#### Commissioners vote to keep a JP Pct. 1

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, May 24, 2021 at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no public comments. Minutes from the May 10th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's payroll report was also approved.

Commissioners voted to keep the Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 office intact. Precinct 3 Commissioner Kenny White made the motion, Precinct 4 Commissioner Casey Russell made the second and the vote was unanimous in favor of keeping the office. As for now, the JP Pct. 1 position will remain vacant until the Fall 2022 election.

A public hearing was held prior to Commissioners Court to discuss questions regarding the intention of Parmer County to designate a Lazbuddie Wind Energy II, LLC Reinvestment Zone. Friona ISD Superintendent Jimmy Burns and Lazbuddie ISD Superintendent Steve Wolf were in attendance. Later, in regular session, the Court voted to approve the Lazbuddie Wind Energy II LLC Reinvestment Zone. A tax abatement agreement with the corporation

was also approved.

Approval was given for Parmer County to join the National Association of Counties (NACo). This organization lobbies for rural counties at

the federal level in Washington, D.C. The NACo will help the county distribute funds it receives from the "Rescue America" legislation that was passed recently. Dues to join the NACo are \$450 per year.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he was currently housing 18 inmates in the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center. Two of the inmates are from Deaf Smith County. Commissioners approved the purchase of a new 2021 Chevy Tahoe to be used as a patrol vehicle. Final cost will be around \$28,500 after a \$7,500 trade-in allowance on a 2014 Chevy Tahoe with 158,000 miles.

In other business, a bond for Deputy Treasuer Lucy Martinez and ten hours of CE hours for JP Pct. 3 Pam Haseloff were approved. Consideration on a contract for court collection services was tabled. Commissioners believed that the Justices of the Peace should have a significant role as to which company is chosen to provide the


#### Top graduates announced

#### Texas producers expect bumper peach, blackberry crops

Larry Stein, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension horticulturist, Uvalde, said there was fear among growers that Winter Storm Uri might impact Texas peach production significantly, but all signs point to an above-average crop. Blackberries, another significant fruit crop for the state, were also expected to produce a bumper crop.

"I wasn't sure there would be a crop this year, but barring any unforeseen weather calamities, Texas producers are expecting a good crop in both quality and quantity," Stein said.

Conditions have been good overall since the freeze for Texas' fruit crop, Stein said. Dry conditions helped trees avoid disease issues, and timely rains have provided good additional moisture as fruit begins to fill out. So far, spring storms have produced minimal hail and turbulent winds that can cause yield loss.

While some early peach varieties and trees actively emerging from winter or that had opening blooms suffered crop loss and some tree damage or kills, Stein said Texas' commercial production orchards fared well. But it will likely be next year before producers truly know the extent of any tree damage suffered during Winter Storm Uri.

"The extent of tree tissue injury is the only unknown," Stein said. "Will those injuries be significant? When the heat sets in, will they still be able to transfer moisture? If not, we could see some more dead trees, but I think most trees that made it through the freeze and set fruit are showing signs that they are OK."

Peach crop progressing

Stein said the Texas peach crop continues to progress and that producers are expecting a good year. Availability should be good, but demand and prices are expected to be higher than normal.

"The peach crop looks

"The peach crop looks amazingly good," he said. "There were some fruit set losses on trees with actively growing buds, but trees with tight buds came through the cold fine and are progressing nicely. Producers should do well because demand will be very high, and consumers should expect good, quality fruit."

Some early fruiting varieties in South Texas and varieties grown in high tunnel houses in the Hill Country are ripening and should be available soon, Stein said.

He said trees were behind on chill hours due to warmer than normal temperatures prior to the winter storm, but that the cold and cooler temperatures since provided orchards more than enough to trigger good blooms. Good, cold winters tend to push better blooms and fruit sets, but the best chill hours occur between 32 degrees and 45 degrees.

Winter Storm Uri provided

limited chill hours, as extreme, sub-freezing temperatures during that week were not conducive to chill, Stein said.

If anything, he said, producers' thinning efforts will factor heavily in the yield and quality of individual orchards.

"The only challenge this year might be adequate thinning to get proper fruit size," Stein said. "There is a fine balance that producers must find that will allow trees to produce that marketable-sized peach, but still maintain a good yield."

#### **Cherry Frozen Yogurt Recipe**

#### **Ingredients**

- 2 16 ounce bags frozen cherries
- 1/2 cup honey, maple syrup, or simple syrup
- 1 cup plain yogurt
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice pinch salt

#### Instructions

Add all ingredients to container of food processor or high-speed blender. Process until smooth and creamy, 5 to 6 minutes. Serve immediately or store in an airtight container in the freezer.

