Council hears status reports

Programs designed to improve living conditions for Reese personnel were at the forefront of topics discussed at the Jan. 25 meeting of the Base Advisory Council.

Reese dormitories are to benefit directly from two of the announced projects. According to CMSgt. Frank Guidas, wing enlisted advisor, pay telephones will be installed in Dormitories 230 and 320 in the near future. In addition four new clothes dryers are scheduled to go into the base dorms.

First Lt. Barbara Shippy told BAC members that volunteer drivers are needed to reinstate the shuttle program to the South Plains Mall. The shuttle service was tested during the Christmas holidays and worked well.

Plans to match the shuttle runs with the entertainment schedule downtown are being considered, but; the entire program rests on whether or not enough people volunteer to serve as drivers.

All volunteers are welcome, noted Lieutenant Shippy.

For those who do not have a government drivers license, training will be scheduled. To volunteer, call Lieutenant Shippy at Ext. 3617.

Jack Hood, chief of Morale Welfare and Recreation, told the council that two new services have opened for Reese personnel. Hood explained that the Arts and Crafts Center now has a T-shirt shop with more than 200 decals to choose from. Shirts and decals cost \$3.75. He also said that the Mathis Recreation Center has opened an ice cream bar.

Among the other topics discussed at the meeting were plans to bring the Air Force boxing team to Reese for a smoker on Feb. 25 and 26, the schedule of observances for Black History Week from Feb. 10 through 16, and the need for volunteers to work with the Camp Blue Yonder program.

Court sentences two base airmen

Two Reese airmen were court-martialed during December.

An airman basic charged with selling and possession of cocaine and possession of marijuana was convicted and received a bad conduct discharge, confinement at hard labor for 10 months and forfeiture of \$50 per month for 10 months.

Charged with the same crimes, an airman first class received a slightly differing sentence in conjunction with his bad conduct discharge. His penalty was confinement at hard labor for 8 months, reduction to airman basic and

forfeiture of \$100 for eight months.

Three Article 15 punishments, previously suspended, were carried out in December. One airman first class, charged with failure to obey a lawful order under Article 92 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, was reduced to the grade of airman.

Another suspended sentence vacated involved an airman charged under Article 86 with being absent from duty. The offender was reduced to airman basic and forced to forfeit \$100 for two months.

Finally, an airman basic

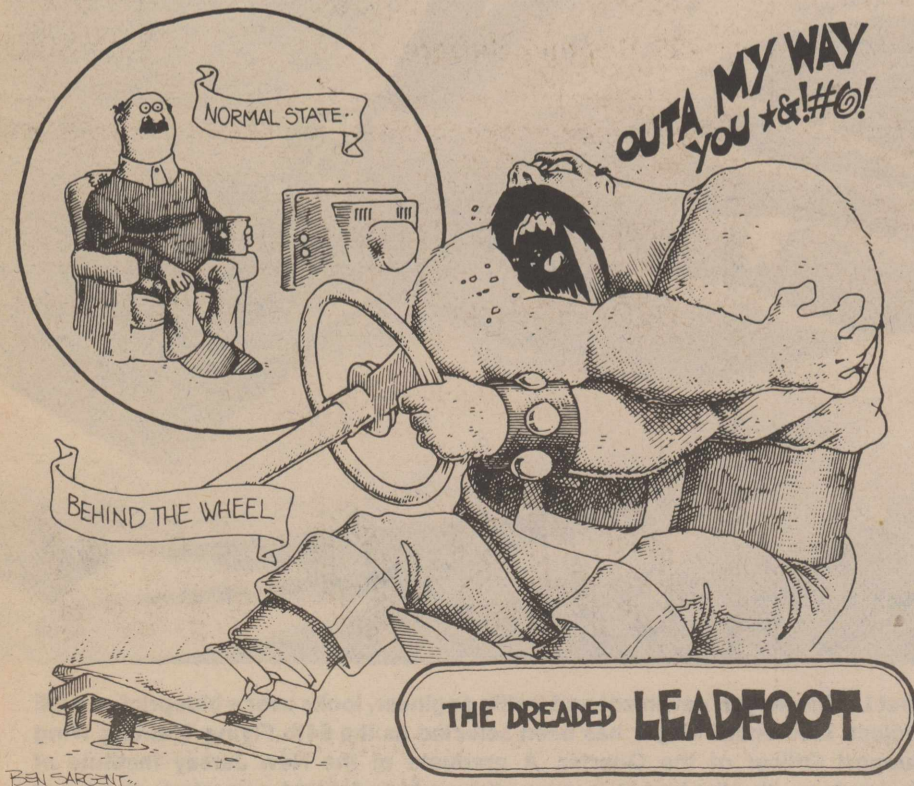
I was wondering if there is anything that could be done about improving services on base.

