McDonald tops IPs

Three Reese instructor pilots were recently selected as Instructor Pilots of the Year. Capt. James R. McDonald, T-37 class commander; 1st Lt. Silvanus T. Gilbert III, T-38 instructor; and 1st Lt. Francisco Pineiro, T-37 instructor, garnered the awards.

Captain McDonald won the overall award as the outstanding instructor pilot. He is delegated the authority to command and supervise approximately 60 officers in Undergraduate Pilot Training. His duties include curriculum management, counseling, and all aspects of leadership. He entered the Air Force in Nov. 1972 and received his navigator wings in Oct. 1973. He earned his pilot's wings in April 1978 after UPT Here.

Lieutenant Pineiro's duties include being an instructor pilot, Flight Standardization/Evaluation member, and Runway Supervisory Unit Controller. He is responsible for the planning and management of both student and instructor pilot continuation training. He entered the United States Air Force Academy in July 1973 and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in management in June 1977. He graduated from class 79-01 here

Base Airman of Month seeks U.S. citizenship

Self-made man, pulling yourself up by your bootstraps, getting to the top of the heap. Americans have long admired those few who have overcome adversity, poverty and social circumstance to become successful.

But admiring, or becoming, a success is not the exclusive ground of Americans. A1C Abdelkade Maanoui, Reese's Airman of the Month, is a case in point.

Born in Morocco to a construction worker and his wife, Airman Maanoui estimates his family was supported on the equivalent pay of an airman basic. Like 93 percent of the country, both of his parents were unable to read or write. The thing that stood out to him, though, was the government. "We had no democracy," he said, "We didn't vote on anything."

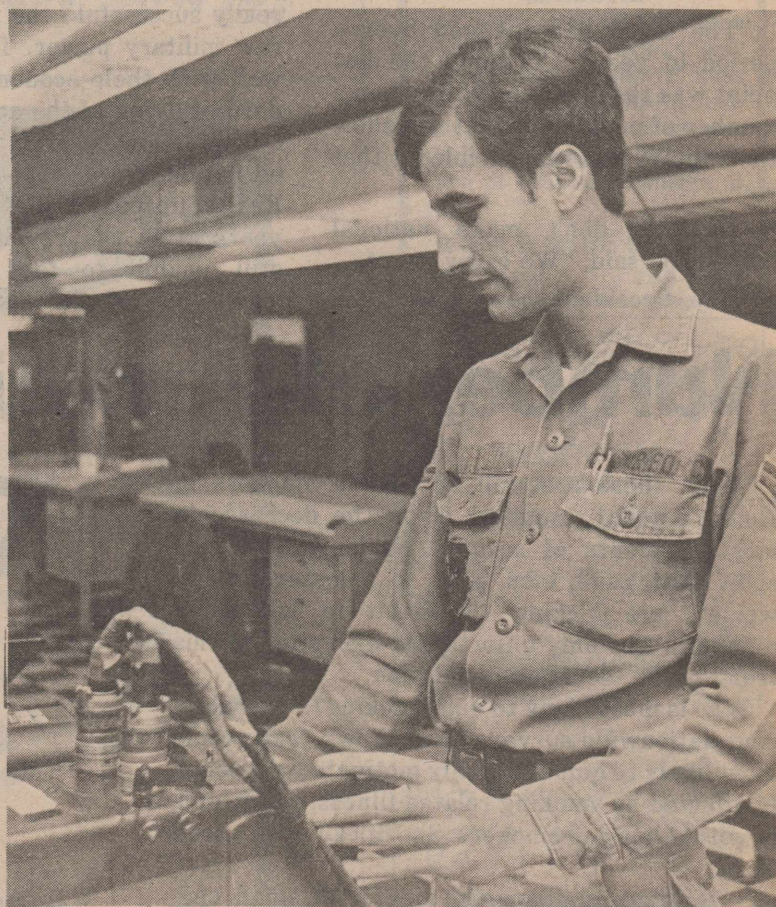
Like millions from around the world before him, Airman Maanoui questioned the right of the royal monarchy which rules Morocco to control his life. Perhaps for this reason and

because of what he had read and Americans he had known, he became a member of the American Cultural Society, an organization dedicated to the study of the American system of government and society.

While still in high school, Airman Maanoui applied for and was granted a student visa to study in the United States. Living with a host family, he completed his last year of high school and went on to attend East Illinois University. After receiving a master's degree in economics, he felt a desire to repay the country that had made it possible.

