew, NASA said Friday.

Shuttle meteorologists said a weather front was expected to move into the area Sunday, breaking a string of clear days and bringing clouds and a 30 percent chance of rain.

Similar conditions caused two of Columbia's record seven launch postponements and forced three landing waveoffs here before that shuttle was detoured to land in California.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said it is counting on a break in the weather during a three-hour launch period that begins at 9:36 a.m. EST.

Weather in the form of blowing sand at an emergency landing site in Dakar, Senegal, already has postponed the flight one day. The delay was necessary so that an al-ternate site, the international airport at Casablanca, Morocco, would be available in daylight in case a problem shortly after lif-toff forced the shuttle to cross

the Atlantic and land in North

The meteorologists said the outlook for Dakar on Sunday was poor, while Casablanca appears

While the experts kept watch on the weather, Mrs. McAuliffe and her six crewmates were busy studing the flight plan for the six-day mission and meeting with shuttle officials.

Commander Dick Scobee and pilot Mike Smith, with Mrs. McAuliffe and Greg Jarvis riding along, practiced landings at the shuttle runway here. They flew a Gulf-stream jet modified to handle like the shuttle.

They and the other crew mem-bers, Judy Resnik, Ellison Oni-zuka and Ron McNair, had lunch at the crew quarters Friday with spouses and friends.

Mrs. McAuliffe, a 37-year-old high school social studies teacher from Concord, N.H., was selected from 11,146 teacher applicants to be the first to make a shuttle trip in NASA's citizen-in-space

During the flight she will teach two lessons which students in hundreds of schools will watch on Public Broadcasting Service.

Afghan resistance leader seeks weapons

WASHINGTON (AP) — The leader of an Afghanistan resistance group brought five maimed children to the White House on Friday and asked President Reagan for weapons to shoot down Soviet helicopter gun-

ships that bomb Afghan villages. Reagan greeted the youngsters with "much sorrow in his face," said Dr. Hashmatullah Mojaddidi, chairman of the financial committee of the Afghan National Liberation

Talking with reporters later in the White House driveway, Mojaddidi said, "He doesn't know how to explain his sympathy. This is what I feel. He was very sad about the situation, especially when he saw this small girl" — a 6-year-old Afghan whose face was burned from what the resistance said was an incendithe resistance said was an incendiary bomb.

Asked later about the request for arms, presidential spokesman Larry Speakes declined to discuss U.S. aid. We have never discussed our system of assistance to the Afghan free-

dom fighters and we will not,"

Speakes said.

Mojaddidi said 100,000 Afghan children have been maimed or killed in the six years since Soviet troops entered the country and a Sovietbacked government took power. An estimated 118,000 Soviet forces remain in Afghanistan, battling rebel

To avoid further casualties, "the peace-loving country in the United States, they should send us weapons, effective weapons, especially mis-siles against gunship helicopters," said Mojaddidi. "I have already asked the president to do that."

Asked how Reagan responded, Mo-jaddidi said, "He was very much in sorrow about the situation. He say that as much as we could do, we will extend our cooperation." Asked specifically what Reagan said about weapons, Mojaddidi said, "Just he said, we will extend our cooperation."

He said the resistance is receiving humanitarian aid from various countries. He said weapons are being smuggled into the country, but that he did not know their source.

The five children who saw Reagan ranged in age from 4 to 10. They were brought to the United States for medical treatment by the Free Afghanistan Alliance, a private voluntary organization based in Cambridge, Mass.

Maine guard can't train in Honduras

AUGUSTA, Maine (AP) — Members of the Maine National Guard will not be allowed to attend a training session in Honduras because the area is too unstable, Gov. Joseph E. Brennan said Friday.

A 35-member engineering team was scheduled to work two weeks in May with about 5,000 other U.S. personnel on a Pentagon-sponsored road project recently begun in the Central American country.

Brennan cited 385 armed rebellions and 126 governments in the nation's 165-year history as evidence of

the area's instability. "Honduras borders El Salvador and Nicaragua, two Central American countries with ongoing internal rebellions," Brennan said in a pre-

pared statement. "Both rebellions have spilled into Honduras. The possibility of violence in either of these neighboring countries moving into Honduras is very real, as is the potential for anti-American violence.

David Cheever, Brennan's press secretary, said the Reagan administration's Central American policy was not an important issue in the

Rebels reportedly replace president of South Yemen

Associated Press

A rebel radio broadcast from South Yemen said leaders of the bloody insurgency against Ali Nasser Mohammed replaced him as presi-dent Friday and named Heidar Abu-Bakr al-Attas as provisional head of the Arab world's only Marxist state.

