## Listen to This

After a road trip a few years ago, I met my new travel best friends: Podcasts. I capitalize the word because they are really good companions.
Whether I am alone in my little house or adding miles to the Civic, listening to them keeps me company, educates, entertains, and often inspires. I do not see this medium as a replacement for reading a newspaper or a book. Podcasts are often based on published written material. It is in this format that a jogger, walker, worker-outer (none of which am I), commuter, or traveler can simply access the presentation. Much like choosing a book to read, so much depends on my appetite. If I need humor, I'll go with Smartless. Three hosts-Jason Bateman, Sean Hayes, and Will Arnett-spend 45 minutes talking with a guest that one of the three has kept a mystery to the other two prior to their Zoom meeting. The three are often in their own homes, which makes for another layer to their back-and-forth banter. My favorite guests so far have been Sandra Bullock, Tiffany Haddish, and George Clooney. Smartless's impromptu shows range from hilarious to silly, informative to shocking (I had no idea Sandra

Bullock grew up in Germany and that her parents were opera performers and teachers), and thoughtful to concerned. Author Michael Lewis's (Moneyball and The Blind Side) appearance on Smartless had one of the most touching moments I have ever heard about losing a child and his grief.
Full disclosure: language may be an issue for some.
For history, my go-to guy is Lindsay Graham. Not the politician Lindsey Graham, but anoth er guy. He has a voice made for podcasts (very crucial to the enjoyment level). American History Tellers and American Scandal are two of his podcasts that I highly recommend. Graham does not read a lecture; rather, the podcasts are told as stories with dra matic license for dialogue. Just this weekend, I learned that Billy the Kid was born in New York City-I had a Pace Picante Sauce commercial reaction to that little info nugget. The three-part series on him was a good one. I would also recommend The Coal Wars, The Cold War (very timely), Lewis and Clark, and The Great Chicago Fire.
For the unsavory and unethical and sometimes illegal historic moments, I go with American

Scandal. Each new episode of Enron, The Ice Pick Surgeon, Bernie Madoff, The Red Scare, and Lance Armstrong were eagerly anticipated.
Finally, my library also in cludes Jen Hatmaker's For the Love podcast and Texas Take-a political podcast by Scott Braddock, editor of The Quorum Re port and Houston Chronicle/San Antonio Express-News political writer Jeremy Wallace. The latte is bound to get folks worked up ne way or the other but what appreciate about these two guys is that they are political reporters in the trenches who attend events, talk to insiders, and know their stuff. You may not agree with their take, but they are fac tually based observations, not propaganda. Analysis through research is a trademark of Brad dock's hosting role, offering ma terial in an informed and fai fashion for Texans interested in the Lone Star State's political landscape-timely for 2022 state elections.
Podcasts (with commercials) are free. I pay $\$ 4.99$ a month to do without the advertising. All of the ones listed above can be found on Wondery offered through Ap ple Podcasts. But the catalog for many other categories is vast.

Northern Italy. It gained the name pretzel when the recipe moved to Germany and Austria. The pretzel
first came to America in 1710 with Palatine German immigrants when they settled in Pennsylvania.

## Homemade Soft Pretzels

Ingredients
$11 / 2$ cups warm (110 to 115 degrees F) water 1 tablespoon sugar 2 teaspoons kosher salt 1 package active dry yeast 22 ounces all-purpose flour, approximately $41 / 2$ cups 2 ounces unsalted butter, melted Vegetable oil, for pan 10 cups water
2/3 cup baking soda 1 large egg yolk beaten with 1 tablespoon water Pretzel salt

## Directions

Combine the water, sugar, and kosher salt in the bowl of a stand mixer and sprinkle the yeast on op. Allow to sit for 5 minutes or until the mixture begins to foam. Add the flour and butter and, us-
ing the dough hook attachment, mix on low speed until well combined. Change to medium speed and knead until the dough is smooth and pulls away from the side of the bowl, approximately 4 to 5 minutes. Remove the dough from the bowl, clean the bowl and then oil it well with vegetable oil. Return the dough to the bowl, cover with plastic wrap, and sit in a warm place for approximately 50 to 55 minutes or until the dough has doubled in size. Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F. Line 2 half-sheet pans with parchment paper and lightly brush with the vegetable oil. Set aside. Bring the 10 cups of water and the baking soda to a rolling boil in an 8 -quart saucepan or roasting pan. In the meantime, turn the dough out onto a
slightly oiled work surface and divide into 8 equal pieces. Roll out each piece of dough into a 24 -inch rope. Make a U-shape with the rope, holding the ends of the rope, cross them over each other and press onto the bottom of the $U$ in order to form the shape of a pretzel. Place onto the parchment-lined half sheet pan Place the pretzels into the boiling water, 1 by 1 , for 30 seconds. Remove them from the water using a large flat spatula. Return to the half sheet pan, brush the top of each pretzel with the beaten egg yolk and water mixture and sprinkle with the pretzel salt. Bake until dark golden brown in color, approximately 12 to 14 minutes. Transfer to a cooling rack for at least 5 minutes before serving.

