

Arab League rejects retaliation on U.S.

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — A special meeting of the Arab League rejected Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy's demand for retaliatory economic action against the United States, and instead issued a condemnation of U.S. economic and military measures against Libya.

Only eight foreign ministers from the 21 Arab League members attended what was billed as a one-day foreign ministers' meeting. They and lower-level delegations from other Arab countries showed little enthusiasm for anything stronger than the moral support they already have given Khadafy.

President Reagan ordered economic sanctions against Libya following the Dec. 27 attacks at the Rome and Vienna airports that left 20 people dead, including five Americans and four Palestinian terrorists. The Reagan administration has charged Libya finances and trains terrorists.

The United States also has accused Libya of harboring Abu Nidal, the renegade Palestinian whom the Reagan administration and Italy blames for engineering the airport attacks. Reagan ordered all Americans and American companies out of Libya as



of Feb. 1, and froze \$12 billion of Libyan assets in U.S. banks.

The U.S. Navy also is conducting maneuvers in the Mediterranean Sea off Libya.

Earlier this month the league gave Libya its moral support with a proclamation condemning the U.S. sanctions.

Upon the conclusion of Thursday's meeting, the league issued a communique denouncing what it called "American threats" and expressed "total solidarity" with Libya.

The league, however, did not act on a request by the Libyan government for a counter boycott of the United States, including withdrawal of Arab funds from American banks and companies.

Notably absent from the meeting were the foreign ministers of the

Persian Gulf countries, except for Saudi Arabia. The other seven foreign ministers attending were from Algeria, Djibouti, Libya, Mauritania, Morocco, Syria and Tunisia.

Sent instead were lower-level delegates or their permanent representatives at the Tunis headquarters of the league, formed in 1945 to demonstrate political solidarity. The league is made up of 20 Arab countries and the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Libyan Foreign Minister Ali Abdussalam Trieki contended that all Arab nations disagreed with Washington's Middle East policy, "including the so-called friends of the United States. But I can assure you, the United States has no friends in the Arab world."

Treiki and Khadafy have accused the United States of planning military action against Libya.

The league in its declaration warned the United States about the "dangers of an armed aggression" against Libya, and agreed to begin consultations leading to a U.N. Security Council meeting.

Treiki had come here armed with strong words but apparently with weaker hopes of substantive results.

In an interview with The Associated Press before the meeting began, he stressed that the delegates would "study the American sanctions and the American provocation, and recently, the maneuvers" of U.S. 6th Fleet warships off the Libyan coast.

"We will ask for certain measures and see what countries can do," he said.

Treiki repeated Khadafy's denial of involvement with international terrorism and said Libya was ready "to talk, without any pre-conditions," with the United States about easing tensions.

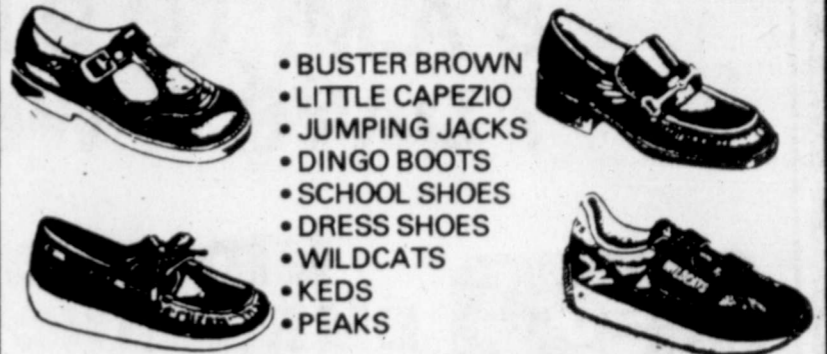
He also said in the interview that his government was willing to work with others to fight terrorism.

South Korean official kidnapped

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Heavily armed gunmen kidnapped a South Korean diplomat today after shooting out the tires of his car as he drove to work in Moslem west Beirut, a Lebanese army official said.

The official and the South Korean Foreign Ministry in Seoul identified the diplomat as Do Chae-sung, 43, the South Korean Embassy's second secretary and consul.

Lebanese authorities had initially said the victim was cultural attache Si Chang Du.

Col. Munir Malouli, chief of a special Lebanese army force in charge of protecting foreign embassies in Beirut, said Do's abduction occurred this morning when five gunmen in a green Mercedes intercepted his car about 50 yards from the embassy in

Beirut's seafarmer Ramlet al-Baida district.

The assailants, armed with pistols and Soviet-made AK-47 assault rifles, shot out the front tires of Do's car. Malouli said the kidnappers forced the diplomat out of the vehicle at gunpoint, bundled him into their car and sped off.

Spent pistol cartridges littered the spot where the diplomat was kidnapped.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the abduction, and neither Lebanese authorities nor officials from the South Korean Foreign Ministry cited a motive.

Do was the 39th foreigner to be kidnapped in Beirut since January 1984, and the first Asian diplomat seized.

NATION in brief

Oil tanker bombed

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Unidentified warplanes fired two missiles at a Liberian oil tanker near the coast of Qatar, marine salvage executives reported Thursday.

They said that one missile caused "some damage but no leakage" to the 132,400-ton Skaubo. The second missile, they added, almost hit the wheel-house but caused no damage.

The executives said the Skaubo was hit about 80 miles east of Qatar. Loyds Shipping Intelligence Unit in London confirmed the attack, adding that the Skaubo was "proceeding with caution."

Hole found in comet

HEIDELBERG, West Germany (AP) — A West German scientist has discovered a hole in the tail of Halley's Comet, the Max-Planck Institute of Astronomy announced Thursday.

The institute released a photograph of the comet taken by astronomer Kurt Birkle on Jan. 10 at the Calar Alto Observatory in southern Spain. Birkle performs research for Max-Planck's space studies department in Heidelberg.

The photo clearly shows the comet's tail with a dark spot, or hole, not far from the glowing head of the comet, the institute said.

Scientists at the institute suspect solar, whirlwind-like forces may be the cause of the gap in the tail of the comet, which passes near Earth once every 76 years.

Abu Nidal sought

PARIS (AP) — Interpol has relayed a "wanted notice" worldwide for Abu Nidal and turned over the case of the feared Palestinian terrorist leader to a newly formed anti-terrorist unit, the chief of the international police agency said Thursday.

The agency, headquartered in the Paris suburb of St. Cloud, is essentially a clearinghouse for information on international crime. For years, it dealt warily with terrorist offenses because of their political overtones.

Raymond E. Kendall, Interpol secretary general, said the alert went out last Saturday to police forces in 136 countries. Both he and Italian authorities, seeking Abu Nidal in connection with the bloody terrorist attack at Rome's airport Dec. 27, say they do not know where the fugitive is.

Soviets may increase aid to Angola

MOSCOW (AP) — A Foreign Ministry spokesman said Thursday that the Soviet Union might consider increasing military aid to Angola if Angolan rebel leader Jonas Savimbi gets an aid commitment in Washington.

"We will have to see how much bigger the aid question will be," said Yuri Yukalov, chief of the Foreign Ministry's department dealing with sub-Saharan west coastal African states.

Savimbi, who is backed by South Africa, is in Washington seeking aid for his National Union for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA), which is trying to oust Angola's Cuban-supported government.

The guerrilla chieftain met with President Reagan Thursday and officials in Washington said the administration has earmarked up to \$15 million in secret military aid for

Savimbi.

Yukalov, in response to a question at a news conference Thursday, reaffirmed Soviet and Cuban support for Angola.

"The Soviet Union and Cuba have reaffirmed their treaty commitments to Angola, its solidarity with it, and I would not like to go any further," he said.

