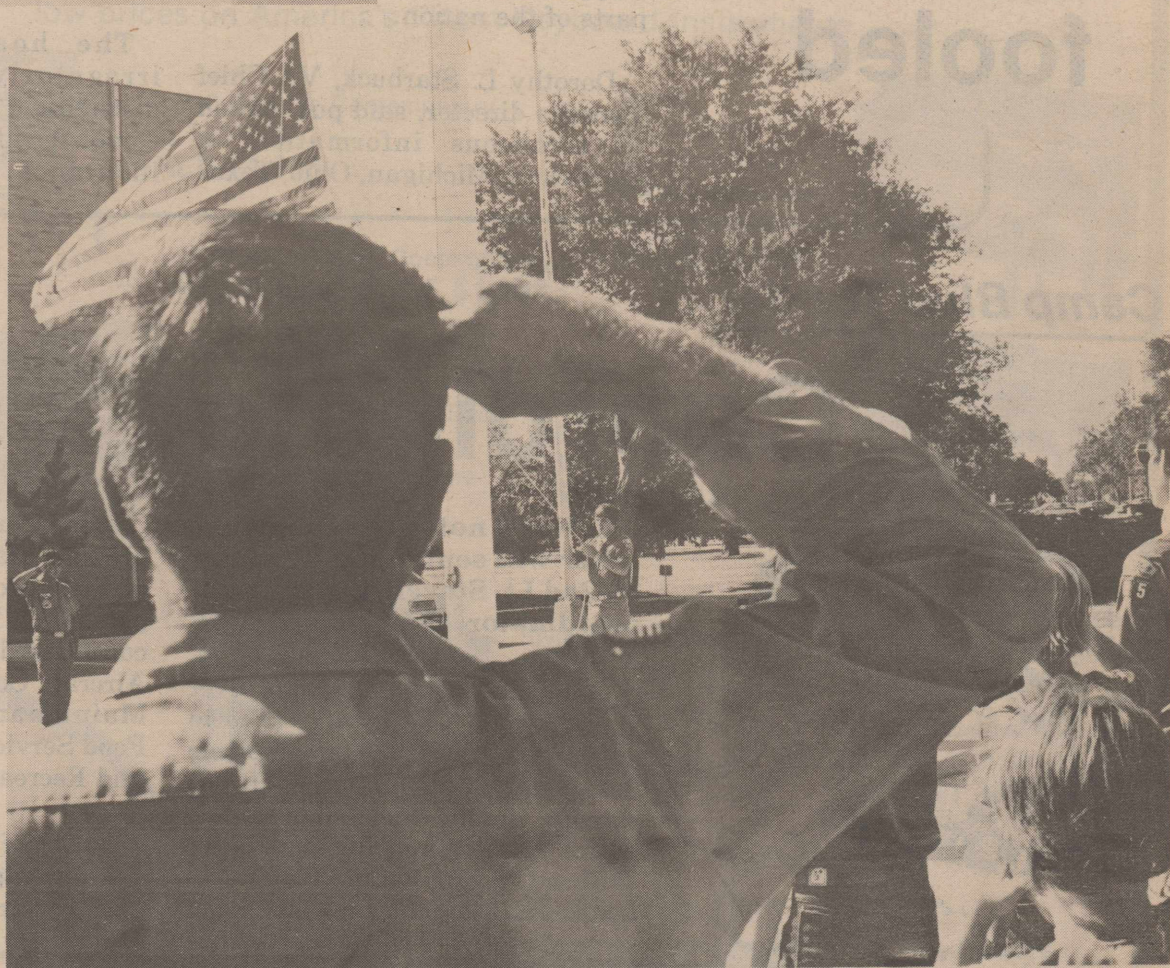

Muffed job

I am from Laughlin Air Force Base. Last month we came in with a T-37 with maintenance problems and they worked on it all night. The problem is that they ripped off my ear muffs that were in the plane.