- Have you often failed to keep the promises you have made to yourself about controlling or cutting out your drinking?

If you have answered "yes" to any of the questions, your drinking is probably affecting your life in some major ways and you should do



something about it — before it gets worse. Whether your drinking problem is in its early stages or you are severely addicted to alcohol, you can find the kind of help that will respond to your particular needs. Your social actions office is always ready to assist or direct you.

It is important to keep in mind that no matter how acute the symptoms are, alcoholism is a treatable illness. There is no such thing as a "hopeless case." Call Ext. 3640 for help.

If you are a woman and have ever used alcohol to try to escape from your own difficulties, you have lots of company. It is estimated that 50 per cent of alcoholic people in the United States are women. If that is true, some five million women in the United States today — about one out of every 20 women — may be facing some kind of alcohol problem.

The sooner you recognize a drinking problem in yourself, the easier it is to get out from under it. Below are some questions that will help you learn how dependent you are on drinking. This is a time to be absolutely honest with yourself — only you can know how seriously you are being hurt by the role alcohol plays in your life.

Has someone close to you sometimes expressed concern about your drinking?

- When faced with a problem, do you often turn to alcohol for relief?
- Are you sometimes unable to meet home or work responsibilities because of drinking?
- Have you ever required medical attention as a result of drinking?
- Have you ever experienced a blackout — a

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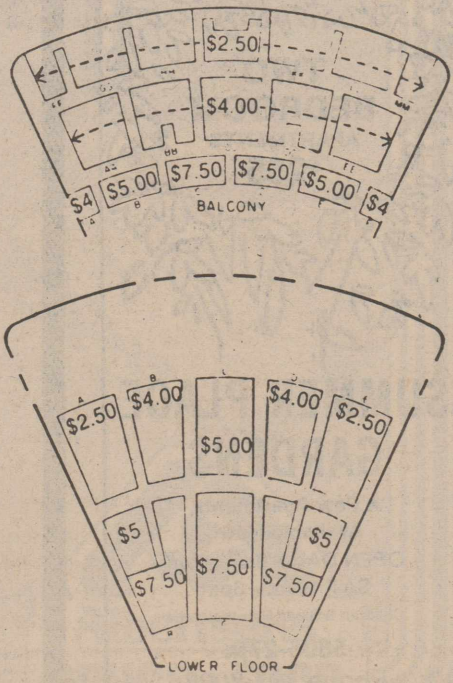
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General Davis outlines challenge facing military

(Editor's note: The following are selected excerpts from a speech given to the Rotary Club of Lubbock Jan. 16 by Gen. Bennie L. Davis, commander of Air Training Command.)

We in the Air Force and you as Rotarians share a common bond — a commitment to the ideal of service . . . service to the nation and the community . . .

Today, I'd like to talk a bit about this ideal of service as it applies to the serviceman and woman. As you know, in the past few years the perception of service has changed significantly in the minds of many people . . .

