Urges quick passage

Carter backs compensation bill

President Carter has pledged his support for a number of improvements in military compensation currently being considered by the Congress, in particular, the Nunn-Warner Amendment.

Going beyond these proposals, the commander-in-chief has also called upon the Congress to enact a number of other legislative changes.

The president announced his support for these programs during a "welcome home speech" to the personnel aboard the aircraft

carrier Nimitz upon that ship's return from the Indian Ocean. "I understand and I'm committed to the principle that a career in the military should be at least as rewarding as a career elsewhere in our society."

Prior to the President's Memorial Day speech to the Nimitz crew, Defense Secretary Harold Brown advised President Carter that the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the service Secretaries uniformly and strongly supported the pay initiatives contained in the Nunn-Warner Amendment which has

been passed overwhelmingly by the Senate and is now awaiting action by the House of Representatives.

The initiatives include:

- A 25 percent increase in officer and enlisted flight pay;
- A variable housing allowance to help offset excess housing costs experienced by members assigned to high-cost areas;
- A Reenlistment bonus for members with 12-14 years of service who possess critical skills;
- A 10 percent increase in basic

allowance for subsistence rates for officers and enlisted personnel;

- An increase in the PCS mileage allowance for military members from 10 cents per mile.

In addition to expressing support for the Nunn-Warner provisions, the President also stated that morale, equity, recruitment, and retention concerns required his support for additional initiatives beyond those under active congressional consideration.

Some of the specific proposals

Several changes set for rules of evidence

On March 12, the President, pursuant to an Executive Order, executed new rules of evidence for use in military courts-martial.

These rules were the result of a 16 month study by a committee of the Joint Service Committee on Military Justice.

When the committee was appointed, it was directed that the Federal Rules of Evidence be adopted verbatim unless they changed military trial procedure or were incompatible with military law or with the special requirements of the military establishment. Federal rules of Evidence are those used in Federal District Courts.

In most cases, only minor technical changes were made, either adopting military terminology or amending the rules so they would be compatible with the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

According to Maj. James N. Potuk, Reese Staff Judge Advocate, the new rules "will present no problem of interpretation at Reese." This positive attitude is fueled by the fact that Major Potuk was assigned as the Air Force representative to the committee which drafted and proposed the adoption of the rules.

He points out that in addition to the Federal Rules, the committee was requested to redraft the constitutional law rules in the present manual and incorporate them into the package.

The new Military Rules of Evidence are divided into eleven sections, each dealing with a subdivision of evidence. Section III, which deals with presumptions in the Federal Rules, was deleted from the military package and replaced with one of the major sections of the Military Rules. It encompasses constitutional law and procedure involving the exclusionary rules (those rules which exclude the use of unlawfully