Arab diplomatic sources in the region viewed with skepticism the broadcast by the hard-line Marxist

One Arab diplomat in Sana'a, capital of North Yemen, said: "Without Soviet and Arab backing, the broadcast will certainly go unheeded."
Al-Attas, prime minister before a

coup attempt began the savage civil war on Jan. 13, was in Moscow when the radio announcement was made. The broadcast, monitored in the Persian Gulf state of Bahrain, purported to speak for the Central Committee of the pro-Soviet Yemen Socialist Party through which President Mo-hammed had governed.

Mohammed, a Marxist who had Moscow's support in the past, tilted toward his pro-Western neighbors, Saudi Arabia and Oman, in recent months.

A few hours after the rebel broadcast, Mohammed was reported to have made a radio appeal to combat-ants to lay down their arms.

The broadcast was not heard outside South Yemen, but North Yemen's official Saba news agency distributed what it said was the text of Mohammed's brief address.

Mohammed's reported remarks did not refer to any plans to regain undisputed control of the country,

leaving his status in doubt.
In Moscow, al-Attas and Foreign

Minister Abdul-Aziz al-Dali were

quoted earlier Friday as announcing their support for the rebels.

In the 11 days since the fighting started, diplomats in the region esti-mate that about 12,000 people have been killed and about 24,000 wounded in the fighting in South Yemen, which occupies a strategic corner of the Arabian Peninsula at the southern entrance to the Red Sea.

The Soviet Union has about 1,000 troops in South Yemen and mans navy and air bases in Aden and Socotra Island.

The warfare appears to have caught the Kremlin off guard and left it in the awkward position of trying to mediate between two proloscow factions.

In Moscow, Yegor K. Ligachev, the Kremlin's No. 2 man behind Mikhail S. Gorbachev, received al-Attas on Thursday and assured him of support for his socialist party, but stressed that the South Yemen con-flict was "purely internal," the official news agency Tass reported

Tass did not mention the report that al-Attas has been named provi-sional head of state. Tass refered to al-Attas only as prime minister and a member of the Politburo of South Yemen's ruling party.

Al-Attas and al-Dali were not in South Yemen when fighting broke out and have been in Moscow since

The South Yemeni rebel broadcast claimed Mohammed had masterminded a "fictitious meeting of party, army and police leaders and killed 50 of them."

The radio said Ali Antar, vice

chairman of the party Presidium, was killed at the Jan. 13 meeting, as were ranking party member Ali al-Shayie, Defense Minister Saleh Muslih and others.

The broadcast did not mention former President Abdul-Fattah Ismail and Ali al-Biadh, minister of local administration, who were earlier reported executed by Mohammed's forces on Jan. 13. Subsequent reports from diplomatic and other sources questioned whether Ismail was killed.

Muslih was widely reported to have been killed in fighting between government and rebel forces.

The Central Committee of the Yemen Socialist Party hereby strips Ali Nasser Mohammed of the presidenthe radio announced.

Earlier Friday, Arab diplomats in the Persian Gulf, insisting on anonymity, said Mohammed was leading an estimated 40,000 regulars and tribal warriors in a "decisive counter-offensive" against rebel strongholds in Aden.

The diplomats said more than 10,000 decomposing bodies were left on the streets and epidemics in the capital were feared.

British, French and Soviet vessels meanwhile braved rough seas to pluck trapped foreigners off South Yemeni beaches.

Across the Red Sea from South Yemen, British diplomatic sources in the African nation of Djibouti said about 850 Third World citizens, mainly Indians and Pakistanis, were still in Aden.

Britain's royal yacht Britannia sailed for New Zealand Friday after rescuing 1,082 foreigners from the

Reagan asks Congress to OK sale of military equipment to China

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration is asking Congress and U.S. allies to approve its decision to sell about \$500 million worth of radar and navigation equip-ment to China's air force, administration and congressional sources said Friday.

The sale would strengthen U.S. ties with the communist government in Peking but could cause strains with Japan, Taiwan and West European countries who are likely to reg-ister objections on security and commercial grounds. State Department officials briefed

The equipment is designed to up-

grade China's F-8 interceptor planes. The sale, under discussion for at least a year, would be the second since the United States established diplomatic relations with Peking in

The first was a relatively minor \$68 million sale of equipment and a design for China to build a factory for artillery and other ammunition.

The State Department, responding to reports of the deal, said it had been "under consideration for some time." Other officials confirmed the deal had been completed but said formal announcement was being withheld until Congress was

Soviet youth allowed to join mother in U.S.

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — A 17year-old Soviet youth being allowed to emigrate to the United States was reunited with his mother Friday after more than six years of separation, a U.S. Embassy spokeswoman

Mikhail Stukalin, who came by train from Moscow, met his mother Margarita at the U.S. Consulate, where Stukalin was having a physical examination and starting immigration paperwork, said embassy spokeswoman Karen Czerny.

