Comptroller will distribute \$893 Million in Monthly Sales Tax Revenue

Texas Comptroller announced that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$893.2 million in local sales tax allocations for July. This amount is 20% higher than the revenue distributed in July 2020. These allocations are based on sales made in May by businesses that report tax monthly.

The City of Friona will receive

\$46,210.73 for the month of July. This represents a .4% decrease from the \$46,400.53 received in July 2020. So far in 2021, the city has received \$328,056.35 which is a 11.22% increase over the \$294,938.03 received in 2020 during the same time period. The Friona Economic Development Corporation will receive \$11,552.68 of the revenue for its operations.

City Council receives "clean drinking water report

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, June 14, 2021 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with a roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

There were no public comments. A public hearing was opened to receive comments from citizens regarding the 2020 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. There were no public comments. Public Works Director Salvador Garcia told the Council that the City of Friona passed all tests with no negative results.

Roddy Berend and Andy Montana were appointed to two-year terms on the Planning and Zoning Commis-

sion. Both are returning members. The other members of the P&Z Commission are Fred Cook, Mayra Olmos, and Danny Campbell.

Mayor Ricky White and City Manager Lee Davila provided a briefing on the presentation they gave Parmer County Commissioners concerning a possible increase in county funding for the Friona EMS. The county currently budgets \$20,000 per year for the Friona EMS. The hope is to raise that amount to \$40,489.40 per year to help cover costs related to EMS service for county residents which is approximately 35% of Friona EMS calls.

Minutes of the June 14, 2021 meeting were reviewed and approved.

The Accounts Payable for June 2021 and the Financial Statement for May 2021 were also approved.

The 3rd Quarter Financial Statement (April 2021-June 2021) was also reviewed and approved. Davila told the Council that following a loan payment in February, the City of Friona would be debt free.

All meetings are open to the public. The City Council reserves the right to go into Executive session at any time. Visit cityoffriona.com to find agendas and minutes from previous meetings. 



Cancer Coalition begins 11th year

It seems like that for the past year the Covid-19 pandemic has blotted out the sun. For those battling cancer, it has not. Just like Covid, everyone is touched by cancer. It can be personal or a family member or friend battling the illness. You either have cancer yourself or know someone who does. Unfortunately, there is no vaccine.

The Parmer County Cancer Coalition was founded in 2010. This year marks their 11th year of operation. Board Chairman Greg Lewellen said that since 2010, the organization has given out 201 grants totaling \$102,100 to cancer survivors in Parmer County. "We average about

20 grants a year and we annually contribute a percentage of our money raised to the American Cancer Society."

He continued, "Our Board has allocated 15% of the yearly revenue to be given to the ACS this year. They have also approved raising the grant amount from \$500 to \$1,000 this vear."

The PCCC is also looking forward to having a "Pink Out" Breast Cancer **Awareness** Month during October this year at all county home football and volleyball games. A Survivor Dinner will also be scheduled for November. Unfortunately, both were scaled back or cancelled last year because of Covid-19 pandemic.







Nobody denies the importance of the Meriwether Lewis-William Clark expeditions in the Western frontier, but Zebulon Pike, an explorer and mapmaker, is — except for the people who are familiar with "Pike's Peak" — obscure.


On July 15, 1806, he departed for the faraway Southwest; according to history.com: "The information he provided about the U.S. territory in Kansas and Colorado was a great impetus for future U.S. settlement, and his reports about the weakness of Spanish authority in the Southwest stirred talk of future U.S. annexation. Pike later served as a brigadier


general during the War of 1812, and in April 1813 he was killed by a British gunpowder bomb after leading a successful attack on York, Canada."


But historical evidence also indicates he colluded with Aaron Burr, to wangle possession of the Western territories, and form a separate nation.



National Peach Ice Cream Day

July 17th is National Peach Ice Cream Day. With the weather heating back up, one of these recipes might be the perfect treat. The one from Paula Deen requires a little more cooking and prep work, so if that is too much effort for you, try the second recipe.

Peach Ice CreamBy Paula Deen

Ingredients

3 large egg yolks ¾ cup packed light brown sugar

- 1 ½ cups heavy cream
- 1 1/2 cups whole milk
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 large ripe peeled, halved, pitted, and cut into bitesize chunks peaches

Directions

In a large bowl, whisk together the egg yolks and sugar. In a large saucepan, bring the cream and milk to a simmer over low heat. Whisking constantly, slowly pour the hot milk mixture into the egg mixture until combined; return the combined mixture to the saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, for 3 to 5 minutes or until the custard has thickened

enough to coat the back of the spoon. Immediately strain the custard into a bowl. Set the bowl in a larger bowl filled with ice water to cool, stirring occasionally. Stir the lemon juice and vanilla into the cooled custard. Freeze in an ice cream maker according to the manufacturer's instructions, adding the peach chunks halfway through the churning process.