This aircraft landed at Reese with engine problems. The aircraft was worked on by Transient Maintenance and several specialists shops. Many persons worked on the aircraft at various times while it was here. At this point, it would be nearly impossible to determine who took the ear defenders and whether it was done maliciously or by mistake. In any event, the supervisor of Transient Maintenance obtained a replacement set of ear defenders, etched the pilot's name on them and gave them to him prior to his departure. Although it does not excuse the person or persons responsible for taking the ear defenders, it should be noted that those are items of personal equipment

which should be kept under the responsible individual's control at all times.

Mad hatter

Why is it that lately officers do not salute enlisted personnel when they are carrying boxes and why are their hats positioned out of regulation.

When a superior commissioned officer is unable to render a salute, he is still rendered a salute by all personnel junior in rank. However, when the opposite occurs, as in the case you mentioned, an oral greeting is sufficient.

AFR 35-10 specifies the proper way to wear the hat. An article in the Reese Bulletin informed military personnel at Reese concerning proper wearing of the flight hat. This article was published due to the large number of individuals (officers and airmen) who were not wearing their

flight hats in conformance with 35-10. We all have an obligation to wear our uniform in conformance with 35-10 and to inform individuals who are not in compliance to do so.

The air conditioning on the third floor in building 420 is not working and many complaints have been turned in. We have told our First Sergeant about the problem. So far we haven't received any response to our situation. It is very hot in the rooms.

Don't be fooled

Washington (AFNS) — A GI insurance dividend hoax that has plagued the Veterans Administration for more than 25 years has reappeared in widely separated parts of the nation.

Dorothy L. Starbuck, VA Chief Benefits director, said publication of erroneous information in California, Michigan, Ohio, Texas

and Pennsylvania during the past several months has resulted in some 200 daily requests for a GI insurance dividend that does not exist.

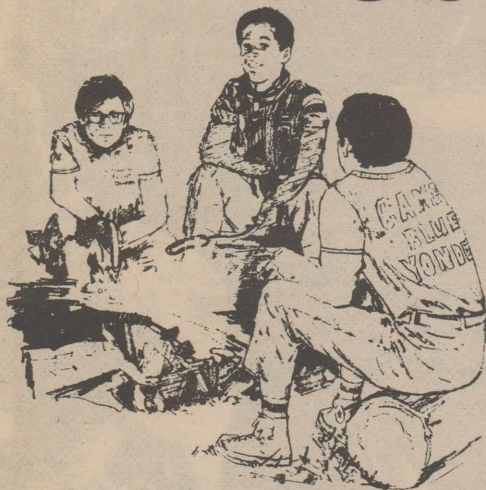
The hoax, which recurs irregularly, usually follows distribution of application forms complete with the address of a VA insurance center. The bogus

application form alleges dividends are payable for the asking, even if premiums are no longer paid.

Annual dividends on current GI insurance policies are paid to veterans who have continued to pay their premiums. These payments are made automatically, usually on the anniversary of the policy, and no application is necessary, the VA explained.

ACSC seminar has October deadline

(ATNCS)—Mid-career officers interested in enrolling in the next Air Command and Staff College non-resident seminar have an October application deadline.

The applications, which are available at base education offices, must arrive at ACSC, Maxwell AFB, Ala., 36112, not later than Oct. 31.

The student led seminars will begin in January or February, depending on geographic location. One of the 50 lessons in the seminar program is required to be covered each week.

Group discussion in the

seminars is combined with other methodologies such as videotape cassettes of lectures presented at the resident school and war gaming exercises. In addition to the seminar program, there is another non-resident program also designed to prepare mid-career officers for the command and staff positions held by majors and lieutenant colonels. It is the correspondence program.

Both the seminar and correspondence programs cover staff communications; command, leadership and resource management; military environment and military employment.

Enrollment in the correspondence program is open at any time. Both programs are open to Air Force officers who are captains and above with more than seven years commissioned service but less than 15 years.