Keep summer fun

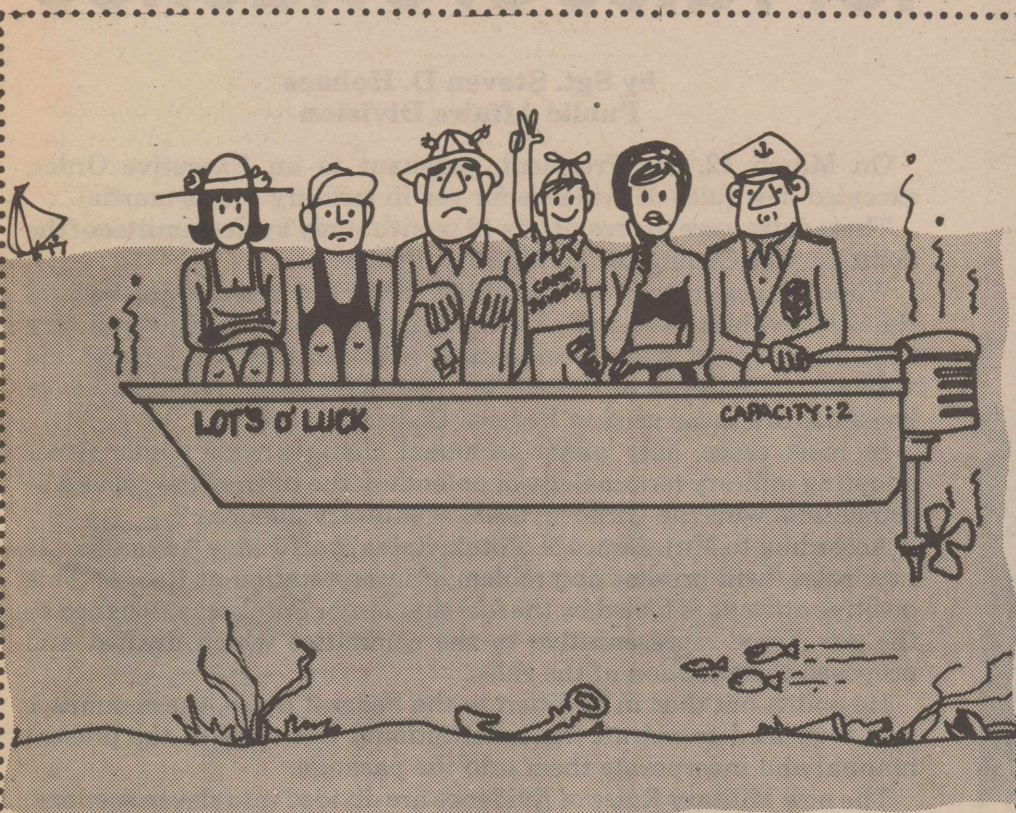
During the next six months, many Air Force people will risk drowning by ignoring safety precautions.

Behind traffic accidents, drowning is the second leading cause of accidental off-duty death in the Air Force. Based on previous experience, 26 airmen will probably drown between now and Sept. 30, 1980.

Drownings occur most frequently at natural swimming and boating areas — lakes, ponds, rivers, bays and beaches. Boating and swimming in these areas — especially on Saturdays and Sundays — account for most of the losses.

Swimmers' and boaters' attitudes are the main issues. Individual safety is based on caution in and near the water rather than on swimming ability. Failure to recognize hazards — cold water, rough water, strong currents and objects in the water — dominate drowning accidents.

Last year, the Air Force had the fewest drownings in its history — 14 less than 1978.

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"DAY SERVICE ON REQUEST"

Command generals air retention, compensation

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In the following article, ATC Commander Gen. B.L. Davis and Maj. Gen. William P. Acker, commander of the Air Force Military Training Center, Lackland AFB, Texas, discuss their views on Air Force retention problems.  A detailed map of Iran's troubled terrain occupies a prominent place in Maj. Gen. William P. Acker's office at Lackland Air Force Base. But General Acker's concerns — echoed in comments from four-star generals to the lowest airman — are much closer to home.

General Acker commands the Military Training Center at Lackland, where 83,000 men

and women this year will obtain their first taste of Air Force life.

But the Air Force is faced with a troublesome irony: With recruiting demands at an all-time high, the Air Force daily loses its most precious commodity — people. The reason why lies buried in the economic failures of the all-volunteer military concept.

The statistics are as startling in human terms as they are alarming to the national defense:

- Between 50 to 60 percent of all Air Force pilots and navigators leave the service after six to 11 years of service.
- In a recent month, the commissary at Lackland took in \$9,000 in food stamps. More than 20,000 Air Force personnel are eligible for public assistance.

Re-enlistments drop

- Re-enlistment rates for enlisted personnel dropped from 75 percent to 60 percent over the past three years.
- Records indicate 90 percent of all enlisted men and 50 percent of officers must either work second jobs or have spouses work just to make ends meet.
- Salaries for Air Force enlisted ranks E-1 through E-3 — the bulk of the enlisted ranks — are now at 83 percent of the national minimum wage. Including all ranks, the average annual salary is \$9,000.