The Soviet Union and Angola signed a treaty of friendship and cooperation in 1976 under which Soviet military assistance is provided. Exact figures on the amount of aid are not known.

Yukalov announced that Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze, Defense Minister Sergei Sokolov, Chief of Staff Sergei Akhromeyev and other Soviet officials met with Cuban and Angolan military and foreign affairs officials this week in Moscow. The meetings were part of regular

joint consultations, which were last held here in March.

The Reagan administration reportedly has been trying to get up to \$15 million in aid for Savimbi, who was trained as a guerrilla fighter by Mao Tse-tung and other leaders of the Chinese revolution before forming UNITA.

Savimbi also met with Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger on Thursday.

After the meeting with Savimbi, Reagan assured him he wants to be "very helpful" to the campaign to oust Angola's Marxist government.

U.S. officials, who declined to be identified, said the administration had notified congressional intelligence committees it would tap a CIA contingency fund to provide assistance for Savimbi.

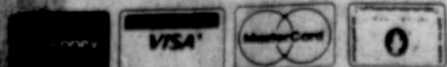

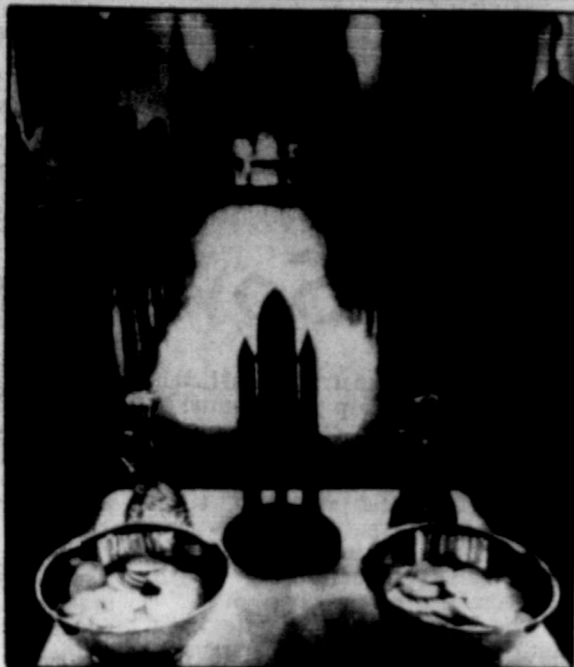

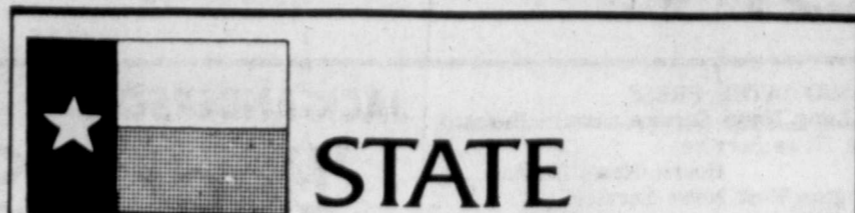

NASA frozen in time as investigation continues

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — On a normal Thursday, this nerve center for the U.S. space program would be abuzz with more than 7,000 workers trying to keep up with the shuttle program's ambitious calendar. But normal days ended in a split second over the Atlantic Ocean, and most of NASA was frozen in time Thursday — the day schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe was to have given lessons from space to children across the country. Experts pored over data and held meetings as part of the investigation into the explosion of Challenger Tuesday, but thousands of other workers were left idle because the space program has been put on hold, NASA spokesman Terry White said. "There's a lot of leave being taken," White said.



Normally, training and planning for future missions continues at the Johnson Space Center while a shuttle is in space. Astronauts work in simulators and payloads are prepared while Mission Control is directing the shuttle in space. While one shuttle is up, the next ones are being readied. The place is usually a whirlwind of activity. Instead, gloomy NASA employees walked around the green, 90-acre campus-like complex Thursday, some watching reporters at work and some observing preparations for President Reagan's visit today. The simulators were being used by experts "working on the anomaly investigation," employee Kay Parker said in true NASA-speak. The space agency can recreate the conditions leading to the crash by feeding the electronic shuttle simulator commands given by astronauts and ground officials as well as com-

puter tapes of data sent by Challenger during its 72-second flight. Astronaut training, mission planning and preparation, research and engineering, tracking and communications have all been suspended. Astronauts were "coordinating efforts for the families," and might resume training Monday, according to NASA official Charlotte Hines. The tourist entrance to Mission Control was locked Thursday morning, and much of the visitors' center was still occupied by reporters. Work on the space station project, however, was proceeding as usual, a secretary said. And groundskeepers, too, were busy Thursday priming the complex for Reagan's visit and memorial service. Trees had to be uprooted and lightposts removed to make way for the memorial service.

Mental health group will aid space workers

HOUSTON — Fearing a delayed emotional reaction among space agency employees here following the shuttle disaster, a local mental health organization is putting together a task force of psychologists to help them cope with the expected aftershock.

Terri Daggett, a public relations official with the Mental Health Association of Houston and Harris County, said her group is working with personnel officers of the Johnson Space Center here to compile a list of counseling services for employees and their families.

"Anything of this type of tragedy is going to affect people," Daggett said Thursday. "All the clinical people are saying is for people to talk about it and get it out. These things should be discussed."

Several counseling services say they have not as yet noticed any increase in the number of clients asking for assistance because of the Challenger explosion Tuesday that sent seven astronauts to their deaths.

"We have had some other agencies calling asking only if we would have time to see some extra people if the need arises," said one worker at Interact Counseling and Consultation Inc., located in Clear Lake, a suburb of Houston and home of the space center.

Similarly, Daggett said her organization has not seen an upswing in a number of people calling for assistance.

But it may be too early yet, she said. A delayed emotional reaction can be expected in a week or even months after a critical event, such as the shuttle tragedy.

"A lot of people during the first few days are going through a denial process, that it didn't happen and that they want to return to a normal routine."

Floral tributes fill two offices at space center

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Floral arrangements sent as gestures of sympathy for America's fallen astronauts arrived at the Johnson Space Center in truckloads Thursday, and one florist said there was a backlog awaiting delivery.

By Thursday, the pink, blue, gold and red flowers filled two offices and spilled into the hallway at the space center protocol office. One, with blue carnations, bore an air-inflated plastic model of the space shuttle. Several included U.S. flags.

Tommy Walton, a NASA protocol officer, spent much of Thursday delivering the floral tributes to the homes of five of the slain Challenger crewmates. But the flowers kept arriving, and by darkness, the greenery still crowded the hallway.

Some of the flowers were addressed to specific astronauts. Others were sent to "The Families of the Challenger Astronauts." One bore the notation of only "Challenger."

Walton said the flowers came from kings, school children, movie stars, policemen's unions and ordinary citizens in foreign countries.

A large wreath bore ribbons with the names of King Hussein and Queen Noor of Jordan. A large cross included a single red rose with a ribbon bearing the name of the one of the Challenger crew members.

Other displays came from singer Neil Diamond, movie actor and singer John Denver, members of the Student Cooperative Association of Virginia Beach, Va. and the Fraternal Order of Police, Tampa, Fla. There also were arrangements from Australia, Japan, Germany and Britain.

All Texas mourns deaths of shuttle crew, White says

AUSTIN (AP) — All Texas mourns the deaths of the crew of the Space Shuttle Challenger, who undertook a dangerous mission "in pursuit of greater knowledge," Gov. Mark White said Thursday.

"Our hearts are with their families who are returning home to Texas from the launch site. And we send special condolences to the family of New Hampshire teacher Christa McAuliffe," White said.