#### **Cherry Crumble Pie Bars**

#### Ingredients

- 2 cups all-purpose flour 1 ¼ cups finely ground almonds
- 34 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 cup butter, cut up
- ¾ cup granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch ½ teaspoon finely shredded lemon peel
- 4 cups frozen unsweetened pitted tart red cherries, thawed and drained
- ½ teaspoon almond extract

#### Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a 13x9x2-inch baking pan with foil, extending the foil over the edges of the pan; set aside. For crust, in a large bowl, stir together the flour, almonds, and brown sugar. Using a pastry blender, cut in the butter until mixture resembles fine crumbs. Remove 1-1/2 cups of the mixture; set aside. Press the remaining mixture evenly onto the bottom of prepared baking pan. Bake in the preheated oven for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, for filling, in another large bowl, combine the granulated sugar, cornstarch, and lemon peel. Add cherries and almond extract; toss

gently to combine. Spoon cherry filling over hot baked crust, spreading evenly (mixture will be wet). Sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Bake about 40 minutes more or until filling is bubbly and topping is lightly browned. Cool in pan on a wire rack. Using the edges of the foil, lift the baked mixture out of the pan. Invert onto a baking sheet; remove foil. Invert again onto a cutting board. Cut into bars. Makes 32 bars.

Tips: Layer bars between sheets of waxed paper in an airtight container; cover. Store in the refrigerator for up to 2 days or freeze for up to 3 months.

#### Texas producers expect bumper peach, blackberry crops

Thinning fruit set is also critical to a tree's long-term production cycle, Stein said. Leaving heavy fruit loads on trees can stress them, which sets them up for a poor performance next year or makes them susceptible to diseases like canker.

"Over-thinning is better than underthinning," he said. "It can be a gamble because you never know what weather will do, but it's better for fruit quality in the near-term and for the tree in the long-term."

#### Notable blackberry crop

Stein said peaches aren't the only Texas fruit crop expected to experience a bumper year. Blackberries appear to have exceptional fruit sets this year, and some areas in South Texas are already harvesting some varieties.

Blackberries have always been a popular supplemental crop for peach growers, but new thornless varieties are making the fruit a considerable crop, especially for "pick-your-own"

orchards, Stein said. Selecting the right variety for individual locations and having enough water to allow fruit set to make plump berries are all that growers need most years for success with them.

"Most peach people have small patches of blackberries scattered throughout their orchards," he said. "The acres aren't high, but these newer varieties coming out may change the game."



#### Gas prices down slightly

Texas gas prices have fallen 1.4 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.75 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 14.7 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand \$1.13 per gallon higher than a year ago

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.39 while the most expensive is \$3.99 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 1.9 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.02 per gallon. The national average is up 14.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands \$1.07 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"In the lead up to Memorial Day, we haven't seen gas prices come down much, though with oil's recent move lower, we should start to see more drops at the pump materialize in the days ahead," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "With the Co-

lonial Pipeline situation continuing to improve in Southeastern states, fueling up for the holiday weekend shouldn't be too challenging, save for a few pockets in GA, NC and SC, where outages remain a bit higher than neighboring states. For those hitting the road, we should see prices inch lower in the coming week through at least Memorial Day, so motorists need not rush to fill their tanks as the drop in oil prices should manifest into lower gas prices as we begin the summer driving season."



#### **DPS Increases Highway Enforcement for Click It or Ticket**

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) wants to remind drivers to travel safely as we close out May and head into the Memorial Day holiday. Monday, May 24, through Monday, May 31, Texas Highway Patrol Troopers will participate in Click It or Ticket, an enforcement campaign to encourage people to wear their seat belt, as well as Operation CARE (Crash Awareness Reduction Effort), looking for drivers who are intoxicated, speeding or breaking other traffic laws. Troopers will also watch for drivers not following the state's Move Over, Slow Down law.

"Roads across the state are getting busier as people begin summer travel," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "With Memorial Day at the end of the month, we encourage Texans, and visitors to our state, to focus on the intent of the day — remembering those who gave their lives serving our country. Honor those sacrifices by doing your part to stay safe on the road. Buckle your seat belt, obey all traffic laws and do not drink and drive."

During the 2020 Memorial Day weekend, Troopers issued more than 27,000 citations and warnings. This included more than 10,600 warnings and citations for speeding and more than 1,000 warnings and citations for seat belt and child safety restraint violations. DPS enforcement efforts also included 288 DWI citations, 409 fugitive arrests and 77 felony arrests.

