### 'Net hacker

WASHINGTON — Using the first court-ordered wiretap on an Internet computer, federal agents tracked down a university student in Argentina and charged him with hacking into U.S. military computers. He gained access to sensitive data on satellites, radiation and engineering. Julio Cesar Ardita, a 22-year-old computer science student and son of a former Argentine military officer, was charged with conducting illegal computer entries from Buenos Aires where he lives, Attorney General Janet Reno told her weekly news conference Friday. The entries occurred between July 12 and Dec. 28, 1995, when Ardita's computer and files were seized by order of Argentine Federal Judge Wilma Lopez. She told The Associated Press in Buenos Aires that she is investigating criminal charges brought against Ardita by Telecom Argentina, whose telephone lines he used to reach the worldwide Internet.

## President OKs 12th stopgap resolution

■ Clinton also signs budget measure raising government's debt ceiling, Social Security earnings limit.

WASHINGTON — For the 12th time this deadlocked budget year, President Clinton signed a stopgap bill Friday to keep government running — and to let lawmakers begin a two-week spring break.

By voice vote in the House and a 64-24 Senate roll call, lawmakers agreed to temporarily let dozens of agencies function while the two sides continue their relentless battle over the size of job training, health and many other programs for 1996. Without the temporary legislation, large parts of many agencies would have been forced into an election-year closure at midnight that neither party wanted to see.

The White House said Clinton signed the bill in early evening. The resolution keeps the agencies

in funds through April 24 — when there will be a bit over five months left in the fiscal year. Clinton also signed another budget measure extending the government's ability to borrow money and letting working Social Security recipients receive higher benefits.

Legislators had hoped to complete their 1996 budget business before their Easter-Passover break, which began Friday afternoon. None was more eager to do so than Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., the GOP presidential candidate who wants this Congress to build a record of Republican achievements. Instead, chagrined lawmakers will return in mid-April facing unresolved spending questions about this year, and having to start work on the 1997 measures.

"I think we're 85 percent there, maybe 90 percent," House Appropriations Committee Chairman Bob Livingston, R-La., said of the 1996 legislation. "We're solving issues that have been lin-

## Selena

GONE TOO SOON

SAN ANTONIO — It has been almost a year since Selena was laid to rest on a grassy plain at the Seaside Memorial Cemetery in Corpus Christi.

Her final resting place is silent and serene.

But in the 12 months since her shooting death March 31, 1995,

nothing else surrounding her life, family and music has been remotely quiet.

Thousands of tributes and memorials have been held, a retrospective CD has sold millions of copies, and dozens of video specials have aired. Bootleggers and counterfeiters, look-alikes and wannabes have been busy, too.

A tribute tour and the movie "Selena" are in the works.

Selena Quintanilla Perez continues to have a wondrous impact as a superstar and role model. She is a bonafide Texas music legend and an authentic American hero at a time when

## Grand jury refuses to indict school officials on claim that they locked student in closet

HARLINGEN (AP) — The father of a special education student who was locked in an elementary school closet as punishment is denouncing a grand jury's decision against indicting school officials.

"It's a shame that no one's held accountable," John McKenna said Thursday. "I'm very disappointed about it. It's a sad day when it's been validated to us that yes, you can abuse handicapped children."

McKenna contends that in 1994, his 11-year-old daughter, Kathleen, was locked in a small closet at Treasure Hills Elementary school.

"From what we can piece together, it was at least three times for 30 minutes to one hour," he said.

The "timeout room," a closet measuring 8 feet high and roughly 4 feet by 5 feet wide, was locked from the outside, the only view from a small wire-mesh window.

After the McKennas filed police reports and notified the school district, Harlingen's fire marshal declared the structure a fire hazard and had it removed from the special education

# Nottingham's businesses seek facelift for community

NOTTINGHAM, England (AP) — Like the gentry of old Nottingham, business and some civic leaders have had quite enough of Robin Hood.

They want a new image for this city identified with the swash-buckling hero of medieval myth and modern movies. For them, a hero who steals from the rich and gives to the poor doesn't strike the right tone.

But traditionalists are fuming at the prospect of the famed outlaw being sidelined for some ad agency line about investment opportunities.

Just go a few blocks past the Robin Hood theme center on Maid Marian Way to city hall, and ask the Sheriff of Nottingham.

"People don't come to look at Nottingham's business world — they know nothing about it," says Sheriff Roy Greensmith, a retired rail man, city council member and current holder of the now ceremonial title.

"Visitors come because of the connection between the Sheriff and the legend of Robin Hood."

After 17 years of Conservative government, unease has grown in Nottingham about the town's link to an outlaw and a band of Merry Men armed with bows and arrows.

Two years ago, the city council, business and volunteer groups got together and commissioned a London firm to find out how people on the outside see this city of 280,000 on the edge of Sherwood Forest.

The answer was simple: They see Robin Hood. And not much else.

Now it's decision time. Four advertising agencies charged with finding something short and snappy — along the lines of "I Love New York" — make their presentations in a couple of weeks.

"Imagine a city as a brand," says Simon Wilkinson, chief executive of Nottingham First, a group of lawyers, accountants and other professionals pushing for change. "Then you want an image, an ad-like jingle."

"Saying 'The Robin Hood City' is saying it's a nice little place to go for a look-round, a bit of history, but it doesn't say much else."

Besides, he says, "I could say stealing from the rich and giving to the poor is a novel way of running professional business."

City officials advocate compromise — something new without ditching Robin. Labor veterans like Sheriff Greensmith have gone along with the search for a new image, but they don't see what's wrong with Robin Hood in the first place.

"There is a need in this country today for a social conscience," says Greensmith, his rail union badge pinned alongside his formal chain of office. "And if Robin Hood is not the personification of social conscience, I don't know what is."

Business leaders point out that with 11-percent unemployment — several points above the national average — the city should be more concerned about attracting Japanese computer chip plants and German electronics companies than with keeping the legend of Robin Hood alive.

Not so, says Ian Walker, manager of Tales of Robin Hood, a privately owned, \$2.3-million theme center with 45 staff members.

"This is what they are trying to destroy, all this folklore and history," he says, showing a visitor shelves of Robin Hood dish towels, little arrows and Sherwood Forest T-shirts.

As Walker's promotional literature acknowledges, there's no proof that Robin Hood actually existed. His grave has never been found.

# Eiffel Tower takes on new attraction

PARIS (AP) — Visitors to the Eiffel Tower will now get more than a great view: They'll get a lesson in how the monument was built.

Operations manager Didier Paul de Bacque said the new exhibit unveiled Thursday was intended to be "state-of-the-art modern, which, after all, was what the tower was when it opened in 1889."

The new attractions will open to the public this weekend. They include the Feroscope, a large glass sphere inlaid with peepholes through which people can scrutinize details of the tower's construction. Using interactive video screens, visitors can "paint" the tower, selecting from an electronic palette to see how it would look dressed in pink, yellow, or even plaid.

Another innovation is the Summit Movements Observatory, which demonstrates "live" the motion of the tower's point due to wind and sun.

There is also an animated display of one of the engineering feats involved in building the tower: It shows how hydraulic jacks were used to crank up thousands of tons of iron just a bit to ensure the tower's platforms would be perfectly level.

lifestyle sometimes passes for substance, controversy for celebrity.

She was the undisputed queen of Tejano, a blend of Mexican cumbias and rancheras spiced with elements of pop and country and propelled by the accordion.

The music originated in the 1800s in Texas when, it is believed, European immigrants introduced the accordion into the Texas-Mexico region. But Selena was one of the bright young stars who helped reinvent the music for a younger generation. She fused Mexican dance rhythms with MTV-era technology and incorporated ballads, touches of rock and hip-hop, rhythms from the Caribbean.

She captured the imagination of a culture, inspired thousands of girls and led a music genre toward mainstream acceptance. Her appeal crossed generational, cultural and geographic lines.

One year later, Selena's legacy continues to unfold in music, on TV and movies and in pop culture.

"Dreaming of You," which contained new songs in English and earlier Tejano hits, was the best-selling album in the country when it was released in July 1995.

So far it has sold 2.5 million copies. And as the anniversary of her death approached, the CD was still No. 1 on the Billboard Latin 50 album chart, where it had been for 33 consecutive weeks.

At one point last spring, five of Selena's CDs were on Billboard's pop charts at the same time, a feat accomplished only by the likes of Garth Brooks and the Beatles.

Selena's legacy can be heard at Corpus Christi's Q Productions, where music by artists such as 12-year-old Jennifer Pena is arranged, directed and produced by Selena's father, Abraham Quintanilla Jr., and her brother A.B. III.

Pena and her band Los Jets previewed songs from her highly anticipated debut album "Dulcissima" at a recent performance in San Antonio's Market Square. The Q Production team clearly has applied the same musical formula to her that helped lift Selena to the top — an emphasis on keyboard-driven, pop-inflected dance cumbias.

Selena's husband, Chris Perez, largely has withdrawn from the media spotlight since her death. He jammed with La Mafia during the Radio y Music Convention in January in Los Angeles, but otherwise he's kept a low profile.

There's street talk about Perez launching a rock band. But Q Productions officials say there are no concrete plans, and Perez was unavailable for comment.

In recent months Selena also has been the subject of several video specials. The most recent was the "Selena" pay-per-view program on Paragon Cable, which generated about 1,500 requests. Cable officials said that was an especially good number since the producers only had three days to promote the event. And then there's the unprece-

dent turnout for the "Selena" movie casting call March 16 in Market Square. Almost 6,000 people from throughout Texas and Mexico tried out for the parts of Selena at ages 8 and 18.

At one point the line of aspiring Selenas stretched from the Centro De Artes building all the way to Interstate 35, three blocks away. Thousands of girls wearing black pants or skirts, caps, bustiers and bright red lipstick jammed the square in a surreal scene.

Selena's mother, Marcella, said the impressive turnout was bittersweet.

"This is wonderful, and it makes me feel good that Selena had a lot of fans," she said. "I have been listening to the interviews, and they say they see her as a role model and look up to her, and they want to follow her footsteps and have a chance to be in the movie."

"That makes me feel good. But it's also been very hard for me because I see a lot of girls who look like Selena, and I have mixed emotions. I wish I had Selena here, that we wouldn't have to be going through this. But she is in the hearts of everyone here."

Selena's popularity has transcended South Texas and has had an impact on pop culture.

She has inspired hero worship similar in intensity, if not magnitude, to that surrounding Elvis Presley when he died in 1977. According to the Memphis press, 30,000 mourners filed by Elvis' casket.

The media reported the same number passed by Selena's coffin in Corpus Christi. The coffin had to be opened midway through her wake to silence rumors that the singer wasn't really dead.

The myth of Selena is apparent in the hundreds of murals painted across Texas, and the tributes devoted to her.

It's apparent in the number of babies christened with her name. Between April and mid-August, 537 newborn girls in Texas were named Selena, according to the state's Bureau of Vital Statistics. That's an average of about 100 a month.

And it's apparent in the parks and pavilions named after her.

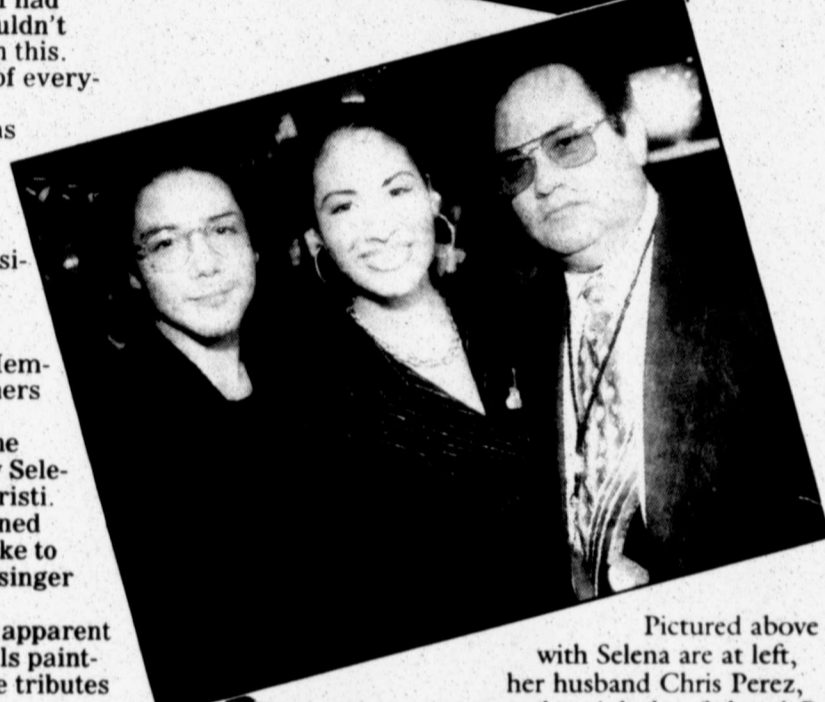
To date, at least five books on Selena have been published.

So many accomplishments to enjoy, with more sure to come. But all without the young woman whose incredible appeal is driving it.

Last summer, as EMI Records and EMI Latin launched an international promotional campaign for "Dreaming of You," EMI Latin president Jose Behar talked about that irony.

"It is our responsibility ... to continue her legacy and to really bring to the forefront the beautiful gift she left us, which was her music," Behar said.

"We can't change the tragedy. I wish we could but we can't. So we now have a responsibility to share her music with the world, which is what she wanted most when she was alive."

SAN ANTONIO — Selena's life has been dubbed a rags-to-riches story by some, a continuing novella by others.

Now, a new book and movie will chronicle the Tejano superstar's life story for those who can't seem to get enough of the big-voiced brunette from Corpus Christi.

Joe Nick Patoski, a senior editor at Texas Monthly, wrote the book, "Como La Flor," as a reality check. "Selena's story is not the sensational, trashy story that some would have you believe," Patoski said. "Nor is it a candy-coated story. It's a story about a young woman whose far-reaching appeal has transcended her death."

Patoski followed Selena's career closely after he wrote a feature article about her in 1994.

He says he wrote the book in part to help quench his curiosity about a young woman who once was designated one of the most important people in Texas. "Mine was not the first book," he said, "and it won't be the last."

## Biographer director refuse to sensationalize Selena's life story

The hardcover book is scheduled for release on Monday (April 1).

Director Gregory Nava said he set out to make a movie about Selena not because he was eager to jump on the singer's bandwagon, but because he wanted to showcase a celebration of family.

"This is just an incredible story of a family that started out with nothing and then went on and found the American dream through trials and tribulations," Nava said during a recent San Antonio casting call that drew thousands of young Selena wannabees.

"There's just a tremendous universality to that," said Nava, who directed "Mi Familia." "Selena's story is about family, and everyone comes from a family."

Filming is scheduled to begin in May, with a release date in December.

"Selena moved many in the Latino community," Nava said. "At long last, Latinos had a spokesperson. Her music, like my movie, is a celebration of who we are."

# Arctic experiment ends with bitter-sweet deal

TORONTO (AP) — Four decades after an icebreaker deposited them on two desolate Arctic islands, a few Inuit families are getting \$7.3 million in government compensation for their hardships. To their dismay, the payout comes with no apology.