The shuttle's six regular crew members and Mrs. McAuliffe were killed Tuesday when the spacecraft exploded moments after liftoff from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

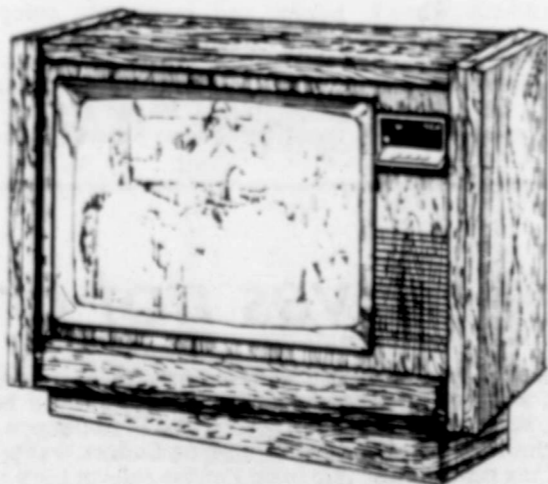
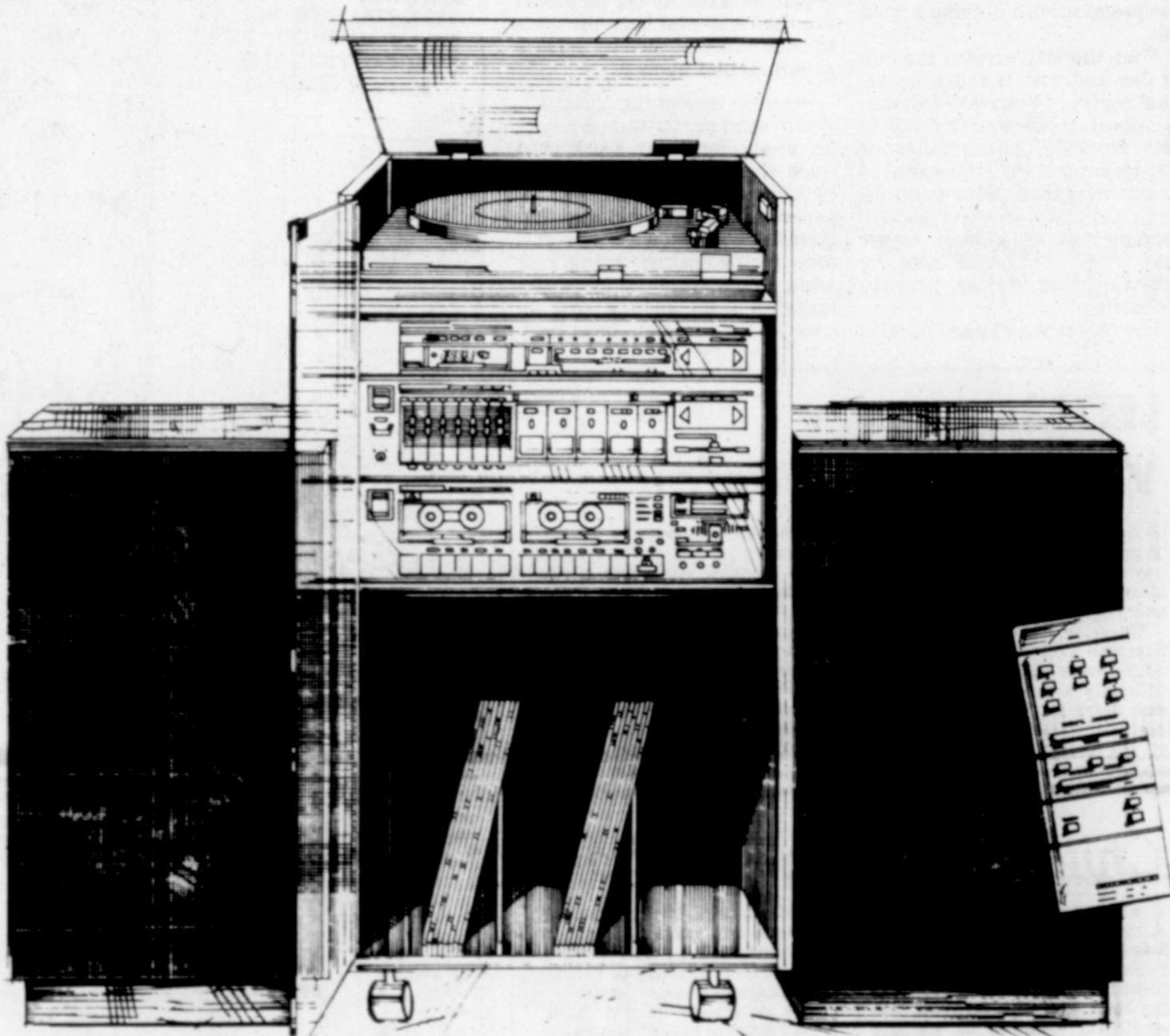
The governor, who plans to join President Reagan and other officials today for a memorial service in Houston, said Texans feel a special loss since the state serves as home base for the nation's space program.

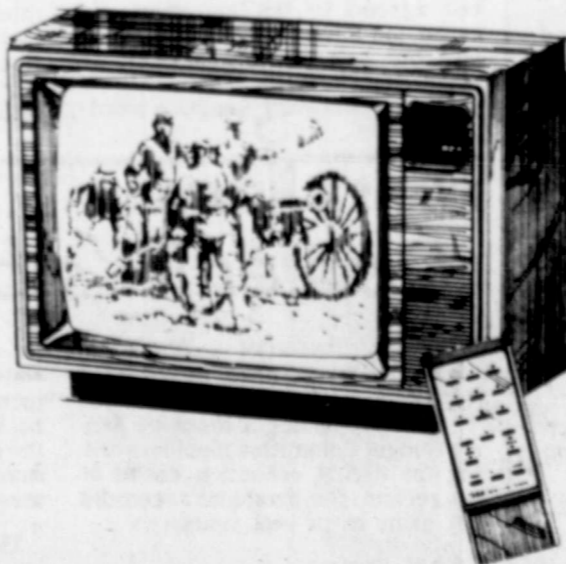

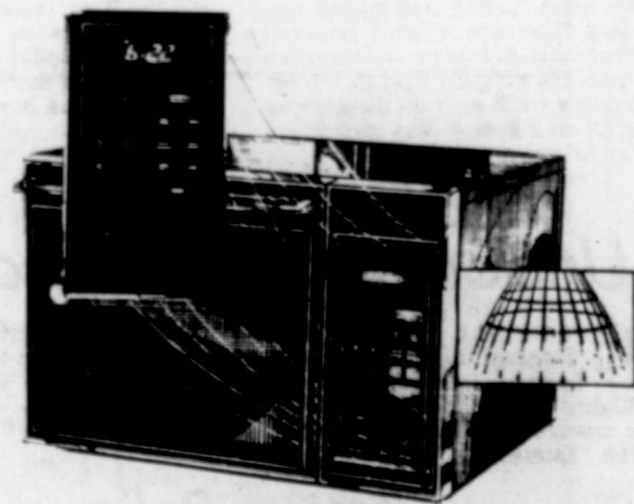

Extra care can boost pecan crop

After a good pecan crop such as the one in Texas this past year, a lot of backyard gardeners turn their thoughts to growing their own tasty morsels. Also, many commercial growers are continuing to expand operations.

One of the keys to growing pecans, whether in the backyard or in a commercial orchard, is to plant the trees properly so that they get off to a good start.

Tree planting time is at hand — January and early February are the best times.

To begin, select a tree 4 to 8 feet tall as soon as nurseries get supplies. Plant as soon as possible, using care not to let roots dry out or freeze.