The reunion came about after ongoing consultations between U.S. and Soviet officials on divided families whose members have been trying to get out of the Soviet Union to join spouses or relatives in the United States.

Mrs. Stukalin, who emigrated to the United States 6½ years ago, lives in Brighton, a suburb of Rochester,

Before last November's Geneva summit between President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, Moscow announced that 10 Soviets would be allowed to join relatives or spouses in the United States. Stukalin was the sixth of those 10 to leave. During the summit Reagan and Gorbachev agreed to promote copperation on "humanitarian issues," and on Dec. 31 the State Department said the Soviet Union had

agreed to let 36 more people go. Soviet officials had turned down an earlier application for Stukalin to leave, said Dr. Bruce T. Leimsidor, director of the Hebrew Immigration Aid Service.

The independent service tries to arrange visas and travel for Jews and others seeking to leave the Soviet Union.

Leimsidor met Stukalin at Vienna's South Railway Station as Mrs. Stukalin flew in from New York for the reunion

The Stukalins planned to leave for the United States on Monday. The U.S. Embassy refused to say where they were staying and kept their reunion behind closed doors.

They have planned a reception in New York when they return," the embassy spokeswoman said.

Stukalin, who said he speaks English "only a little," told The Associated Press at the train station that he had finished high school and planned to continue his studies in the United States.

Bundled against the cold wind in a dark overcoat, jacket and tie, Stukalin was taken almost immediately to the consulate for the reunion with his mother.

Others among the original 10 people slated to leave the Soviet Union include Irina McClellan, who said earlier this month that she had been told she could go, but that she refused to leave without her daughter

In Moscow, Lena said Friday she, too, had a visa and that the two were awaiting their flight tickets. She said she did not know when they would leave, but they expected it to be

Abe Stolar, who was brought to the Soviet Union by his parents in the 1930s, has been told that he may leave with his wife and son, but they have refused to go until the son's wife is also allowed out.

"Everything is the same. I have not heard a single thing," Stolar said in Moscow Friday.

U.S. Embassy officials in Moscow say they are continuing to press the cases with Soviet authorities, but they refuse to discuss details.





Actress moves from 'Dallas' to 'General Hospital'

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Martha Scott has departed CBS' "Dallas" and now is playing a mysterious grand-mother in ABC's daytime soap opera "General Hospital."

"There are very few parts for, shall we say, older women," Miss Scott said. "This is an extraordinary role for a woman who's been around all these years. People don't write roles for women my age. It gives me a channel to do something different. I had a little bit of it in "The Turning Point.' She was the entrepreneur. There's some of it in my role in 'Dallas,' as a woman who's trying to guide her daughter's life."

Miss Scott played Sue Ellen Ewing's mother on "Dallas" for seven episodes this season. In November, she showed up on "General Hospital" as Jennifer Talbot, the grandmother of Terry (Robyn Bernard).

The girl has a tough emotional problem and you begin to wonder what influence the grandmother has over her," Miss Scott said. "You know from the moment she sees her grandmother she's terribly shocked.

ENTERTAINMENT

She has a terribly nice facade. She's very polite, slightly Victorian in her way. She speaks her language a little differently. People around Terry notice this woman has a tremendous influence on her mind.

"As it develops it gets more in-tense and mysterious and horrible," she said. "To be honest, I don't really know what's going to happen. It's like 'Dallas.' They won't tell the actors anything."

Miss Scott, most noted as a film and stage actress and producer, had a fling at soap opera earlier in her

"I had a daytime show in the 1950s called 'Modern Romances,' " she said. "I told a story and it was enacted by a group of actors. We did a complete story every week. I remember they let me out to do 'Ben Hur.' The wonderful part of it was that the kids all knew me. I was the last face on NBC before 'Howdy Doody' came on. Kids would run up to me and say,

"I know you! You're on before "Howdy Doody." The power of the medium is astonishing."

On "Ben Hur," Miss Scott worked with Chariton Heston, who now is starring in ABC's "The Colbys." "I played his mother twice and his wife twice," she said. "I was his mother in 'Ben Hur' and 'The Ten Commandments.' I was his wife on the stage in New York in 'Design For a Stained Glass Window' and 'The Tumbler' in

Miss Scott also has appeared in te-levision's "The Bionic Woman" and "Secrets of Midland Heights."