The deal announced Thursday by the Department of Indian Affairs is intended to end years of inquiries and political wrangling over the controversial relocation project.

But it does not erase the bitterness of surviving Inuit, who say they were pawns in an ill-planned social experiment.

"The absence of an apology is a real slap in the face for us," said John Amagoalik, whose family was among four dropped off on a frigid gravel beach on Cornwallis Island in 1953 at the onset of the Arctic's four-month winter darkness.

The government said at the time that it was moving about 90 Inuit — known then as Eskimos — to the High Arctic because of poor hunting in their home territory, 1,200 miles away in northern Quebec.

The Inuit contend the government wanted to populate Cornwallis and Ellesmere islands to assert Canadian sovereignty and

to test whether the families could survive in primitive conditions.

No one disputes that the families volunteered for the move, but there is disagreement over whether they were fully informed about the conditions awaiting them in the Arctic — and the difficulties they would face trying to return to Quebec.

After years of resistance by his predecessors, Indian Affairs Minister Ron Irwin agreed that the government would pay \$7.3 million to the surviving members of the 17 Inuit families.

The package includes a \$5.9-million trust fund and \$1.5 million in cash for the 55 living exiles and descendants of those who have since died.

The Inuit say they were dumped on the shores of Resolute Bay and Grise Fjord without any housing or firewood. Some recall scavenging for food in the dump of a military base.

The Inuit pressed hard for an outright apology, but the final statement accepted by them and the Indian Affairs Ministry says simply that the hardships resulted "in part because of government planning and implementation."

The officials involved "were acting with honorable intentions in

what was perceived to be in the best interests of the Inuit at the time," the agreement says.

John Raynor, assistant deputy minister for the far north, said the government was adamant in refusing an apology.

"History is history," he said in a telephone interview Friday. "At the time, this relocation was done with every best intention to benefit these particular people."

Some retired officials were opposed to paying compensation, saying the Inuit would have starved to death in northern Quebec and now were manipulating white guilt to make money.

"I don't think for a minute that they suffered any real hardship," Gordon Robertson, a former commissioner of the Northwest Territories, told the Ottawa Citizen.

Such remarks infuriate the Inuit survivors, who remember disease and hunger during that first winter in an environment they were ill-prepared to deal with.

"How dare they talk like that when they're not the ones that went," said Martha Flaherty, who was a toddler when her family was moved to the High Arctic. "They don't know what we went through."

# Senate candidate Morales says he's not afraid student loan dispute will derail political career

Dem's wife has \$27,000 outstanding Indian Health Service education loan.

MARSHALL (AP) — Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Victor Morales said Friday he's not worried that his improbable political career will be derailed by a dispute with the federal government over a \$27,000 student loan to his wife.

"There is now a little bit of a problem going around in my campaign about a student grant, loan, whatever. And the newsmen are asking me 'Are you not concerned this might hurt your political career?'" Morales told an audience at the Suburban Acres Nursing Center.

"And I said, no ma'am, because I know who I am, I know where I stand, I don't go by what other people think. I live my life, and I feel secure," he said.

It was the first time Morales addressed the flap over the loan in a campaign speech, although several Texans said they're not concerned about the matter.

Morales and his April 9 runoff opponent, U.S. Rep. John Bryant, spoke at the nursing home after appearing at the Gregg County Democratic Party's candidate forum in Longview. One will claim the nomination to challenge Republican Sen. Phil Gramm in November.

In Longview, neither candidate brought up the issue of Dani Morales' outstanding Indian Health Service education loan. But both fielded media questions about it.

"My initial reaction is, if you have an overdue and outstanding student loan, you've got to pay that back before you start loaning money to your campaign," said Bryant, who as the Moraleses' congressman said he had tried to help them resolve the loan issue in the past.

"When they say, 'Do you think this will hurt you politically?', that's the least of my worries," said Morales, a Dallas-area teacher. "I fully was prepared that this was going to happen. I expected it, but we are clear of conscience."

Mrs. Morales' scholarship would have been forgiven if she worked in a health-related job helping Indians after she graduated from Texas Woman's University in the mid-1980s.

Morales says she was unable to find an appropriate job until three years later. By then she was married, had young children and was not in a position to pursue it, he said.

Bryant said he recalls speaking to Morales about the student loan when the couple sought his help. He said he has asked his staff to review his records on their case.

Asked why he had not raised the matter when Morales entered the race, Bryant said, "I knew about this but I thought it was case work and I wasn't going to mention it."

One of those attending the Longview forum, Patsy Kirk, said she wasn't concerned about the loan issue.

"Her student loan is not the dad-burned issue," said Ms. Kirk 41, of Longview. "His background cannot be any worse than anybody up there in Washington already. It would not bother me one iota."

In Marshall, Tonya Marks said she hadn't made up her mind about which candidate to support until she heard Morales and Bryant speak. Now she plans to vote for Morales.

"I think we need more people like that. I liked Victor Morales. He's not a politician. I think the politicians who are there, if they can't keep the government running, then they don't need to be there," said Ms. Marks, 25, a homemaker from Henderson.

# Official keeps arrest warrant for shock jock Stern on books

HARLINGEN (AP) — Justice of the Peace Eloy Cano says freedom of speech is alive and well in South Texas, except when it comes to Howard Stern.

That's why an arrest warrant he issued for Stern remains on the books nearly a year after the radio shock jock made disparaging remarks about slain Tejano star Selena.

"I wasn't doing it for the glory," Cano said Thursday. "I was doing it because it was the right thing to do. I have no regrets at all."

Cano issued the warrant for disorderly conduct after Stern made offensive comments about Selena and Hispanic culture following the singer's March 31, 1995, murder.

"Alvin and the Chipmunks have more soul. ... Spanish people have the worst taste in music. They have no depth," Stern said on his nationally syndicated show. He also mixed in sounds of gunfire with a tape of Selena's music and ridiculed the shape of her body.

Stern later apologized for the remarks, which were not broadcast in the Rio Grande Valley.


Enraged Hispanic groups called for boycotts of the show and its advertisers. The boycotts have since been lifted but not the warrant, which was based on a complaint filed by Laura Barboza, Cano's secretary.

The warrant means Stern could be arrested as soon as he steps foot in Texas. Disorderly conduct is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a maximum fine of \$500.

The arrest order can be voided if Cano or Ms. Barboza pull it or if Ms. Barboza dies.

# Atlantis heads home early with leaky hydraulics

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Atlantis' astronauts headed for an early return to Earth today because of a steering-system leak, after dropping off a shuttle crewmate at Russia's space station for a five-month stay.

NASA shortened the shuttle mission by one day because of the hydraulic trouble and cloudy, windy weather in the forecast later in the weekend at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Because of the leak, the space agency wanted to give the crew a greater margin of safety and bring the shuttle home in the best possible weather.

Atlantis sprang the leak in one of three identical hydraulic systems during liftoff on March 22, and NASA briefly considered ending the mission as soon as the shuttle delivered astronaut Shannon Lucid to space station Mir. But the space agency decided it would be safe for the shuttle to proceed with five days of docked flight with Mir.

On Friday, three of Atlantis' 38 primary steering thrusters failed during a routine check. But the problem was not considered serious.

Atlantis was scheduled to land at Cape Canaveral just before 9 a.m. CST today. Forecasters' only concern was fog.

"I don't think we're going to be all that apprehensive," said mission operations representative Bob Castle. Typically, the shuttle needs only two of the hydraulic systems to land safely; in near-perfect weather, it could do it with just one system, although that's never been

tried, Castle said. The hydraulic systems control the landing gear, rudder and wing flaps.

After a week in orbit and with all their objectives accomplished, the five shuttle astronauts are bringing back 1,200 pounds of cargo

from the Mir station, including science experiments and empty food containers.

It was a fast-paced flight for the Atlantis crew: launch on Friday, dock with Mir on Saturday, haul 4,800 pounds of cargo to Mir on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, conduct a spacewalk on Wednesday, undock from Mir on Thursday, pack on Friday, land on Saturday.

"This was about as good a mission as you could do," said Frank Culbertson, director of NASA's shuttle-Mir program. "I think, though, that the part that is really significant is now Shannon is on orbit."

Lucid is the second American and the first American woman to live on Mir. By the time Atlantis returns for Lucid in August, she will have spent more time in space than any other American.

Five more NASA astronauts will take turns living on Mir until mid-1998. By then, U.S.-Russian crews should be occupying a newly built international space station.

"I expect to see us in space together for the rest of my life, if you think about it," said the 46-year-old Culbertson. "I think we'll be there for a long, long time."

# Suspect escapes from Dallas County courthouse

DALLAS (AP) — A court security officer was hurt Friday when a suspect escaped from a Dallas County courts building near downtown Dallas.

The fugitive commandeered a county vehicle about 3 p.m. outside the Crowley Courts Building.

The fugitive appeared to be armed, witnesses said. Two security officers leaped on the vehicle in front of the courts building. One fell off and was run over by the car, Deputy David Robinson said.

Isiah Stanley Robinson, 27, was in a bond forfeiture hearing on misdemeanor vehicular, weapons and drug charges when pushed a bailiff and fled Judge Vic Cunningham's fourth-floor courtroom.

He scurried down four flights of an upbound esca-

lator to the lobby, where he encountered sheriff's Capt. Gary Lindsey and another man at the front door.

Across the street, security officer Antonio Morino was stepping from his Dallas County car when the fugitive approached, pursued by security officer Robert Brightwell, Deputy Danny Chandler said.

Morino and Brightwell tried to tackle Robinson when he reached the street. But during the struggle, Robinson grabbed Brightwell's .357-caliber handgun, jumped into Marino's county car and fled north on Industrial Boulevard with Brightwell and Marino hanging on to the car, Chandler said.

Brightwell hit the pavement after falling from the car, breaking his arm, Chandler said.

# German soldiers patrol former Yugoslavia for first time since WW II

RASELJKE, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Senior cadet Dirk Roester downshifts his supply truck over mountains where an earlier generation of German soldiers battled Yugoslav partisans during World War II.

His mission, however, is peaceful. The 14-vehicle column is making a seven-hour trip to deliver bullets, toilet paper, boot polish and food from a depot in Croatia to British soldiers camped out in the Bosnian Serb town of Sipovo.

Roester is among about 2,700 German soldiers sent to four bases in Croatia to provide support for NATO-led forces camped out in Bosnia. They are carrying out Germany's first true military mission abroad since World War II — proof to the country's NATO allies that Germany is willing to put its soldiers at risk in the name of peace.

The significance of the mission was drilled into the soldiers before they arrived. They heard lectures on the atrocities committed by Hitler's troops. And they were told to be moderate drinkers and

model soldiers, on their best behavior with civilians.

The Germans are quartered in relatively comfortable, prefab buildings at their seaside Croatian bases. They go sightseeing, dine out and drink beer after hours, luxuries denied their American comrades in Bosnia.

But their work is hazardous. Some drive convoys across the former confrontation lines in Bosnia to deliver essentials to other NATO soldiers. Others clear minefields in Bosnia and are building a bridge in Visoko, near Sarajevo, for use by NATO-led troops.

"We value very highly the German contribution. They are taking their share of rough times," says Lt. Col. Mark Rayner, a spokesman for the NATO-led ground troops in Bosnia.

On March 15, at the Visoko bridge site, a German engineer was injured by a mine blast. A week later, another mine exploded beneath a German armored vehicle at the same site, but caused no casualties.

Most Bosnian Serbs don't want

the Germans in Bosnia because German troops and their fascist Croatian allies massacred Serbs during World War II. Along with the usual hazards — land mines, bandits coveting NATO equipment — German troops face the possibility that someone might try to avenge the bloodshed of half a century ago.

So when German troops travel into Bosnia, they go ready for trouble.

The 30 soldiers in Roester's convoy wear flak vests and helmets. Their assault rifles are loaded. A small tank with a 20-mm cannon is leading the convoy, and another brings up the rear. There's a chemical toilet on one truck, sparing soldiers a walk into the woods — where there could be land mines — when nature calls.

The deeper they go into Bosnia, the more damage they see from nearly five years of civil war. Roester, 22, is reminded of the carnage his grandfather told him of seeing as a soldier fighting in the Soviet Union during World War II. "My grandpa told me that war

is horrible because innocent civilians always get caught up in it," he says, both hands gripping the steering wheel as he dodges potholes. "You can see the same thing here in Bosnia."

After World War II, successive leaders in Bonn had interpreted unclear passages in the post-war German constitution as forbidding them to send troops to non-NATO areas.

Pressure mounted on Germany to change the policy after the country's reunification in 1990 and after the 1991 Gulf War, in which Germany did not take part despite grumbling among its allies.

## British Queen ends Czech visit

PRAGUE, Czech Republic (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II wound up her visit to the Czech Republic on Friday with a brief tour of Prague enlivened by thousands of flag-waving citizens.

The queen and prince Philip were on a three-day official visit to the Central European country on the invitation of President Vaclav Havel.

"I know that Prague, a city of which any continent would be proud, will be a worthy European City of Culture in the year 2000," she said in a brief speech.

Prague and eight other cities, including Avignon in southern France and Krakow in Poland, will receive the honorary title awarded by a European Union commission in four years.

The queen received a symbolic key for the city's gates before viewing the Town Hall's astronomical clock, one of the city's best-known tourist attractions.

The prince visited Prague's traditional Staropramen brewery, recently taken over by the British giant Bass PLC.



# Cancer drugs should get to market sooner with FDA ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Food and Drug Administration announced guidelines today advising makers of cancer drugs how they can get the medicines approved as fast as new AIDS drugs.

The FDA has always insisted it would give special "accelerated approval" to any drug that offered dramatic hope for cancer, but manufacturers weren't sure what steps to take to qualify.

The new measures were unveiled at the White House by

President Clinton, who lost his mother and stepfather to cancer. The provisions explain that instead of proving a drug prolongs cancer patients' survival or quality of life — lengthy and expensive research to do — they instead could prove simply that it causes a tumor to shrink.

The change could shave at least a year off the time oncology drugs spend being tested and cut in half the FDA's review of them, from 12 months to six.

Clinton said the development

and approval process for cancer drugs can take years, an unbearable time for patients and their families.

"So I am happy today to say to those patients and to their families, the waiting is over," the president said. "Today we announce a major new initiative to speed new cancer therapies to our people. These changes will affect at least 100 drugs now being studied.

"Dozens of them will get to the market sooner and that means they can help Americans suffering

from cancers of the breast, lung, ovary, prostate and colon, among others," the president added. "To these Americans we cannot guarantee miracles but at least now new hope is on the way."

The program is the brainchild of Dr. Michael Friedman, a National Cancer Institute scientist who joined the FDA six months ago under orders to make improvements in how lifesaving drugs are treated.

And FDA Commissioner David Kessler, under increasing scrutiny

from a Congress upset that AIDS drugs are approved much faster than medicines for any other disease, earlier this month hinted at the new cancer push.

"If there is an oncology drug and we have reason to believe it works, patients in this country will have

access to it," he promised a congressional subcommittee.

On Thursday, a Senate committee approved broad legislation that would help Americans get new medical therapies faster and broaden access to European treatments.

