Dear Judge Freeland: You have probably been advised by the Texas Highway Department that it is desired to proceed at once with the construction of that deficiency in the strategic military network on U. S. Highway 80 in your county extending from Clyde to the Eastland County Line.

It is considered most essential to the war effort that this project on the military net work be placed under construction at the earliest possible date. The project is to be financed by Federal and State funds, and the right of way is to be secured by your county.

I know that your county will not fail in this effort and will proceed as early as practicable with the securing of this right of way in order that your part of this project development may not delay the work that is so urgently necessary on this military network project.

Civilian Pilots Wanted

Qualified civilians pilots applying for commission posts as instructors in the navy air branch may receive their commission and orders to active duty almost immediately, it was announced today by officials of the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board, Dallas.

Necessary qualifications are that the applicants be high school graduates; hold effective commercial licenses, or effective private licenses with 300 hours in at least 100 h. p. aircraft or be graduates of Civilian Pilot Training Instructors Courses.

Commissions are given almost as readily to men applying as ferry pilots. Requirements in this case are: 1,000 hours certified time; 300 hours cross-country flying; and 100 hour in aircraft of 300 or more horse-power.

Texas and Oklahoma flyers may address mail inquiries to the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board, Allen Building, Dallas. Expenses of the applicant incurred in travel to and from the board must be paid by the applicant.

It is with genuine regret that I withdraw from the race, but I feel that under all the circumstances this is the best course to pursue."

Lieut. Crawford Hughes Reported Missing In Action

Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Hughes of Belle Plain received a message Monday night from the war department notifying them that their son, Lieutenant Marion Crawford Hughes was missing in action in the Australian area on May 24. Lieut. Hughes was a navigator in the air service in which he enlisted July 12, 1941.

He was first stationed at Ryan Field, California, then sent to Miami Fla., where he completed his training and commissioned a Second Lieutenant and assigned to a bombing squadron as navigator on January 17th. He was sent immediately to the Pacific coast and sailed Feb. 6th for Hawaii and after two months there went to Australia where he has since been with the fleet in the bombing raids in the Australian area.

Mr. and Mrs. Hughes received two letters from their son on Tuesday written May 16th and 22nd. His sister Clara Nell Hughes, who is attending school at Abilene also received a letter from him dated May 22nd.

The message from the navy department said that further news as received would be sent the parents and their many friends join them in the hope that better news will be received. "Missing in Action" does not necessarily mean death—he could have been picked up at sea or have landed on some isolated place and be safe.

Crawford Hughes is the eldest son being 22 years of age. He graduated from Baird high school in 1935 and later attended McMurry College. His younger brother Linton will enter the service within a few days.

Baird Refinery Lays Gathering System In Silver Valley Pool

Baird Refining Company, Baird, has completed work on a gathering system of three-inch and four-inch lines into the Silver Valley pool, a distance of 12,160 feet from the company's main tank near Novice.

The new gathering system serves some seven batteries, or 14 wells that produce thousands of barrels daily. Oil is sent by a four-inch pressure line from the Silver Valley field to the Novice tank, thence by pipeline to the refinery at Baird.

The Novice and Goldsboro pools are served also by the Baird refinery's pipeline.

Clyde Marine Safe In Midway Islands

Severne E. Canada, a marine corps private from Clyde, came through the second attack on Midway island as he did the first—unharmd.

A cablegram to that effect was received Wednesday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Canada, who live on a farm two miles south of Clyde.

His message yesterday was delivered only a little more than a year after his enlistment on May 7, 1941, and was sent to Midway Aug. 7.

Canada, who will observe his 22nd birthday June 17, was graduated from Baird high school shortly before his enlistment.

His assignment to duty on Midway sent young Canada to the same spot where his father once served in the medical corps before the last world war. The elder Canada, who is an ex-serviceman, has visited Midway the Philippines and Japan. Uel Livingston of Baird is also stationed on Midway Island.

The Callahan County USDA War Board this week urged farmers to comply with the spirit of the ODT order restricting transportation by making the best possible use of their trucks.

