**Commissioners nominate Cargill for Texas Enterprise Zone program**

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, April 26, 2021 at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

A public hearing was held at 9:00 a.m. regarding the intention of Parmer County to designate the Lazbuddie Wind Energy II, LLC Reinvestment Zone. Another public hearing was held at 9:30 a.m. regarding the intention of Parmer County to consider nominating Cargill Meat Solutions Corporation for the Texas Enterprise Zone Program.

sioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll report and the Quarterly Report were also approved. The Quarterly Report can be viewed in page 11.

Commissioners learned that part of the Reinvestment Zone for Lazbuddie Wind Energy II, LLC involves the Bovina and Friona school districts. Another public hearing will have to be scheduled. Commissioners will take up the matter again at their May 24th meeting along with the tax abatement ment Code.

The Court approved the Liaison Grant for the Parmer County District Attorney's Office. DA Administrative Assistant Charlotte Marrufo was approved as Victim Coordinator.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he was currently housing 21 inmates in the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center including 4 from Deaf Smith county.

Sheriff Geries also informed the court that the County is considering renting the extra office space at the JP Precinct 1 location in Friona to Panhandle Community Services. PCS is a non-profit, community based organization offering a variety of programs and services to assist low-income individuals and families. Their previous location was in the building near

Hunan's restaurant which was recently sold. This extra office area was not used by Judge Gipson and will not be needed by the next Justice of the Peace.

### Class of 1970





# Gas prices stabilize

Texas gas prices have fallen 0.4 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.60 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 2.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand \$1.07/g higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.27 while the most expensive is \$3.15 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 0.4 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.87 per gallon. The national average is up 2.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands \$1.13 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Last week saw limited upward movement in gas prices, tying the previous high water mark we last saw in March, signaling that perhaps we may see additional upside as most states in the nation have finished the transition to EPA-mandated summer gasoline," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "While gasoline demand did dip last week for the third straight week according to GasBuddy data, it was yet another small decline, and as temperatures continue to warm ahead of summer, it wouldn't surprise me that demand will rebound in the weeks ahead and we could continue to see gas prices push higher. For now, however, it doesn't appear that any rise in price would be significant, so motorists shouldn't be too concerned at this point, but may see see average prices inch higher."


longing in your soul to be saved from your sin. This salvation happens when you repent of your sin and trust in him alone for salvation.



### **Friona Playa Field Day Draws Statewide Wetland Program Leader** *Vital contribution of playas to recharge being recognized*

It's about 489 driving miles from San Marcos to Friona, but Dr. Rachel Fern, Statewide Wetland Program Leader with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department felt that the first Playa Field Day of the 2021 season staged by Ogallala Commons in Friona April 20 was important enough to make the eight-plus hour drive one-way.

The opportunity to get out of her TPWD office and onto the lofty heights of the Llano Estacado to preach a little gospel on the vital nature of the region's playas to Ogallala aquifer recharge, and to mix with folks from across the Panhandle, South Plains, and Big Country who are interested in playas too, proved a powerful draw.

A good crowd of Texas Master Naturalists from the Panhandle and South Plains chapters, local landowners, Texas Parks and Wildlife staff, and other interested individuals gathered at Saint Teresa's Church Parish Hall in Friona to hear remarks from Fern, Jordan Menge, Muleshoe-headquartered biologist with Pheasants Forever, and earth moving contractor and playa restoration specialist Terry Boedeker of Memphis, and to tour a local rehabilitated playa.

Talented cinematographer Lee Smith of Austin, a former TPWD employee who is working on a playa documentary that will air on PBS, was also on hand gathering video and audio.

The fact that the TPWD wetland program head was on hand is indicative of the growing importance being attached to playas in the overall water scheme for the High Plains.

"Recharge through playas is 10 to 100 times greater than through other areas they are the primary source of recharge on the Plains," Fish and Wildlife Service, Ducks Unlimited, and the Playa Lakes Joint Venture. The goal of the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative is to create an abundance of healthy playa wetlands across the Texas Panhandle in order to benefit current and future residents and concerns reliant on the Ogallala Aquifer," she said.

TxPCI efforts also support resident and migrating wildlife dependent on playa wetland habitat and the surrounding upland grasslands that encompass fully functioning playas. Work includes educating locals about playas and their link to a healthy ecosystem and to the sustainability and integrity of the Ogallala Aquifer.