## Illegal immigrants start fire, riot in military stockade

MIRAMAR NAVAL AIR STATION, Calif. (AP) — Illegal immigrants jailed in a Navy brig started a fire and rioted Friday afternoon, the military said.

Several injured inmates were taken to Scripps Hospital in La Jolla, said Marine Staff Sgt. Arnold Patterson. San Diego police were called to the hospital because the inmates were causing a disturbance there, he said.

No details on the number injured or the hospital disturbance were available.

The rioting and fire began at 1:15 p.m., and smoke could be seen rising from the brig on the sprawling air station, which was closed to the media and other civilians. The fire was extinguished by 2 p.m.

U.S. Attorney Alan Bersin got permission last year to use the stockade as a second jail for federal inmates and criminal illegal immigrants to ease overcrowding at the downtown San Diego federal detention center.

Miramar's brig, which holds prisoners from

all branches of the military and bases throughout Southern California, has room for 360 prisoners with one prisoner to a cell.

U.S. Corrections Corp. of Kentucky has an \$11 million contract with the U.S. Marshal's Service to house civilian prisoners at the Navy Consolidated Brig Miramar.

The agreement between the marshal's service and the Navy marked the first extensive use of a military jail to house civilian prisoners.

# Government witness testifies to submitting forged documents

LITTLE ROCK (AP) — A government witness who implicated President Clinton in a deal that brought charges against Clinton's business partners admitted Thursday that he sent a forged document to a federal agency.

The witness, Bill Watt, testified that he did so to pressure David Hale to pay off a \$10,000 loan he said Hale conned him into taking from Hale's federally backed small business lending company.

Watt testified in the federal trial of Gov. Jim Guy Tucker and Clinton's Whitewater real estate partners James and Susan McDougal. Hale is expected to be

the government's chief witness in the trial, which is in its fourth week.

Later Thursday, prosecutors suggested that Watt had tried to encourage other potential witnesses to resist Whitewater investigators by referring them to lawyers who had been in contact with Clinton's lawyer, David Kendall, prompting angry objections from the defense.

"Is there anything wrong with someone having a lawyer and them getting together when you're fighting a \$1 million-a-month prosecution machine?" McDougal lawyer Sam Heuer asked.

On Wednesday, Watt said he was told by Hale that Clinton pressed Hale to complete an \$825,000 loan in another transaction which is at the center of the indictment accusing Tucker and the McDougals.

Hale also has publicly alleged that Clinton pressured him to make a loan of \$300,000 in 1986 to Susan McDougal. Clinton has said Hale's tale is "a bunch of bull."

Hale is a former municipal judge in Little Rock. Watt, a traffic judge, said he often acted as Hale's right-hand man, and agreed to take out the \$10,000 loan with the understanding that Hale

would pay it back.

An application for the loan from Hale's Small Business Administration-backed lending company to Watt said the money would be used to set up a law practice to accommodate business that Watt would conduct when he was not on the bench. That would have met federal restrictions on the loan.

Instead, Watt said he spent the money for other purposes at Hale's direction, including closing costs on a house Watt sold at a loss and a \$2,000 contribution to Frank White's 1986 gubernatorial campaign. White, a Republican, was challenging then-Gov. Clinton in

1986.

Watt said he did not learn until 1989 that the money he borrowed from Hale's Capital Management Services Inc. could only be used according to SBA regulations.

"David has a habit of representing that everybody else's money is his money," Watt testified.

When he found out that he had violated federal law, Watt said he nearly came to blows with Hale about the loan outside a Little

Rock restaurant.

Watt acknowledged under oath that he later produced a document truthfully itemizing how he spent the money and forged Hale's signature onto it. He said he meant to use it only to threaten Hale, but that he later sent the document to the SBA while negotiating to repay the loan. He said he paid the note in full in February.

## House passes bill to limit punitive damage awards; veto likely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Threatened with a veto, the House sent President Clinton legislation Friday to limit punitive damage awards in faulty-product lawsuits. Supporters from both parties called on Clinton to reconsider his promise.

By a vote of 259-158 — 19 votes shy of the number needed to override a veto — the House approved the compromise measure pushed by business groups.

It was at most half a loaf for House Republicans, who have contended that legal overhaul legislation is needed to stem a tide of frivolous lawsuits. A far more sweeping package affecting all civil lawsuits, not just product-liability cases, was passed by the House a year ago as part of the GOP's "Contract With America."

Last week, the Senate passed the faulty-products bill by a 59-40 vote. That was a victory for Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, Clinton's presumed election rival, but

also fell short of the 67 votes needed to override the president's veto.

"This is about restoring fairness to the American legal system, and this bill should not be a political issue," Rep. John Linder, R-Ga., said. "I urge the president to forego politics and do his job."

Democratic opponents recited a litany of past injuries to consumers from flammable pajamas, defects in cribs, mechanical failures in vehicles, asbestos insulation and silicon breast implants. They said victims would be inadequately compensated under the legislation.

"People are maimed for life

and burned, disfigured," said Rep. Harold Volkmer, D-Mo. "Veto the bill, Mr. President."

Rep. John Conyers of Michigan, the House Judiciary Committee's senior Democrat, noted the vote was occurring on the same day a House subcommittee held a hearing on a proposal to eliminate the federal Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Clinton has said he would veto the measure in its current form but would be willing to resolve differences with its supporters. Presidential spokesman Mike McCurry said last week that Clinton might work out differences after he

vetoed the bill.

Among other things, the administration opposes ceilings on damage awards intended to punish wrongdoing, a fundamental thrust of the legislation.

Under the measure, juries hearing faulty-products cases could grant a maximum punitive damage award of twice a claimant's compensatory damages.

## School principal accused of theft

PLAINFIELD, Wis. (AP) — Police used a marked roll of toilet paper to put the squeeze on a principal suspected of filching bathroom tissue from his high school.

Dennis Ferriter, 57, was suspended from Tri-County High on Wednesday after a search of his car and office turned up the marked toilet paper and two marked \$1 bills that had been placed in a vending machine, Superintendent James Erdman said. The markings could be seen only under ultraviolet light.

No immediate charges were filed. The district attorney is investigating the extent of the thefts.

Authorities suggested Ferriter may have taken the toilet paper for a bed and breakfast he owns. The principal refused to comment Friday.

A janitor first raised suspicions about Ferriter in February after noting that a roll of toilet paper was routinely missing from a supply room after Ferriter ate lunch there.

On Feb. 26, school officials and police began daily counts of the toilet paper. None was missing on days Ferriter was absent from school, police said.

Investigators also reported discrepancies between nightly audits of cash in the school's vending machines and Ferriter's deposits from them.

# House Republicans question Democrat's ethics

WASHINGTON (NYT)—As an independent counsel toils behind the scenes on his investigation of House Speaker Newt Gingrich, Republicans have launched an ethics counteroffensive against Democrats.

Three complaints have been filed in recent months against two Democratic leaders, and Republicans have made trade unions the target of an Federal Election Commission complaint modeled after one filed against GOPAC, the speaker's former political action committee.

"I guess a little turnabout is fair play," said Rep. John Linder, R-Ga., echoing Republicans' assertions that the Democrats misused the ethics process to attack Gingrich.

The tug-of-war comes at a time when the ethics committee is facing an exceptional workload.

The need to interpret a new gift ban and the committee chairwoman's decision to forgo outside help and conduct her own inquiries has led to more than 80 meetings for a committee that met only a dozen times two years ago.

Common Cause, the public interest lobbying group, and several House members say the recent machinations are proof that the ethics system is hopelessly tainted by politics and ought to be changed.

"This is a very political and very partisan Congress, and it's spilling over into the ethics committee," said Meredith McGehee, Common

Cause's legislative director. McGehee advocates the creation of an independent Office of Ethics Counsel to interpret the rules, investigate complaints and recommend sanctions.

Linder and other Republicans have suggested inserting a provision that if someone files a ethics complaint that is later dismissed, that person must cover the costs incurred by their target. "There's got to be some risk in it," Linder said.

Rep. Porter Goss, R-Fla., a member of the ethics committee, had planned to hold hearings on revamping the ethics process until he was named chairman of the subcommittee overseeing the Gingrich investigation.

Committee Chairwoman Nancy Johnson acknowledges that her panel has been tainted by the bitter atmosphere in the House. "The complaints reflect the tension in the chamber," she said.

"But if a system doesn't work in the hard times, it won't work at all. It's our job to make it work," she added.

Since the panel began considering ethics charges against Gingrich, two complaints have been filed against the speaker's chief antagonist, House Minority Whip David Bonior, by the Landmark Legal Foundation, an organization whose financial backers include some wealthy GOPAC backers.

One complaint focuses on a 12-year-old book on Vietnam veterans for which the Michigan Democrat

received no advance and has earned less than \$1,000 in royalties.

The second complaint alleges that Bonior improperly employs his wife as a office aide. Judy Bonior has worked for the House for more than 20 years and was an employee in the congressman's

office for four years before they were married in 1991.

House Minority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., is also facing an ethics complaint.

#### High-tech Hootie

Atlantic Records will release the new Hootie & The Blowfish single to radio stations across the country Monday.

For over 1,000 stations, the new song, "Old Man and Me," will not come via the traditional delivery person, but instead by modem. The audio-via-ISDN lines promises to deliver sound-quality equal to that heard on compact disc, according to Atlantic.

KBAT, Midland-Odessa's album rock station, is one of the stations set to receive the new Hootie via ISDN lines.

Bob Gerhard, the station's program director, says the station will transfer the audio to tape around 9 a.m. If all goes well, the song from the popular South Carolina band will make its debut sometime Monday morning.

"This is something we've seen the possibility of for a long time," Gerhard said. "For me personally, it's exciting to see our industry moving in this direction."

The new Hootie and the Blowfish album is set for an April 23 release.

#### Search for engines

Searching the Internet just got easier.

On Monday, San Francisco-based C/NET: The Computer Network launched Search.com, a site on the World Wide Web with links to more than 250 Internet search tools.

Search.com (http://www.search.com) lets users conduct direct searches of half a dozen top search services, including Yahoo, Excite and Infoseek, simply by typing in keywords and clicking.

In addition, the site provides access to hundreds of specialty search engines, organized by category. Using them, it's possible to scour the Net and pinpoint anything from a movie database to a job hotline.

"In the past, finding the desired information on the Internet has involved tracking down and using multiple searches," said Halsey Minor, CEO of C/NET.

"Search.com changes everything by providing a single point of entry into the Internet's most exciting information services."

Search.com features new technology that lets users personalize the site by placing their favorite search services right on the home page. The patent-pending technology "makes it possible for personalized pages to be delivered to users as fast as the static, unpersonalized variety on the Web today," said Jonathan Rosenberg, C/NET's executive vice president of technology.

In an effort to stay abreast of the rapid growth of the Web, C/NET officials said they plan to continually review and add new search tools to the site. "One of the beauties of Search.com is that our editors will always be able to steer viewers to the most advanced engines available," said Kevin Wendle, executive producer of C/NET Online.

Search.com is C/NET's third Web site. The company also operates C/NET Online (www.cnet.com), a counterpart to C/NET television show; and Shareware.com (www.shareware.com), which provides links to sites offering inexpensive and free software.

# Surf carefully: They know who visits

It's great fun to surf the Internet's World Wide Web by clicking on a link found on one page to connect to still another. That's surfing, and it'll take you to a wild variety of Web sites around the world.

Some of them are pretty seamy places. Without really trying, you can end up at pages devoted to hard-core sex, racism and violence. Some are the kind of places where you frankly wouldn't want to be seen.

But — although it may come as a surprise to some newcomers — each Web page is capable of keeping a complete record of who you are. It's just part of how the Web works. A Web server — the computer that is host to the page you visit — automatically tracks the address that identifies your computer on the Net (called an IP). It can also record the name of the page you visited before that one and, in some cases, your e-mail address.

That potential for abuse is seldom realized. Most Webmasters don't use that information for evil. But since there is that possibility, a wise Web user will learn about the poten-

tial for harm on the Net. If you'd like to read more about the privacy and security implications of using the Web, visit The World Wide Web Security FAQ at http://www.genome.wi.mit.edu/WWW/faqs/www-security-faq.html.

Lots of information

In Net lingo, FAQ stands for frequently asked questions. Most of these FAQs are a bit on the dry side — there are none of the usual flashy graphics. But most, like this one, are packed with information.

Security is an important issue on the Net. The very ability to be able to communicate seamlessly with people from around the world also means it is possible for people from around the world to know your business.

For instance, if you send an e-mail message or post a comment in one of the Usenet newsgroups, everyone will know your e-mail address.

Even if your comment or note is perfectly innocent, there may be times when you would rather not have your identity known. For instance, a controversial comment can open the door to a deluge of e-mail.

## Microsoft network will get 'bold and sweeping overhaul'

SEATTLE — As Microsoft Network passes the million-subscriber milestone, its new programming and content manager says the fledgling online and Internet access service is undergoing a major overhaul.

Bob Bejan, executive producer for Microsoft Network in the United States, said the company is planning to relaunch the seven-month-old service to mark its transition from a proprietary online service to a World Wide Web site fully integrated into the Internet.

"You can look for a bold, pretty sweeping change in (Microsoft Network's) look and feel, and in what the program offerings are going to be," Bejan said Monday.

He would not divulge what the changes would be. And while Bejan declined to say specifically when the re-launch would take place, a revamped news site within the network — and possibly the entire network — is scheduled to debut April 1.

Bejan joined Microsoft two weeks ago to boost the content available over the network. He reports to Microsoft Vice President Russ Siegelman, who runs the Microsoft Network division.

A former vice president for creative development at Warner Bros. Interactive Entertainment and founder of an interactive movie company, Bejan is an example of Microsoft's effort to attract top creative talent.

Microsoft Network now has about 100 employees and the company is continuing to hire at a rapid clip, Bejan said.