DPS encourages drivers to follow these safety tips for Memorial Day weekend:

- Don't drink and drive. Make alternate plans if you are consuming alcohol.
- Move Over or Slow Down for police, fire, EMS, Texas Department of Transportation (Tx-DOT) vehicles and tow trucks stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated.

Show the same courtesy to fellow drivers who are stopped on the side of the road. So far in

- 2021, there have been 5,645 violations.
  Buckle up everyone in the vehicle it's the
- Slow down, especially in bad weather, heavy traffic, unfamiliar areas or construction zones.
- Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices. Texas law prohibits the use of portable wireless devices to read, write or send an electronic message unless the vehicle is stopped. If you're using a navigation device or app, have a passenger operate it so you can keep your eyes on the road.
- Drive defensively, as holiday travel can present additional challenges.
- On multi-lane roads, use the left lane for passing only. Not only is it courteous driving and avoids impeding traffic, Texas law requires slower traffic to keep to the right and to use the left lane for passing only (when posted).
- If you can Steer It, Clear It: If you are involved in a non-injury crash and your vehicle can be moved, clear the traffic lanes to minimize traffic impact. Leaving vehicles in a traffic lane increases traffic congestion and leaves those involved with an increased risk of harm or a secondary wreck. On some highways, if you don't move your vehicle when it's safe to do so, it's against the law.
- Check your vehicle to make sure it is properly maintained and always ensure your cargo is secure.
- Report road hazards or anything suspicious to the nearest law enforcement agency.
- Monitor weather and road conditions wherever you are traveling. For road conditions and closures in Texas, visit Drive Texas.

#### Bridge Builder




#### Lightning strike knocks radio station off the air







#### **Check Your Mirrors**

Big fan of the family road trips. I am hoping you and yours can work that in this summer.

Since I just completed one as mentioned in last week's column, it's been fun to compare what road travel was like when I was much younger. I have probably written about some of this before, but the subject is timeless.

Mother had two sisters who both lived in Washington State. In 1958, the small Sullivan family consisted of three-year-old Scotty and two-year-old me. Dad had a piece of plywood outfitted for the back seat, perfect for two toddlers to play, nap, eat and repeat for the long journey to Yakima and then Seattle. The concept of a pallet with blankets and pillows and toys still has a cozy connotation for me. Our parents stopped for breaks that mainly involved rock throwing. To this day, I credit these type of rest stops for mine and Scotty's pitching control. We aimed at something and made a game of it, even then.

By 1962, Sara had been added to the family. She puked a lot in the car, so that created some tension—the smell of it and then the dynamic of an impatient father who hated to stop once he got going, unless it was to throw rocks.

1967 was the year my mother received sainthood. The road trip was one to Alabama to visit friends. Dad wanted to pull a pop-up camper, even though the fifth child was not even a year old, the fourth child was two years old and hyperactive, and the oldest two children were on the verge of adolescence. Now a middle child, Sara still got carsick. All Dad had to do was drive. Mother had to change cloth diapers, prepare meals, wrangle the Active One, be the bad guy about uncomfortable seat belts, and listen to music on the radio that was starting to sound very foreign to people over the age of 35. The weather was hot and humid as we drove across the South. Dad finally granted us all a break on the way home when we got to stay in a motel with a pool in Monroe, Louisiana. The marriage, for the time being, was

1968 and 1972 had many similarities as both trips to Washington were for cousins' weddings. The two-year-old was now three and still hyperactive. While we all stepped out to grab a bite to eat at Denny's, Shane was overlooked as we were getting loaded. Don't

judge—these things happen in big families. The door to my parents' room was locked as was the adjoining room door. We weren't event sure he was in the room. A mad dash to the front office got a spare key, and fortunately Shane was lounging instead of jumping back and forth between the two beds.

The '72 trip was a biggie in the sense that Mom and Dad decided their five children were ready for a coveted vacation rite of passage: a trip to Disneyland. Scotty was sixteen and in love with the girl back home, so he was homesick and not impressed. The rest of us had a blast. This was also the trip where the Crown Prince was allowed to ride shotgun, having moved to the enviable position while Mom was relegated to the back of the station wagon with Shane and Sabrina (bucket seats were a thing in that Chevrolet wagon). Mom was content as she read while the youngest two played with their Fisher-Price toys. Sara and I had the entire middle seat to ourselves, and yes, she still threw up. Those mountain roads had her number.