He joined the Air Force in March 1980 and attended Instrument School at Chanute AFB, Ill. He now works in the Avionics Instrument Section of 64th Field Maintenance Squadron. His future plans include gaining citizenship as soon as his residency requirement is fulfilled, then Officer Training School, a commission and pilot training.

Sound like a rather optimistic viewpoint? Not for a man who believes in the American Dream . . . and knows that dreams come true.

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AFAF: Helping our own

I encourage support for the Air Force Assistance Fund (AFAF) Campaign. This program which begins next Monday has adopted the motto of "Commitment to Caring". Just some of the ways the AFAF cares for our people are:

The Air Force Aid Society gives emergency financial assistance to Air Force personnel and their dependents during unforeseen crisis through AFAF loans and grants. In addition it gives educational assistance for the children of Air Force personnel in the form of loans which are interest free until repayment begins after graduation.

Last year the Air Force Aid Society made a total of \$27,637.17 in loans and grants to Reese people, returning a large portion of what was donated directly to Reese families. Air Force-wide the figure was a staggering \$3,870,967.

The Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows and Dependents Home at Fort Walton Beach Fla. provides housing facilities and services to widows or dependents of Air Force enlisted personnel.

The Air Force Village in San Antonio is a home

for widows of Air Force Officers and to retired officers and their spouses who are unable to provide for their own physical and social needs. A key feature in the village benefits is that no qualified applicant shall ever be refused admission because of an inability to pay.

You might ask, "Why should I contribute to one of the retirement villages, I will never live there". You may be correct, but how do you know what your personal situation will be 20 or perhaps 30 years from now. A realistic approach is to consider the retirement homes as insurance. They will be there should you need them.

Our wing goal this year is \$11,129. You can contribute by and I encourage the use of payroll deduction. This is a painless and very effective way to give and at the same time the benefits accruing from the AFAF may be those which ultimately provide you and/or your family with the security of knowing someone will be there should assistance be required.

Remember the AFAF is the Air Force's only fund raising campaign conducted solely for the benefit of its members and dependents. Please show your generosity when your keyworkers call on you.

Gen. Mathis senses changing mood

RANDOLPH AFB, TEXAS (AFNS)—I sense a changing mood in the American people indicating more respect for the military and better understanding of its role, said Air Force Vice Chief of Staff, Gen. Robert C. Mathis.

Speaking to reporters here, General Mathis said, "When the President talks about power and being able to deal with world problems, one of the major aspects of power he's talking about is the military, and I think that people are beginning to see that."

Changing mood

"The mood has changed over a period of years. Certainly the low point was the Vietnam War, when a number of people felt that somehow the military was responsible for that war."

"But we don't make national policy," he said, "We carry it out."

"The President has respect for

the military and the strength it gives him in his negotiations, and that respect is being reflected in the country. People are starting to appreciate what the military is all about," the vice chief of staff said.

That feeling is important now, because "This country has never needed strong and capable armed forces more than today. The dangers to this country are real."

Military buildup

The Soviet Union, he stated, has emphasized a military buildup.

"That's the only place they're really successful - the production of raw military power. They don't do well with their economy. The standard of living of the average Soviet citizen is lowest of any industrialized nation - lower than most of their East European allies. Sixty-three years after the revolution they're still unable to feed themselves. Three out of the last five years

they've had to import large quantities of food. What they have focused on is a rapid buildup of raw military power. In order to be able to counter that we need to make sure we're ready and professional in what we do," General Mathis said.

People the key

Stressing quality people as the key to readiness, the vice chief of staff described efforts to improve pay and entitlements.

"Most of the pay raises we've had in recent times have been to take care of inflation. But we've had some caps along the way, so we're behind. Even though we got the 11.7 percent raise, pay still doesn't measure up. We're requesting a 5.3 percent raise in an attempt to get back on track."

"I think what the chief of staff is looking for today is a situation whereby we can pay our people enough so that they have an adequate living and can live with dignity. That's really what we're after."

Weapon systems

Readiness also requires effective weapon systems, General Mathis said.

Asked which aircraft or system is the most important, he replied, "Which is more important, breathing in or breathing out? They're all important. But I think the most important is modernizing our strategic nuclear force. The M-X has to be the most important."

"The big thing about nuclear force is that it's a deterrent - the best missiles are those that are never fired. Our national policy is one of never striking first. But, potential aggressors must understand we'll be prepared and able to retaliate, that they cannot knock us out with the first strike. So we have to have a survivable missile force."