She has made numerous appearances on Broadway, but also has produced many shows for the stage. She co-produced the Broadway version of "First Monday in October" and the movie. She was a co-founder of Plumstead Playhouse with Henry Fonda, Alfred deLiagre and Robert

Miss Scott recalled that a few years ago she worked in an afternoon movie called "Sorority Kill" that was produced by Gloria Monte, who guided "General Hospital" to its present success. One of the actors in the play was Tony Geary, a key player in Miss Monte's building of the soap opera.

She said Fonda, who had done "First Monday in October" on the stage, was unavailable to perform in the movie version because he was filming "On Golden Pond," his last

"Hank helped me with the cast-

ing," she said. "Paul Heller, who co-produced with me, and I had a cast list. Walter Matthau was the one name Hank agreed on. Walter didn't want to do it. He said, 'Oh, no, that's Hank's role.' I said, 'Hank's doing 'On Golden Pond' and you have his

blessing. Although she has spent a lifetime memorizing scripts, Miss Scott said learning the 100-page daily script for "General Hospital" is "terrifying."

"You get the scripts in advance but you can't learn them until the night before," she said. "Otherwise, it gets too confusing. It's heavy studying every night."







And again it was a horrible shooting display by MHS that had everyone wondering. The Bulldogs shot a meager 35 percent from the field, acting like they were playing again against Midland Lee.

The Bulldogs put up 43 first half shots and hit on only 15. The Steers, meanwhile got only 25 shots, but hit 11 while adding 11 of 15 from the

charity stripe.
It was a dire looking sight until the
Bulldogs reeled off eight unanswered points to open the third period to take control of the game and then Elvin Mackey took complete charge of the Steers with 12 of his 24 points in the fourth quarter to make

the game look like a rout.

"Big Spring isn't a bad team, but they just haven't learned to win yet. They keep it close on you sometimes.

The Steers grabbed the Bulldogs' attention after that first half and Matt Sears keyed the third quarter opening spurt, scoring 10 of his 18 points in the period with a five-of-six shooting eye from the field.

In addition to Mackey and Sears, Thomas Wilson turned in another

Thomas Wilson turned in another great outing with 14 points, hitting 10 points in the first half when the other 'Dogs were struggling. Anthony Deande scored 13 points to round out the four-pronged attack.

But MHS couldn't stop Mayfield,

the league's leading scorer. No one seems to be able to do that. Mayfield, only a sophomore, led all scorers in the game with 25 with an 11-of-20 shooting eye from the field.

Illness hits Super Bowl camps: Pats' Eason, Bear's Butler

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - New England quarterback Tony Eason, the quiet quarterback this week, missed practice Friday with what was described as a "mild viral illness," but the Patriots team doctor said he was optimistic Eason would be ready for Sunday's Super Bowl.

Chicago Bears placekicker Kevin Butler also missed his team's practice after being treated for flu symptoms.

Patriots Coach Raymond Berry said Eason, who has gone almost unnoticed this week while attention centered on the bruised buttock of his Chicago counterpart, Jim McMahon, became ill about 10 p.m. Thursday night during a meeting with quarterbacks and receivers.

Veteran Steve Grogan, just activat-

ed after missing seven games with a broken leg and a knee injury, took all the snaps at practice with a brace on his knee. Berry said Grogan would start if Eason wasn't ready.

"It looks like he has mild viral illness," Dr. Bertram Zarins, the Patriots' team physician, said of Eason. "We kept him out of practice to give him some rest and we'll evaluate him later today. At this point it doesn't look serious."

Zarins declined to give details except to say it was a "generalized viral

"At this point we're fairly optimistic he'll be all right," he said.

Berry wasn't so optimistic. "I don't know how serious it is right now," he said. "There's the pos-

sibility it could be a whopper. They don't really know. They're going to have to watch it. There's a couple of types of the virus. One might be over quickly. The other might not be over quickly. I don't think they really know which one it is right now." As for Butler, Bears trainer Fred

Caito said he expected the virus to last between 16-20 hours. Coach Mike Ditka said Butler would kick on Saturday when the

Bears practice in the Superdome. "He'll be OK," Ditka said. "This is the biggest game of his life." It is the latest "big" game for the

rival coaches, who graduated from the football hotbeds of western Pennsylvania and the Texas plains to play for championship professional

teams. Ditka, from Pennsylvania, played with the Bears' 1963 championship team and with the 1972 Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys. Berry, from Texas, performed for Baltimore's champions of 1958 and 1959.

Despite their distinctly different personalities and styles, their roots in football's fertile breeding grounds are reflected by the similarity of their teams.

Ditka's Bears and Berry's Patriots play basic football. If California and Florida players like to pass and catch, Texas and Pennsylvania players like to hit.