That would be the last of our seven-member family trips as Scotty graduated from high school in 1973 and then spent his summers working. At various times, Mom and Dad hauled a smaller version of the Sullivan family and more memories were made. In 1977, they drove a van for our vacation to Washington, D.C., and then to Virginia to see Uncle Clifton and Aunt Jo. The van was a one and done transport as poor gas mileage and higher gas prices sent it to the trade-in lot. But, for a brief shining moment, the family loved all that room in the van seems there were fewer arguments on that trip, too, as having more space created a more pleasant travel experience. We even had room for a real cooler, not the little red and white Igloo.

Hope you can get away this summer. If your driving days are over, just invite yourself as a passenger and offer to help with gas and motel costs. And don't ditch the Atlas map or the foldables that go in the glove compartment. GPS may not be updated in some vehicles, and besides, use the maps to teach your kids how to read for information.

Above all, stop often and let your kids throw rocks—but not at each other.

#### **State Capital Highlights**

#### Special session coming this fall

Texas lawmakers will adjourn the regular session on Monday — Memorial Day — but Gov. Greg Abbott has already indicated he will call a special session in the fall to grapple with redistricting after detailed census results are finally released.

Last week, Abbott told lawmakers he would put them in charge of deciding how to spend nearly \$16 billion in federal money the state received for COVID-19 recovery efforts. During the first two rounds of stimulus funding, Abbott decided how the money would be spent, which angered some legislators.

The special session comes just months before the 2022 primaries, with Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, Attorney General Ken Paxton and Comptroller Glenn Hegar all planning to seek re-election.

That raises the possibility of other topics being added the special session that could appeal to the governor's base, according to the San Antonio Express-News. Abbott has drawn one primary opponent, former state Sen. Don Huffines.

#### Mask mandates largely a thing of the past in Texas

Abbott last week issued an executive order banning all government and public entities from mandating the wearing of masks. The order went into effect May 21, except for public schools, which can require masks until June 4.

Local governments or officials can be fined up to \$1,000 for requiring the wearing of masks, although businesses can still require them. Most large retailers, such as Walmart, Costco and Target, announced they were ending mask requirements.

However, state-supported living centers, government owned or operated hospitals, state prison juvenile justice facilities and county and municipal jails are exempt from Abbott's order and can still require masks be worn.

A day in Texas with no COVID-19 deaths

For the first time since March 21, 2020, the state's Department of State Health Services on Sunday, May 16, said no deaths related to COVID-19 were reported.

The milestone was noted by Abbott and others, though celebrations were tempered at least among some, the Houston Chronicle reported. The hiatus was short-lived, however, as DSHS reported 23 new deaths the following day.

The number of Texans hospitalized who are COVID-19 patients is at its lowest level since last June, according to DSHS, with 2,070 cases that were lab confirmed as of Sunday.

The number of new cases in the past week in Texas, as reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University, stood at 12,290, down 17.5 percent from the previous week and continuing the steady decline statewide. A total of 269 deaths were recorded statewide for the same time frame.

Meanwhile, the number of Texans who are fully vaccinated reached nearly 9.8 million.

#### Drought conditions easing under widespread storms

Much of the state has experienced a soggy May thus far, with widespread precipitation blanketing much of the eastern and central regions. As a result, drought conditions have eased except in the Panhandle and West Texas and the counties around Laredo on the border.

The Texas Water Development Board reports a total of 44% of the state's area is now under moderate or worse drought conditions. By comparison, we reported on April 4 that drought conditions existed in more than two-thirds of the state.

#### Texas opts out of federal jobless assistance plan

Abbott last week announced the state will no longer accept federal jobless assistance funds after June 26, including the extra \$300-perweek approved earlier this year by Congress.

The state is also leaving a federal

assistance program that provides aid to self-employed and gig workers not normally covered by unemployment insurance. The move is intended to encourage people to return to work, as restaurants and other businesses say it is difficult to attract workers.

"The Texas economy is booming, and employers are hiring in communities throughout the state," Abbott said. "According to the Texas Workforce Commission, the number of job openings in Texas is almost identical to the number of Texans who are receiving unemployment benefits. That assessment does not include the voluminous jobs that typically are not listed, like construction and restaurant jobs."

The state's jobless rate was 6.7% in April, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. down from the record high of 12.9% in April 2020.

#### Secretary of State Hughs to step down

Texas Secretary of State Ruth Ruggero Hughs will step down at the end of May, she announced last week. Hughs was appointed by Abbott in August 2019. However, the Texas Senate never formally confirmed her nomination. Abbott will now be free to appoint a new secretary of state, who could be confirmed during the upcoming special session.

The state of Texas offers three tax-advantaged plans for higher education —the Texas College Savings Plan, the Lone Star 529 plan and the Texas Tuition Promise Fund.