Air Force officers who are active duty, reservists, Air National Guard, and Civil Air Patrol, who have completed Squadron Officer School are eligible. The programs are also available to GS-11 and above civilian employees as well as O-4s from other military branches.

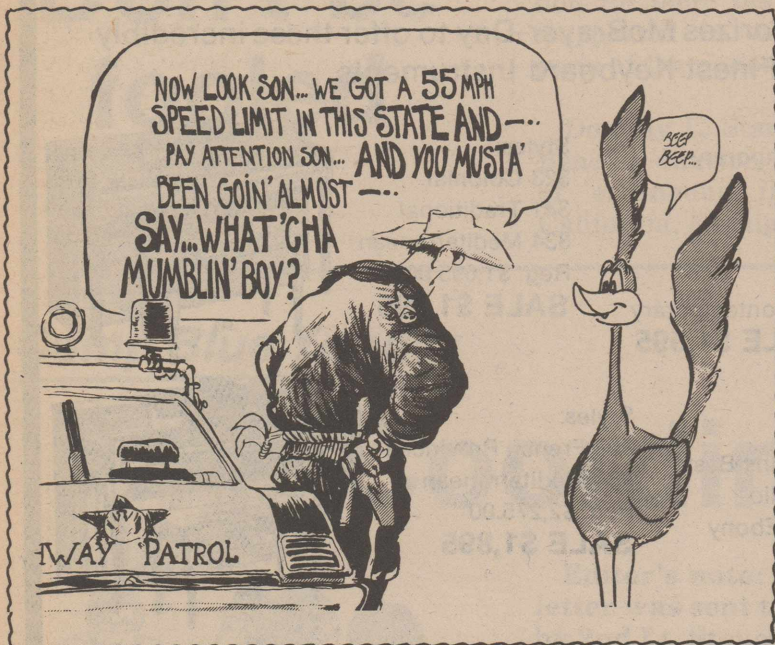

New commander tops BX news

Col. William C. Godwin, U.S. Army, has been named chief of staff of the Army and Air Force Exchange Service, replacing Col. James D. Reid, U.S. Air Force, who retired May 31.

Godwin transferred from Ft. Lee, Va. where he had commanded the Quartermaster Brigade since December 1978.

During his career, Colonel Godwin established the European Field Office, U.S. Army Troop Support Agency and directed the operation of the U.S. Army European and Middle East Commissaries.

His previous assignments also include service as the chief, Systems Analysis Division, Headquarters U.S. Army Material Development and Readiness Command. He carried out duties in Vietnam as assistant division supply officer, 25th Infantry Division.

In other Exchange news,

AAFES officials are responding to the shortage of available pennies by announcing plans to round off purchases to the nearest nickel at Exchange cash registers.

They feel this move will not inconvenience the customer since purchases should average out over a period of time. For instance, a purchase that totals \$4.83 would be rounded to \$4.85, while a \$4.82 purchase would be \$4.80.

Naturally, where either the cashier or the customer has the correct number of pennies, the price will be what is shown on the sales slip.

Officials point out that hoarding pennies doesn't really make much sense. A penny's copper content doesn't exceed one cent until the price of copper passes \$1.50 a pound. The price peaked at \$1.41 in February and has since settled at about \$.95.

But many times the Public Affairs Office is the recipient of complaints from the project managers who are responsible

for completing a job. They feel they and their crews should be recognized for a job well done. Public Affairs couldn't agree more.

There is, however, a major drawback to a great many of the complaints received; the members of the Roundup staff are not seers, mindreaders or fortune tellers. In order to tell the base about your accomplishments, they have to know about them. This doesn't mean waiting till a week after the project is complete and then calling to complain about not having seen any coverage.

Since it is often difficult for busy members of maintenance crews, Civil Engineers and the like to take time for lengthy


interviews or for writing drafts for the paper, an alternative is now being offered. Unit Public Affairs Officers will act as liaison between the newsmakers and the newsbreakers.