## Modest increase in gas prices

 By GasBuddyAverage gasoline prices in Texas rose 6.9 cents in the last week, averaging $\$ 3.76$ per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 10.5 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand $\$ 1.16$ per gallon higher than a year ago.
According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at $\$ 3.35$ while the most expensive was $\$ 4.79$ per gallon.
The national average price of gasoline rose 4.4 cents in the last week, averaging $\$ 4.11$ per gallon. The national average is down 13.3 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands $\$ 1.24$ per gallon higher than a year ago, according to GasBuddy data compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.
"For the first time in over a month, the national average price of gasoline has risen. Primarily, this was due to oil prices that had jumped the prior week, pushing up the price that stations pay for fuel and thus causing them to raise prices," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.
De Haan continued, "The rise has been quite tame in most areas, while others have continued to gently decline. But, with the French election now behind us, there is risk that the EU could pursue harsher sanctions on Russia's energy, which could cause oil prices to rise if it happens - something motorists should be on the watch for. In addition, U.S. oil inventories continue to decline, putting additional pressure on prices as the nation's SPR continues to drain and Russia's war on Ukraine remains ongoing. The global imbalance between supply and demand that led to these higher prices continues for the time being."
GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

## Constitutional <br> Amendments Election

Governor Greg Abbott issued a proclamation setting Saturday, May 7, 2022 as the special election day for two proposed constitutional amendments in Texas.

The two proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot are:

PROPOSITION 1: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for general elementary and secondary public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled to reflect any statutory reduction from the preceding tax year in the maximum compressed rate of the maintenance and operations taxes imposed for those purposes on the homestead.

PROPOSITION 2: The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from $\$ 25,000$ to $\$ 40,000$.

## State Capital Highlights

Early voting underway for May 7 election
Early voting began Monday for ocal elections and two proposed constitutional amendments relating to property tax reductions. Early voting continues through Tuesday, May 3, with election day on Saturday, May 7
One proposed amendment would authorize the Legislature to limit property taxes on hometeads of elderly or disabled resi dents, while the other would in crease the homestead exemption or school taxes from $\$ 25,000$ to \$40,000.
Voters return to the polls later in May for runoff elections in both the Democratic and Republican primaries. Voters cannot switch parties if they voted in the March 1 primary, but voters who didn't vote in the primary can participate in either party's runoff. A full list of runoff races can be found on the secretary of state's website sos.texas.gov. Early voting for the May 24 runoff begins on May 16.
"With multiple opportunities to vote in the upcoming May elections, I strongly encourage all Texas voters to get informed about what's on the ballot and make a plan to cast one," Secre ary of State John Scott said. To find out what is on local ballots, ontact your county's local elec tion office

Material shortage bedevils TxDOT projects
Shortages of steel and concrete are slowing down road projects and driving up costs, according to an internal memo from the Texas Department of Transportation's construction division director, reported last week by the Quorum Report and kut.org.
Due to recent circumstances affected by world events, there has been significant volatility in he market for various construc ion materials. We have seen the availability of some materials become very limited or the ma erial lead time has increased significantly. We have also seen significant increases (over 100\% in some cases) in some material
prices," Duane S. Milligan wrote.

TxDOT has more than 15,000 projects in the pipeline across th state. The jobs total $\$ 156$ billion, with about half either underway or set to start soon. Milligan's memo to district engineers and construction managers suggested substituting construction materials when feasible, or removing work or materials from a road project "when the deletion will not affect the safety of the completed project."

"Texans are killed each year simply because someone was distracted by their phone, radio, navigation system, eating or drinking, or even by others in the car," Marc Williams, TxDOT executive director, said. "When your focus isn't on driving, you're putting yourself, your passenger and everyone else on the road at

The agency reminds drivers that any distraction is dangerous. It urges drivers to pull off the road entirely before talking or texting and turning off the phone while driving.

 disastersAs wildfires and tornadoes sweep the state with hurrican season just around the corner, the Texas A\&M Forest Service urges Texans to assemble a go-kit that can be easily transported and includes supplies for several days The kit should include:

- Priceless items, such as family photos and heirlooms.

The Library of Congress has millions of books, recordings, photographs, newspapers, maps, and manuscripts in its collection. That is how the LOC describes itself. Founded on April 24, 1800, it amassed 964 volumes within two years. Then, the War of 1812 began, and the library was burned to the ground.
The retired Thomas Jefferson volunteered to restore it and sold his books to Congress. According to History.com, "The purchase of Jefferson's 6,487 volumes was approved in the next year, and a professional librarian, George Watterston, was hired to replace the House clerks in the administration of the library. In 1851, a second major fire at the library destroyed about two-thirds of its 55,000 volumes, including twothirds of the Thomas