Gradually, an attitudinal change seems to have evolved about military service as a profession . . . Instead of accepting the fact that all citizens have an inherent responsibility to offer something of themselves for the good of the whole society, the "takers" sometimes seem to outnumber the "givers."

Change inevitable

I realize that change is inevitable. That progress depends on constant reevaluation. We must all respond to internal and external forces, maintaining our flexibility. Yet, you and I both know that some things will always remain constant. The ideal of selfless service is one of them . . . No matter what—dedication to duty, total commitment to worthy goals, and unquestioned integrity — must remain steadfast.

Perhaps the most difficult challenge we in the military have had to deal with recently is that of basic value shifts. These have most affected both recruiting and retention efforts . . . The "Me First Syndrome" has become all too prevalent among some segments of society. And even as the changes have occurred, many have developed general distrust for all large and highly visible institutions, even the military.

Within this state of flux, the military, as much as any other facet of government, has had to meet the internal combustion of attitude change head-on . . . We've had to revise . . . time-proven techniques in recruiting and attracting the kinds of quality people demanded for a strong and viable defense.

Recruiting difficulties

I'm sure you're aware of the recruiting difficulties all services face across the board . . . The causes are varied:

- First, there are today fewer young men and women in the "eligible to serve" age group . . .
- Fewer young people in the job market mean greater competition by employers for fewer human resources.
- Certain recruiting advantages of the past, like the old GI Bill and recruiting advertising dollars, have been altered or reduced.
- Starting salaries in engineering fields are nearly half again those of newly commissioned second lieutenants . . . We're recruiting only about a third of the engineers we require.
- Physician shortages are a

continuing dilemma in the civilian sector . . . And we're attracting only about half of the specialty doctors needed.

These are the factors with which we must work. But we in the Air Force are determined to make the all-volunteer force a continuing success . . .

A youth attitude tracking study last spring showed a steady decrease in an interest in the military over the past five years . . .

(However), over just the past year I've noted a reemergence of interest in the state of our weapons and force capability. Even before events in Cuba, Iran and Afghanistan, Americans were beginning to have a fuller understanding of the different elements of national security . . .

. . . I believe Americans are beginning to understand that the most fundamental social obligation a nation has to its citizens is to defend them against attack.

Positive effect

I also think this attitude will have a positive effect on our efforts across the board—from force modernization to recruiting and retention. International events and the obvious realization of the fragile state of peace anywhere in the world has caused many to reevaluate the status of our military . . .

. . . Anyone who volunteers for military service makes a special contribution. That individual . . . makes a conscious choice to accept higher standards and a more rigorous concept of discipline than the norm . . .

. . . Servicemen and women are fulfilling a unique role of responsibility in protecting the very character of our nation. I personally consider our profession a very demanding and admirable calling . . . But more than that, it's a place where one can make a director contribution to the good of the nation through individual achievement.

Leaders are not born, they evolve. They emerge out of their experiences, their knowledge and their sense of responsi-

bility. Not everyone can be a leader, some are not capable of it, some are not prepared to make the necessary sacrifices, but everyone can strive for individual achievement through service.

"Service Above Self" is not only an appropriate motto for Rotary, but the kind of ideal we strive to instill in our youth, and in those who serve in the military.