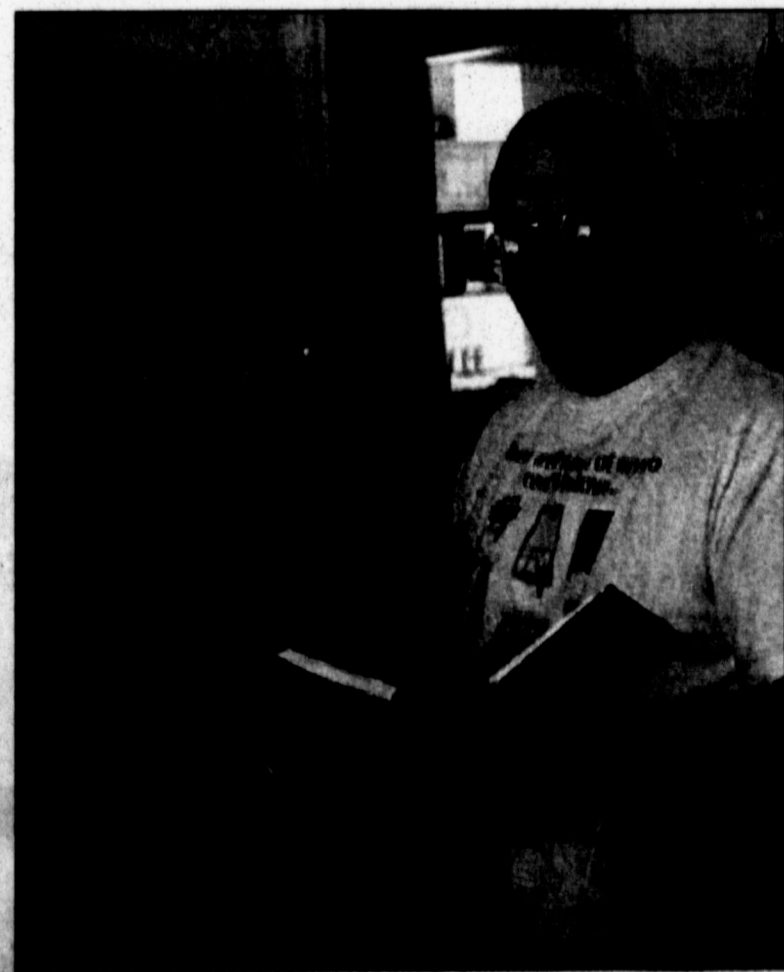

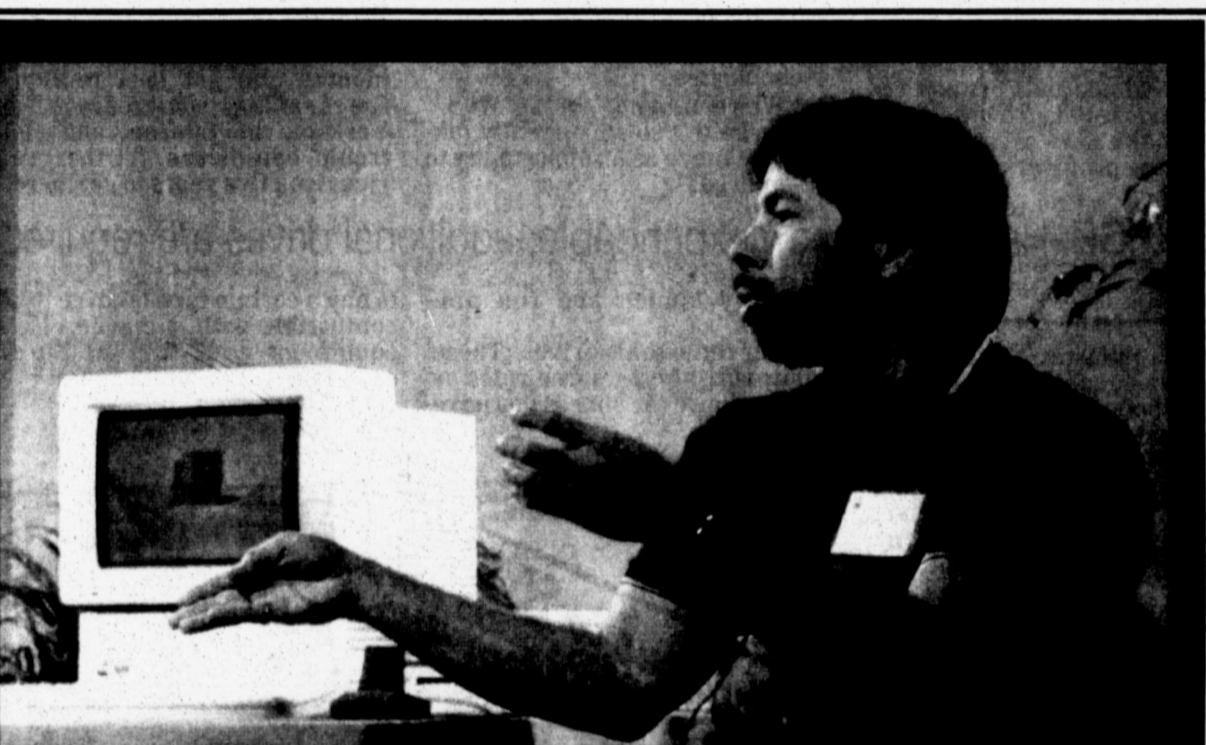

# IP: Sending anonymous email easily done on web

If you'd like to be able to send e-mail anonymously, the Web can help. There are several sites on the Web where you can enter a message and have it e-mailed anonymously. One is called Noah's Place at <http://www.lookup.com/Hompages/64499/anon.html>. You enter the message and intended e-mail address right on the page, and the note is sent anonymously. It goes without saying that these anonymous remailers should not be used to harass someone, or as part of any illegal activity.

**Using encryption**

Most people won't need to send an anonymous e-mail message. But many computer users will, at one time or another, find the need to send an encrypted message. That's one that can only be decoded by someone with the proper "key" on the other end. Until the key is used, the contents of the message are locked away from prying eyes.

One of the Net's most popular encryption programs is called PGP, which stands for Pretty Good Privacy. If you'd like to learn more, the Cryptography and PGP Page at

<http://rschp2.anu.edu.au:8080/crpyt.html> is a good place to start. Besides learning how these coded messages work, you'll find links on the page for downloading your own copy of PGP. Even if you have no particular interest in that program, you may find the information on codes fascinating in a secret agent sort of a way.

**A must-see page**

If the notion of computer security really fascinates you, there's one must-see page called COAST. That stands for Computer Operations, Audit, Security Technology.

The page at <http://www.cs.purdue.edu/coast/coast.html> con-

tains some terrific links to other security sites where you can get everything from advice to free security software.

Windows 95 users will want to explore some built-in security risks in that software.

Some have been fixed in the latest update of Windows 95, but others have not.

Drop by a page with the ominous name Serious Windows 95 Security Risk at <http://www.cc.ubc.ca/campus-computing/jan96/risk.html> to find out more.

# APPLE: PC sales also sluggish in first half

An Apple spokeswoman said a bulk of the company's loss is from a \$125 million restructuring charge it announced in January; in addition, she said the company will post an operating loss.

"Apple isn't moving enough product, but neither is Compaq," said Daniel Kunstler, senior technology analyst at J.P. Morgan Securities Inc. in San Francisco, noting Apple's staggering inventory of \$1.94 billion. "Demand is slow in the consumer market while corporations are sitting on their hands

waiting for (Microsoft Corp.'s) Windows NT (operating system) to ship."

Indeed, all signs are that the PC market is experiencing a sluggish patch before sales pick up in the second half of the year, according to industry analysts.

Sales of computers to U.S. consumers will grow just 8 percent in 1996, after three consecutive years of double-digit growth, Dataquest Inc. said on Monday. The market research company said domestic home sales will actually fall 2.3 percent in 1998.

# MSN: Spokesman touts network as super WWW site

"Microsoft's ability to bring me into the fold really indicates how serious we are about becoming a media company and all that that means," he said.

Microsoft Network's Aug. 24 debut coincided with the release of Microsoft's Windows 95 operating system. At the time, established computer online services feared that easy "one-button" access to the network through Windows 95 would give Microsoft an unfair marketing advantage against other proprietary services such as America Online and CompuServe.

But the rapid growth of the Internet as a low-cost alternative for content providers to get their

message out to computer users threatened all proprietary online services. Apple Computer and AT&T decided to close their offerings. AOL, Microsoft and CompuServe restructured, establishing stronger ties to the Internet.

Microsoft Network was initially criticized for being too technical and unappealing to novice computer users.

Bejan said Microsoft is in the process of turning the network into a kind of super Web site on the global computer network, one that will fully exploit the possibilities of interactive multimedia technologies.

"We're moving to the Web," Bejan said, "so we're really taking that move as an opportunity to re-emerge."

Microsoft plans to continue to develop content internally and through partnerships, he said. The network recently unveiled a new feature that will offer extensive coverage of the 1996 presidential election, developed as part of the MSNBC joint venture formed by Microsoft and NBC earlier this year.

Microsoft announced Monday that more than 1 million people now subscribe to the network. Chairman Bill Gates said the company reached that mark five months sooner than expected.

"We've been in business seven months and got to 1 million," Gates said at a conference in New York on the Internet and electronic commerce. "Other services took five years to get there."

America Online is the largest online service, with more than 5 million subscribers.

Gates said the biggest roadblock to broader use of the Internet is the availability of greater "bandwidth" — connections that can handle more data signals simultaneously.

"The bandwidth problem is one that won't disappear overnight," he said. "Even at the turn of the century, 90 percent of the people who connect will do so over normal phone lines."

# STORAGE: Hard drives now expandable; additional drives are required

programs to install. I stress programs, because they need the superior speed of a hard drive to launch and run quickly. If you've cluttered your drive with other things, check out your other options. Negatives: Hard drives are not expandable, so future upgrades will require additional drives.

Zip drive: If your hard drive is full of stored files — photos, documents and such — you're a perfect candidate for a Zip Drive. I suggest you transfer everything but programs and your most-used files to a Zip. These drives cost about \$200 and use 100-megabyte cartridges, so this is a cheap, expandable option. Another plus: The drive is small, and cartridges are the size of a standard diskette. Negatives: Zip is too slow to con-

veniently launch and run programs.

Other removable drives: These follow roughly the same rules as the Zip. However, unless you have

to buy a certain type of drive to be compatible with someone else's equipment, stick with the Zip or one of its direct competitors.

There are hundreds more baseball sites; these are a few of the most resourceful.

# BOOKS: CompuBooks only bookseller that sells its merchandise solely on 'Net

plan." Fratus said on-line customers can find many other general and specialty bookstores on the Internet — a vast system connecting computers around the world. But he said CompuBooks is the only electronic bookstore not connected with a publisher or a traditional bookstore.

Fratus said Mrs. Munoz, a former information service manager for the state, originally planned to operate the business in her spare time.

"We've spent a lot of time laughing at how naive we were, thinking that this would take only a little time," she said. "Everything we thought was wrong. But we were flexible. We knew the technology was here."

The bookstore not only has taken more time — both Fratus and Munoz work full time at it — it also has taken more and more space.

Originally housed in two rooms, one their daughter's former bedroom, the bookstore now takes up three rooms and a warehouse built next to the couple's home on their four-acre lot in Waller County.

"At one point there were books on the kitchen table, in the hallway and the living room. We had stuff everywhere," Fratus said.

Mrs. Munoz added, "If you could see the master bedroom, you'd see it still."

Mrs. Munoz and Fratus said expected growth soon will force the entire business out of their home. But both said moving it out of their house will not grant them much freedom from the business.

"The phone is always ringing. Orders are always coming in, regardless of what time it is or holidays. We're always open," Mrs. Munoz said.

Fratus added, "The last time we went on a family vacation ... was to Disney World three months before CompuBooks opened."

The store employs nine people, including the couple's oldest daughter, 17-year-old Yolanda. She gives the store full-time work during the day, dedicating her evenings to high school.

With flow charts in the office and warehouse, Fratus explains that two workers process orders, Mrs. Munoz handles book purchasing and contracts with various international institutions and a warehouse team of three maintains book stocks and fills orders.

Fratus does most of the financial and administrative work and several other employees help in various positions.

Fratus said he expects to double his staff in the near future. He and Mrs. Munoz hope to get not only their customers but some employees to enter the store via comput-

ers. While CompuBooks advertises itself as specializing in computer titles, Mrs. Munoz said the store works with customers to find any books published.

She also said future plans will lead the bookstore to handle more medical titles and more general reading titles.

"We do a lot for our customers," she said.

Sandra Nicholson, of the International Trade Center at the University of Texas at San Antonio, nominated Fratus and Mrs. Munoz for the 1996 Small Business Exporter of the Year award. She said the couple approached the center soon after their first book order came from Italy.

International sales account for more than 50 percent of all CompuBooks sales, with much of that from Japan.

"The cost of a computer book anywhere overseas is double to triple the list price," Fratus said, explaining the high number of international orders.

Ms. Nicholson said Fratus and Mrs. Munoz showed innovation and courage in starting on the Internet.

"CompuBooks has had the courage and business intuition to take advantage of the new technologies ... and to ride the wave of the ever expanding Internet," she wrote to the U.S. Small Business Administration.

# Reports show trade deficit rising

WASHINGTON (AP) — The trade deficit widened dramatically at the beginning of the year, climbing to \$10.27 billion as imports hit an all-time high and aircraft sales abroad sank to the lowest level in 18 years.

The January deficit, the worst in six months, was 47.6 percent higher than December's \$6.96 billion imbalance. The deficits with Japan, China and Mexico all worsened.

While the administration sought to blame temporary factors such as January's bad weather and the fallout from a strike at Boeing for the deterioration, private economists said that weakening economies overseas and a pickup in U.S. demand could spell larger deficits for several more months. "We have seen the best news on trade for a while," said Bob Dederick, chief economic consultant at Northern Trust Co. in Chicago. "We are being hurt by weaker growth in Europe that is causing businesses there to cut back on their inventories."

Dederick said he still believed the overall deficit in goods and services, which climbed to a seven-year-high of \$111.5 billion last year, would decrease this year to around \$100 billion. But he said much of the improvement would probably not occur until the second half of the year.

That would be unwelcome news for President Clinton, who has already come under fire from GOP presidential candidates such as Pat Buchanan for pursuing a trade strategy that they say has

cost millions of American jobs.

Private economists were surprised by the magnitude of the deficit increase. Many said they were revising downward their forecasts for overall economic growth, as measured by the gross domestic product, based on the trade report.

Bruce Steinberg, an economist at Merrill Lynch in New York, said he now believed GDP for the January-March period would post a barely discernible 0.5 percent to 1 percent rate of increase.

The administration sought to depict the widening trade deficit in the best light, noting that while U.S. exports fell in relation to December, they have risen over the past 12 months at a faster rate than imports.

U.S. Trade Representative Mickey Kantor said this trend was "a major move for American trade in the right direction."

In another report Friday, the government reported that sales of new homes dipped 1.3 percent in February. Analysts discounted the decline, however, noting that sales were actually up in all parts of the

country except where the severe weather had caused a 24 percent plunge.

Financial markets had little reaction to Friday's reports. The Dow Jones industrial average was down 11.92 in late afternoon trading.

For January, exports of goods and services dropped 2.2 percent to \$66.6 billion while imports were up 2.4 percent to a record \$76.86 billion. The resulting deficit was the biggest since the \$10.98 billion of last July.

The January drop in exports was heavily influenced by commercial aircraft, which fell \$726 million to \$493 million, the lowest monthly level since February 1978. Analysts attributed this decline primarily to the effects of last year's lengthy strike at Boeing Co.

Other big-ticket capital goods also showed weakness during the month with exports of telecommunications equipment dropping by \$420 million, machine tools \$134 million and industrial engines \$106 million.

# Republicans scrutinize Clinton's judicial choices

WASHINGTON (NYT) — For nearly three years President Clinton has carefully burnished his crime-fighter credentials.

He has appeared on the lawn of the White House in a sea of blue uniforms to mark the hiring of new police officers through his anti-crime package. He has championed the popular ban on assault-style weapons, defending it with gusto as Republicans try to repeal it.

