Lewellen sworn in as Mayor



Municipal Court Judge Deborah Campbell congratulates Friona's new mayor after administrating the oath of office. Mayor Greg Lewellen became the 18th person to hold the office. Lewellen has been serving as a city council member since May 2012.

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, May 9, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 617 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

There were no public comments. The Minutes of the April, 2022 regular meeting were approved.

New mayor Greg Lewellen, returning council member Brent Loflin, and new council members Cindy Moreno and Esmeralda Mills were sworn in by Municipal

Court Judge Deborah Campbell. Council Member Alan Monroe was elected to serve as Mayor Pro Tem for 2022-24.

An InterLocal Cooperation contract with PRPC concerning the grant application involving the fire truck (FAST) program was approved. The agreement includes a 1% match from the City of Friona up to \$7,500.

The Council approved a resolution to authorize the city manager to solicit bids for construction designs concerning the future development of the property owned by the city just west of Legacy Pointe apartments.

A permit submitted by Randy Geries to operate Dynamic Fireworks stands inside the city limits during a 30-day period which includes July 4th was approved.

In other business, the accounts payable for April 2022 and the financial statement for April 2022 were approved.

Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

Hummus

May 13th is National Hummus Day. This dip is great with pita bread, vegetables, or chips. I think this homemade hummus sounds delicious. And since you use the Instant Pot, it is easy as well.

Instant Pot Hummus

Author: Amy + Jacky www.pressurecookrecipes.com

Ingredients

- 1 cup (225g) dried chickpeas (garbanzo beans)
- 1 whole head (40g) garlic, crushed
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 (212g) onion, halved
- 1 teaspoon (6g) fine salt for soaked chickpeas (or for nosoak chickpeas - 1 ½ teaspoon (9g) fine salt)
- 4 cups (1L) water
- 1 teaspoon (3.2g) ground cumin
- 6 (17g) garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 cup (250ml) tahini
- 1/4 cup (63ml) fresh lemon juice (from 2 lemons)

Instructions

Optional - Soak Chickpeas Overnight: Place ½ lb (225g) dried chickpeas and 1 tbsp (17g) fine table salt in a large container. Pour in 4 cups (1L) cold water, then give it a few stirs. Allow chickpeas to soak overnight for 8 - 16 hours.

*Pro Tip: If your house is very warm, place container in the fridge to avoid fermentation.

Rinse Chickpeas: Rinse soaked or no-soak chickpeas under cold water. Pick out any stones or debris. Drain well.

Pressure Cook Chickpeas: Add 1 cup (225g) unsoaked or all of the soaked chickpeas, 2 bay leaves, 1 whole garlic, and 1 halved onion in Instant Pot.

Add Salt:

- -For No-Soak Chickpeas: add in 1 ½ tsp (9g) fine salt.
- -For Soaked Chickpeas: add in 1 tsp (6g) fine salt.

Pour in 4 cups (1L) cold water, then give it a quick mix. With Venting Knob in Venting Position, close the lid, then turn Venting Knob to Sealing Position.

Pressure Cooking Method:

-For No-Soak Chickpeas: High Pressure 60 minutes +

Natural Release 20 minutes.

-For Soaked Chickpeas: High Pressure 15 minutes + Natural Release 20 minutes.

Open the lid carefully.

Purée Garlic & Chickpeas: While the chickpeas are natural releasing, soak 6 garlic cloves in ¼ cup (63ml) freshly squeezed lemon juice in a blender for 20 - 30 minutes before blending (*Pro Tip: This dramatically reduces the garlic's pungency). Discard onion and bay leaves. Taste the chickpeas and ensure they are fully cooked. Drain the chickpeas and cooked garlic cloves really well, then set aside the chickpeas and chickpeas liquid. Blend garlic with lemon juice.

*Pro Tip: You will want to blend the chickpeas while they are hot.

Add drained chickpeas, cooked garlic cloves, 1 tsp (3.2g) ground cumin, and ¾ cup (188ml) chickpeas liquid to the garlic lemon juice in blender.

*Pro Tip: If you like thinner hummus, add 1 cup (250ml) - 1 1/4 cup (313ml) chickpeas liquid (adjust accordingly).

First, blend chickpeas over the lowest speed, then increase the speed slowly to high. Blend until desired smoothness.

Make Hummus: In a large mixing bowl, mix 1 cup (250ml) tahini and mashed chickpeas mixture together.

*Pro Tip: If serving the hummus immediately (with no leftover), mix in 2 tbsp (30ml) extra-virgin olive oil for extra smoothness. If not, skip this step.

Taste and season with more salt to open up the flavors (for reference, we added 2 large pinch of salt).

Serve Instant Pot Hummus: Garnish hummus with finely chopped parsley, freshly ground cumin, and paprika. Drizzle with extra virgin olive oil, then serve. Enjoy!~

The Art of Public Service

As I write this week's column, my Internet hotspot is sketchy. That simply means whatever I write will not include anything that requires research or verification. You just got me today, plain and simple.

School board elections took place across the state last weekend. Coming from a family of teachers and school board members, the significance of such polling days is of keen interest. The honor of serving one's community is not to be taken lightly.

School board candidates sometimes run with a single agenda or focus. That focus might be a personnel issue regarding an administrator or a teacher or coach. Currently, some trustee elections in Texas have turned contentious over Critical Race Theory and book banning.

But it is the wisest of school

their service is not agenda-driven sports to coach but also STAARbut includes sacrifice and hard work. School trustee roles involve recognizing what is best for a broad base, not a few. Sometimes the few need their advocates, of course. Elected public servants worth their salt have the discernment to know when to step up and go to bat for certain individual causes which rightfully need attention.