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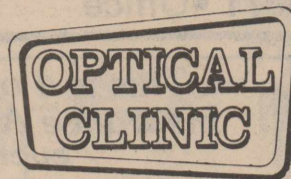
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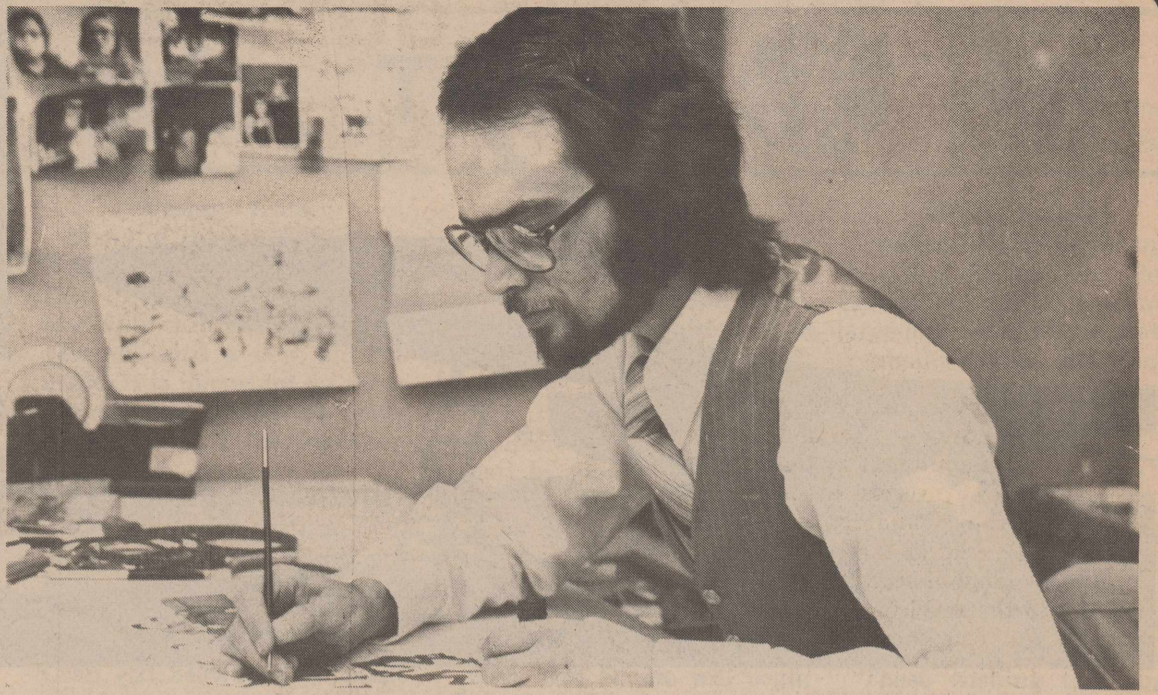

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Two get courts-martial

charged with failure to go had to forfeit \$100 for two months when his suspended sentence was enforced.

Article 15s issued during December included a senior airman who was charged with being drunk and disorderly and then reduced to airman first class, given 14 days extra duty and forced to forfeit \$100 per month for two months. \$25 of the penalty was suspended.

An airman was given a suspended demotion to airman basic, 14 days extra duty and forfeiture of \$100 for two months (\$50 suspended) for being absent from his organization.

A suspended reduction to sergeant was in store for a staff sergeant given an Article 15 for dereliction of duty. He also received seven days extra duty and forfeiture of \$150 for two months, \$75 of which was suspended.

Article 107 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice was invoked to give an Article 15 to an airman who falsely altered an official statement. He was reduced to airman basic and ordered to forfeit \$100 for two months.

Finally, an airman first class charged with possession of marijuana was given a suspended demotion to airman and had to forfeit \$116.

