Lieutenant Worthing led the field of 53 graduates by being named as the recipient of the Air Training Command Commander's Trophy. The ATC award is presented to the top all-


around student in each graduating class.

Reese sets goal for AFAF drive

Thursday marked the opening of the 1980 Air Force Assistance Fund drive here with base officials eyeing a goal of \$9,327.

Energy conservation—part of our job

Every day of the week, 365 days of the year (oops! 366 this year), the United States buys 8,000,000 barrels of oil from foreign sources.

If you are a numbers buff, that equates to 2,920,000,000 barrels per year. Or, at the current average cost of \$24 per barrel, \$70,080,000,000.

Here at Reese, in fiscal year 79, we burned 529,226 barrels of JP-4 jet fuel at a cost of \$9,113,271. We also used 3 430 barrels of gasoline at a cost of \$110,926.

The world consumes about 20 billion barrels of oil each year. To maintain that rate of consumption and keep reserves intact, the world would have to discover another Kuwait or Iran every three years, or another Texas or Alaska every six months. An unlikely prospect!

Reserves dwindling

While there is some uncertainty

about the exact amount of recoverable world oil resources, and about the rate of increase of productive capacity, one fundamental fact is clear: within about four generations, the bulk of the world's supply of oil, created over hundreds of millions of years, will have been substantially consumed.

The huge expenditures that we are having to make overseas for imported oil have created an unfavorable balance of trade, weakened the value of the dollar, and fueled inflation. This, of course, directly affects each of us. We pay higher prices for gasoline and every other product or service linked to energy consumption and we pay more in taxes. Because our buying power is reduced, our standard of living is reduced; national defense is weakened as the cost of weapons and training goes up; and we are constantly faced with the possibility of more interruptions in the supplies of energy from overseas sources.

Conservation needed

Progress is being made in solving our nation's energy problems. But, for the most part, the solutions are long-term and require long lead times before they will have much impact. In the short-term, however, there is something we can all do to help— CONSERVE. Each of us may only be able to save the equivalent of a gallon of fuel per week. But, if we can get 100 billion people saving a gallon a week, it will go a long way toward helping solve our immediate problems.

Conserve energy — it is part of our job.

World situation involves military



You hear a lot about military people on TV these days. The newspapers carry stories about whether the military is ready for action. And there's talk about registering Americans for the draft.

It's clear that the bright spotlight of attention is turning again toward the military because of the change in the world situation. The President described the situation this way in his State of the Union Address:

"The Soviet Union must realize that its decision to use military force in Afghanistan will be costly to every political and economic relationship it values.

"The region which is now threatened by Soviet troops in Afghanistan is of great strategic importance: it contains more than two-thirds of the world's exportable oil.

"The Soviet effort to dominate Afghanistan has brought Soviet military forces to within 300 miles of the Indian Ocean and close to the Strait of Hormuz — a waterway through which most of the world's oil must flow. "Let our position be absolutely clear: an attempt by any outside force to gain control of the Persian Gulf region will be regarded as an assault on the vital interests of the United States of America, and such an assault will be repelled by any means necessary — including military force."

And what is the United States going to do about this?

Secretary of Defense Harold Brown touched on that when he answered a question in a recent interview. He said that "we have to make it clear that we don't regard this as a three-day or a three-week or a three-month crisis in which war between the U.S. and the Soviet Union threatens".

He said: "Our reaction has to be a long-term. steady, significant one that shows the Soviets that, unless they change their general attitude, they're going to be up against stronger U.S. military capability in the future. It must be a reaction that shows them also that they're going to be up against strong punitive non-military actions by the United States." (AFNS)

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Mark outlines nation's strengths, weaknesses

Outlining America's major strengths and weaknesses in the coming "dangerous decade," Secretary of the Air Force Hans M. Mark said, "We must again act like a world power," to face up to the challenges ahead.

"First and foremost, we must realize that we are a great world power, with correspondingly great worldwide responsibilities." Secretary Mark told San Francisco's Commonwealth Club in prepared remarks.

'This was an unfashionable thing to say only a year ago and perhaps only six months ago, but the most recent events in the Middle East have changed all that.

'There is every reason to believe that the capture of the American Embassy in Tehran and the Russian invasion of Afghanistan will affect our nation's behavior as radically as did Pearl Harbor in 1941 ... In my view the recent events I noted will also mark a turning point in our attitude toward the rest of the world," Secretary Mark said.

Mark opened his remarks with an outline of the three greatest threats to our nation in the 1980s. He listed them as dependence on foreign oil, the "clear change in the overall military balance between ourselves and Soviet Russia," and the problem of dealing with terrorism.

Secretary Mark also gave attention to the goal of achieving energy independence, which he called "not all that unreachable, if we are willing to take the necessary steps.