"Recruiting is extremely difficult now and the No. 1 reason is money," General Acker said.

"Pay and entitlements have not kept pace with inflation under the all-volunteer concept," he added. "Today, a good, sharp youngster can do better financially by working at McDonalds."

But recruiting isn't the main problem. "Where we're hurting

is retention," Acker said. "We're losing that core of experienced people at a painful rate."

"This leads to a Catch-22. As we lose more experienced people, we have to up the recruiting ante. But we're faced with a shrinking pool of young people to draw on," General Acker said. "We wind up just chasing ourselves."

General Acker's boss, Gen. Bennie L. Davis at the Air Training Command at Randolph AFB, Texas, echoes these concerns.

"When we talk about retention losses, we're talking about people — a core of well-trained and experienced specialists gone after six or seven years," Davis said. "You don't replace them overnight."

Experience lacking

"What this means is that less experienced people are being moved into more critical areas," Davis said. "If you have a fighter pilot with 800 hours in the F-15, you'd rather have him in combat than the guy with 150 hours. But you won't, because the experienced guy is getting out."

The answer, the generals say, is money. But the promise of comparable pay for an all-volunteer military was the first victim of a runaway economy and a public indifference to the needs of a peacetime military.

When the military draft died its legislative death in 1972, the all-volunteer force concept was born. Military duties were made more attractive and pay and benefits were raised to make the services appealing.

But in three of the past five years, the administration has set limits on military pay hikes of five to seven percent to set an example to the private sector in the president's war on inflation. As a result, while the Consumer Price Index rose 72 percent since 1972, military wages rose only 52 percent.


"The whole purpose of the all-volunteer force was to keep pay comparable," Davis said.

"I believe that with the administration's support, Congress would have passed pay bills to keep things comparable," Davis added. "But that didn't happen."

Base shaving program should reduce waivers

Responding to what base officials tab an "unusually high" number of people with shaving waivers, a program designed to educate people in the treatment of Pseudofolliculitis Barbae is being put into action here.

Pseudofolliculitis is an inflammatory reaction of the skin caused by ingrown beard hair. At present, 30 bluesuiters have shaving waivers because of the disease.

Centering around a formal shaving clinic, those suffering from Pseudofolliculitis will be shown how to manage the facial hair problem and how to prevent its return.

Before June 15 all military

personnel here currently on shaving waivers will report to the hospital for reevaluation. If a waiver is still required, hospital officials will recommend that the individual's squadron approve a waiver of no more than 30 days.

Individuals receiving the new waivers will have to attend a shaving clinic on Tuesdays and Fridays. Following the 30 day period the patient will be reevaluated. At that time the individual will be taken off the waiver, allowed to grow a 1/4 inch beard for up to 60 additional days, allowed to maintain a stubble shave (essentially a 5 o'clock shadow) or referred to a dermatologist for treatment.

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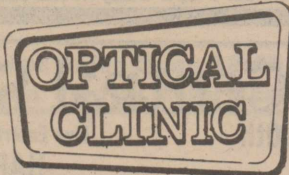
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Cable television service available on base soon

After years of waiting, reams of paperwork and hundreds of telephone conversations, the long-awaited cablevision system will appear at Reese within the next six months, according to an announcement made at the recent Base Advisory Council meeting.

Joyce Raymer, the procurement agent who wrote the cablevision contract with Lubbock County Cablevision, says that construction should begin as soon as the final layout of plans is approved by Civil Engineers. The construction is expected to take approximately 60 days.

Hookup fees for first-time customers will run \$19.95 for both full cable and Home Box Office. Monthly fees for the two services will be \$19.90. A mini-basis service is available that will provide two cable stations in addition to the local stations for a monthly charge of \$4.95.

Other items covered at the BAC meeting included lengthening the number of days the base pools would remain open. One suggestion to aid in doing this was to operate with volunteer, qualified lifeguards. Those interested in volunteering should contact Jack Hood at Ext. 3412.