Dig the hole only as large as the tree's root system. If the hole is too deep, the tree will settle and this can cause poor growth or death.

The taproot should sit in the bottom of the hole. If the hole cannot be as deep as the length of the roots, cut

back the taproot to fit the hole.

Pack original soil around roots as tightly as possible. Packing the soil in 2- to 3-inch layers is better than watering to pack the soil. Use adjacent soil to complete filling the hole, not light soil, sand or potting soil. The tree can drown in rainy weather if light fill soil is used on scaly land.

Plant the tree at the same depth it grew in the nursery row. Look at the colors to determine the soil line; the

bark is gray and the root is dark brown.

Cut off the top half of the tree at planting to balance the stem and roots and to force growth close to the soil line.

Wrap the lower 18 inches of the trunk with aluminum foil to prevent side shoots, sun scald and rabbit damage. On large plantings, use a mixture of white latex paint and water (one part paint to three parts

water.) Build a basin around the tree to hold water and give each tree five gallons of water immediately after planting. Make sure trees do not go longer than 14 days without water.

These basic steps in planting pecan trees can lead help get them into production in a few years.

Wind damage drops on Plains

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wind damage to land in the Great Plains is down sharply from a year ago, according to surveys by the Agriculture Department.

Wilson Scalling, chief of the department's Soil Conservation Service, said this week that 1.02 million acres were reported damaged in November and December by wind erosion in the most vulnerable parts of the 10-state region. That was down 33 percent from 1.53 million acres damaged a year ago.

November and December are the first two months of the annual seven-month season when winds normally are highest and the soils are driest. Surveys were made in 541 counties.

Scalling said 61 percent of the damage was in the southern Great Plains, where protective cover often is sparse because of a lack of moisture. Cropland sustained 86 percent of the damage, while 12 percent occurred on rangeland, and 2 percent on other land.

Land described as "in condition to blow" when winds are high was reported at 14.5 million acres, nearly 750,000 acres more than a year ago.

Scalling said that emergency tillage to prevent damage was used on 265,440 acres in November and December, with Texas accounting for 75 percent. Tillage consists of roughing up the surface of the soil to make it less susceptible to wind damage.

In all of the 1984-85 wind erosion season, damage was reported at 8.5 million acres in the 10 states. That was down sharply from 12.3 million acres damaged in 1983-84 when drought left sparse cover on so much of the region. That was one of the worst seasons for wind damage since the agency began records in the mid-1930s.

The worst season recorded was 1964-65 when 15.8 million acres of the Great Plains were damaged by wind. Another bad year was in 1980-81 when 14.5 million acres were damaged.

Conservationists consider land to be damaged when the effects of wind erosion "are apparent to the eye." That indicates an annual erosion rate of about 15 tons per acre. When such damage becomes visible, the erosion rate is already three to 10 times higher than most soils can stand without damage to their productive capacity.

According to the survey, the state-by-state breakdown comparing damaged acres in November and December with the damage during the same two months of 1984-85, included:

- Colorado, 5,000 acres damaged this season and 28,900 damaged in 1984-85.
- Kansas, 144,500 and 12,100.
- Montana, 217,400 and 711,200.
- Nebraska, 72,900 and 63,100.
- New Mexico, 8,900 and 4,200.
- North Dakota, 68,400 and 328,100.
- Oklahoma, 70,200 and 114,000.
- South Dakota, 8,000 and 91,300.
- Texas, 393,400 and 121,000.
- Wyoming, 32,500 and 54,300.

Trim budget hatches chicken inspector plan

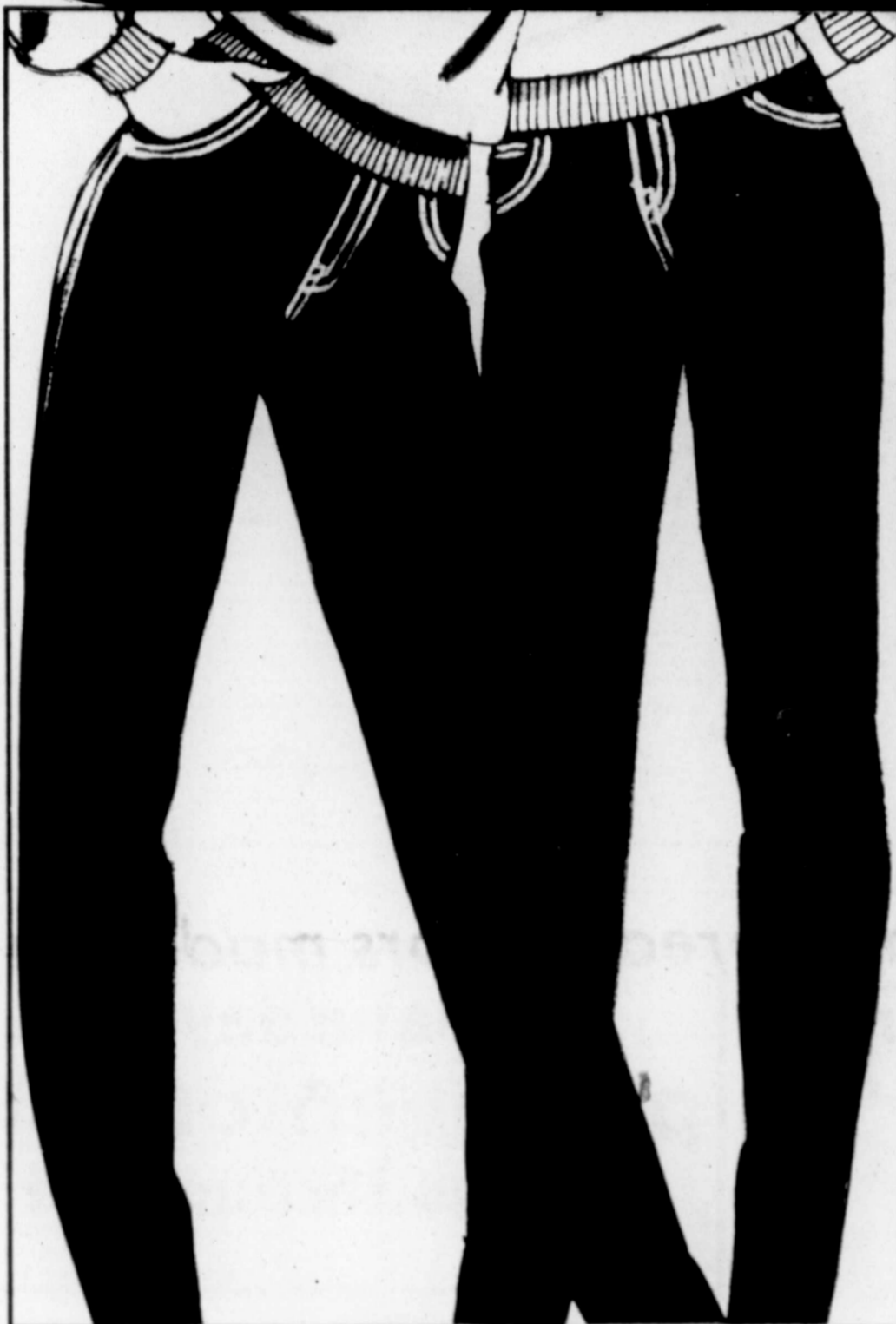
WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal spending rules, tightened by the Gramm-Rudman balanced-budget law, are forcing some changes among the government's chicken inspectors.

The Agriculture Department said this week the rule changes will apply immediately to poultry plants that turn out young chickens — the broilers sold in supermarkets.