Currently, the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative partners are completing projects with private landowners to restore, conserve, and protect as many fully functioning playas as possible to help sustain residents and wildlife in the High Plains of Texas.

"Pit backfilling and playa buffering with grass are included in TxPCI efforts currently. Landowners receive an \$80 per playa acre onetime incentive payment on this playa rehabilitation work and there's a quick return on pit filling. Thus far, 56 playa restorations have been completed on 2,418 playa acres. A total of \$159,325 has been paid directly to landowners in the program. There are 200 more playa acres in line for restoration. The first public land playa restoration has also been completed on the Rita Blanca Grassland near Dalhart, and two playas have been restored southeast of Friona.

"The recharge process is so slow that it can't keep up with the rate at which the aquifer is being depleted by irrigation. Recharge certainly can't make up for the loss of irrigation. It can support communities and small-scale livestock operations, however," she said. Ms. Fern put playa recharge on a family scale.

tial use for a family of four for two years. Texas has a total of 23,037 playas, with 4,080 categorized as pristine/functional."

Extrapolating on those numbers, and expanding on figures first arrived at by Don Kahl while he was with TPWD show Texas also has another 5,631 playas listed as functional but at risk, and 13,326 categorized as not functional.

A single three-inch recharge event through an average-size 17 acre High Plains playa would recharge 1,385,500 gallons of water to the aquifer.

Current average-size pristine/functional playas encompass 69,360 acres. At a recharge rate of 81,500 gallons per acre from a single three-inch rainfall event, water returned to the Ogallala aquifer from all of the average-size pristine/ functional playas would amount to five billion, 652 million, 840 thousand galO) Water Planning Group, indicate that if per person per day water consumption were reduced and 70 percent of playas are restored to a functional state where they provide recharge, there would possibly be sufficient water restored to the Ogallala aquifer through recharge to sustain 1.5 million people indefinitely. Jim Steiert is an award

winning member of the Texas Outdoor Writers Association and a Certified Texas Master Naturalist.

Dr. Fern introduced Heather Johnson, who has joined the TPWD staff as "the new Don Kahl, who came on board with us this month (April) and will continue this important playa restoration work."

Jordan Menge indicated that there are many opportunities as the Farm Bill evolves to boost playa conservation, including onetime payment incentives through Wetland Restoration 659, Wetland Enhancement 657, Wetland Wildlife Management 644, and Upland Wildlife Habitat 645. direct contact for landowners if they are considering a playa restoration project and want to schedule a field visit. TxPCI funds can also be used for planting buffer grasses around playas."

Terry Boedeker explained that playas were an "adventure zone" for him growing up, and that doing earth work in playas "is almost like icing a cake with a knife—the soil is the medium. He outlined considerations before moving playa soil.

"If you're looking to rehabilitate a playa by filling a pit, a big thing to consider is if there's enough soil to fill the pit. Hauling fill dirt is costly. Also, are there any irrigation facilities in place that are still functional? In some playas you may want to consider that a pitted area can provide some bird habitat in dry times," he advised.

"In areas where soil has been scraped or moved, weeds come back before grass, so keeping the weeds mowed will help the grass get established. Some erosion is possible on excavated areas. Farming tenant interests need to be considered."

Through the course of his work with TxPCI Boedeker has thus far worked on 42 playa rehab projects, with only one involving sediment removal.

"What do you do with the sediment if you remove it? A little planning has to be done. How deep is that sediment? Sediment gen-

erally builds out from the edge to the center, making the playa edge non-functional."

His first playa restoration was in Floyd County in 2011, a job where he moved 11,000 cubic yards of sediment into surrounding gullies and washes where the sediment first originated.

Jim Steiert writes about issues concerning the great outdoors including managing water resources. He is the author of Playas: Jewels of the Plains (Texas Tech University Press, 1995).

"It's not just TPWD working on restoring playas, but a whole coalition of partners working through the Texas Playa Conservation Initiative that was formed in 2015. Partners in addition to TPWD include Texan by Nature, Ogallala Commons, Natural Resources Conservation Service, U.S.

"Three inches of recharge through a four-acre playa produces 326,000 gallons of returned water. That's enough to support residenlons of water.

A single three-inch recharge event across the pristine/functional playas would be enough to sustain 154,800 people for a year at a use rate of 100 gallons per day per person.