Steps to cut foreign dependence would include moving away from use of petroleum in generating electricity






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President Carter calls for hike in carpooling

President Jimmy Carter has ordered federal agencies to give new emphasis to carpooling, vanpooling and mass transit.

Executive Order 12191, the "Federal Facility Ridesharing Program," has the goal of conserving energy, cutting congestion and easing air pollution.

The order has three main parts.

First, federal agencies are directed to establish an annual ridesharing goal. The goal would be determined as a percentage of those who commute alone versus those who double-up.

Second, each agency will appoint transportation coordinators. These people will work to get employees involved in a carpool and publicize the program locally.

Third, agencies are directed to report on their goals and the means they will use to accomplish them. The General Services Administration will issue the regulations to launch the program.

Those regulations are being worked on now, said GSA spokesman Bob Fisher. He said he expects it will be at least two or three months before the regulations are ready.

The order exempts "small, remotely located" facilities but other specifics are not available.

The president also ordered program participants to coordinate their efforts with other energy conservation plans. One of these, the Pay-to-Park Program, went into effect in November, requiring fees for parking at the Pentagon and selected Defense installations.

The GSA acts as the landlord for the Pentagon and federal buildings outside the Defense Department. (AFNS)



(Continued from page 1) resolved. As reported by Air Force personnel officials the Senate bill would:

• Provide a 25 percent increase in flight pay for officers and enlisted crewmembers. Officer rates range from \$125-\$306; enlisted rates, from \$63-\$131.

• Increase the basic allowance for subsistence for both officers and enlisted people by 10 percent. The increase would be approximately \$6.72 per month for officers and \$9.63 per month for enlisted members.

• Extend selective reenlistment bonus eligibility to members with 10 through 14 years of service. For example, a member at the 10-year point would be potentially eligible for a four-year bonus and a member at the 14-year point for a twoyear bonus.

• Permit reserve enlisted members to receive retired pay prior to age 60 if they complete at least 20 years of active-duty service.

• Establish a variable housing allowance system that would pay the full difference between average local housing costs and 115 percent of the basic allowance for quarters. This would help approximately • Continue the field-grade 87 percent of Air Force people

assigned to high-cost stateside locations.

• Repeal the 10-cents-permile reimbursement limitation for members making permanent-change-of-station moves. This assumes reimbursement of members at 18.5, cents per mile. Although the statutory limit for dependent travel is also repealed, rates would remain unchanged for the time being, for example, 7 cents per mile for adult dependents and 3.5 cents per mile for dependents ages 2 through 11. The 7-cents-per-mile limit for temporary-duty travel is also repealed, although no increases are contemplated now

• Revise "Save Pay" provisions for enlisted members and warrant officers who accept commissions. Pay raises and longevity increases that the individual would have received as an enlisted member or warrant officer would be included in the "Save Pay" calculation.

This is in addition to the calculation of basic pay, allowance for subsistence,

Although the jump was being successfully completed by only a few women rollerskaters in the world at that time, the judges apparently agreed with Airman Sills' review of her performance. Her marks were good, but; not good enough for the gold. She returned home with the bronze medal.

"I was determined to go back to the worlds the next year, said to the worlds the next year," said Airman Sills. "But, my mother had different plans.'

The problem was that in the off season the sprite young girl that had swept all of the American freestyle matches had matured into a woman. She grew three inches and her mother was convinced that she would never be able to consistently land triple jumps.

"There was no way to change mom's mind," explained Airman Sills. "So, at her suggestion I changed from freestyle to dance."

While on her Redford High School senior class trip, Airman Sills was kicked by a horse. The injury sidelined her for nearly a year. She is still affected by the mishap and is unable to perform the thrilling high jumps that had lifted her into world class ranking.

But she refused to give up, logging seeminly endless hours of practice, the dance team made a come back. In fact, the rollerskating duo rolled to the 1978 national dance crown.


Personal problems hastened Airman Sills' retirement from the amatuer ranks following the nationals. She decided to turn professional and start coaching.

1980 census

Air Force members in the 50 states will be counted for the national census April 1 when they will be asked to fill out military census reports.

The report forms will be distributed by base project officers.

Local governments of the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands and the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianna Islands will provide census materials to installations in those areas.

Data at all other overseas areas will be taken from the automated personnel data system. Military people in these areas will be counted automatically. (AFNS)

Retirees get pay hike

Retired military people will get a 6 percent increase in their retirement pay Saturday.

Retirement pay raises are based on the consumer price index, a statistical tool that measures a market basket of prices to show changes in the cost of living. The index increased 6 percent from July through December.

The next increase in retired pay will be based on the growth of the index from January through June 1980 and will go into effect Sept. 1. The index in December was pegged at 230 which means that what \$1.00 would buy in the 1967 base year, would cost \$2.30 now.

Shot clinic