Peach Ice Cream

Ingredients

2 cups chopped peaches (peel removed) 1 1/4 cups sugar (divided) 2 cups heavy cream 1 cup whole milk 1/2 tsp vanilla extract

Instructions

Mix chopped peaches with 1/2 cup sugar in a medium sized bowl. Allow to set for about 15

minutes so the peach pieces release their juices. Blend peaches up in a blender or food processor until nice and smooth. (Add 1/4 cup of your whole milk if you need more liquid to blend it up.) In a large bowl combine peach mixture with heavy cream, whole milk, vanilla extract, and remaining 3/4 cup sugar. Set aside. Get out your freezer bowl and start running your ice cream maker. Pour the peach mixture into the running ice cream maker. And allow to run according to manufactures instructions (Mine is about 25-30 minutes.) Serve now for soft serve ice cream. For scoopable ice cream, scoop the peach ice cream into a bread loaf pan and cover with plastic wrap. Place in the freezer for 6 hours up to overnight. Then scoop and serve.

Deadlines are fast approaching, so I want to make sure everyone is aware of what we have coming up.

Certification for spring crops ends July 15th. If the crop was planted before July 15th and is not certified on or by July 15th it will be considered late filed. Please make sure you have your crops in by the end of the day Thursday. The office number is 806-481-3311 ext 2. so that we can set you up an appointment.

CRP rebid deadline is July 23rd. If your CRP expires October 1, 2021, expired last year and did not make it in or if you would like to make a new bid, we have to have them done by the 23rd. If you have made a bid but want to double check that it is current with the new sign-up, please call us at 806-481-3311 ext 2.

As we get ready to get into a new crop and CRP year NRCS will be performing status review field checks on all CRP land that is

expiring in 2022. If you have any questions, please contact Bill Taylor at 806-481-3311 ext 3

Nominations Open for the 2021 County Committee Elections

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) encourages all farmers, ranchers, and FSA program participants to take part in the Parmer County Committee election nomination process.

FSA's county committees are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA and allow grassroots input and local administration of federal farm programs.

Committees are comprised of locally elected agricultural producers responsible for the fair and equitable administration of FSA farm programs in their counties. Committee members are accountable to the Secretary of Agriculture. If elected, members become part of a local decision

making and farm program delivery process.

A county committee is composed of three to 11 elected members from local administrative areas (LAA). Each member serves a three-year term. County committees may have an appointed advisor to further represent the local interests of underserved farmers and ranchers. Underserved producers are beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers and landowners and/or operators who have limited resources.

All nomination forms for the 2021 election must be post-marked or received in the local USDA Service Center by Aug. 2, 2021. Gas prices up slightly

Texas gas prices have risen 2.3 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.83 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 7.8 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 94.1 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.49 while the most expensive is \$3.51 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has risen 0.5 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.13 per gallon. The national average is up 5.0 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 93.7 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"While the national average has seen a slight rise over the last week, we may see some stabilization coming to the pump as oil prices hold just under their 2021 peak from last week," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "Without additional crude oil supply coming online in the weeks ahead, we could see oil test \$80 per barrel in the next couple of weeks. However, with U.S. gasoline demand falling slightly last week, we may have already seen peak consumption with the July 4 holiday. While the jury isn't quite in on that just yet, we're potentially only 4-6 weeks away from gas prices beginning a seasonal decline that we're likely all eagerly awaiting."

Panhandle Parables

Amazing Grace

I was flipping through our song book seeing many songs that I have been privileged to sing. Songs that have touched me in ways that have grown me, admonished me and challenged me to keep the faith.

He is preceded in death by his parents, 1 daughter-Sandra and 1







Commissioners vote to sell generator

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, June 28, 2021 at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no public comments. Minutes from the June 28th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's payroll report was also approved.

Commissioners voted to sell the used surplus generator that had been set aside for the Courthouse. Instead of costing around \$13,000 to install, the new estimate was \$50,000 after the addition of a transformer. The plan is to sell it on a website that specializes in selling government equipment.

Friona Mayor Ricky White and City Manager Lee Davila presented cost estimates to the court regarding Friona EMS operations. Commissioners were asked to consider a possible increase in financial assistance to the Friona EMS in the future. Parmer County currently provides \$20,000 per year to the Friona

EMS. The new amount would be approximately \$40,489.40 per year which is based on the 35% of the calls that come from the county. The item was tabled.