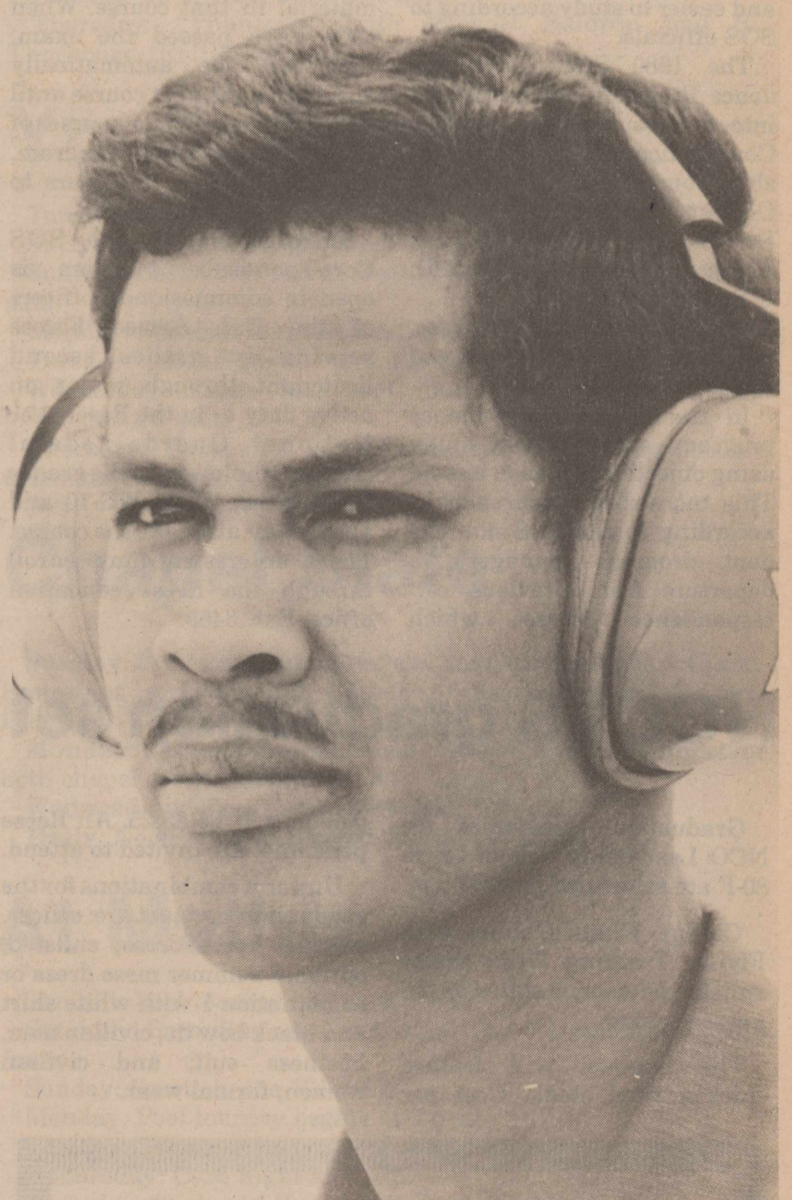
He went on to say that the Security Policy have 17 engravers available for checkout that may be used to mark personal property for recovery in case of theft. He urged people to mark their property with their Social

Air Force improves correspondence SOS

Officers taking Squadron Officer School by correspondence will find a new look featuring current, streamlined material which is more readable and easier to study according to SOS officials.

The 1980 SOS Correspondence Program will be divided into four courses: Course 20A, Communication and Leadership; Course 20B, Management; Course 20C, Employment Environment and Threat Assessment; and Course 20D, U.S. Military Forces.

These courses use exercises, programmed texts, and selected readings.