Now more than ever, school board members face challenging roles. Our public schools comprise a variety of demographics which require empathy. Many children do not go home to the stability that majority of our elected public officials enjoy. Listening to teachers who are in the trenches with these children is vital. Particularly in small schools, understanding that ath-

board members who understand letic coaches not only have four related subjects to teach is a far cry from a 5A football coach who is paid far more to just coach one sport and serve as athletic director. When conflicts arise, mature communication between parties involved can sometimes impact the complexion of the problems in a positive way.

In a media climate where our young people see elected government officials worry more about showmanship than service, it is the local school board member who can restore faith in the art of public service.

Congratulations to those newly elected trustees. May you join a team of fellow school board members who understand that serving others is noble. It is also necessary if we are to be the best version of ourselves.



There are those who have been gifted with the ability to carry a tune and they don't need a bucket or a handle. Then there are those like myself who are thankful God's requirement for praise is merely a "joyful noise." I do enjoy singing and praising God even though others may wish I didn't do it so loudly. (Remember, joyful noise). But whether you sing well or not has little to do with whether you are in tune with God.

Prior to playing an instrument the musician tunes his/her instrument to the established standard for any particular note. So the "A" they play sounds like the "A" that is the actual note. If it does not sound like the standard then adjustments are made until it does. In singing a song, often a pitch is given so the singer will know at what standard the tune will be sung. If you are a musician, then please accept my apologies for this woeful interpretation.

So how do we know if we are in tune

with God? The short of it is do we look like Jesus? Do we have the mind of Christ, the humility of Christ, the service of Christ, the words of Christ...? Paul wrote for us such an example in Philippians 2. (must read) or Jesus himself in preaching the Sermon on the Mount (another must read, Matt. 5-7) shows us what a life in tune with God looks like.

Does your life sing praise to the King? Do your very actions show you to be in tune with Jesus or out of tune with the Savior? Jesus is the standard. Our lives are to take on His qualities and attributes. So I do encourage you to sing. Let the words you sing also be the life you live. A dear brother in Christ once told me, "If people would live how they sang on Sunday, you wouldn't have to preach for six months." So let your lives sing of the glories of our King through the actions that we bring. La La La La, Me, Me, Me...Let's sing!

Another Tempting Proposal

Getting the Most from Your Bible By Teena Hughs

True confession that I am not proud of: sometimes when I am reading the Bible, especially for a study or class, I don't take the time to see what God is saying to me. I am so concerned about answering questions, or just getting it read so I can check it off my list of things to do, that I don't take the time to really read and see what is in it for me.

Right now, we are reading Psalms in our Tuesday night Bible study. Last week, we had to read the first 12 Psalms. On the way home, Feller and I talked about how we didn't really get too much out of it. I told him that some people suggest you read a Psalm and a Proverb every day, but I didn't understand why. I can't speak for Feller, but I was really busy last week, and I read the week's lesson, just to be able to say I read it.

When I started this week's reading Wednesday, I made up my mind that I was going to take the time to read the Psalms, to concentrate and see what they actually say, and how they apply to my life.

I have to admit it has been a great week of reading. I have read Psalms of praise to God; psalms to help me with my enemies; Psalms to pray for myself; and Psalms that remind me what an awesome Creator we have. I have been writing down verses that really speak to me, and I can share what is important to me with our class tomorrow night, because I couldn't do that last week.What a difference an attitude change has made in me this week. I even went back and reread those first 12 Psalms, and it is amazing the number of verses I wrote down.

Feller has a cousin in Junction whose wife is in Community Bible Study. The last time I saw her, I asked what her group was studying, and she told me they had just finished Job. I groaned, and she said, "Oh no, I LOVED it!!!" She talked about the beautiful poetry in it, and what a wonderful study it was, and that she learned so much! Well, I have read Job this year, and I just don't get Pat's attitude and feelings about Job being so wonderful. Because of her positive attitude, Pat gleaned far more from Job than I did when I read

it a month ago. Pastor Magrey R. deVe-

ga, the author of our study book, talks about the setting and the situation we find ourselves in when we read something. For example, if you hear the 23rd Psalm spoken at a funeral, it sounds one way and touches you a certain way, because of the setting and the situation; if a soldier is in a foxhole and recites it while he is hoping and praying he survives the night, it will touch and affect him differently. What about a young couple that reads it on a wall hanging in their new baby's nursery?

How Scripture affects you depends on your setting, your situation, and your attitude!

I have wasted so much time reading my Bible, so if you are going to take the time to read God's Word, I encourage you to do it when you have the time to really read, study, and listen. Consider your situation and what God is saying to you through His Word. When we put our whole self into His Word, we are going to get the most out of it. That is what God wants for us, so that we can become more like His precious Son! Take care, and have a great week!!!


Pontiac drives to Detroit

Washington George and his soldiers were not the first American revolutionaries. On May 7, 1763, Pontiac, the Chief of the Ottawa nation of native Americans, gathered a force that girded his Ottawas, Wyandot, Ojibwa, and Potawatomi tribes, and stormed the British forces in Detroit.

According to the curator of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation's Cultural Heritage Center, "Pontiac was an Ottawa warrior and leader who fought during the French and Indian War, gaining recognition as a member of an intertribal confederacy to repel British control and settlement in the Great Lakes," says Blake Norton, the curator of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation's Cultural Heritage Center.

History.com says that a year earlier Pontiac "en-



listed support from every tribe from Lake Superior to the lower Mississippi for a joint campaign to expel the British from the formerly French-occupied lands. According to Pontiac's plan, each tribe would seize the nearest fort and then join forces

to wipe out the undefended settlements ... In April, Pontiac convened a war council on the banks of the Ecorse River near Detroit. It was decided that Pontiac and his warriors would gain access to the British fort at Detroit under the pretense of negotiating a peace treaty, giving them an opportunity to seize forcibly the arsenal there."
