Honor guard acts as Air Force ambassadors

Long hours, endless miles of road trips, interminable practice sessions and microscopic attention to every detail of clothing and deportment are the tangible aspects of being a member of the Reese honor guard.

So what is it that makes an already busy airman give up his or her time to become an ambassador for the Air Force? Perhaps Strategic Air Command summed it up best when it began using the phrase "Professional Results In Daily Endeavor, PRIDE."

PRIDE in the service they represent, PRIDE in their comrades whose funerals they travel hundreds of miles to attend and PRIDE in the country they honor at dozens of parades and retreat ceremonies each year. But, more than that, it is PRIDE in themselves as professional performers.

Other benefits of being an honor guard member include basic allowance for subsistence (which doesn't benefit those who are married), relief from certain additional details and the wing commander's endorsement on performance reports. It's easy enough to see that these benefits alone don't make up for the time and effort put into the additional duty.

Second Lt. Kevin D. Illsley, coordinator for the honor guard, explained a system of recognition for team members. Aiguillettes, or shoulder ropes, in differing colors are given to members corresponding to the number of details or the number of years they have belonged to the honor guard.

Beginners wear a solid white aiguillette, which is changed to a braided blue and white rope after completion of the 10th detail or first year. After two years or twenty details a blue

rope is awarded, followed by the prestigious silver and blue rope given after the third year or 30th detail.

There are currently 40 people in the Reese unit, though Illsley says he hopes to have 60

soon. A new local headquarters has been given to the team, the old BX manager's office, located behind the Caprock House.

Transient alert wins seventh Riley award

For the seventh consecutive grading period, Reese's transient alert facility was listed as a recipient of the Rex Riley Award, recognizing excellence in all aspects of service to transient aircrews.

Joining Reese as a recipient of the award was Keesler AFB, Miss. Its addition to the listing means that all Air Training Command bases with active runways are now included on the Rex Riley roster.

The award is based primarily on inspections conducted by representatives from the Air Force Inspection and Safety Center. Results of questionnaires filled out by transient aircrew members are also considered.

Bases are judged on the cleanliness and appearance of a base's transient alert facilities, adherence to Air Force flying safety procedures, professionalism of the airfield operations staff and service provided by base transportation and billeting people.

ATC's Maxwell AFB, Ala., has held the award continuously since 1958 and is listed third on the Riley honor roll. Other long-time holders of the award include Mather AFB, Calif.; and Sheppard and Randolph AFBs, Texas. Reese leads off the remainder of the list, followed by Vance AFB, Okla.; Laughlin AFB, Texas; Columbus AFB, Miss.; Williams AFB, Ariz.; and Keesler.

Phase I of the program was the completion of our new BX facility which was opened on June 17. With this first phase of our program completed we increased BX shopping space, centralized all the facilities into one area, and made available more concessions to better serve the people.

Now we are at that point of the program where Phase II is upon us. The completion of Phase II will see us open the doors to our new commissary complex. This, I think, may be the most important people facility ever opened at Reese. Arrangements have been made to make this a gala occasion.

On Aug. 24, between 7 and 8 p.m., authorized commissary patrons will be permitted to tour the completely stocked new facility. However, no purchases will be permitted. On Aug. 25 at 8:30 a.m. opening ceremonies will be conducted at the store and it will open for business at 9 a.m. that day.

Some of the improved features which will immediately hit your eyes besides the added space, are wider, two-way isles, full air conditioning, seven checkouts (with cash registers that work), a delicatessen and a bakery.

All the departments within the commissary will be much larger, the fresh vegetables area will permit us to carry a larger variety of vegetables, fresh dairy products and the frozen foods area will be tremendous. The meat department will also start special orders on carcass meat, which will be a big savings to all of your who have freezers. What more do you say?

There will also be some great door prizes available: A \$50.00 shopping spree, a dishwasher, small calculators, and wristwatches. In addition, you can expect to see many "Managers Specials" on food items in the store. Also with the opening, all our commissary baggers will be required to wear a bagger's identification card.

The final phase to our program, Phase III, will be the tearing out of the old commissary and construction of a new commissary parking lot at that location. However, for obvious reasons this can't start until after the old commissary is closed and food and equipment are removed.

I know parking will be a problem but keep in mind we have a great new commissary and the new parking lot will be completed as soon as possible.

One last thing. My hat's off to Joe Vasquez, our store manager, and his staff. Thanks for all the hard work. When you go in the new store for the first time you'll want to thank Mr. Vasquez and his staff too.

Village residents fail to heed sirens

Here's a little weather quiz.

If you hear a three-to-five minute steady tone on the base siren it means:

- A. Somebody set their coffee cup down on the button.
- B. A steamboat is docking on the reclamation lake.
- C. It is an invitation to go outside and look at the funny cloud formations.
- D. None of the above.

If you picked answers A-C, and you liked the Wizard of Oz, you're in luck, because you may be the next visitor to Munchkinland.