"Our budget situation is an added impetus to implement the new procedure now," said Donald L. Houston, administrator of the department's Food Safety and Inspection Service. "Present resources do not allow us to meet the current, nor the anticipated, need for poultry inspection that is a result of growing consumer demand."

The new procedure will be mandatory in poultry plants currently operating under "modified traditional inspection" methods, which accounts for the vast majority of plants that slaughter young chickens, he said.

Until now, the inspection procedure was divided among three inspectors. The first, using a mirror, checks the outside of each chicken carcass. The other two check the internal organs and inside the body cavity.

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. — The golf tournament has a new name — the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am — but the same old weather, Crosby weather.

Q. Last July 30, I gave a broker \$10,000 to purchase mutual fund shares. The broker told me there was no way I could lose. Later, I found out I had paid him a \$500 commission and had bought only \$9,500 worth of shares. The monthly dividend check I receive from the mutual fund hasn't changed, even though the stock market has been running wild. If I cash this investment and put my money back in a certificate of deposit, will I get \$9,500?

A. You'll get the redemption value of the fund shares you own, which might be higher or lower than \$9,500. You "cash" an investment in a mutual fund by redeeming your shares — turning them back to the fund. The redemption value of most mutual funds is the "asset value per share" — the actual dollar and cents value behind each share. Some funds charge redemption fees. That information is in the prospectus the broker was required to give you. The share asset value can rise or fall. The monthly statements you receive from the fund list that price. Because stock and bond prices have risen since you made your investment, you almost certainly could redeem at a profit.

But that broker flat-out lied to you, if he actually said there was "no way" you could lose when stock and mutual fund share prices fall.

Q. Last July 30, I gave a broker \$10,000 to purchase mutual fund shares. The broker told me there was no way I could lose. Later, I found out I had paid him a \$500 commission and had bought only \$9,500 worth of shares. The monthly dividend check I receive from the mutual fund hasn't changed, even though the stock market has been running wild. If I cash this investment and put my money back in a certificate of deposit, will I get \$9,500?

A. You'll get the redemption value of the fund shares you own, which might be higher or lower than \$9,500. You "cash" an investment in a mutual fund by redeeming your shares — turning them back to the fund. The redemption value of most mutual funds is the "asset value per share" — the actual dollar and cents value behind each share. Some funds charge redemption fees. That information is in the prospectus the broker was required to give you.

The share asset value can rise or fall. The monthly statements you receive from the fund list that price. Because stock and bond prices have risen since you made your investment, you almost certainly could redeem at a profit. But that broker flat-out lied to you, if he actually said there was "no way" you could lose when stock and mutual fund share prices fall.

Mexico, Venezuela reach oil price pact, could cut prices

CANCUN, Mexico (AP) — A spokesman says the presidents of Mexico and Venezuela, two of America's major foreign oil suppliers, reached a general agreement on oil price issues in talks which the Venezuelan leader said might lead to a joint price cut.

Mexican presidential spokesman Manuel Alonso said the agreement took place Thursday during a special one-day meeting between Presidents Jaime Lusinchi of Venezuela and Miguel de la Madrid of Mexico in this Caribbean island resort.

"There is agreement in principle and now a working group from the two countries is negotiating and discussing final details of a joint communique," Alonso said Thursday night.

Release of the statement was delayed until today, and no details were available in the meantime. The two presidents remained in Cancun overnight, but both were scheduled to leave today.

As the presidents discussed oil-related issues, speculation intensified about what petroleum prices Mexico would fix for January. Mexico announces prices the end of every month, retroactive to the beginning of the month, but the announcement could be delayed into early February.

Before the meeting, Lusinchi had raised the possibility that the two countries might lower crude prices.

"It's possible Mexico and Venezuela may be preparing an adjustment of prices," Lusinchi said before leaving for the meeting at Cancun, a small island off the Yucatan Peninsula.

Both nations are heavily dependent on oil exports and the recent sharp drop in oil prices, mostly below \$20 a barrel, has raised concern about their ability to

meet payments on their foreign debts.

Mexico, with a foreign debt of \$96.4 billion, second highest in the developing world after Brazil, earns about 70 percent of its foreign exchange from oil exports.

Venezuela, which owes foreign creditors \$35 billion, depends on oil for 90 percent of its export earnings.

Before the conference began, Mario Ramon Beteta, director of the Mexican oil monopoly PEMEX, said Mexico had not yet decided on its January prices.

"Mexico doesn't have any price. We are working on it," Beteta said.

Mexico's prices are set by a group of experts from Petroleos Mexicanos, the energy, mining and oil department and other Cabinet ministries.

Mexico slashed its average price by 90 cents a barrel in December. The cost to the United States is \$26.25 a barrel for light isthmus crude and \$22 for the heavy Maya brand. It differs for other geographical areas, depending on transportation costs.

Beteta, Energy Secretary Francisco Labastida Ochoa and Treasury Secretary Jesus Silva Herzog were in Cancun for the meeting.

Mexico sells about half its oil exports of 1.5 million barrels a day to the United States. Supplying 13 percent of U.S. oil imports, Mexico is the United States' biggest foreign supplier.

About 40 percent of Venezuela's exports of 1.51 million barrels a day are sold to the United States.

Silva Herzog said the purpose of the talks was "to try and buffer the situation which the world oil market is going through and defend the interests of our countries."

—The stock market was mixed, as the Dow Jones industrial average closed down 6.76 at 1,552.18, ending a five-session winning streak.

—The Federal Reserve Board reported that M1, the nation's basic money supply, including cash in circulation, deposits in checking accounts and non-bank travelers checks, rose \$3.7 billion in mid-January to a seasonally adjusted \$628.3

billion in the week ended Jan. 20. That was up from \$622.6 billion the previous week.

—The U.S. dollar fell in trading at home and abroad. The dollar recovered a bit in U.S. trading, but still finished lower against most major currencies except the Canadian dollar. Gold prices were mixed.

Relatively strong economic growth over the past three years has helped keep the value of the dollar

high relative to other major currencies, thereby aggravating the net trade deficit.

Thursday's report on the merchandise trade balance showed that in December the United States imported \$17.4 billion more than it exported, the highest monthly trade deficit ever — up 27 percent from November's \$13.7 billion deficit. It was far above the \$12 billion average for the first 11 months of the year.

Efforts to reorganize air traffic controllers yet to get off ground

WASHINGTON — More than four years after air traffic controllers lost their union as a result of an illegal strike, an effort to reorganize them has yet to get off the ground.

Leaders of two unions wanting to reorganize the controllers say they are hearing the same complaints of long hours and unresponsive management that precipitated the Aug. 3, 1981 walkout by nearly three-fourths of the controllers.

That walkout resulted in President Reagan firing more than 11,000 striking controllers and the decertification of their union, the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization.

Now vying to reorganize the controllers are the American Federation of Government Employees and a new union, to be known as the National Air Traffic Controllers Association, which is being funded by the Marine Engineers Benevolent Association. The federation claims some 210,000 members, while the association has about 30,000 members, including its affiliates.

Reorganization efforts have been

hampered by a jurisdictional dispute between the two competing unions, and uncertainty whether there is enough pro-union sentiment among the nation's 14,000 controllers for an election on union representation.

The jurisdictional dispute could be resolved by mid-February. But the most optimistic projection is that there will be no election before summer.

The controllers' employer, the Federal Aviation Administration, caused part of the delay by blocking an effort to organize the controllers on a regional basis. But a federation leader acknowledged the union rivalry also has slowed the effort.

"We really have not had as much problem with management as we have with our own brothers and sisters in labor," said John Sturdivant, executive vice president of the federation.

Sturdivant was referring to the marine engineers union that, as the parent organization for the defunct PATCO, had jurisdiction to organize the controllers. He claimed the engineers' union gave up its rights to organize the controllers as part of an

agreement to resolve another dispute between the two AFL-CIO affiliates.