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
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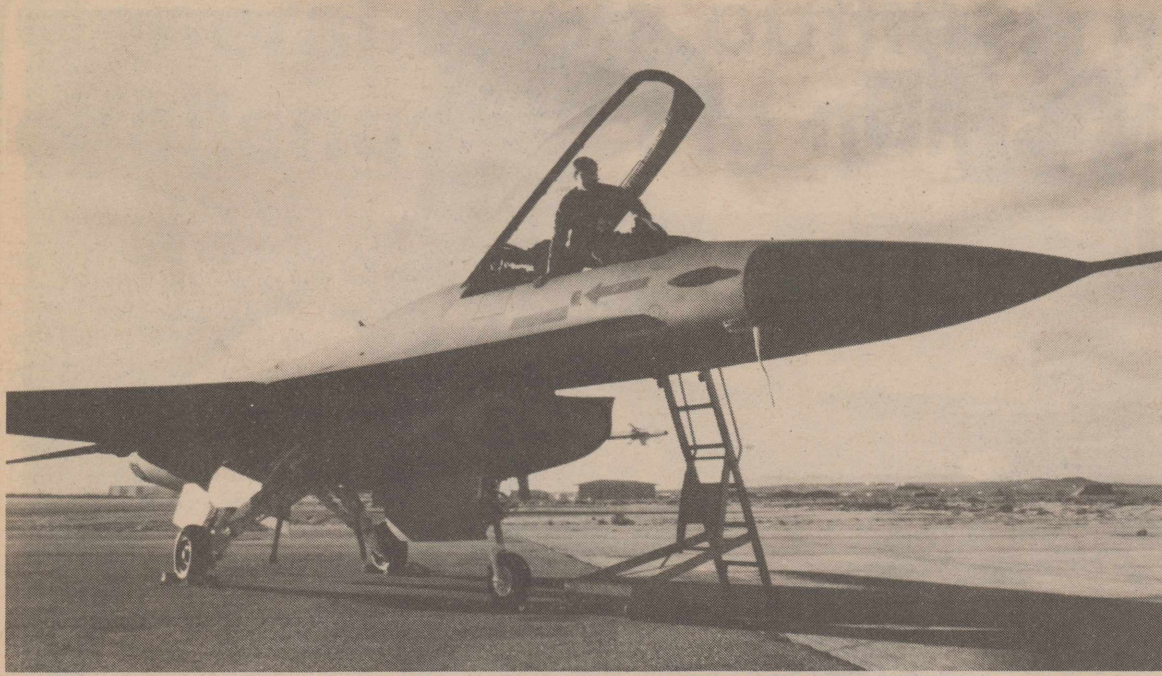
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Static display

Rosie is the wife of Maj. David Sullivan, Reese Staff Judge Advocate.

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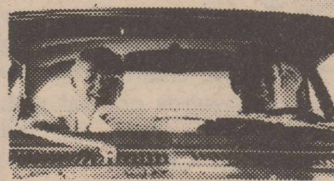


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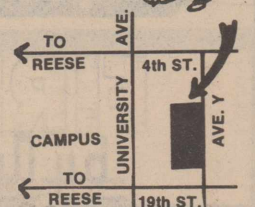
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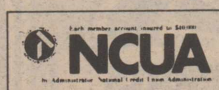
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Tidbits

B-1 tested



Former POW addresses Reese Prayer Breakfast

All base personnel, active duty, retired, civilian and dependents, are invited to attend the base Chapel's annual observance of the National Prayer Breakfast Wednesday at 7 a.m. in the Officers Club.

Col. Gobel D. James, deputy commander for resources, will be the featured speaker. A veteran of the Vietnam War, Colonel James flew F-105F aircraft as a "Wild Weasel" pilot. After a short tour in Korea in conjunction with the Pueblo incident, he was stationed at Korat Air Base, Thailand.

On July 15, 1968, his aircraft was shot down over North Vietnam. Captured by the Viet

Cong, Colonel James was held until March 14, 1973, as a prisoner of war.

The colonel is a command pilot with more than 3,500 flying hours and flew 34 combat missions over North Vietnam.

Also featured at the breakfast will be taped messages from the Secretary of Defense, Secretary of the Air Force and Chief of Air Force Chaplains.

"We also have entertainment designed for smaller groups," added McFall. "We have several pool and ping pong tables, all types of parlor games, pinball machines and video games. There is also a television and reading room at the center."

For the music fan, the center has a collection of more than 400 albums available for listening or recording. A minimal fee is charged for use of the center's top notch eight-track and cassette recording room. There is also a piano available for those who want to make their own music.

Special services

A copying machine is available for center patrons. Cost per copy is just 10 cents. Another bargain for Reese people is the discount theater tickets available for shows at

two downtown movie complexes. Tickets cost \$2, discounted \$1.50 from regular theater prices.