"It may be a little different game than we've come to expect from the Super Bowl," Ditka said Friday at the coaches' final news conference before Sunday's game. "Neither of us is a flashy team. We both have the capacity to create turnovers and take advantage of them and that's what I think will decide Sunday's game.

The Patriots' penchant for forcing turnovers - 16 in their three playoff victories - come directly from Berry's roots.

The first thing he did when he took over as head coach midway through the 1984 season was to institute fumble recovery drills - the same ones he learned 35 years ago playing high school football in Paris, Texas, under his father, Mark Raymond Berry.

That's also true of the basic kind of offense - some call it conservative - that the Patriots play. And that's what Berry suggested they would do Sunday, passing considera-bly more against Chicago's "46" defense than the 12 times they threw in their AFC championship game against Miami.

"That's one thing my father preached to me - balanced offen-" Berry says. "He always said that when two teams are equal, the team with the most balance always wins."

In the same way, the Bears reflect Ditka's roots.

They routinely break their own helmets making tackles the way their coach once broke a hand on a locker after a loss. Ditka's mellowed

Way down yonder in New Orleans again. Bourbon Street. Dixieland. The French Quarter.

It's supposed to be the home of some of America's finest restaurants. I wouldn't know. I've been to New Orleans for five Super Bowls and the nearest thing I've had to a gourmet meal was a box lunch.

During Super Week, the only way the common folk can get into one of those tony eateries is with a mop and

In fact, I don't hold with haute cuisine very much at all anymore. I don't think even Escoffier would go along with what they've been doing

My little granddaughter, Danica, unwittingly put her finger on it one day when she was trying to read "Oriental food." It came out "ornamental food," and that's about what it is these days.

Just ask Dan Jenkins. My pal, Dan, the author and satirist, is, to coin a phrase, fed up with modern food serving. Typically, he has taken out after it in a savagely funny piece in January's Playboy.

"It is clearly time for food eaters to take a tough stand on the issue of food," Dan storms. "If we don't, a hearty meal in another couple of years will consist of a mesquitesmoked quail's egg sitting on a little

Adds Dan: "When I say we should take a tough stand on food, what I have in mind is murder."

Dan would like to trigger a show called, "Who Is Killing the Great Chefs of America?" who he bets are named Duane and Trevor and Colin and Randall. They are, he says, devoting all their energies to "making all food look like Monet's lilies."

Dan went to the barricades one night when, he notes: "I happened to gag on a piece of zucchini that some

precious chef had cleverly disguised as a french fry.'

He felt even more betrayed when what he took to be a platter of onion rings turned out to be calamary. Dan was thunderstruck. "Squid?!" he demanded. "Like in octopus squid? Like in that thing it took John Wayne and Ray Milland an hour to kill in 'Reap The Wild Wind'?" Dan decided it was time to speak

out before we became a nation of lotus eaters.

"Let me tell you about food," he lectures sternly. "Food is brown and white and not crinkly. OK, it's orange sometimes - if it's cheese. May-be maroon - if it's pinto beans. I'll give you two kinds of green. Lettuce green - none of that bibb or romaine bleep - and dark green for green beans, which you cook in lard if you don't have a ham bone or slab of

"Don't get white mixed up with cheese. You want Swiss cheese on a

cheeseburger, go to the West Side!" Dan doesn't need Julia Child or

the Galloping Gourmet to tell him how to cook American. "The key to good food is grease,

he says. "Grease got us through the Depression. Grease is coming back. You know the first thing grease is gonna do? Go round up aspic and start kicking butt."

Jenkins thinks the apotheosis of the American culinary art was the chicken-fried steak. Smothered in gravy so thick with flour and cream you could use it for epoxy.

"Food don't make noise, either," challenges Dan. "Like, when you bite into some kind of vegetable that's been steamed and you hear it crack, that's BS! Only four kinds of food can make noise. A taco makes noise. A potato chip makes noise. Corn on the cob makes noise. And the lower half of an ice cream cone makes noise.

Dan recommends chefs be at least

indicted for capital offenses like using seed buns for hamburgers, "putting sweet sauce on any meat, cooking fried chicken in corn-meal batter like it's some stinkin' fish." Green beans, he warns, should be cooked in salt pork instead of Giorgio perfume. He wonders what grapes are doing

on plates at any time.