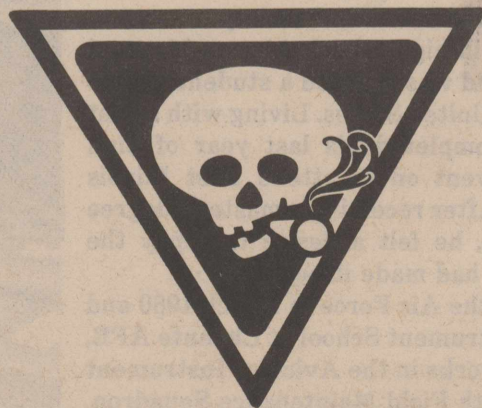
"We do have viable forces today," he emphasized. "I'm sure we'll be able to do whatever is needed."

Number of American smokers declines

While there are still 50 million smokers in America today, smoking is on the decrease in most segments of society. Nationwide trends show that adult men, and, to a lesser extent, women, are kicking the habit in increasing numbers. The only unfortunate exception in this trend is the teenaged population.

Who is most likely to quit smoking? Several recent nationwide surveys have shown that people most likely to quit are highly motivated, personally affected by smoking related illness, and friendly with other non-smokers. Specifically, they tend to be:

- Married, middle-aged men with small children
- Friendly with people who are either non-smokers or recent ex-smokers



- A friend or acquaintance of someone whose health has been seriously impaired by smoking
- Diagnosed as having myocardial infarction,

angina, or another smoking-related illness

- People who have started smoking at an older age
- Relatively light smokers, when they smoked
- Light coffee and alcohol drinkers

These surveys have also found that ex-smokers differ from smokers in regard to certain psychological characteristics. They tend, for example, to have:

- Fewer nervous oral habits than smokers
- Lower need for excitement and risk taking (e.g., they use seat belts more often)
- More motivation to achieve in general
- A greater belief that they can control their own lives by their own efforts
- More motivation to seek help for smoking and other problems

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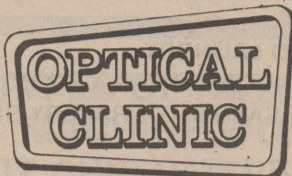
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Care Line

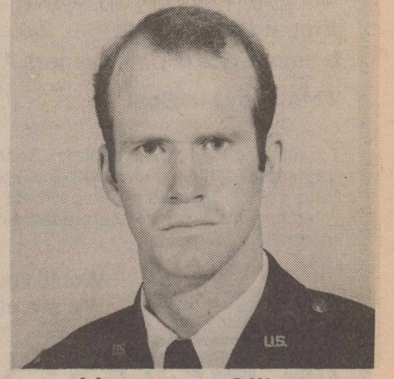

Government lifts freeze

Although the Department of Defense has been relieved of the civilian hiring freeze, Reese will have no jobs to offer in the immediate future. That's the word

from Tom Ireland, chief of civilian personnel.

Ireland went on to explain in a telephone interview that although three positions on base will be filled March 9, these jobs were already committed prior to the freeze. "Existing funds for civilian hiring are all committed," said the personnel chief. "We don't see any further hiring for quite some time."

In a memorandum from the office of the Secretary of Defense, civilians may be hired "as needed

to execute the approved 1981 defense program and to assure people do not suffer financial hardship due to the suspension of firm commitments made since Nov. 5, 1980."

The three positions at Reese: club officer, librarian and cardiac care unit nurse; have been filled by Pauline Reed, Mary Rinas and Zetha Warren, respectively.

"But," stressed Ireland, "Although we've been able to fill our three existing slots, the relief from the hiring freeze will have little immediate effect at Reese."



Safety Wise

A great deal of confusion has been generated regarding the safety vests for two-wheel vehicle operators. There are a number of reasons for this, but I hope this article, as well as the ones in recent base bulletins, will clarify the situation.

The problem that faces Reese people who ride a cycle is one of minimum visibility to motorists. This program was initiated in an effort to increase the awareness level of everyone to the presence of our cyclists. Although a reflectorized international orange vest worn at all times is the most effective solution, it is not required. What is required (pay attention) is a reflectorized garment worn at night while on Reese AFB. It is recommended (key word) that a high visibility vest be worn for day use on Reese and in Reese Village.

The vests and reflective tape can be purchased at toyland. Additionally, reflective tape can be obtained from security police. As a minimum you should have enough reflective material to cover 24 square inches on the back and 18 square inches on the front.