The center has just opened an ice cream bar and has hot dogs and drinks available too. The center also has hot chili every Thursday.

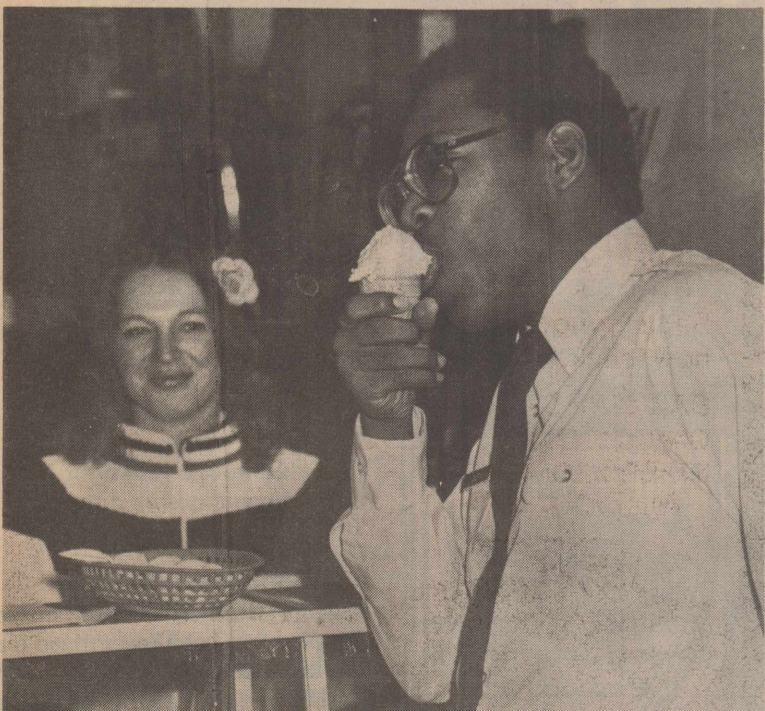

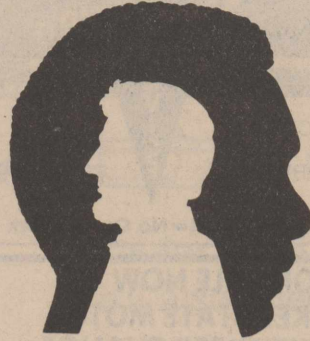



But the voodoo spell that had troubled Reese throughout the

Reese charged that the winning goal had been fired after the horn, but, none of the officials saw the play in favor of the Rattlers.

"The Laughlin player took a full step after the buzzer and then shot the ball," remembered Jones. "It was a bad call, but, that's the way our luck had been running throughout the tourney."

The 107-105 loss knocked Reese out of the tournament and ended the varsity cagers season.

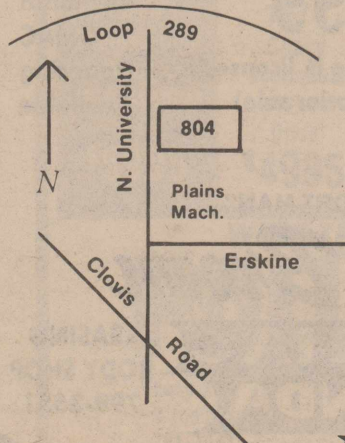

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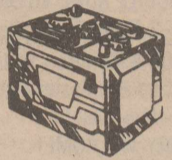
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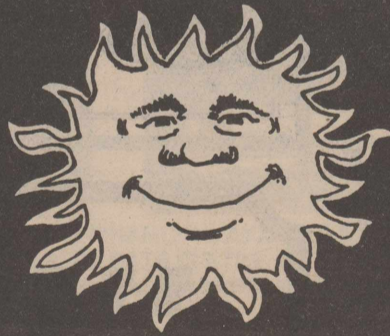
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