### Tips from the "Walk Across Texas" Challenge

#### Safety Tips for Walking

It's Springtime and as the weather warms up and the days are longer, we see more and more people walking. We know though that accidents to pedestrians can happen. In 2018 there were 6,283 pedestrians killed in traffic crashes, which was the highest since 1990.

According to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) there are 5 tips you can do when walking to help keep you safe.

1. Walk on a sidewalk or path. If that is not available walk facing traffic and as far from cars as possible.

2. Cross streets at marked crosswalks when possible. We know if our rural areas that isn't always available, wait for a gap in traffic that allows you enough time to cross safely, and continue to watch for traffic while you are crossing the road.

3. Be Alert. Put your cell phones done. If wearing headphones make sure the volume is low enough you can still hear traffic. Try one earbud also.

4. Walking while impaired is dangerous. NHTSA estimates 33% of fatal pedestrian crashes involve a pedestrian who is drunk.

5. Most important NEVER assume drivers see you, they can be distracted or impaired. When walking make eye contact with drivers to be seen, and wear brightly colored clothing during the day. At night, wear reflective materials and/or use a flashlight.

Use this weather to safely get out and enjoy walking while being safe.

#### Meal Planning for a Healthy Lifestyle

Taking the time to plan our meals can be a great way to incorporate healthy eating into our lifestyle. The task can seem daunting at first, so we at Texas A&M AgriLife Extension encourage you to start with just one or two of these tips, master it, then work on your next goal. Meal planning takes practice and no one is perfect at it. Stick with it! It is always worth it to invest time into your health. Meal planning can also decrease food waste and help your budget. Check out these tips to get started!

1. Write Out Your Meals: Meal planning starts with simply planning your meals! Post your "Menu" somewhere in your kitchen to hold you accountable and help you write your grocery list. TIP: Plan meals that you can use more than once. For example, chicken chile is great with whole wheat crackers on Monday and on top of baked potatoes on Wednesday!

2. Balance Your Nutrients: Try to incorporate all 5 food groups throughout the day (protein, grains, fruits, vegetables, and dairy). If you have dairy and fruit for breakfast, be sure to include protein and vegetables in your afternoon meals and snacks.

3. Vary Your Protein: Different protein sources bring different nutrients to our diet. If you have chicken on Monday, look for meal options with lean beef, fish, legumes, egg, or beans later in the week.

4. Shop the Sale: What's on sale this week? Protein is often the most expensive part of our meal. Try basing your weekly meals on what lean meat is on sale for the week.

5. Plan Your Leftovers: Include leftovers in your meal planning. Some foods are better as leftovers anyway, right? You can even plan to freeze leftovers for use in a few weeks.

6. Make Your Grocery List: Make a list of ingredients needed for each meal. This is where the first step comes in handy; hopefully, some of your ingredients or entire recipes can be used more than once. When your grocery list is ready, shop your house and cross off what you already have before heading to the store.



### **Crop** report Price good, drought bad for Texas cotton

Texas cotton producers could have a tough year due to drought, but good prices are likely to soften the blow, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

Drought and good prices will influence the final total acres of cotton planted, especially in Texas, said John Robinson, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension cotton marketing economist in the Texas A&M University Department of Agricultural Economics, Bryan-College Station.

Robinson said cotton prices have recovered from a deep slide due to COVID-19. The pandemic recession sent cotton into a spiral as demand for cotton plummeted in April 2020.

Cotton prices bottomed on April 1 last year but began climbing back, in large part due to China purchasing large amounts of U.S. cotton to build up their reserves when prices cratered. The purchases provided cotton with a bump, but prices gained momentum as mills around the world ramped up production this year.

Robinson said export demand for U.S. cotton has been historically high, which led to a 45-cent rally from below 50 cents per pound April 1, 2020 to 95 cents per pound by March 2021.

"It was an astounding rally," he said. "Mills around the world from Asia to Turkey ramped up production and bought a lot of U.S. cotton, and the resumption of demand fed upward prices."

The market has corrected since, and prices settled in the low- to mid-80 cents per pound range, which is still a good price for producers, he said.

Drought, Texas cotton potential

Prices may have recovered, but the opportunity for Texas cotton producers will depend on Mother Nature.