He sneers at foods of the world. Chinese food, he dismisses as "shoelaces and sweet-and-sour coat buttons." Of French food, he says, "You're looking at a fat duck or a pureed rabbit." California cuisine, he describes as "I'll just have a little dish of feijoas with some fern on the side, and perhaps a tiny glass of babaco. And then, get me out of here, you swine, so I can go get something

Jenkins has a point. The great foods of the world never came out of some Parisian's haughty idea of what people like to eat. They came out of the kitchens of the poor. You

think some lah-de-dah chef invented the taco? Pizza? The hot dog? You ever get good chili in a place where you couldn't eat with your hat on? Who gave the world the hamburg-

er? Some guy with teeth missing and a tattoo on his arm who worked in the back of an all-night diner, learned how to cook in prison and answered to the name Frenchy is

So, I don't feel bad I can't get in those places where they put eggs on a bed of spinach. I don't want to eat any food I haven't at some time in my life eaten off a paper plate, or in any place where they call chocolate pudding mousse.

I like places where, before you put a fork into it, you yell at the fry cook, "Hey, Joe, how old is this pie and do I get my money back if one of the raisins walks out of it?"



Tyson scores kayo in fifth

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) -Hard-punching heavyweight Mike Tyson scored his 17th straight knockout Friday night, stopping a lumber-ing Mike Jameson in the fifth round of a scheduled eight-round bout.

In scoring his 17th straight knockout, Tyson surpassed the legendary Rocky Marciano for knockouts at the start of a career. Marciano had 16 and later went on to win the world heavyweight title. Other boxers have started their careers with more than 20 consecutive knockouts, but none ever captured a world title.

Tyson appears that he is on the road to one.

The Catskill, N.Y., native opened a cut over Jameson's left eye in the second round with a right hook and he sent his San Jose, Calif., opponent to the canvas in the fourth round. Jameson, who weighed 236 pounds, opened the fifth round by attacking Tyson with a series of flicking jabs, before Tyson pinned him against the ropes and delivered a smashing right cross and a thundering left uppercut.

Referee Joe Cortez quickly stepped between the fighters and examined Jameson, who was bleeding from the earlier cut. He just as quickly ended the bout at 46 seconds of the round. It was Tyson's longest fight as a

professional. His previous longest bout had been a fourth-round knockout over Don Halpin last May. Prior to Friday fight, Tyson had handled his previous 16 opponents in

just 23 rounds, an average of 11/2 rounds per bout. Tyson sad he was not disappointed

the fight lasted so long. "Hey I got the job done," he said.

PHOENIX (AP) - Hal Sutton led a spectacular scoring blitz with another bogey-free 64 that provided him with a 2-shot lead Friday in the second round of the \$500,000 Phoenix Open Golf Tournament.

"I feel like I'm playing better right now than I've ever played in my life," said Sutton, a former PGA champion, leading moneywinner and Player of the Year.

His 128 total was 14 shots under par for two trips over the Phoenix Country Club course and matched the low 36-hole total on the PGA Tour last year. He has not made a bogey in the tournament, and, in 21/2 tournaments this year, has scored 62 birdies.

But he was not alone in his scoring heroics on the little course that was robbed of its natural defenses by the absence of wind and was subjected to an awesome assault by golf's touring pros. As examples, consider Howard

Twitty and Don Pooley. 'What can I say?" asked Twitty, a hometown boy, when he and Pooley finished their late-afterweather. "I shot 63 and I got beat

Pooley, who won the 1985 Vardon Trophy for the low stroke average on the tour, matched the course record with a 10-under-par 61, the lowest score on the pro circuit since the 1984 Walt Disney World Open. It was two off the all-time tour record.

"I knew very well what I was shooting," said Pooley. "I knew, standing over my second shot on the last hole, that I had that for 59. I figured it was possible, since Howard had holed out his second shot just a few holes earlier."



U.S. volleyball Olympian dies of cardiac failure

TOKYO (AP) - Flo Hyman, who led the U.S. women's volleyball team to a silver medal at the 1984 Olympics, collapsed during a game in Japan and died of cardiac failure

The 6-foot-5 Hyman, 31, of El Toro, Calif., was playing in a Japanese wo-men's volleyball league match in Matsue City, 380 miles west of Tokyo, when she colapsed during the third set of a match against Hitachi. She sat down on the bench after a player change, then collapsed, Japan's Kyodo News Service reported.

Kazunori Yoneda, the team man-ager, said Hyman "seemed well at the player change. She called out to the new players to play hard. Those were her last words."

"She was the finest female volley-ball player in the world," U.S. Olympic Committee Secretary General George D. Miller said of Hyman.

Rose Magers of Big Spring, Texas, also a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic volleyball team, is in Japan and was watching the match on television when Hyman collapsed.

"Rose ... saw the whole thing," Aia Selinger, wife of the U.S. Olympic volleyball coach, Arie Selinger, said from her home in Laguna Niguel, Calif. "She called me immediately and said, 'Please don't get panicked but I think something bad happed to Flo because they interrupted the match and said that Flo was rushed to the hospital.