The board urged pooling of facilities, best possible care of equipment—especially tires, and elimination of all unnecessary driving.

Farm trucks are exempt from the Office of Defense Transportation Order requiring truckers to carry at least a three-quarters load on all return trips. Mr. Farmer, chairman of the board, explained, but farmers are expected to comply with the order voluntarily insofar as possible.

"There's no sense in several folks living in one vicinity making separate trips to town when all could have gone together," Mr. Farmer declared. "We don't intend to force farmers to save their tires and equipment by pooling facilities, but we feel that they will all do their part if they understand the situation."

"Transportation tie-ups would cause serious damage to Callahan County agriculture, and to the Food for Freedom program, since trucks and trailers which bring produce to market certainly are one of the most important parts of our transportation system."

"Farmers in this county pledged greatly increased production of milk, eggs, peanuts, pork, beef and other food products, but producing won't do any good unless we can get the produce to market," the war board official said. "The best way to make sure we be able to get them to market is to keep our trucks running just as long as they will go."

TIPS

Asking your neighbor if they need anything in town or want to ride in with you is more than just neighborliness these days—it's good sense and a good way to save wear and tear on tires.

That's why the Callahan County U.S.D.A. War Board is urging farmers in the county to work out neighborhood plans for making the best possible use of transportation facilities. As J. L. Farmer, board chairman, points out, agricultural products must get to market if they're going to be sold and if the American people are going to eat, and tires are going to be mighty hard—maybe impossible—to get when the ones now on hand are gone.

"Arrange with one or more neighbors to exchange trips," the board advises farmers. "Do all your regular hauling, so far as possible, on that basis. Form a little group on your road to do this in a systematic way. Pool your loads."

As a further tire-saving step, the USDA War Board advises against going into town "empty."

"If you have an errand in town, call up your neighbors and take everybody on the road who needs to go that day—then let them do the same by you," Mr. Farmer continued. "Make similar arrangements for small partloads of produce. Don't make a trip alone with just a bushel of potatoes or a sack of grain, nor to get one or two small items of supplies. Double up. Cooperate with your neighbors."

Farm hauling is not subject to restriction under the Office of Defense Transportation order, Mr. Farmer pointed out, but farmers are expected to comply with the spirit of the order by making as few trips as possible.

NOTICE TO ALL FARMERS AND RANCHERS

All farmers and ranchers in Callahan County have received a letter and a card asking for scrap iron, scrap rubber and other metals. They are urged to return the filled out cards as quickly as possible so that trucks can come to their farms and ranches in the next two weeks to pick up the scrap material.

The scrap iron, nonferrous metals, such as copper, brass, lead ore, and scrap rubber will be assembled by W. P. A. labor and trucks hired by the government and farmers and ranchers may donate or sell the scrap for twenty-five cents per 100 pounds and one-half cent per pound for scrap rubber.

As soon as all cards are returned, another card will be sent giving the dates that trucks will come to each farm or ranch in the County to receive the materials. The trucks will be equipped with scales and sellers' erment checks which ever he prefers.

The Callahan County U. S. R. A. War Board and County Agricultural Victory Council is cooperating with Work Projects Administration in this campaign.

 - 1 teaspoon lemon extract
 - 1 cup raisins
 - 3 cups rolled oats
- *Cream shortening, add molasses and eggs. beat well then add other ingredients. Drop on greased coky sheets and bake in moderate oven.

Stamford Cowboy Reunion

STAMFORD, Texas, May—Featured rodeo performers of the Texas Cowboy Reunion are cowhands who ride for cowhand wages. And while some of them could give the professionals a run for their money, they are rated as amateurs. But the Reunion show included some of the world's most accomplished professionals.

When the chuck wagons are parked each in its assigned place, on the Reunion grounds skilled cooks swing into action, cooking up batches of the best chuck wagon grub ever dished out to a hungry gang. Menus run the full scale, including barbecues, deep pot fried steaks, beans, stewed fruits and always onions. One meal ticket entitle the guest to chose any or all of the wagons in the field. It's one of the few places where one can really get all he wants to eat at one setting.