In yet another event last week, he stood flanked by police chiefs and local officials including Atlanta's Mayor Bill Campbell to issue an order to kick lawbreakers out of public housing.

But Republicans — who once owned the crime issue and want to retake it in next fall's elections — believe they have found a chink in Clinton's anti-crime image: The judges he picks for the federal bench.

"The president talks about putting cops on the beat, yet he appoints judges who are putting criminals back on the street," Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, charged last week.

Hatch had been saying similar things for months, but suddenly people are listening, thanks in large part to a controversial ruling by Judge Harold Baer Jr., a Clinton appointee to the U.S. District Court in New York.

In a decision last January, Baer threw out a conviction in which police had seized nearly 80 pounds of cocaine and heroin from a car. The police had no probable cause to conduct the search, he ruled, although they saw four men place duffel bags in a car and then scatter at the sight of the officers.

Baer wrote that because police were considered corrupt in the neighborhood, it would have been "unusual" if the men had not run when the officers

stared at them.

The storm of criticism that followed left the White House reeling, as aides saw visions of a replay of the Republicans' famous "Willie Horton" television ads that in 1988 portrayed the Democrats as soft on criminals.

Clinton spokesman Michael McCurry even hinted that the president might ask for the judge's resignation from his lifetime appointment. That threat was quickly withdrawn. But the attack was sharp enough to prompt four judges on the New York federal appeals court to protest the "extraordinary intimidation" by the White House and also by Republican Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, who suggested Baer should be impeached.

At the Republican National Committee, press secretary Mary Crawford predicted that the judge selection will be an issue in the presidential campaign. "It's one of the clear contrasts between our nominee and Bill Clinton," she said.

Meanwhile, Hatch's office is scouring decisions of the 185 federal judges that Clinton has appointed to find more ammunition. Among his next targets is Judge Rosemary Barkett, who went from the Florida Supreme Court to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta.

Controversial from the start, Barkett has raised the ire of conservatives for a number of decisions since joining the federal court.

Among them: She sided with Timothy Upshaw, who confessed to setting fire to his girlfriend's home and killing her two children, by granting a hearing on whether he had "ineffective" legal advice. Upshaw's attorney had counseled against saying he was under the influence of drugs when he torched the house.

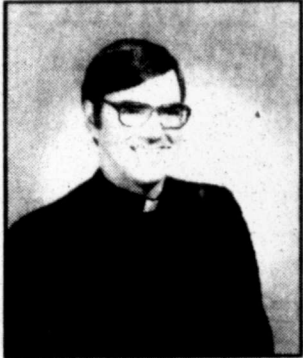

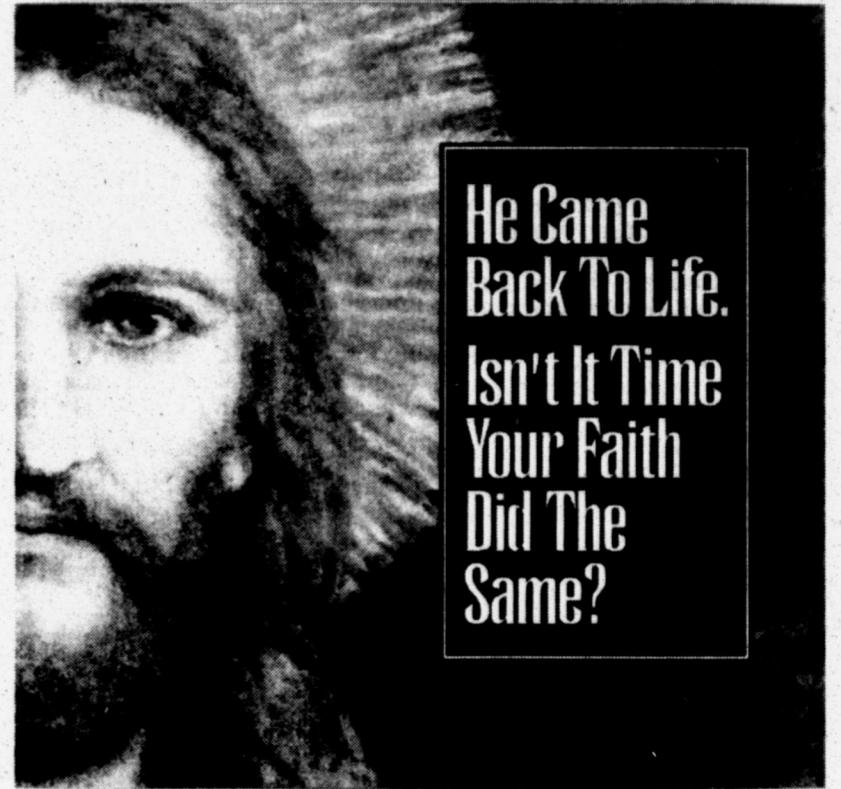

## First United Methodist Church to present "Requiem"

"Music hath charms to soothe the savage beast." King Saul found that to be true when the shepherd boy David sang and played the harp for him. Some wind-blown West Texans have found that out as well in their rehearsals of John Rutter's "Requiem". The Chancel Choir of First United Methodist Church, directed by Suzanne Cate, will present the Rutter "Requiem" on Sunday evening, March 31 at 6:00 p.m. in the church sanctuary, on the corner of Main and Ohio.

They will be accompanied by an

ensemble composed of Marjorie Jennings, flute; Rebecca Durham, oboe; Sharon Hickox, timpani and glockenspiel; Ross Moshell, timpani; Reba McHahey, harp; Tina Duckett, cello; and Joan Lucas, organ. Billie Peterson will be the soprano soloist.

Written in 1985 by British composer John Rutter (b. 1945, London), the "Requiem" is not a strict following of the Latin mass for the dead, but rather the composer's selection of texts drawn from the mass and from the Anglican Book of Common Prayer.

In this regard he follows the precedents set by Johannes Brahms and Gabriel Faure, composers who also wrote choral requiems. The work is actually an arch-shaped meditation on the themes of life and death; the first and seventh movements are prayers on behalf of all humanity, the second and sixth movements are psalms, the third and fifth are prayers to Christ, and the fourth movement at the top of the arch is an acclamation of divine majesty (Holy, holy, holy).

Rutter's musical style will be familiar

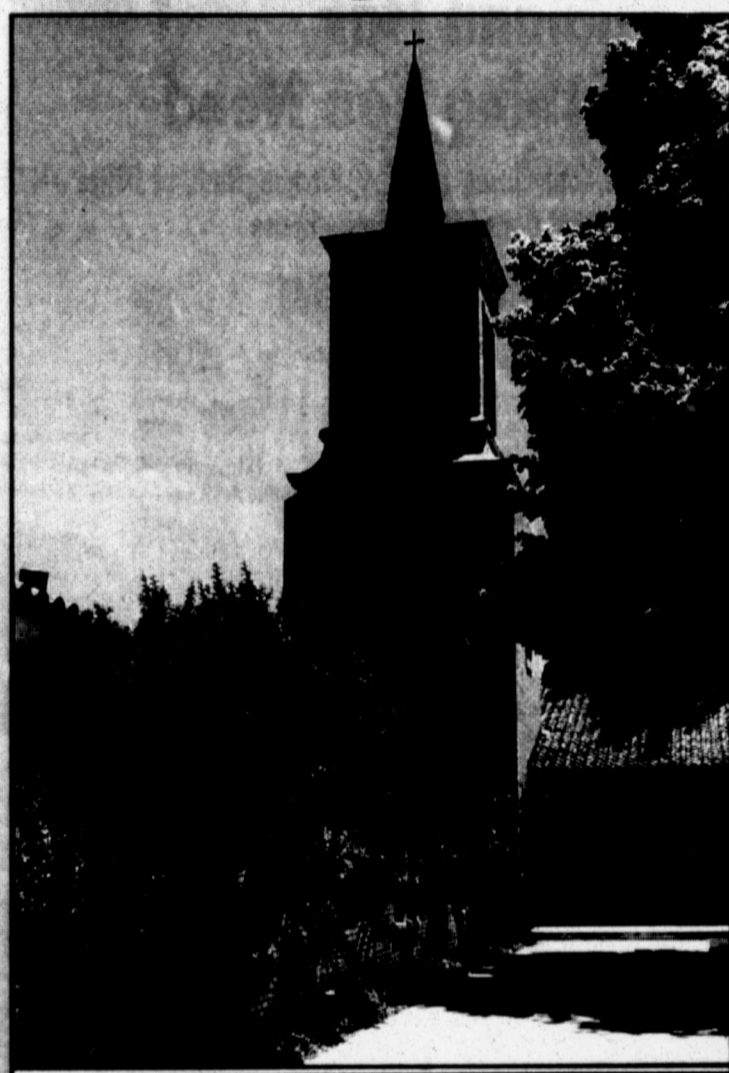
to TV watchers who may recognize his distinctive choral writing from the soundtrack of a Volvo commercial! He is one of the most popular church anthem composers writing today, incorporating memorable, lyrical melodies with harmonies expressive of the texts which are mostly biblical or liturgical.

Most of his compositions are within the capabilities of a good church choir, and modern congregations find his music immensely appealing while maintaining stylistic and theological

integrity. Mr. Rutter, formerly director of music at Clare College, Cambridge, now lives in the United States and is a frequent leader of music clinics and festivals. As founding director of the Cambridge Singers, a professional choir, he recently won a Grammy award for his recording of the Faure "Requiem".

Sunday's concert will be followed by a reception and the First UMC Summer Ministries Fair held in Fellowship Hall. There is no charge for the concert and a nursery will be provided.

### Tractor-trailer carrying cattle overturns, causes impromptu roundup on highway

MESQUITE (AP) — It was the roundup from hell Friday as rodeo riders joined mounted police and animal control wardens in trying to herd dozens of stray cattle on a busy interstate and a nearby shopping mall parking lot.

The impromptu roundup came after a Florida-bound tractor-trailer rig loaded with more than 140 head of cattle overturned at the busy U.S. 80 interchange on Interstate 635 Friday.

Although more than a dozen cows were killed, dozens more rambled free into traffic and nearby neighborhoods. Sheriff's officers used ropes to lasso strays, and participants in the Mesquite Rodeo scheduled for this weekend were asked to help.

Officers said some vehicles on busy Interstate 635 struck strays before they could be rounded up. "I grew up out in the country and stuff. I drive on those roads all the time and never run into a cow," said Doug Guinn of rural Forney, whose Cadillac struck one of the animals. "You come to the city and you run into a cow coming down the freeway."

The driver, Garland Van Sickle, said the rig toppled when the cat-

tle shifted in the triple-decker trailer while rounding a tight turn on an exit ramp, causing him to lose control.

"When the cattle shifted, I corrected. When I corrected, it just laid over. That's it," Van Sickle said. "Then I crawled out."

Cows that survived the accident wandered across traffic lanes and even ventured toward a large shopping mall nearby. Confused shoppers at Town East Mall saw cattle being herded.

Authorities said the truck may have been traveling too fast when Van Sickle tried to turn westbound from U.S. 80 onto Interstate 635's northbound lanes.

Sheriff's deputies warned motorists not to attempt to corral the stray cattle.

"If people would just stay away from them and don't mess with them until the proper authorities come out there — just call the sheriff's department and let us know where the cattle are at and we'll have members of the posse come out and capture them," said sheriff's Sgt. Harry Johnson.

But some motorists tried their hand at being cowboys.

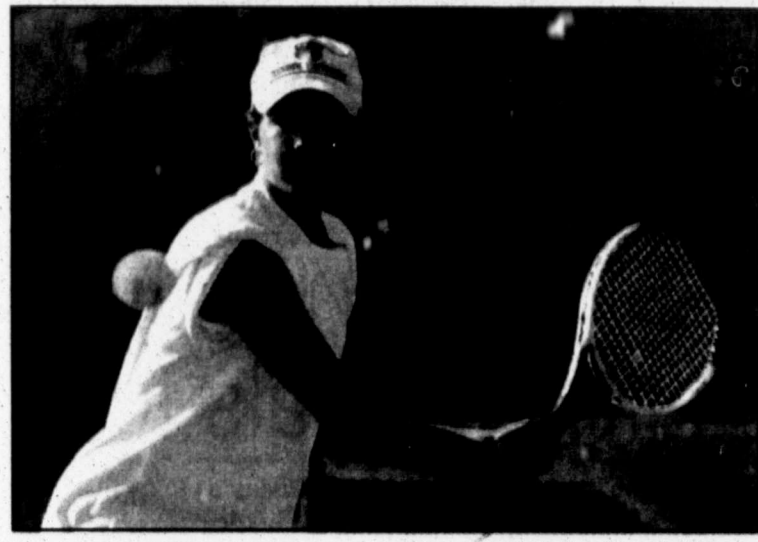
Bates to stay

Lady Vols beat UConn, avenge title game loss

■ Tennessee to face Georgia, a winner over Stanford in the other NCAA Women's Final Four semifinal, Sunday to decide national title.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Finally, Tennessee was stronger down the stretch than Connecticut. And finally, the Lady Vols have beaten the Huskies.  
 Tennessee made seven of eight free throws in the final 1:43 of overtime, got a key defensive play from Tiffani Johnson and ended Connecticut's hopes of repeating as national champion with an 88-83 victory Friday night in a semifinal game of the women's NCAA tournament.  
 That sends Tennessee into its sixth national championship game Sunday, against either Georgia or Stanford, and gives the fourth-ranked Lady Vols (31-4) a chance to win their fourth NCAA title. Connecticut (34-4), trying to become the first repeat champion since Southern Cal in 1984, sent the game into overtime at 75-75 when Nykessa Sales hit a 3-pointer from the top of the key with 4.2 seconds left. Sales finished with 28 points to lead all scorers.

1:19 left in regulation and the second-ranked Huskies couldn't hold on in the overtime. They had beaten Tennessee three straight times, including 70-64 in last year's title game, mainly by playing stronger at the end. It didn't happen this time.

After three ties in the extra session, Tennessee took the lead for good on a free throw by Michelle Marciniak with 1:43 left and the Lady Vols limited Connecticut to two shots the rest of the way.

One was a driving layup by Sales that cut the lead to 84-83 with 19.9 seconds remaining. Marciniak, who led Tennessee with 21 points, was fouled on the inbounds play and hit two free throws for an 86-83 Tennessee lead.