However, John Thornton, national coordinator for the new union, contended the marine engineers did not give the federation exclusive rights to organize the controllers.

Thornton, who formerly held a similar post with the federation, said the federation's inability to organize the controllers during the last two years, and its unsuccessful attempt last year to transfer the organizing authority to the Air Line Pilots Association, gives the marine engineers the right to step back into the picture.

Sturdivant said the federation turned to the pilots after its early, more modest attempt to organize the controllers one region at a time was blocked by the FAA.

"The FAA was fighting us tooth and nail," Sturdivant said. "The FAA position was the appropriate unit would be a national unit. We didn't totally disagree with that, but we were trying to carve out something that was manageable."

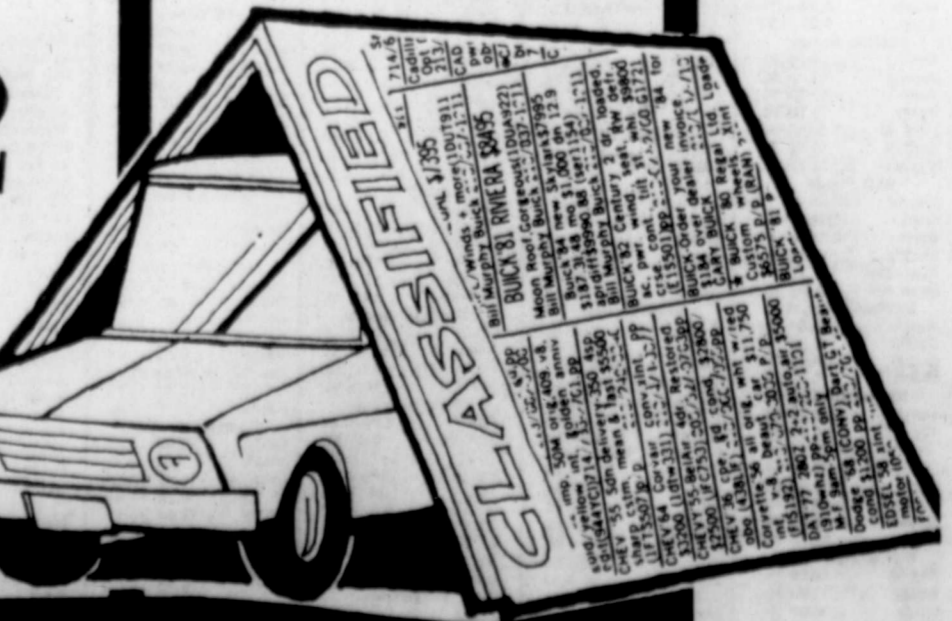
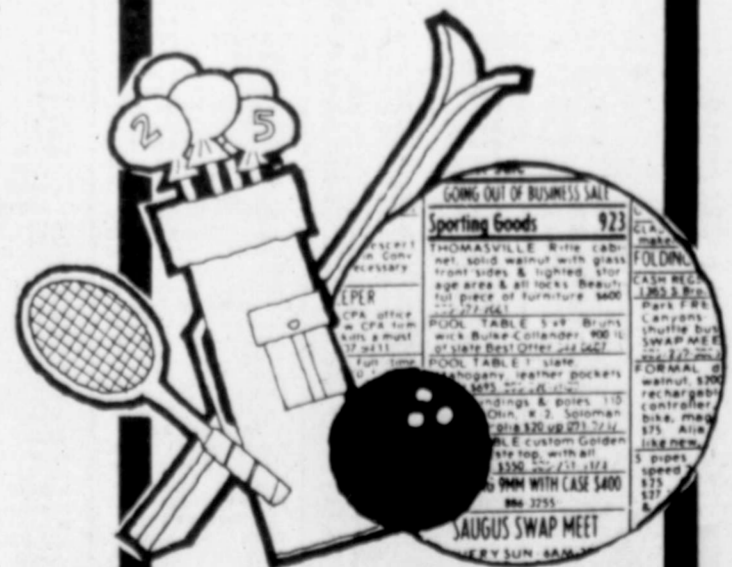

Panel finds no evidence of wrongdoing in Lucas probe

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Public Safety Commission says it has found nothing in the Henry Lee Lucas murder investigations to indicate any wrongdoing by the Department of Public Safety, particularly the Texas Rangers.

The statement followed a comment by Mattox Tuesday that he thought there had been a "great miscarriage of justice" in investigating Lucas' claims he was responsible for more than 300 murders.

Last year, published reports by the Dallas Times Herald cast doubt that Lucas, who has been sentenced to death in one Texas slaying, could have committed many of the crimes. Rangers officials said at the time that they had merely acted as coordi-

nators for local officials investigating Lucas. Mattox told a news conference Tuesday his office would issue a report shortly on its investigation into the Lucas confession, particularly concerning the Texas Ranger "task force" that worked with local officers from several states.

Recovered blood not identified, chemist testifies

LIVINGSTON (AP) — A Texas Department of Public Safety chemist has testified he recovered but could not identify small amounts of human blood from the pickup truck of a former junior high school principal accused of murdering a football coach.

Mike McGeehon also told the jury Thursday a laboratory analysis proved a tiny amount of white powder found during a police search of Billy Mac Fleming's apartment was "90 percent pure cocaine."

Fontenot, 48, former principal at Hull-Dalsetta Woodson Junior High School, is charged in the April 12 shooting death of Fleming, 36, who coached and taught math and science at the school.

Prosecutors allege Fontenot was jealous of Fleming because he planned to marry Laura Nugent, 36, the school secretary.

McGeehon testified he scraped a small amount of dried blood from a crossbar beneath the bed of Fontenot's pickup truck. He also said he swabbed 13 spots of suspected blood from the inside of a school district camper shell that Fontenot borrowed.

Although laboratory tests showed the crusted blood was human, McGeehon said, he could not say it was Fleming's blood.

McGeehon also said an analysis of a small plastic baggie containing white powder recovered from Fleming's bathroom April 17 showed the substance was cocaine.