"Rita Crockett, who was playing with Flo, called me a half hour later

and gave me the bad news." Japanese television showed Hyman being carried out of the gymnasium on a stretcher. She was taken by ambulance to Matsue Red Cross hospital, where she had no measurable pulse on admission, according to a hospital staff member, who spoke on condition that she not be named.

The player was placed on a respirator and given external cardiac massage, but was pronounced dead at about 9:30 p.m., she said.

Crockett, a Daiei teammate and also a veteran of the U.S. national team, was with Hyman in the emergency room, the spokeswoman said. Team director Yasuhiro Doi was astonished by Hyman's death.

There wasn't anything strange about her health before the match. She didn't have any health problems," he said.

Miller, at his Colorado Springs, Colo., office said, "the shock of her death affects all of us in the Olympic

"She was one of those rare athletes who was the best, and unselfishly gave back effort and support to her sport at all times.

Hyman, who began playing Daiei in November 1982, was considered one of the most dominant players in the sport. She became a member of the U.S. team in 1975 and competed in every major competition that the U.S. squad ever qualified for.

In 1981, she was among six players selected to the All World Cup Team, and was honored as the best hitter at







WASHINGTON (AP) — Orders for big-ticket durable goods climbed a sharp 4.2 percent in December, the government reported Friday, but analysts said the increase did not signal a revival for America's hard-pressed manufacturing sector. Economists dismissed the gain, the biggest in

more than a year, because it came entirely from a sharp rise in orders for airplanes, a volatile component which fluctuates from month to month. The Commerce Department report put total orders for durable goods, items expected to last three or more years, at \$108.2 billion in December, \$4.4 billion above the November level. It marked the first increase since August and the

biggest rise since an 8.2 percent advance in November 1984.

Gordon MacRae dies of cancer

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Actor-singer Gordon MacRae, who crooned in a surrey with the fringe on top in "Okiahoma!" and later battled back from the blackouts of alcoholism, died Friday at age 64.

Edwin Shafer, director of development and public relations at the hospital, said MacRae died at 2:15 a.m. at Bryan Memorial Hospital. He had been hospitalized since Nov. 27 for treatment of cancer of the mouth and jaw, and Shafer said death was "related to cancer" but declined to be more specific.

"He died very peacefully in his sleep," MacRae's wife, Elizabeth, said in a telephone interview.

Mrs. MacRae said that although her husband suffered a stroke in 1962 and doctors said he would

fered a stroke in 1982 and doctors said he would

never be able to work again, he kept performing "out of sheer guts and willpower."

A memorial service is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. Monday at Sheridan Lutheran Church in Lincoln. A

Monday at Sheridan Lutheran Church in Lincoln. A private burial was planned.

The family asked that memorials be sent to the National Council on Alcoholism. Since undergoing treatment for alcoholism in 1978, MacRae had spoken out on the disease and was honorary chairman of the National Council of Alcoholism.

MacRae's long career reached its peak on the screen in the mid-1960s with the musicals "Oklahoma!" in which he played the cowboy Curiy, and

ma!" in which he played the cowboy Curly, and

During the last year, cancer prented him from performing, Mrs. MacRae said. "His last days were really spent trying to overcome this," she said. "Gordon was a very religious man and he spent most of

his time in prayer.

"He was a very unusual person in show business in the sense that he never dwelt on his past achievements. He was always thinking about what he was going to do next.'

MacRae was born March 21, 1921, in East Orange, N.J. After childhood roles on radio, MacRae joined the Millpond Playhouse at Roslyn, N.Y., where he met actress Sheila Stephens. They were married in

MacRae got a role as Tommy Arbuckle in the Broadway play "Junior Miss." At the same time, he was a singer in a radio chorus and worked on another radio program until June 1943, when he was drafted into the Army.

After wartime service as a navigator in the Army Air Corps, MacRae returned to radio and finally won a commercial show as star of the NBC "Teentimers" program. He was host of "The Railroad Hour" on

radio from 1948 to 1954. MacRae's career skyrocketed when he was signed to a contract by William Orr, a talent scout for

Warner Bros.

MacRae's credits include, "The Big Punch," 1948, "Look for the Silver Lining," 1949, "Backfire," 1949, and "Return of the Frontiersman," 1950.

He was also in "Tea for Two," 1950, "West Point Story" 1951, "Oklahoma!" 1955, "Carousel," 1956 and "The Best Things in Life are Free," 1956.

In the late 1950s, he moved into televison as host of the "Colerate Company Hour" and the "Lux Television."

the "Colgate Comedy Hour" and the "Lux Television Theater." He also had a recording contract with Capitol Records. MacRae and his first wife had four children — Meredith, Heather, W. Gordon and Bruce — before they were divorced. In the 1980s, the whole family

occasionally worked together in a nightclub act, and Meredith MacRae appeared on the television shows "Petticoat Junction" and "My Three Sons."