Judge Ellis stated that clarification has still not been forthcoming from either federal or state officials concerning how Rescue America relief money can be spent. The Court would like to address a number of needs but cannot do so until regulations & guidelines are put forward. Commissioners will begin work on next year's budget on July 25th.

Commissioners voted to allow the City of Farwell to have use of the Courthouse lawn for the annual Bordertown Days celebration which will be held this year on Saturday, July 31st.

Approval was given to extend the current Covid-19 Administrative Leave Policy. The policy is reviewed and voted on each quarter.

Approval was also given for a water line under Country Road R approximately 100' west of Highway 214.

The Court also discussed upcoming changes to the voting precincts as a result of the 2020 Census. County Clerk Susie Spring said she is interested in "county-wide voting" because it is hard to find poll workers for all the smaller precincts.

This item was discussion only and no action was taken.

Sheriff Randy Geries announced that "National Night Out" would return this year. The county-wide is scheduled for Tuesday, October 5th. Sheriff Geries also reported that he was currently housing 24 inmates in the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center. He also discussed the possibility of purchasing a water softener system for the jail. The "hard water" has caused a lot of problems as well as expenses. No action was taken. A new Body Camera/In-Car Camera/Taser system was also discussed. The package deal would include full-service & maintenance and cloud back-up servers. The cost would be \$30,000 per year for ten years. No action was taken.

The next scheduled Commissioners Court meeting is Monday, July 26th.

All meetings are open to the public. The Commissioner's Court reserves the right to go into Executive Session at any time. The agenda may be found on the Parmer County website. Information in this article is only a summary. Any questions concerning specific actions should be directed to the Commissioners Court.





Check Your Mirrors

I had planned to write about Ted Lasso's endearing optimism or Cruella's redeeming qualities after watching the Apple TV show and seeing the movie. Then I caught the most recent episode of CBS's *Sixty Minutes*. My train of thought took a 180-degree turn.

Syria's President Bashir al-Assad has gassed and tortured his own citizens during the country's ten-year civil war. Substantiated nerve gas and chorine bomb attacks on civilian populations have occurred in 2013, 2017, and 2019. The depravity of his actions has been documented by a photographer who at one time was on Assad's payroll. The Syrian government ordered this photographer to take photos of corpses, label the photographs, and save them for posterity. Children make up a large number of the civilian casualties.

"Our job became solely to take photographs of the bodies of dead human beings that had been tortured to death or killed in the different intelligence branches," the photographer (identity protected) said on Sixty Minutes.

After some time on the job, he secretly turned against the regime and began saving the photos to a flash drive, which was then smuggled out of the country. Risking his own life, the photographer appeared on *Sixty Minutes* to confirm that these photos have been analyzed and authenticity confirmed by international agencies.

Gruesome details and body count aside, the takeaway for me always comes back to (1) lack of accountability and (2) an international hesitancy to intervene.

Of course, war comes with consequences for those who have signed on to defend their country or who have decided to fight against autocratic governments. But collateral harm to the men, women, and children who are targeted for no other reason than to send a message is evil.

This is not a rant about the United States having a moral obligation to interject itself into all the world's problems. That can sometimes lead to an unrealistic and imprudent foreign policy. The concern is that terribly bad things happen in war to civilians, and the world responds with a collective jaded spirit. We have grown numb as we scroll past.

In the meantime, war crimes against Assad are being processed as a result of over 900,000 archived documents that have been smuggled out of the country by rebel forces. These documents, along with the photos, are hard evidence. According to the *Sixty Minutes* feature, the Independent Commission for International Justice and Accountability will use those documents to prepare for what many hope will be Assad's war crimes trial.

American Stephen Rapp is chair of the Commission. He has served on prosecutorial teams in trials of those involved in war crimes during the Rwanda genocide and the Sierra Leone civil war.

"If the word is that you can commit those crimes, and that you can get away with it, and this is the way that you suppress a popular uprising, then others will do the same thing. The future will be much more dangerous than the past, and a lot of what we built will be destroyed," said Rapp.

Rapp believes that the evidence collected against Assad is "better" than what war crime tribunals had when Slobodan Miloŝaveć, President of Yugoslavia, was tried at the Hague in 2006. In addition, Rapp asserts that Assad's documentation of the Syrian government's brutality exceeds Nazi record keeping during the Holocaust

My little world is void of this kind of terror. The main things my young granddaughters need to be protected from right now are sunburn, mosquitoes, and each other. And, I honestly believe the world has more Ted Lassos and Andy Griffiths than it does Assads.

But when humanity's lens displays darkness, do not close your eyes and sleep through it.