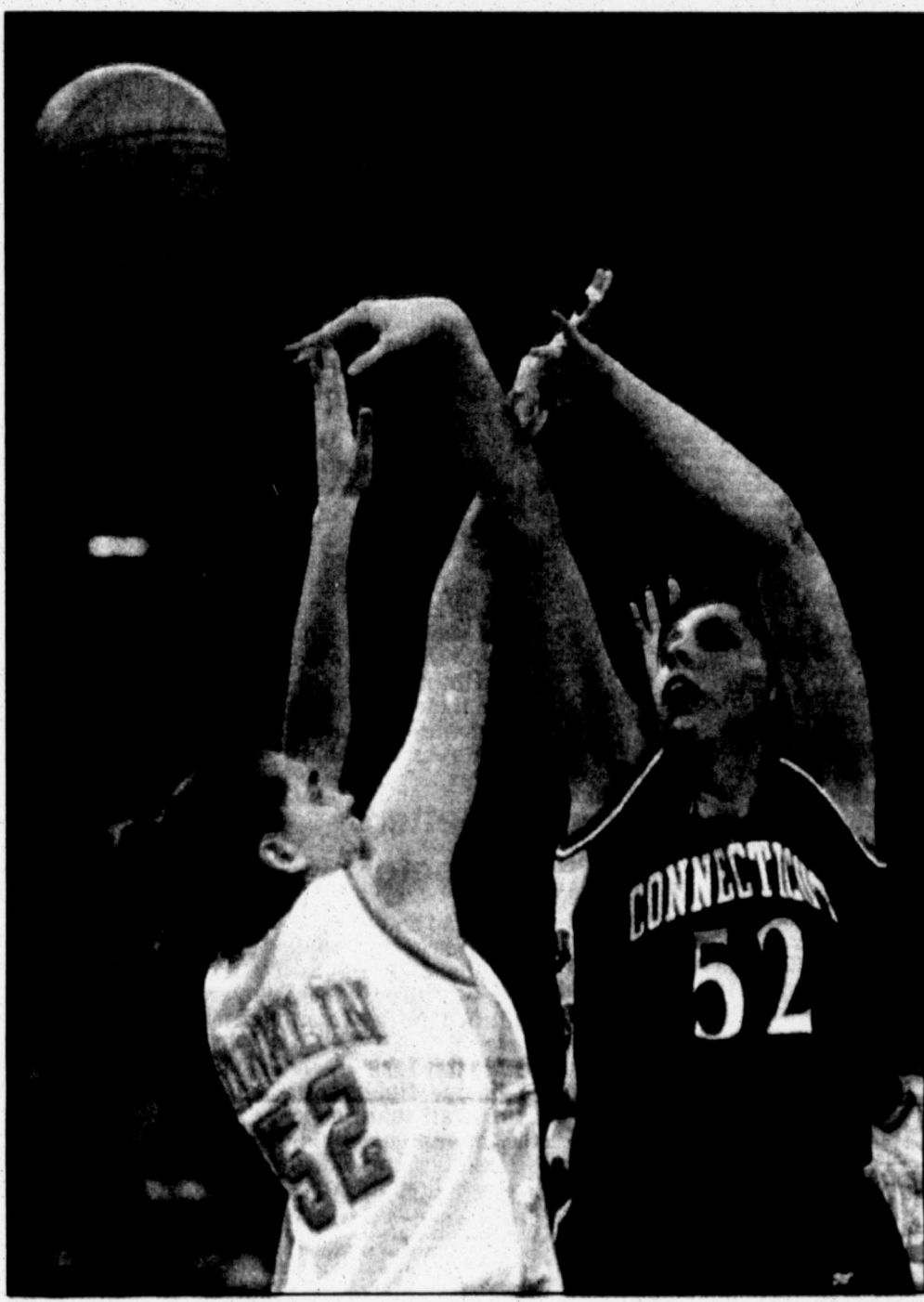
Then Johnson partially blocked Jennifer Rizzotti's 3-point shot from the right wing and the ball went to Latina Davis, who was fouled and made two free throws to wrap it up.

Davis finished with 16 points, Johnson and freshman Chamique Holdsclaw each scored 13 and Abby Conklin 11. Rizzotti had 17 for Connecticut, while Wolters and Carla Berube scored 13 each. Wolters also grabbed 10 rebounds.

Tennessee couldn't hold a nine-point lead in the first half and frittered away a 10-point lead in the second.

Following Abilene Cooper's 3-1 victory over Midland High Thursday, the District 4-5A softball race has another top-heavy log jam at the top of the standings.

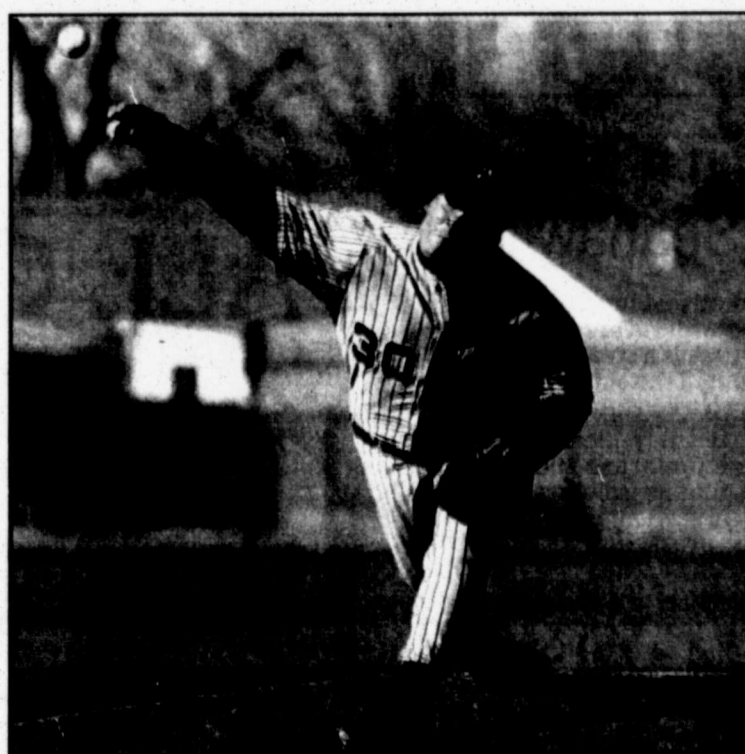

Former Cowboy Martin arraigned on drug charges

DALLAS (AP) — Harvey Martin, a former Super Bowl MVP for the Dallas Cowboys, has been arraigned on charges of drug possession, assault and resisting arrest following a quarrel with his live-in girlfriend.  
 But the former defensive end contended Friday that the drugs were planted and that police beat him after the confrontation in his apartment. He also denied beating Debbie Clark, 36, who police said was bruised and had hair torn from her head.  
 Magistrate Judge William Ridgeway arraigned Martin on one felony charge of possession of a controlled substance, one misdemeanor assault charge and one misdemeanor charge of resisting arrest.

He posted bail totaling \$2,500 shortly after 8 a.m. Friday morning officials said.  
 Martin, who earlier served a probated term for marijuana possession, could face up to 10 years' imprisonment if convicted of the felony.

But Martin claimed he was the victim.

Irvin makes 2nd trip in front of grand jury

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas Cowboys wide receiver Michael Irvin made a return appearance Friday before a grand jury that has been considering evidence from a motel drug bust at which he was present.

Three others who were with Irvin in the room where cocaine, marijuana and drug paraphernalia were discovered March 4 have been offered immunity from prosecution for their testimony, according to broadcast reports.

Irvin returned to the courthouse Friday afternoon with his lawyer and entered the chambers of the grand jury, which had its term extended one month by state District Judge John Creuzot. The judge has also issued a gag order in the case.

Irvin, his attorneys and some grand jury witnesses spent much of the day in Creuzot's courtroom behind doors that had been chained shut with handcuffs.

The grand jury recessed without a report shortly after 6 p.m. Friday. It was

Texas boxing regulators to require HIV testing before issuing licenses

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Commission on Licensing and Regulation is considering a rule to again impose HIV testing before issuing boxing licenses.

The commission on Friday ordered staff members to draft such rules. In 1992, the commission required such testing. The commission had backed off the requirement over constitutional concerns.

"The event with Tommy Morrison brought the issue before the commission again. That doesn't

mean that (the policy) will pass in the end," said deputy director Lora Williams.

The commission said it would consider adopting the rule at its next meeting, which has not been scheduled but is required before June. Morrison, a Kansas City heavyweight, was diagnosed with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, earlier this year. Before then, only Arizona, Georgia, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah and Washington and the territory of Puerto

Rico required HIV testing.

Since the disclosure of Morrisons' infection, at least five states, New York, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Indiana and Texas have either started requiring testing for the virus or have

announced such plans. Texas requires all boxers scheduled to fight in the state to carry a state license. Ms. Williams said there are 218 licensed Texas boxers. In 1994, there were 42 sanctioned boxers in Texas.

King County officials win home court in battle to keep Seahawks

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — King County officials won home court advantage Friday in their legal fight to keep the Seattle Seahawks from leaving town.

The state Supreme Court said King County Superior Court is the jurisdiction to decide if Seahawks owner Ken Behring can legally move his team to Southern California.

The two sides filed lawsuits within 30 minutes of each other on Feb. 2, a day after Behring informed King County officials that he intended to take the team to Southern California, contending the Kingdom was unsafe in an earthquake.

Seattle officials rushed to King County Superior Court to try to prevent the team from leaving immediately, while the Seahawks scurried to Kittitas County with their lawsuit in an effort to break their lease with the Kingdom. That lease runs for another 10 years.

The two sides agreed to let Washington's high court settle the jurisdiction question, and it heard arguments Wednesday.

William Temko, Behring's attorney, said he and his client were dis-

appointed but undaunted by the ruling. "Regardless of the venue, we feel our case is a strong one and feel confident in the outcome," he said in a prepared statement.

"I am extremely pleased that the Supreme Court has endorsed our position that jurisdiction of the Seahawks litigation is in King County," prosecutor Norm Maleng said in Seattle.

The high court, in a unanimous opinion, said that because a suit was first filed in King County, that's where the case belonged. The court, however, noted that Behring is free to try to persuade a King County judge that he should have a change of venue to Kittitas County.

Temko said he and Behring were "considering various options, including the possibility of requesting a change of venue before the Superior Court in King County."

The issue could be moot if the team is sold. Microsoft Corp. co-founder Paul Allen has said he is interested in buying the team, but both sides say no deal has been struck.

# '63 Bulldogs broke barriers

## Former coach McCarthy began Mississippi State's history-making legacy

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Mississippi State, winner of four Southeastern Conference titles from 1959-63, made just one appearance in the NCAA tournament during that era of racial segregation.

In those days, schools, restaurants, water fountains and life itself were strictly separated by race. The U.S. Supreme Court said in 1954 that separate but equal school policies were unconstitutional, but years later it was still unwritten law in Mississippi that the state's white athletes didn't play games with — or against — blacks.

So when NCAA tournament invitations went to SEC champion Mississippi State in 1959, 1961 and 1962, the Bulldogs stayed home and Kentucky or Georgia Tech went instead. In 1960, Auburn also declined to play in the NAAs for the same reason.

Finally, in 1963, coach Babe McCarthy, athletic director Wade Walker and school president D.W. Colvard challenged the established way of life. At a time when civil rights marches and sit-ins were just starting to occur in other parts of the South, the three men decided it was time Mississippi State took its place in an integrated NCAA tournament.

However, the state legislature issued an injunction designed to prevent the team from making the trip to the tournament. The injunction, which named Walker, McCarthy and Colvard, prohibited them from using state funds to subvert state policy by playing an integrated team.

To escape the injunction, Walker, McCarthy and Colvard left the state days before the team did. The school's sports publicist shepherded the team to the airport, nervously watching for the sheriff all the way.

"There were some cloak-and-

dagger aspects to the story," said Bob Hartley, a Mississippi State employee for 50 years who was then the sports information director and is now a paid athletic consultant. "We definitely had to sneak out."

The Bulldogs managed to get out of Starkville, Miss., and play in the NAAs against Loyola-Chicago, an integrated team that went on to win the 1963 national title.

State officers didn't enforce the injunction on the players, who were not named in the action.

McCarthy, Colvard and Walker ultimately joined the team in Nashville before they went on to East Lansing, Mich., for the tournament game against Loyola.

"It wouldn't have happened without those three," Hartley said.

It was different in 1959, 1961 and 1962, the other years the Bulldogs won the SEC title.

"Babe tried to persuade them (school officials) to change their minds, but there was no threats of

walking out or anything like that," Hartley said. "It was a different time then. People didn't challenge authority."

Bailey Howell, a 12-year NBA player who played on two Boston Celtics title teams in the 1960s, was a member of the 1958-59 Bulldogs team that went 24-1 only to stay home at tournament time.

"We knew we couldn't go anywhere, and coach McCarthy cautioned us against being belligerent about it," Howell said Friday as the Bulldogs prepared to play Syracuse in the NCAA semifinals on Saturday. "We just did as we were told. I was taught to be respectful of everybody, especially older people in authority."

Now that Mississippi State is in the Final Four for the first time, Howell is asked often if he was angry about not playing in the tournament.

"That just wasn't our mindset," Howell said. "It wasn't the way we were brought up. We accepted

things as they were.

"We knew the unwritten policy was wrong and ridiculous. We knew it then and we know it now. All racist policies deny people their rights. We were denied our rights and our opportunity to play against the best."

Jack Cristil, the Mississippi State radio network play-by-play man for 43 years, said the state's racial policies of the 1950s and 1960s weren't discussed, just accepted.

Political correctness didn't exist then, at least not in Starkville. There also was little political activism.

"It wasn't like we sat around the coffee shop talking about missing the NCAA tournament," Cristil said. "It was the way it was going to be. We didn't know it then, but it was a time in history that was going to change."

Despite the defying of the injunction, there were no post-tournament repercussions for the team and administration.

"Some papers said it was a sad day for Mississippi, but for the most part, we were greeted warmly," Hartley said.

One of the ironies connecting the 1963 team that went to the NCAA tournament for the first time and the 1996 team that is in the Final Four for the first time is that their current coach, Richard Williams, was a Bulldogs freshman in the fall of 1963.

But the students of later generations are ready to forget the school's racial history.

"People need to get over it," said Marilyn Johnston of Memphis, a 1975 Mississippi State grad. "It's something that's part of our history. The team (most of which is black) has gotten over it."

Harold Akins, a 1980 graduate from Memphis, said continuing the success of this year's team will make people forget.

"We need to put enough Final Fours behind us to give everybody something else to talk about."

## Camby, Keady get AP nods for top collegiate basketball player, coach

NEW YORK (AP) — Marcus Camby, the junior center who led Massachusetts to its first Final Four appearance, and Gene Keady, who guided Purdue to its third straight Big Ten title, were honored Friday as college basketball player and coach of the year by The Associated Press.

The 6-foot-11 Camby, who was one vote shy of being a unanimous All-America selection, was presented the Adolph Rupp Trophy, an award sponsored by the Commonwealth Athletic Club of Kentucky in the name of college

basketball's winningest coach.

Camby averaged 20.3 points, 8.2 rebounds and 3.8 blocks this season for the Minutemen, who held the No. 1 ranking for 10 weeks, including the final poll of the regular season. They play No. 2 Kentucky on Saturday in the Final Four.

He missed four games this season after mysteriously collapsing before the St. Bonaventure game on Jan. 14. He underwent a battery of tests and returned against the same team 13 days later, recording a career-high nine

blocked shots. His three-year total of 330 blocked shots makes him the fourth player to record his 300th during his junior year, joining Shaquille O'Neal of LSU, Tim Duncan of Wake Forest and Rodney Blake of St. Joseph's.

Camby, a native of Hartford, Conn., received 63 votes in the national balloting of AP membership, easily outdistancing Ray Allen of Connecticut, who had 29 1/2 votes. They were followed by Allen Iverson of Georgetown, 25, Tim Duncan of Wake Forest, 15 1/2, and Tony Delk of Kentucky, 13.