MacRae married Elizabeth Lambert Schrafft, a



Group backs subsidies for mothers who work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Saying government and industry have not kept pace with dramatic changes in family lifestyles and the labor force, a liberal group is urging massive new subsidies for working mothers.

Traditional government, business and school policies toward families and work should be changed to accommodate the fact that one of every two marriages is ending in divorce and most children have a working mother, a panel of the U.S. United Nations Association says in a

new report.

The 177-page report by a family policy panel of the association's Ecopolicy panel of the association's Eco-nomic Policy Council, a foundation-sponsored group, said fewer than 10 percent of the nation's households now correspond to the so-called "tra-ditional family" with a wage-earning husband, a homemaker wife and two or more children.

Instead, said the report, both parents work in 61 percent of the na-tion's families and more than half of the country's children can now expect to spend a part of their child-

hood in single-parent households.
"With very few exceptions, the schools, the workplace, the relevant government agencies and legislation, and our attitudes as a nation have not fully recognized or ad-dressed the widespread social and economic implications of these changes, the recently released report claims.

The panel — headed by Alice Ilchman, president of Sarah Lawrence College, and John Sweeney, president of the College, and John Sweeney. dent of the Service Employees International Union — did not put a total pricetag on 26 recommendations.

But it placed at \$1.5 billion per year the costs of two proposals: expanding from 30 to 50 percent and making refundable the annual tax credits on up to \$4,800 in child care expenses, and extending Medicaid coverage to all impoverished women and their children under age 6.

The recommendations also included strengthening quota requirements on federal contractors on hiring and wages for women and minorities and federal legislation requiring temporary disability pay-ments for pregnancies.

White says he wants progress to continue

HOUSTON - The only children in the classroom didn't sit there regularly, but they all looked like attentive students as they watched the governor Friday.

Mark White stared straight back at the students and announced his re-election plans, obviously relishing a re-match against the man he beat in 1982.

Using schoolroom props to dramatize his campaign theme and a hi-tech satellite feed to spread his message across the state, White kicked off his re-election bid with a press conference from the Houston elementary school classroom where his late mother taught first grade for 14 years. He said he wants to serve another term to prevent his opponents from "unraveling all of the progress we've made.'

White, a 45-year-old Democrat, slung most of his arrows towards former Gov. Bill Clements, the Republican White defeated in 1982 and the man he expects to win the GOP nomination this year.

"Never again can we afford to go back to those years — just ast — when minorities, women and workers struggled to be

heard outside the doors of an indifferent government," he said. Clements has toured the state inviting voters to compare the two administrations and claiming that White has repeatedly broken campaign promises and lost the confidence of Texans. White Friday touted his own administration's achievements in education reform, highway funding, economic development, utility regulation and water planning, and returned Clements'

"This election offers one of the clearest choices in many years," White said. "That choice is simply this: whether Texas will continue to challenge the future and lead the way for economic growth and individual opportunity, or whether this

state will return to the past and be cast adrift again."
Friday was a school holiday in Houston, but about 20 children joined White, his family and staff and a swarm of reporters and photographers in the kindergarten classroom at Briargrove Elementary School on Houston's west side. The youngsters included children of White supporters, children of those students White's mother taught in the classroom years ago and a few Briargrove students.

White appeared close to tears twice as he recalled the late Sarah Elizabeth Wells White's career in that classroom. "We must not depart from teaching our own children well," he said. "We must not retreat from the progress we have made in these three years - and I never will.

Communications Carrier Inc. of Austin linked the schoolroom via satellite to 35 television stations — including KOSA-TV in Odessa - across the state. Following the 45-minute announcement speech, CCI provided five-minute hookups to the stations individually, allowing the governor to respond to local questions asked by local reporters. From Lubbock, for example, former Gov. Preston Smith interviewed White.

That satellite link — financed jointly by White's campaign, CCI and the stations - eliminated the traditional city-to-city dash that usually characterizes a candidate's campaign kickoff. The governor appeared in all 18 TV markets in the state Friday without leaving the Briargrove classroom.

White seemed confident he would win the Democratic nomination with little difficulty against three relatively unknown opponents. He said he didn't care which of the three candidates — Clements, former U.S. Rep. Kent Hance of Lubbock and Congressman Tom Loeffler of Hunt — wins the GOP nomination.

"They all seem to come out in favor of ignorance and super-stition, and that's a voice of the past," White said. "Every single candidate that has announced so far, from the Ku Klux Klan to Bill Clements...all seem to sing from the same hymnbook."