State Capital Highlights

Legislature returns for special session

The Texas Legislature convened in special session last Thursday and GOP legislators introduced a fresh set of voting bills after Democrats blocked an earlier attempt during the regular session by walking out in May, preventing a quorum.

HB3 and SB 1 don't include some of the more controversial measures that were in the previous bill, such as restricting voting on Sundays. KUT.org reported the new bills include new ID requirements for people voting by mail and banning local election officials from sending vote-by-mail applications that have not been requested by the applicant.

The measures, still largely opposed by Democrats and voting rights groups, also ban drivethrough voting and extended hours during early voting. Those backing the new bills say those extended hours encourage voter fraud, though there is no evident of widespread fraud during the 2020 election. Republican lawmakers are pushing for a full House floor vote this week.

Gov. Greg Abbott announced the topics to be considered during the special session the day before it opened. Besides the voting bills, they include:

- Bail reform to "protect the public from accused criminals who may be released on bail."
- Border security with increased funding to support law-enforcement agencies and counties.
- Social media censorship legislation to protect social-media users from being silenced by social media companies based on their viewpoints.
- Restoring funding to the Legislature and legislative agencies that was vetoed by Abbott after the walkout.
- Family violence prevention legislation to provide funding for education to middle school and high school students about dating violence, domestic violence and child abuses. Parents would have the right to opt their children out of such programs.
- Youth sports measures to revive legislation passed by the

Senate that bans transgender students from participating in UIL athletic competitions "designated for the sex opposite to the student's sex at birth."

- Abortion-inducing drugs legislation that would prohibit providing such drugs by mail or delivery service.
- Thirteenth Check legislation to allow a one-time supplemental payment of benefits under the Teacher Retirement System of Texas.
- Bills targeting "critical race theory" and restricting how current events and the country's history of racism is taught in Texas public schools.
- Appropriation bills targeting property-tax relief, protecting children in the state's fostercare system and safeguarding the state from potential cybersecurity threats.

PUC ordered to improve electric reliability

Abbott also last week directed the Public Utility Commission to make major changes "to ensure the reliability of the Texas power grid," the Houston Chronicle and other media outlets reported.

Abbott asked the PUC, which oversees the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, to improve maintenance on power plants and speed development of some transmission projects.

"The objective of these directives is to ensure that all Texans have access to reliable, safe, and affordable power," Abbott wrote in a letter released last Tuesday.

In response, PUC chairman Peter Lake in a letter to Abbott expressed "wholehearted agreement with its contents." Besides the widespread blackout during the mid-February storm, a heat wave in June prompted ERCOT, which maintains the state's electric grid, to urge Texans to conserve electricity as usage approached peak capacity.

\$4.1 billion more in school stimulus funds

Texas will receive another \$4.1 billion in federal stimulus funding for its public schools, the San Antonio Express-News reported.

The U.S. Department of Education announced last week that it had approved the state's plans for spending \$12.4 billion that was allocated to the state. According to the Express-News, the top priority for the Texas Education Agency is bolstering the mental and emotional health needs of Texas students by expanding tutoring and other methods.

TEA estimates Texas students lost 5.7 months of learning during the pandemic school year.

"The approval of these plans enables states to receive vital, additional American Rescue Plan funds to quickly and safely reopen schools for full-time, in-person learning; meet students' academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs; and address disparities in access to educational opportunity that were exacerbated by the coronavirus pandemic," Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona said in a news release.

Number of COVID-19 cases in state rises

At 12,426, the number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas increased 18% in the past week when compared to the previous week, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University.

The number of new deaths in the past week dropped slightly to 151. Hospitalizations of lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients in the state were on the rise, with 1,927 currently in Texas hospitals as of Sunday, according to Texas Department of State Health Services.

The number of Texans fully vaccinated crossed the 12 million mark this week, DSHS reported. The rate of vaccinations in the state has slowed significantly in recent weeks, despite troubling reports of the spread of the delta variant of COVID-19.

Sealcoat project scheduled for July 19th

City Manager Lee Davila informed the Friona Star that starting next Monday, July 19th, crews from Bryers Paving of Amarillo will be in Friona sealcoating select streets. Sealcoating, or pavement sealing, is the process of applying a protective coat-

ing to asphalt-based pavements to provide a layer of protection from the elements: water, oils, and U.V. damage.

The map shows the streets that will be affected by the work. Davila said, "If you live on these streets, please do not park your

vehicles on the streets. You might be charged if the vehicle must be towed. Also, please do not water your lawns that day to help keep the streets dry." The annual sealcoat project helps maintain the streets throughout the town.