Robinson said the state's cotton growing regions, from the Panhandle down to the Rio Grande Valley, are experiencing drought at levels that threaten yield potential in both irrigated and dryland fields. And forecasts are calling for drier- and hotter-thannormal weather through May, and then normally hot weather after that. Irrigation would likely not support the crop without rainfall because the moisture deficit is too high.

Irrigation in areas like Far West Texas and the Rio Grande Valley may be limited this season due to rationing by water districts. Furthermore, areas like the South Plains and Panhandle may find irrigation difficult due to water demand and high energy costs.

But that may not dissuade producers from putting seed in the ground because crop insurance prices for lint were at 83 cents based on the recent price surge. The high insurance price cuts both ways. While implying a better safety net against losses, it also raises the value of the coverage, leading to higher insurance premiums paid by farmers.

"It's one of those years where the possibility of crop failure might lead to more cotton plantings, since cotton performs better agronomically than grain crops in dry conditions," he said. "It's still a risk for producers because these dry plantings could get rain and then they have to follow up with weed control and more inputs and end up play-

ing catch-up."

Producers are also likely to pay more for inputs from fertilizer, seed and herbicides to around-the-clock electricity that runs water pumps and drives irrigation pivots, he said.

#### Tight supplies a possibility

Robinson said U.S. cotton producers were expected to plant 12 million acres this season, as of USDA's March 31 estimate. Texas likely will account for 6 million of those acres, and it could climb by several hundred thousand acres due to good market and insurance prices.

High grain prices may have changed some producer's minds, but the final decision will depend on how producers invested preparation dollars. But even with the high number of acres, Robinson said the cotton supplies will likely be tight after this season due to drought, international demand and low carryover stocks from last season.

Robinson doesn't expect more than 16 million bales of U.S. production in 2021, which he said would support good prices into summer and could push them further upward if crop abandonment numbers are high throughout the cotton-producing southwest U.S.

Additional uncertainty surrounds an ongoing geopolitical problem unfolding with China, as retailers have begun boycotting cotton produced in the Xinjiang province because of the nation's treatment of the Uyghur population. Xinjiang produces 85% of Chinese cotton, and it is unclear whether the boycotts will help U.S. cotton or spiral into another trade war.

"There is above-average uncertainty this season," Robinson said. "The stories to follow will be drought and the economic recovery and whether it continues to remove some of the hesitation Americans have when it comes to discretionary spending. The China situation is a wild card."

#### Healthy Oatmeal Breakfast Bars

#### Ingredients

1 cup peanut butter can sub for any nut or seed butter of choice 4 cups gluten free rolled oats can sub for quinoa flakes or buckwheat flakes

6-7 medium bananas mashed

1/2-1 cup chocolate chips of choice Optional

#### Instructions

Preheat the oven to 175C/350F. Line an 8 x 8-inch pan with parchment paper and set aside. In a large mixing bowl, com-

bine all your ingredients and mix well. Fold in your chocolate chips, if using them. Transfer the batter to the lined pan and bake for 12-15 minutes, until golden on top and a skewer comes out the center clean. Allow oatmeal breakfast bars to cool in the pan for at least 10 minutes, or until firmed up enough to remove. Transfer to a wire rack and allow to cool completely.

Notes: Healthy Oatmeal Breakfast Bars will keep at room temperature, for up to 3 days. They are best kept refrigerated and will keep for a week. They are freezer friendly and will keep frozen for up to two months.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease a 15x10x1-inch baking pan; set aside. In a large bowl stir together oats, flour, the 1 cup pecans, baking soda, and salt; set aside. In a large mixing bowl beat butter with an electric mixer on medium to high speed for 30 seconds. Add brown sugar. Beat until combined, scraping sides of bowl occasionally. Beat in eggs, coffee crystals, and vanilla until combined. Beat in as much of the oat mixture as you can with the mixer. Using a wooden spoon, stir in any remaining oat mixture with a wooden spoon. Reserve 2 cups of the mixture for the topping. Using floured hands, press remaining oat mixture evenly into the bottom of the prepared pan. Spread with caramel topping to within 1/4 inch of the edges. Drop spoonfuls of the reserved oat mixture topping onto caramel topping; sprinkle with the 1/2 cup pecans. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until edges are set (do not overbake). Cool in pan on a wire rack. If desired, drizzle with Coffee Glaze. Let stand until glaze is set. Cut into bars.