No. 5 Georgia 86,  
No. 3 Stanford 76

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Saudia Roundtree and Latrese Bush did their best to make it easy for Georgia. Then the Lady Bulldogs made it difficult with late free-throw problems.

Roundtree, an All-American and the Southeastern Conference player of the year, had 26 points and seven assists to lead Georgia to an 86-76 victory over Stanford in the NCAA tournament's semifinals.

Bush, a reserve guard who hadn't scored more than 11 points this season, added 11 points and two steals as the fifth-ranked Lady Bulldogs snapped the nation's longest winning streak at 23 games.

The two guards helped Georgia (28-4) build an 18-point lead in the second half before the Lady Bulldogs gave most of it back by missing 12 of their last 15 foul shots. Stanford (29-3) couldn't cut its

deficit under five in the closing minutes and lost for the first time since December.

The victory put Georgia into Sunday's national title game against SEC rival Tennessee, an 88-83 winner over defending NCAA champion Connecticut earlier Friday. The Lady Vols defeated Georgia in last year's national semifinals, but the Lady Bulldogs

downed Tennessee in January, their only meeting this season.

The third-ranked Cardinal got 20 points from Kate Starbird and 16 from Olympia Scott.

Georgia advanced to the title game for the second time in school history. The Lady Bulldogs lost to Old Dominion in 1985.

# UMass-Kentucky won't be repeat

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — It was just four months ago that Massachusetts opened its season by knocking off No. 1 Kentucky.

Since then, a lot has changed for both teams, which met again Saturday in the NCAA semifinals.

"That was early in the season and now it's two teams that have gotten a lot better," Kentucky's Tony Delk said Friday. "I was at the point then and everyone was out of position. We were trying to get our rotation down. They have gotten better because of a tough schedule."

Top-ranked Massachusetts (35-1) won that Nov. 28 meeting 92-82 behind the 32 points, nine rebounds and five blocks of All-America center Marcus Camby.

"I didn't think we did a good job on Camby," Kentucky coach Rick Pitino said, "but I've watched the tape three times and we did a good job. He's just a great basketball player."

It was far from a perfect effort for the Minutemen that night at Auburn Hills, Mich., in the Great Eight tournament. UMass committed 23 turnovers against Kentucky's pressure.

The number of mistakes dropped all season as the backcourt of Edgar Padilla and Carmelo Travieso jelled into one of the best guard tandems in the country. They were at their best in the regionals, combining for just 12 turnovers against the pressure of Arkansas and Georgetown.

"The Kentucky game was the first game of the season, and we were just trying to get used to each other," Padilla said.

"Now we know what we have to do and it showed against Arkansas and Georgetown." Pitino said the first two games — the Wildcats opened with a 96-84 victory over Maryland — set the tone for the changes that changed everything.

"We got down big against Maryland, and then there was UMass," he said. "It was obvious we were not playing the right people together and we made a change, putting Antho-

ny Epps at the point, and we let Tony Delk concentrate on scoring. Now it's been a great situation as far as the cohesiveness of the team, and that's where we've evolved."

Kentucky (32-2) didn't lose again until the Southeastern Conference tournament championship game against Mississippi State, which meets Syracuse in the other Final Four game. It wasn't just a 27-game winning streak, it was a romp through the regular season with an average margin of victory of 23 points. That may explain why the Minutemen are 8-point underdogs.

"We like being underdogs," Camby said. "We've been underdogs all year long. They've been beating people by a lot. Maybe that's why they're the favorite."

Kentucky center Mark Pope isn't buying into that theory.

"Gambling is like politics — I don't understand it," he said. "It doesn't make any sense. They beat us. They beat everyone they played. They've proven that they're a great team."

Massachusetts' only loss was to George Washington. But the Minutemen's average margin of victory was nothing like Kentucky's. They won nine games by five points or less and had to go to overtime to win four games.

"All those close games make them mentally tough," Delk said.

Four of the wins came without Camby when he was waiting for medical clearance to resume playing after mysteriously collapsing in mid-January. Many believe it helped make the Minutemen a better team, one that learned it could win even without the dominant center on the court.

"If you concentrate so much on Camby, they'll cut you to pieces with their other players, because this is truly a great team," Pitino said. "No matter what coach you may go back to and ask them to give a definition of a team, as far as understanding roles, as far as defense, as far as togetherness, as far as all the attributes you would say a great team would have, you can use Massachusetts as an example of that word."

# Martin wins Food City pole; Pruett tops IndyCar trials

BRISTOL, Tenn. — Mark Martin definitely has the half-mile oval at Bristol International Raceway figured out in qualifying. Martin gave Ford its first Winston Cup pole of the season Friday, taking the top qualifying spot for Sunday's Food City 500, his third straight pole on the .533-mile, high-banked concrete track.

"I've always like banked race tracks and I don't think you'll find one banked more than this," Mar-

tin said. "I know where the walls are and I've got a pretty good set-up on the car."

"Goodyear did bring a new tire this year, and that should have changed things quite a bit, but we pretty much stuck with what we had and pretty much ran fast right out of the box."

Martin's fast lap of 123.578 mph was well short of the track quali-

fying mark of 125.093 he set last August, and it was slower than his pole-winning speed of 124.605 last March.

He has 29 career poles, including five at Bristol. The pole-winning Thunderbird was followed by five Chevrolet Monte Carlos, led by Terry Labonte at 122.921.

Darrell Waltrip, a 12-time winner at Bristol, was third at 122.787, followed by Sterling Marlin at 122.709, Bobby Labonte at 122.584 and Mike Skinner, announced ear-

lier in the day as the driver for a second Richard Childress Racing entry, at 122.584.

Chevys have won four straight races since Dale Jarrett took the season-opening Daytona 500 in a close battle with Monte Carlo driver Dale Earnhardt. And, until Friday, General Motors cars had dominated 1996 qualifying, with Chevys taking three poles and Pontiac Grand Prix two.

Thunderbird driver Jarrett, the series point leader, ran afoul of the often treacherous Bristol track Friday, losing control just as he crossed the finish line following his second and final qualifying lap.

Jarrett's Ford slid sideways and slammed hard into the low wall separating the track from pit lane, then skidded up the banking into the first-turn wall. He was not injured and will be listed in the seventh position with a lap of 122.552, but by switching to his backup car will, according to NASCAR rules,

fall to the rear to start the 500-mile race.

Joe Nemechek, who qualified 20th at 121.883, crashed on the backstretch during his second qualifying lap, but will repair the car and drive it in Sunday's race.

Among the other qualifiers, defending race winner Jeff Gordon, coming off a victory last Sunday at Darlington, was eighth in a Chevy, while Earnhardt, who trails Jarrett in the standings by 47 points, was 19th. The top 25 qualifiers Friday locked in starting spots in Sunday's 37-car field, with the top 19 earning pit stalls on the front straightaway, considered an advantage in the race.

**Australian IndyCar SURFERS PARADISE**, Australia — Scott Pruett was happy to see the rain during the Australian IndyCar qualifying session Friday. Michael Andretti wasn't.

Pruett set a lap record on the temporary street course to lead the

qualifiers after the first session for Sunday's race. Driving a Lola Ford, Pruett broke Andretti's 1995 lap record of 1 minute, 36.770 seconds by nearly five-tenths of a second when he sped around the 2.794-mile, 12-turn course in 1:36.283, 104.467 mph.

"It surprised me," Pruett said of his time in the first group of qualifiers before the rain. "We've been working really hard over the winter on our street-course tires, and I think we'll even go faster yet."

The 36-year-old American leads the early-season circuit standings with 26 points after finishing fourth in the Grand Prix of Miami and third in the Rio de Janeiro race on March 17.

The second qualifying session to determine the pole position is scheduled Saturday.

## Agassi into final; Goran beats Pete

KEY BISCAIYNE, Fla. (AP) — Mother Nature and Goran Ivanisevic stopped Pete Sampras' run at the Lipton Championships.

Ivanisevic regrouped during a 48-minute rain delay in the second set and beat Sampras 2-6, 6-4, 6-4 in the semifinals Friday night.

The Croat's comeback spoiled a bid by the second-seeded Sampras for his fourth consecutive Lipton final. Instead, Ivanisevic has a chance to win his fifth title of the year Sunday against Andre Agassi.

Defending champion Agassi advanced by beating Frenchman Arnaud Boetsch 6-4, 6-3.

Chanda Rubin, a 20-year-old Louisianian seeking her first WTA Tour title, will play four-time Lipton champion Steffi Graf in the women's final Saturday.

Sampras' defeat cost him a shot at regaining the No. 1 computer ranking from Thomas Muster. Sampras needed to win the tournament to overtake Muster, who lost his opening match last week.

The sixth-seeded Ivanisevic, serving badly at the start, trailed 6-2, 1-0 when the rain came. After the delay he delivered all 11 of his aces and twice broke Sampras, who had not lost his serve previously in the tournament.

Two errant volleys by Sampras contributed to the second break, which gave Ivanisevic a 4-3 lead in the final set. Sampras, struggling to put even Ivanisevic's second serve in play, managed just five points in the Croat's final six service games.

Despite some ragged moments, Agassi kept his cool on an 85-degree afternoon against Boetsch. The hard court soaked up the Florida sun and made it seem much hotter.

Agassi cooled off during changeovers by applying an ice towel to his balding head.

Lipton's defending champion is seeking his first ATP Tour title since August. Agassi began to shake the slump after losing his opening match at Memphis last month to Luke Jensen, a doubles specialist ranked 419th.

Agassi took charge early against Boetsch, breaking his first three service games for a 4-1 lead. Agassi won 11 straight points midway through the match and closed it out with another service break at love.

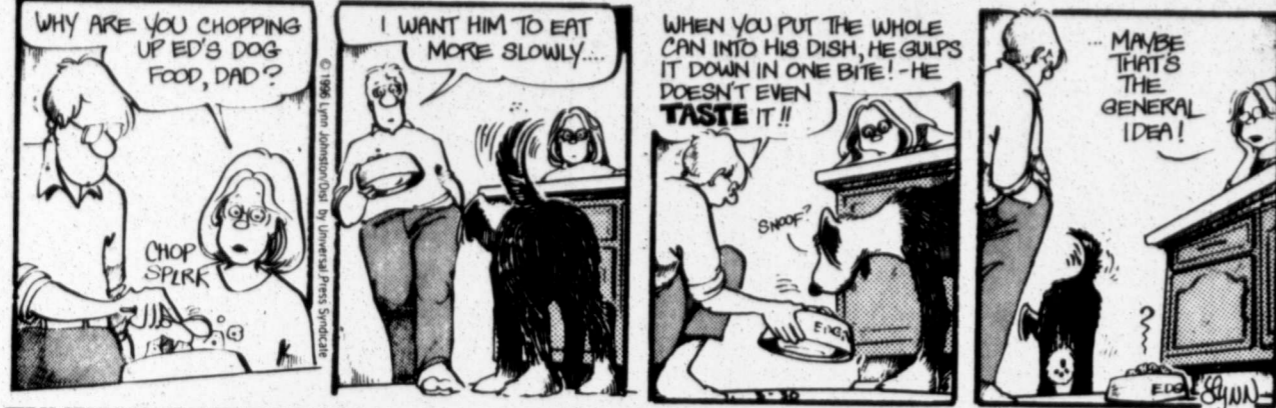

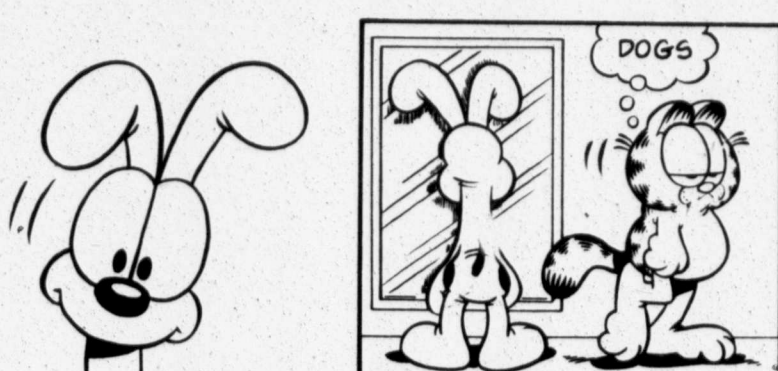
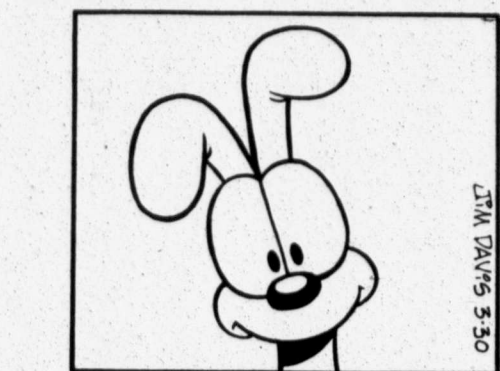

# This round of legal fees to be on 'Cheers' barflies Norm and Cliff

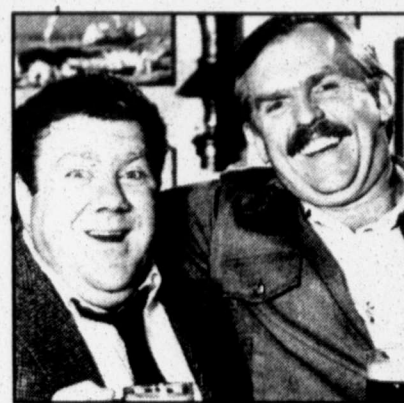
LOS ANGELES — Norm and Cliff have to pick up an expensive round. George Wendt and John Ratzenberger, who played them on the long-running sitcom "Cheers," must ante up more than \$78,000 in legal fees after losing a lawsuit that claimed robot barflies resembled them.

U.S. District Judge Manuel Real signed court papers Thursday requiring the two actors to pay \$33,000 in legal fees to Host International and \$45,033 in fees to Paramount Pictures Corp.

In January, Real dismissed their lawsuit, which originally was thrown out of federal court but sent back on appeal.

Wendt and Ratzenberger sued the companies in 1993 over pairs of robots that were perched on stools in about a dozen airport bars in the United States and New Zealand. Paramount, which owns the rights to "Cheers," hired Host to set up the bars.

The judge decided the bespectacled, brown-haired robots looked nothing like the actors.

Deputy City Attorney Brian Williams said the actor, whose films include "Lady Sings the Blues," "The Empire Strikes Back" and "Return of the Jedi," received "no added benefit or burden because of his celebrity status."

"It wasn't an egregious case," the prosecutor said.

Williams, who pleaded innocent Monday to misdemeanor spousal battery and dissuading a witness, wasn't in court. The misdemeanor counts don't require his presence.

The 58-year-old Williams allegedly attacked his girlfriend, Patricia Von Heitman, 53, while driving home from a restaurant Jan. 30 and later after parking in the garage of the Hollywood Hills home they share.

The woman told police Williams slapped her on the face and upper body and stopped her when she tried to notify police. She also said he pulled her out of the car and pushed her down.