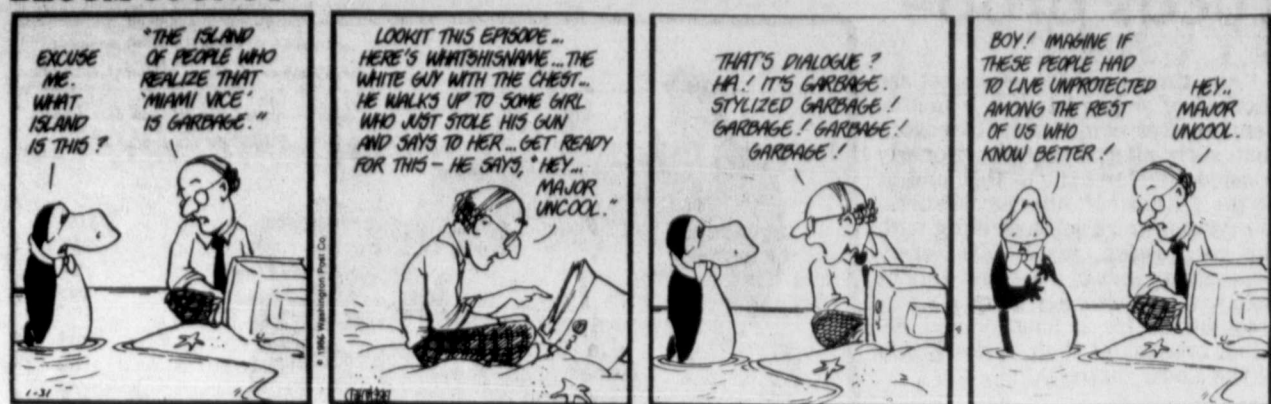

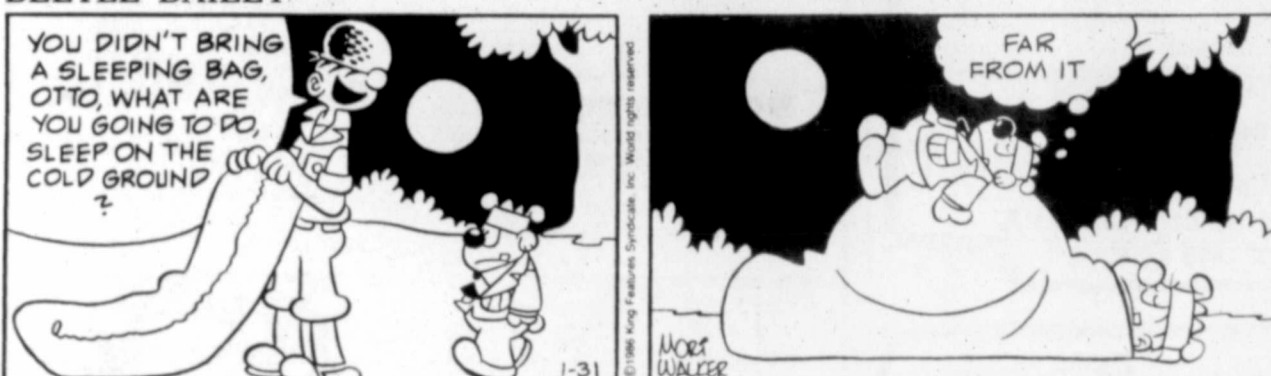

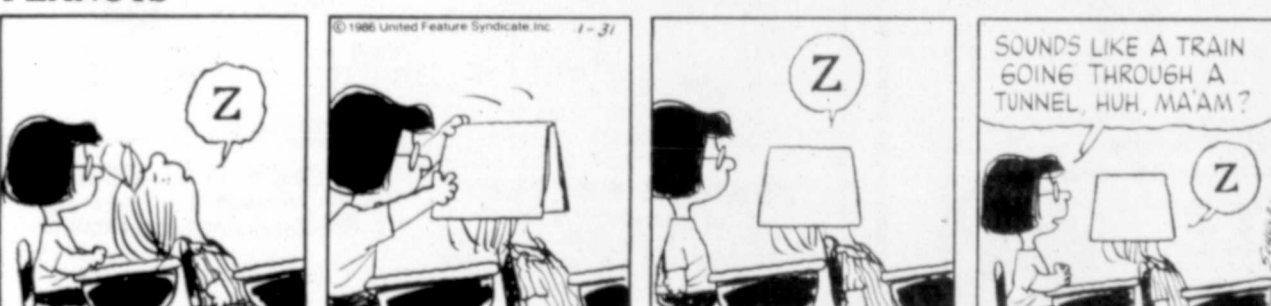

HELP FOR YOUR FRIEND

Both vulnerable. South deals.

NORTH: ♠ K 8 6 3, ♥ A K 2, ♦ 7 5 4, ♣ K 4 2. WEST: ♠ 9 7, ♥ 10 8 6, ♦ K Q J 10 9, ♣ J 9 3. EAST: ♠ Q J 10 5 4, ♥ Q J 9 5, ♦ 8 2, ♣ Q 6. SOUTH: ♠ A 2, ♥ 7 4 3, ♦ A 6 3, ♣ A 10 8 7 5.

The bidding: South West North East 1 ♠ Pass 1 ♠ Pass 1 NT Pass 3 NT Pass Pass Pass. Opening lead: King of ♠.

Every card played by a defender should tell a story. If partner listens to the tale, he might find a way to help.

North-South reached a reasonable three no trump contract after an uncomplicated auction. Since all North's points were prime, his hand was actually worth more than the 13 it counted. Unfortunately, South did not use his assets to best advantage.

West led the king of diamonds, then continued with the queen and nine when declarer held up the ace for two rounds. Since this defense marked West with the J-10 of diamonds, his nine had to be a suit preference signal, showing a possible entry in the lower-ranking suit: clubs. To give his partner a helping hand, East discarded the queen of clubs!

Now there was no way for declarer to set up his clubs without allowing West to gain the lead, and when he did West had two more diamonds to cash. Down one.

We salute East for his brilliant defense, but he did receive an assist from declarer. South should have won the second round of diamonds, thus preventing East from jettisoning the queen of clubs.

Declarer must set up clubs by losing a trick in the suit to East. If East then has a diamond to return, the suit is breaking 4-3, and declarer can afford to lose three diamond tricks and a club.

At trick three, declarer must cross to dummy with a heart and lead a club toward his hand. If East pops up with the queen, he is al-

lowed to hold the trick; if he plays low, declarer rises with the ace and ducks a club, hoping to find that East had started with either a doubleton queen or Q-J-x. Nine tricks come rolling home.

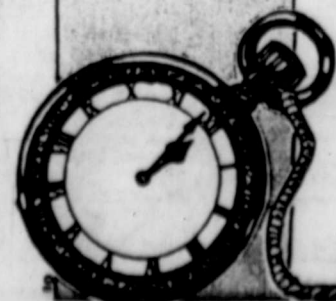

Eastwood ready to 'clean up' town

CARMEL, Calif. (AP) — Actor Clint Eastwood, who has made a career of playing hard-bitten heroes not afraid to take the law into their own hands, is hoping to take a stab at the role of small-town mayor.

Eastwood, 55, filed papers on Thursday to run for mayor of Carmel, a picturesque city on the Monterey Peninsula that he has called home for 14 years. "Our village faces some fundamental problems which are not being solved by our current mayor and city council," he wrote in a candidate's statement that was part of his filing.

Eastwood said he prefers diplomacy as a means of solving problems and labeled the current council and mayor Charlotte Townsend "litigious." If he is victorious in the April 8 election, Eastwood said he would cut back on activities with his motion picture company, Malpasco Productions.

Mrs. Townsend said she thinks "the accomplishments of this council in the past four years have been profound."

"Folks my age love to reminisce, and I'm no different. It's a form of conceit, I reckon, or perhaps escape from a frenetic world, different from the one we knew," said the 73-year-old entertainer, whose real name is Sarah Cannon.

In addition to her Opry appearances, Miss Pearl appears on the syndicated television show "Haw Haw" and on "Nashville Now," a musical talk show on cable television.

VOLTERRA, Italy (AP) — Soviet poet Yevgeny Yevtushenko was awarded Italy's prestigious Etruria Prize for Literature for his collection of verses, "Romance in Poetry."

Yevtushenko, en route to New York for the Feb. 5 premiere of his autobiographical film, "Kindergarten," was the focus of ceremonies Thursday night in this northern Italian city of 13,000 people.

"Thank you for inviting me to this small — but not provincial — city in the provinces," Yevtushenko told his audience in Italian. "I, too, was born in a small town of Siberia and I am sure that the true spirit of the people finds itself in the small cities, not in the capitals."

OLATHE, Colo. (AP) — Country-western singer C.W. McCall says he wasn't surprised by the first controversy he faced as the mayor of Olathe, a small town in the San Juan Mountains: deer feasting on residents' lawns, roses and hedges.

McCall, whose real name is Bill Fries, was elected mayor of Olathe in southwest Colorado last year. He has lived there part-time for 10 years.

Some folks wanted the mayor to do something about the deer, while others said the animals should be left alone. Fries recalled in remarks before the Olathe Chamber of Commerce's annual banquet. About half the town showed up to debate the deer problem at his first town council meeting as mayor, said Fries.