In the new correspondence program, students will study using objectives for each lesson. This more direct approach is, according to the SOS nonresident program managers, a departure from previous correspondence courses which

used volume review exercises as study aids.

Once students complete study in a course, they will take an exam covering only the material in that course. When they have passed the exam, they will be automatically enrolled in the next course until they complete all four courses of the correspondence program. The student has two years to complete all four courses.

Enrollment in the SOS Correspondence Program is open to commissioned officers of the U.S. Armed Forces serving in grades second lieutenant through major on active duty or in the Reserve or National Guard. Federal civilian employees in the grades GS-8, WS-8, WL-9, WG-10 and above may also take the course. Those interested may enroll through the Reese education office, Ext. 3469.

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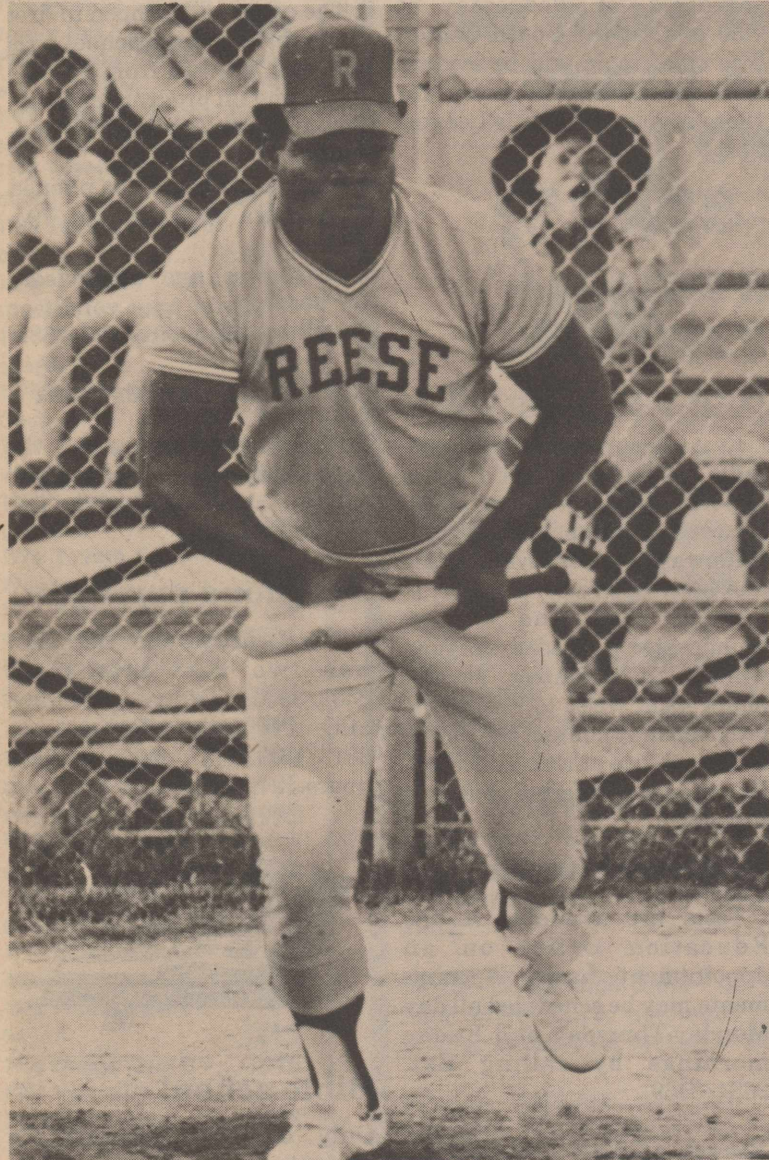
IM softball league off to sluggish start