SANTA ANA, Calif. — Dorothy Hamill has filed for bankruptcy after a series of financial setbacks.

Hamill, 39, filed for Chapter 11 protection in U.S. Bankruptcy Court on Thursday, seeking to reorganize her financial affairs, said her lawyer, Craig H. Millet.

Hamill, the women's figure skating gold medalist in the 1976 Winter Games, said she has had a number of financial setbacks as a result of poor investment advice and management over the last several years. Details of her financial woes weren't disclosed.

## Rabbi who led Reform Jewish renaissance looks forward to his retirement, sightseeing

MERCER ISLAND, Wash. — Enough with being a full-time mediator and lightning rod, a lover of tradition and instigator of change, revered as a visionary and reviled as an apostate.

Preparing for retirement after 23 tumultuous years as head of Reform Judaism in America, Rabbi Alexander Moshe Schindler looks forward to more sightseeing between speeches, more reading for the joy of reading.

Not to any less controversy, though. At age 70, a self-deprecating but unabashedly left-leaning activist, Schindler has broken from centuries of tradition on issues as fundamental as who is a Jew, while reveling in a resurgence of rituals once shunned by the most liberal branch of one of the world's oldest religions.

"If it has meaning, you ought to observe it. That's the principle of Reform. If it doesn't have meaning for you, don't observe it," Schindler says.

In June, he will be succeeded as president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations by Rabbi Eric H. Yoffie of Westfield, N.J.

In an interview after a recent speech at Temple B'nai Torah in this Seattle suburb, Schindler said his greatest satisfaction has been Reform's resurgence amid growing conservative fundamentalism among Christians.

Since he took over from Rabbi Maurice N. Eisendrath in 1973, the number of Reform affiliates in Canada and the United States has grown from about 400 to nearly 860, claiming 1.3 million adherents.

Reform Judaism, also known as Liberal or Progressive, arose in early 19th century Germany during the Enlightenment.

Hebrew was replaced by the local vernacular and musical instruments were introduced in services, men and women could sit together, prayers were shortened, major holiday observances were reduced by one day and many rituals, including the dietary laws, were abandoned. Some congregations even celebrated the Sabbath on Sunday.

In surveys conducted by the Council of Jewish Federations, 33 percent of U.S. Jews identified themselves as Reform, 42 percent conservative and 11 percent Orthodox in 1971, compared with 42 percent Reform, 38 percent Conservative and 7 percent Orthodox in 1990.

"We have emerged as the overwhelmingly predominant synagogue movement on the American Jewish scene," Schindler said.

"What makes me happy is that it's not just a numeric strength. There has been a considerable amount of increased Jewish literacy and spirituality of the grass roots, a greater appreciation for the Jewish calendar, a greater understanding or a greater discipline in the observance of the mitzvot, the commandments," he said.

"An ever-larger number of Reform Jews are beginning to view Reform not just as a religion of convenience, where there is Jewish minimalism, but as a faith, a religion that can satisfy the passionate heart."

Schindler's character and style win hosannas even from those most upset with his promotion of proselytizing and patrilineal descent, the belief that Jewishness can be conferred at birth by the father rather than only by the mother.

"I was extraordinarily

impressed with his ability to put aside his own parochial or denominational views when he served as chairman of the Council of Presidents," said Rabbi Haskell Lookstein, spiritual leader of the Modern Orthodox congregation Kehillath Jeshurun on New York's Upper East Side.

"I think Rabbi Schindler is genuinely in search of God and what is in the best interests of the Jewish people," Lookstein said. "I disagree with him on how best to approach God."

Nonetheless, official Reform approval of patrilineal descent at Schindler's urging in 1983 after decades of growing informal acceptance "caused a much greater rift between Reform and Orthodoxy," Lookstein said.

Schindler also took heat for supporting gay and lesbian rabbis, an "outreach" program to attract non-Jewish spouses and children of Jews and, in 1993, a \$5 million campaign to seek converts among those without any religious belief or practice, reversing more than 1,000 years of shunning proselytization and actively discouraging potential converts.

With an intermarriage rate exceeding 50 percent among U.S. Jews, an increase by a factor of 10 in the past 30 years, "I want to be as inclusive as I can," he said.

Judaism followed patrilineal descent for more than 1,500 years and actively sought converts for more than 2,000 years, he argued.

"Judaism is in fact a missionary religion," Schindler said. "We have the right to take our place, to offer our ideological and spiritual riches in the marketplace of ideas."

Schindler was born in Munich, Germany, on Oct. 4, 1925, the son of a Yiddish poet and entrepreneurial businesswoman.

His father, Eliezer, fled the night Adolf Hitler was elected president in 1933. His mother, Sali, supported young Alex and his sister, Eva, with a mail-order business for five years until they, too, escaped.

Schindler, 12 when the family arrived in New York, had an Orthodox education and bar mitzva, but was taken by his father to hear Jewish speakers ranging from atheistic socialists to charismatic Hasidic rabbis.

As a ski trooper in World War II, he earned the Bronze Star for bravery and Purple Heart for battle wounds. Like Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, he served in the 10th Mountain Division. They were wounded two days apart in the Apennines of northern Italy.

Soon afterward, Schindler visited Munich and the extermination camp at nearby Dachau.

"When I saw what I saw, when I came back, I guess, subconsciously this worked on me," he said.

He dropped engineering for rabbinical studies, worked as an assistant rabbi in Worcester, Mass., for six years, then rose rapidly through Reform's administrative ranks.

"The Torah: A Modern Commentary" by Rabbi W. Gunther Plaut, the first comprehensive Reform Jewish exposition on the Torah, resulted from an 18-year project he helped start as national education director.

Schindler and his wife, Rhea, have five children, one of whom is an assistant rabbi in Scarsdale, N.Y., and six grandchildren.

"I don't regret my retirement at all," he said. "Well, my wife may have a problem with it because, you know, a retirement means twice as much husband and half as much money."

"The narcotics were not mine. I walked out and talked with these officers, but they beat the hell out of me," said Martin, 45. "These two guys said they had to restrain me, but that's what they had to say."

"They searched me once and then jumped on me in the garage of the police department," he said. "One guy was just getting madder and madder and he has a thing against black athletes."

Police denied targeting Martin and denied planting the drugs or beating the athlete during his arrest. A search of Martin's pants pockets during his jail booking pro-

duced two baggies containing 1.8 grams of cocaine, Dallas police Sgt. Jim Chandler said.

Ms. Clark, who told officers Martin had proposed to her Thursday, had visible signs of swelling on her wrist and forehead after the fight, Chandler said. Martin denied attacking Ms. Clark.

Martin at the apartment found him highly intoxicated. They said he struck them with his elbows and pushed them.

Sheriff's spokesman Jim Ewell said Martin told arresting officers he was unemployed but declined to give other personal information.

He said Martin also faced a warrant for an earlier traffic violation.

In 1991, police arrested Martin on charges of marijuana possession and resisting arrest. He received a six-month probated sentence and \$350 fine on the drug charge, which was dismissed in 1994 after he served the term, said Ewell.

He said Martin received a 12-month probated sentence and \$300 fine in 1993 for resisting arrest.

In 1987, Martin was arrested and jailed temporarily on two misdemeanor charges of check theft.

A key member of the Cowboys' "Doomsday Defense," Martin played in the Pro Bowl form 1976-79 and was an All-Pro in 1977. Martin and Randy White were named co-Most Valuable Players of Super Bowl XII in 1978, when the Cowboys defeated the Denver Broncos 27-10.

Martin retired following the 1983 season after 10 years with the Cowboys.

# IRVIN: Grand jury asks for, gets 30-day extension on term

scheduled to reconvene at 8:30 a.m. Monday.

Fort Worth television station KXAS reported Thursday that prosecutors promised Angela Beck, a 22-year-old topless dancer, that any testimony she gives won't be used against her.

Beck, who claims responsibility for the more than \$6,000 in cocaine and marijuana found in the room, is the only person charged in the case.

Another topless dancer, Jasmine Nabwangu, and Alfredo Roberts, a business partner and former teammate of Irvin, were offered the same immunity last

week, reportedly after invoking 5th Amendment protection against self-incrimination.

The KXAS report said the grand jury offered Nabwangu, 21, Beck and Roberts "use immunity." But other evidence could be used against them should they be charged and brought to trial.

Any of the three could now be held in contempt of court if they refuse to testify about events in the Irving motel room.

After the jury recessed Friday, Irwin, Roberts and the two women left the court building grim-faced. Irwin's only comment to reporters was, "I have a flight to catch."

The grand jury had not handed up any indictments in the case

from its closed proceedings. The panel's three-month term was set to expire on Sunday, but grand jurors requested and received a 30-day extension, which prompted protests from lawyers for Irvin, 30, and Roberts, 31.

"I think if there was nothing there, this process would probably be over," Terry Hart, a legal expert, said. "But there's something there that interests the grand jury. Now, whether that applies to Mr. Irvin or whether that applies to somebody else that they brought before the grand jury, we don't know."


Irving police said they found about 3 ounces of marijuana, 2 ounces of cocaine and drug para-

phernalia in the motel room, where they went in response to a motel manager's complaint about a noisy party involving possible prostitution and drug use.

The drugs were in the immediate proximity of Beck, who claimed they belonged to her, officers said.

But KXAS-TV, quoting sources it said close to the investigation, reported Thursday night that Irvin's fingerprints were found on various items in the room, including dinner plates on which drugs were found.

The station also had reported last week that a glass container with cocaine residue was found in Irvin's overnight bag.

## Astros' success depends upon starting rotation

KISSIMMEE, Fla. — Gerry Hunsicker has done his job. Now it's up to manager Terry Collins and the Houston Astros' players to do theirs.

Hunsicker, who became general manager last November, set his priorities quickly and has accomplished most of them. He wanted an everyday third baseman and he got Sean Berry. He wanted to keep Craig Biggio and Hunsicker got that done too, with a little help from Biggio, who resigned \$22.36 million over four years, less than he could have gotten elsewhere.

"All a general manager can do is put a team on the field that has a chance to win," Hunsicker said. "I certainly feel this club is capable of winning the Central Division. I'll be disappointed if we're not in contention all year."

The Astros should score enough runs. Their chances of winning depend on the starting rotation turning around after a spotty performance last season. Big bucks starters Doug Drabek and Greg Swindell, both 10-9 last season, are in the final years of their contracts and have not pitched well consistently. Darryl Kile has a no-hitter and All-Star appearance, but also was 4-12 last year, the worst season of his career.

much of last season after surgery to remove a rib that was constricting blood circulation to his pitching arm. He'll start the season on the disabled list because of a pulled chest muscle on his left side that apparently is not related to his previous injury.

"It's obvious that pitching is going to be the key," Swindell said. "Doug and I haven't pulled our load. At times we have, but we need to be consistent throughout the whole year."

Swindell had a 4.47 ERA last season and spent part of the season in the bullpen. Drabek's ERA was 4.77, the highest of his career.

"History has shown this team is capable of scoring runs," Kile said. "We have a great offensive team and great defense so as a pitching staff we have to go out the pitch the way we're capable of doing."

"We've got a Cy Young guy (Drabek) and a guy who won 100 games (Swindell), young guys in Shane Reynolds and Mike Hampton, and me, so we're capable of winning."

With Bagwell and Biggio on

the right side of the infield, Berry will open at third and Orlando Miller at shortstop.

There'll be a lefty-righty platoon of James Mouton and Derrick May in left field, Brian Hunter in center and Derek Bell in right.

The Astros also are hoping technology will get Bagwell through a complete season without another broken bone in his hand. He has been sidelined for three years with broken bones from being hit by pitches.

He's now wearing a shock-absorbent brace over his left hand, and he says it will keep him in the lineup this season.

"I really do have confidence that it will help me," Bagwell said. "In my mind, I'll be all right if I do get hit again. The first year we didn't do anything, the next year we did something and this year we really researched it."

Biggio and Bagwell have vowed to be more vocal this season in the clubhouse. But they plan for everyone to be vocal.

"If anyone feels at any time that somebody isn't pulling his weight or going about business the right way, anybody can say anything to anybody," Biggio said. "Jeff and I won't hesitate to say something and Derek Bell won't either."

## Rangers have to stay healthy, pitch stronger

PORT CHARLOTTE, Fla. — The Texas Rangers kept the team doctors busy last season and vowed it wouldn't happen again.

They came to spring training determined to put their injury-prone past behind them. But they couldn't even get out of spring training healthy.

Shortstop Benji Gil is out six-to-eight weeks following back surgery. No. 2 starter Roger Pavlik has a sore elbow. Juan Gonzalez had an excellent spring but has a nagging groin injury.

"We almost made it home," general manager Doug Melvin said. "But we're leaving camp with more positives than negatives. We've basically got our everyday lineup intact except for Benji."

The Rangers could be forgiven if they panic at the hint of a repeat of last year's casualty list, which included power hitters Gonzalez and Dean Palmer. Gonzalez missed several games last week because of the groin injury. Melvin is building his hopes around Gonzalez being the everyday right fielder.

"Our club will revolve around our big guys and their performance," Melvin said. "Juan, Will (Clark), Palmer and Mickey Tettleton need to go have big years."

Gonzalez played in 90 games last season, 83 as the designated hitter because of a back injury.

"He's played extremely well in right field and that's where we need him," Melvin said. "He's thrown out three or four runners and has really made the adjustment."

Palmer tore a bicep last season and played in only 36 games, but hitting coach Rudy Jaramillo is convinced he's ready for a full season.

"He started real strong last season and had a good two-strike approach," Jaramillo said. "He's stronger now than before and he's got great bat speed. He's in the best shape he's ever been in."

Tettleton has had a spotty spring, but Melvin expects another solid season from Tettleton as the DH. Tettleton hit 32 homers last season.

"That's Mickey, he's a streak hitter," Melvin said. "He's a productive hitter. When he's not hitting, he still gets on base because he's got good plate discipline. A lot of guys don't hit for a week and also don't walk."

Darryl Hamilton replaces Otis Nixon in center field. Melvin doesn't expect Hamilton to match Nixon's 50 stolen bases.

"Darryl is a good on-base

guy but I don't see a lot of steals, maybe 25," Melvin said. "He's not flashy, just fundamentally sound."

The Rangers signed Ken Hill in the offseason after Kenny Rogers signed with the New York Yankees. He's expected to head a rotation that also includes Pavlik, Kevin Gross and Bobby Witt.

"People kept talking about our pitching last year but the reason we didn't win was offense, we were 11th in the league in offense and runs scored," Melvin said. "Our biggest improvement was in pitching. We still have to improve our pitching but there is a perception that when we lose it's because of our pitching."

Kevin Elster would be Gil's replacement at shortstop, joining Palmer at third, Mark McLemore at second and Clark at first. Gold Glove Ivan Rodriguez returns at catcher.

Gonzalez is moving from left to right field, and Rusty Greer takes over in left. "We've got a good solid club right now," Clark said. "The main thing wrong with the Rangers the past few years is staying healthy. If we can stay healthy, we will be all right. Injuries are a part of baseball but we really had a rash of injuries last season."