The wagons are the real things, being used throughout the year to tail the riding ranch hands, and must be ready to serve meals, regardless of what remote or desolate section the crew may be in when it's eating time. Wind, rain, or sand, the wheels roll just the same, and chuck is readied on time.

This section of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, like the rest of the show, is not run for profit. Each wagon boss presents to the commissary head a list each day of the foods he will need, and cooking is done on a day to day basis. The reunion managements pays for all provisions and all receipts are turned over to the management. Ranch owners and employees of the ranches bringing wagons, and members of The Texas Cowboy Reunion Association are given passes.

Grady Bowdry, city manager, has been in charge of the commissary for years. Experience has taught him how to have his official business in shape so that he can devote his full time to the big order of having enough food to take care of the thousands who eat from one to nine meals on the ground during the three days of the Reunion. Battered and weather-scarred, but strong and sturdy, the chuck wagons are a true picture of the real old West. Tarps are stretched from the wagon to afford a bit of shade to some of the help as they cook over open fires. Guests aren't furnished cushioned seats or folded linen napkins. Eating is done squatted on the

haunched or sitting cross-legged on the ground.

Sugar rationing won't have much effect on this year's chuck wagon menus during July 2, 3, and 4, since fancy sweets just don't have a place in the average cowhand's eats.

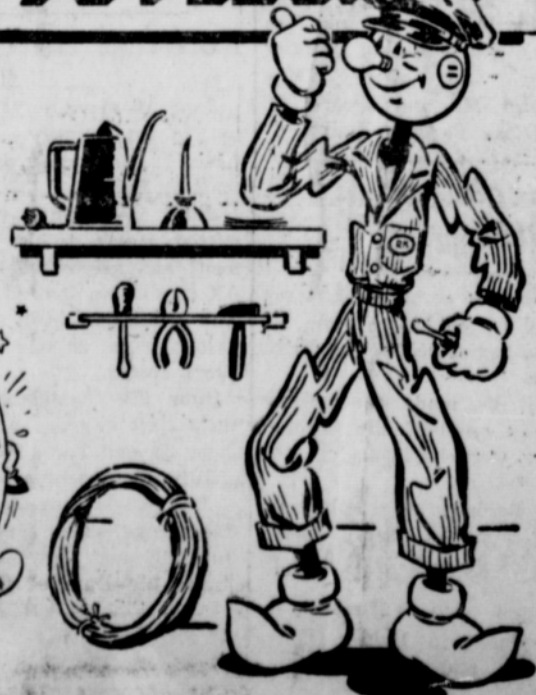

Sugar Rationing

Due to the amount of work to be carried on by the Callahan County Ration Board, sugar certificates for canning purposes will only be issued on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays of any week. As long as there is fruit to can, sugar may be obtained for such purposes. According to O.P. A. instructions, each family is allowed one pound of sugar for every four quarts of finished canned fruits and one pound per person annually for jellies, jams and preserves.

Persons who received sugar certificates before the above regulations were received by the local board must use the sugar allowed by such certificate before other sugar may be obtained, and must be used in the same manner as is specified in the present regulations.

Frances Baulch, secretary of the Rationing Board, says they are out of sugar purchase certificates supplies and that just as soon as supplies are received all grocers will be notified.

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds of the same nature heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Callahan County Road District No. 1, will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said District; and

WHEREAS, said Callahan County Road District No. 1 has heretofore been legally created by an order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 14th day of November, 1917, which order is of record in the minutes of the Commissioners' Court;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said Callahan County Road District No. 1 on the 23rd day of June, 1942, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3 3/4 % per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twenty-two (22) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District Number One sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

All persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this County who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote, and all such electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballot the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX

IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper published in Callahan County Road District No. 1 for three successive weeks before the date of said election. And in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said district, and one at the Court house door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the returns of said election, executed by the duly authorized election officers, are received by this Court.