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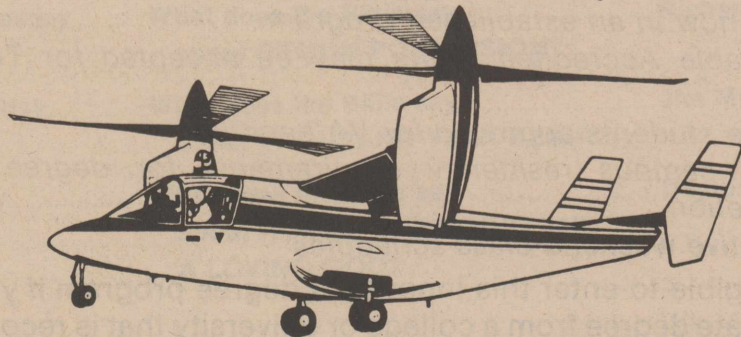

obtained evidence) and related matters dealing with self-incrimination, search and seizure and eyewitness identification.

Briefing scheduled

Major Potuk emphasized that, although the rules are much too extensive to cover in depth, there are a few major changes that everybody would be aware of. He stressed that commanders need to be briefed on the rules and also urged that any questions be directed to his staff at Ext. 3505.

Briefings for first sergeants, Security Police and Office of Special Investigation personnel are planned, but no schedule is available at this time. In addition, Major Potuk will be giving a series of weekly briefings at wing staff meetings that are tentatively scheduled to begin June 18.

Section III

Many of the new rules which were singled out by the Staff Judge Advocate are found in Section III. One concerns the decision of an accused to testify at trial. Historically, a cautionary instruction has been given by the military judge to the court advising them that the accused's failure to testify should not be considered against him. Since this was considered to emphasize the accused's silence, thus amplifying the prejudicial effect, the rule recognizes the tactical importance of a cautionary instruction and simply leaves the decision of whether to request the instruction in the hand of the defense.

A further change affects the accused's right to privileged discussion with a psychiatrist. When a psychiatric examination of accused is ordered by the court, the squadron commander or defense counsel, the new rule prevents any incriminating statement made by him from being used as evidence or as a means of gaining further evidence.

The accused, however, waives the general protection when he first introduces such statements.

Administrative inspections for contraband have been legalized when such contraband would adversely affect the military fitness of the command. Such evidence would be admissible against an accused unless the commander's sole purpose was to obtain evidence for use in trial by court-martial or other disciplinary proceedings.

Contraband seized during pre-scheduled inspections is now admissible as evidence also.

Further changes

An important change in Section IV deals with evidence of a rape victim's prior sexual history. This evidence is no longer admissible except when it is constitutionally required, when an attempt is made to prove that a third party was actually the source of injury or in an attempt to prove that the victim consented.

For the accused being tried a second time, evidence of a prior conviction is inadmissible when there is evidence of rehabilitation. The explanation of this rule states that the extent to which military rehabilitation programs come within this section is unclear, although it is probable that successful completion of such a program is rehabilitation.

A final major change concerns the use of polygraph and drug or hypnosis induced interviews. Under the rule, if the evidence will assist the court to understand the evidence or determine a fact in issue. Admission, however, is within the sound discretion of the military judge.

included in the presidential recommendations are:

- Increased per diem rates.
- An increase in the PCS trailer allowance.
- Extension of eligibility for the family separation allowance for junior enlisted personnel.
- Establishment of a cost-sharing basic dependent dental care program.
- Providing single members

in grades E-7 and above the option of residing on or off base.

Air Force officials have cautioned that some of these proposals have not yet been submitted to Congress. While action might be taken this year on some of the proposals already submitted, it would probably be next year before Congress could address major issues such as dependent dental care and optional residency for single personnel.

Academy commissions 900 second lieutenants

The Air Force Academy has graduated approximately 900 students for the year 1980. Ninety-eight are the first women graduates.

Three hundred one graduates have military parents. The largest group of military parents come from the Air Force with 175. Of this number, seven are officers of general rank, 95 are officers of various grades, 68 are noncommissioned officers and five serve in the Air Force Reserve. (AFNS)