GLENDALE, Calif. (AP) — Actress Lilli Palmer has been laid to rest without fanfare in a private burial, with two cemetery employees the only people looking on.

Miss Palmer died Jan. 24 at age 71, apparently of a heart attack. A day earlier, she had been released from Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, where she had been hospitalized since Jan. 3 for treatment of cancer.

Miss Palmer's husband since 1957, Carlos Thompson, returned to their home in Switzerland the day after she died, said Dick Fisher, a spokesman at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale.

Fisher said Thompson asked the mortuary to handle a private burial, and those wishes were carried out Wednesday.

In addition to the cemetery workers who buried the casket, two employees were on hand as witnesses, he said. It is Forest Lawn policy to have witnesses at every burial.

The Austrian-born actress, who was married to actor Rex Harrison from 1943 to 1957, stars in the eight-hour NBC miniseries "Peter the Great" that starts this weekend. It was her last work as an actress.

HOLLYWOOD (LAT) — Edward Biberman, whose murals of early Los Angeles proved so representative that they were painstakingly removed and stored during remodeling of the new Federal Building 20 years ago, died Monday.

He was 81 and died in his Hollywood Hills home of cancer.

His career as an artist spanned 60 years and his most recent honor came last month when it was reported that two of his life-size portraits — those of entertainer Lena Horne and author Dashiell Hammett — were purchased by the Smithsonian Institution's National Portrait Gallery.

Not all 'typical' freshmen seeking lucrative careers

Is the typical college student of the 1980s a tidy, aggressive, salary-above-all business administration major?

Not necessarily, says Stanford University professor Herant Katchadourian, who reports that a good chunk of college freshmen still have a desire for literature, music and the arts. In a study to be released this week, Katchadourian also found that women outnumber men 2-1 among "intellectuals." As such, they pursue such subjects as education, writing and the arts.

The 400 freshmen selected at random were divided into four categories: careerists (those who chose careers over education), intellectuals (those who chose education over careers), "strivers" (equally concerned with both) and unconnected (those not particularly concerned with either).

More than half the students were concerned with a liberal arts background, said Katchadourian. The highest number of students — about 30 percent — fell into the striver category. About 25 percent were careerists. Another 25 percent were "unconnected" and 20 percent fell into the intellectual group.

The findings debunked two stereotypes:

1. That the typical college student is

a dog-eat-dog capitalist who eschews Shakespeare over statistics and;

2. That women who pursue courses in literature and the arts are not particularly concerned about their financial futures, Katchadourian said.

"A lot of students are not following that blind pursuit. A substantial number are trying to get a good balance of both," he said. Katchadourian, professor of psychiatry and behavioral science, examined how undergraduates make academic and career decisions in his book, "Careerism and Intellectualism Among College Students." He said he was surprised to find women outnumbering men in intellectual pursuits because women entering graduate school have been typically preferring business programs to liberal arts studies.

"Unlike the men, they are willing to choose careers, but aren't as likely to sacrifice a liberal arts education," he said.

During the four-year study of the freshmen, Katchadourian and a colleague provided questionnaires, interviewed the students and found that most decided how they steered their college education long before they got there.

The researchers had expected students high in careerism would be low in intellectualism, and vice versa, but found that "they aren't mutually exclusive."

CMU faculty senate votes to erect plaque explaining inscription

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Carnegie Mellon University's faculty senate recently voted to erect a plaque explaining an 80-year-old inscription about the role of women in society rather than have the plaque removed.

"Everybody knows that stupid things are written on buildings and tombstones. The lesson in this is don't write on buildings," art professor Bruce Breland said.

The inscription, considered outdated by some, is chiseled into the wall of Margaret Morrison Hall, which was built in 1906 as headquar-

ters for the Margaret Morrison Carnegie College for Women.

It reads: "To make and inspire the home; to lessen suffering and increase happiness; to aid mankind in its upward struggles; to ennoble and adorn life's work; however humble — these are women's high prerogatives."

Professor Tom Kerr proposed erasing the statement because it implies that women are ranked below men. Others agreed that the inscription is biased.

"This is the first time I've encountered mankind used in this context.

It means that women are at best marginal members," said mathematician professor John Schaffer.

But others argued that erasing the words would mean erasing history. "Actually, this is a rather lovely statement. If it puts down anyone, it puts down men," said Bennett

McCallum, professor of industrial administration, during polite debate.

"I do not feel this belittles women's work particularly," said Nancy Evans, a senator from the university library who argued the inscription should stay. "It really doesn't seem that bad."

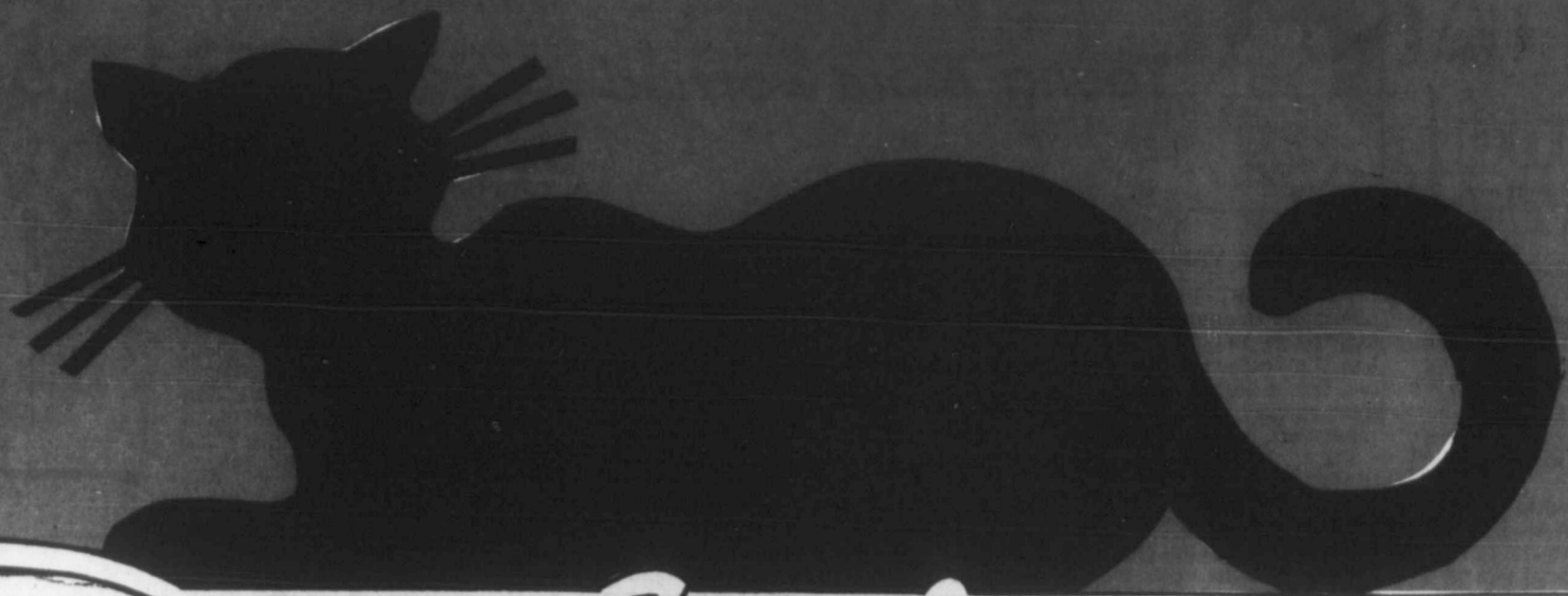