If an event happens that should be shared with the base, if a person you know or work with has done something outstanding, or if you have a pertinent point you'd like to make, call your unit representative.

Don't assume someone else will do it, and don't put it off because you "don't have time." A very rough idea of what the story is, given over the phone, will be enough to get things rolling on a story.

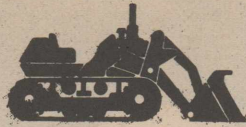



Wells has 'fun' stunt flying

In the disciplined world of Air Force Undergraduate Pilot Training, Capt. Stephanie Wells must remain the serious mentor. But, when the 35th Flying Training Squadron instructor pilot climbs into her own stunt plane, she lets her barnstorming spirit soar free.

One of the few women instructor pilots in the military, Captain Wells says that she decided to buy her own stunt plane for one reason . . . fun!

"I love the challenge of being an IP," she said. "But, I wouldn't say that it is always fun. That's what I like about my Citabria."

Despite the fact that shifting West Texas winds make stunt flying here difficult, Captain Wells absolutely delights in running her Citabria through loops, rolls, spins and other maneuvers such as the hammerhead, "split-s" and lazy-eight.

"I've loved stunt flying since I got my first ride with the Civil Air Patrol in Methesda, Md.," she said. "CAP Capt. Doc Trams took me for my first real ride," she remembered. "He gave me the works. I came the closest I've ever been to getting sick in the air, but I loved it."

The 29-year old T-37 instructor pilot bought her Citabria while in Undergraduate Pilot Training at Williams AFB, Ariz. She purchased the yellow 1970 Citabria at a local airfield despite suggestions from her instructors that she wait until after graduation.

"I had a little trouble transitioning from one plane to the other in the early weeks of training," she admitted. "When I'd get to the point where I could land the Citabria well I'd have trouble making a smooth landing in the T-37."

Captain Wells said that the biggest difference she found in flying the two planes is in the use of the rudder.

"When you're flying the Citabria," she explained, "you are always fighting the torque of the propeller with the rudder. The longer wingspan on the Citabria also restricts your ability to roll, although the T-37 has a relatively long and straight wing for a fighter type jet."

She noted that the amount of roll a pilot gets for the amount of pressure on the stick is the main difference between flying light aircraft and Air Force jets. Captain Wells said that the difference is even greater when compared to a sleek supersonic jet like the T-38 Talon.

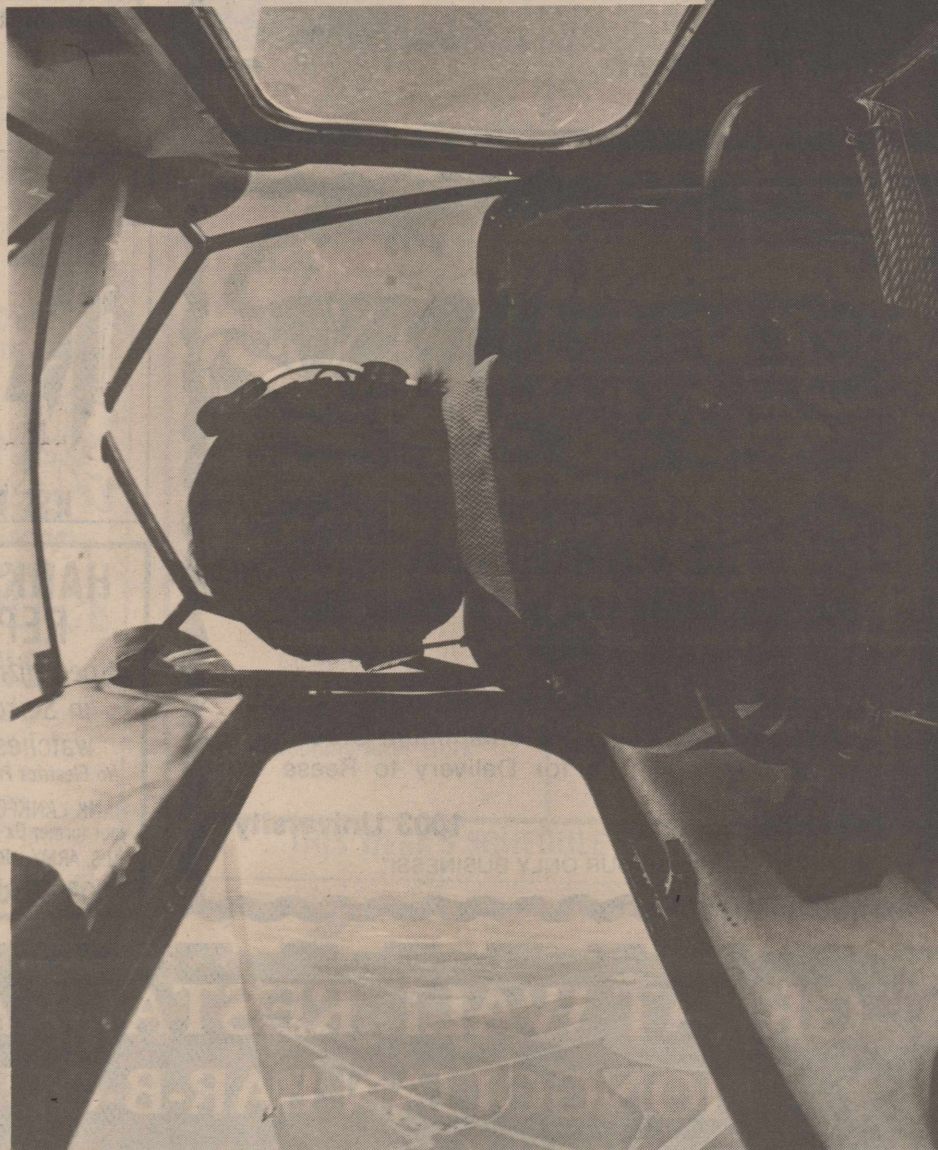
"You barely use the rudder at all in the T-38," she said. "Outside the fact the both planes fly there really isn't much comparison between a T-38 and a light plane. It's sort of like comparing the way a lumbertruck handles against the handling of a Porsche."

Those who knew Captain Wells as a child would be surprised to see her flying at all today and even more shocked to see her performing stunts.

"When I was little my father was stationed at an air base in England," she said. "We lived just off the end of the runway in a third floor apartment. When the planes came in for a landing it looked as if they were going to fly right into the livingroom. It scared me to death!"

But she got over her fear of planes and went on to become one of the few women instructor pilots in the military.

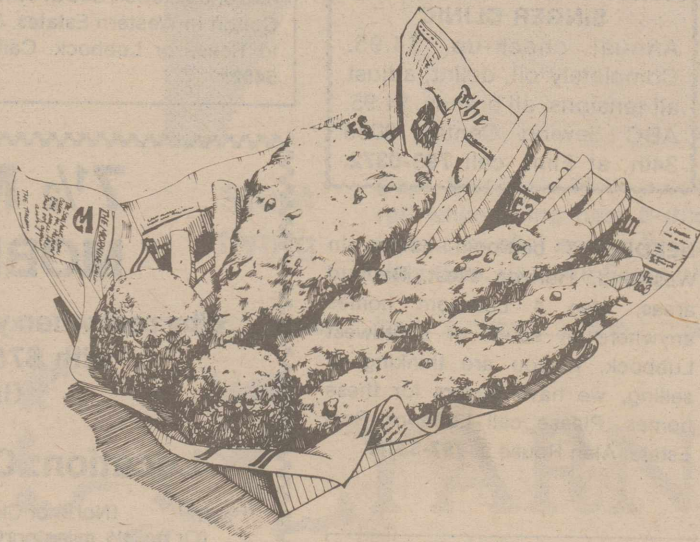