A three-to-five minute steady tone is an indication that a tornado has been sighted in the vicinity of the base. When the sirens went off last week

however, it may as well have been a steamboat docking, because several base housing residents turned out to see it. The proper response would have been to take cover and wait for the all-clear.

Although the "tornado season" generally runs from late spring through early summer, the South Plains have been victim of the vicious storms at all times of year, and residents should be ready for them year round. The tornado is the most common weather-connected disaster. The violent, whirling winds have been reported in all fifty states (witness the recent Denver tornadoes, an area historically free from such disasters) but are most common in the mid-and southwest.

The U.S. Weather Bureau has designated two stages of warnings for tornadoes. The first is a tornado watch, which means meteorological conditions are right for the formation of the storms.

Local television and radio stations will broadcast instructions periodically when a watch is in progress. It is a good idea to keep a battery-operated radio handy, since the violent weather associated with the twisters often knocks out electrical power.

A tornado warning is the second stage. This means take cover immediately, a tornado has been sighted in the area. Go immediately to a designated shelter area, usually an interior hallway on a lower floor. Avoid structures with wide, free-span roofs.

If caught outside, move away from the tornado at right angles. If there is no time, take cover in the nearest ditch or depression.

Remember, if you are caught unawares in a tornado, there isn't always a witch handy to break your fall.

Crash victim recalls value of safety belts

I WOULD ALSO like to welcome the ten airmen who recently gained the rank of NCO. The new sergeants will now be among the many outstanding NCOs we have at Reese.

FINALLY, I WOULD like to praise all in the Organizational maintenance squadron and USAF hospital for the sharp increase in the letters to parents program. Keep up the good work.

CONFLICT OF HOURS was one complaint from personnel who work in maintenance. The caller wanted to know if hours of operation for the barber shop could be changed or additional barbers be on duty on Saturdays for those personnel who have problems getting off work in time to get a haircut. To accommodate those customers that cannot patronize the barber shop Monday through Friday, the barber shop concessionaire has been directed by exchange management to have three barbers available on Saturdays to ensure prompt service. Hours of operation are under evaluation at this time.

ANOTHER COMPLAINT from a care line caller was about the water conservation and waste happening on base. The caller specified water overflowing into the ditches and being nearly level with the road while the land has water standing on it with the sprinklers still in use.

First, I want to say that I am glad to know how many Reese personnel have become more aware of the importance of water conservation.

We are beginning to use our water more efficiently and, whenever possible, it is always best to irrigate an area and water

it thoroughly, not sprinkle it daily. It is even better when this can be done at night to reduce the evaporation process. We have been using this technique recently and we are beginning to see the savings.

We do most of our heavy watering at night. This virtually eliminates any evaporation and allows sufficient time for the water to thoroughly saturate the area being watered. Occasionally there may be some run off.

It must be pointed out however that the water that collects in the swale is far less than that which would evaporate if we watered for the same length of time during the day. Also, any runoff from the base is then used again by pumping it out of the lake and irrigating the golf course. Your concern is appreciated and I ask all Reese personnel to keep up the good work in conserving water.

A CARE LINE CALLER from the fire department wanted to know if wear of the corafam shoe was authorized while wearing the utility uniform. In AFR 35-10, 2-2 Col 'C', it states that the utility uniform shoe will be laced with plain toe or plain capped toe, smooth cowhide leather or scotch grain leather. Since corafams are not leather, they do not qualify for wear with fatigues.

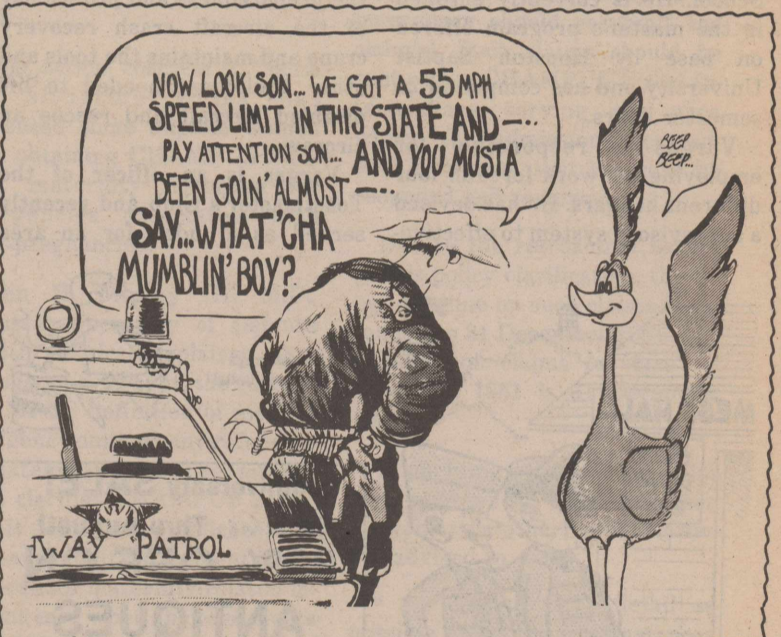

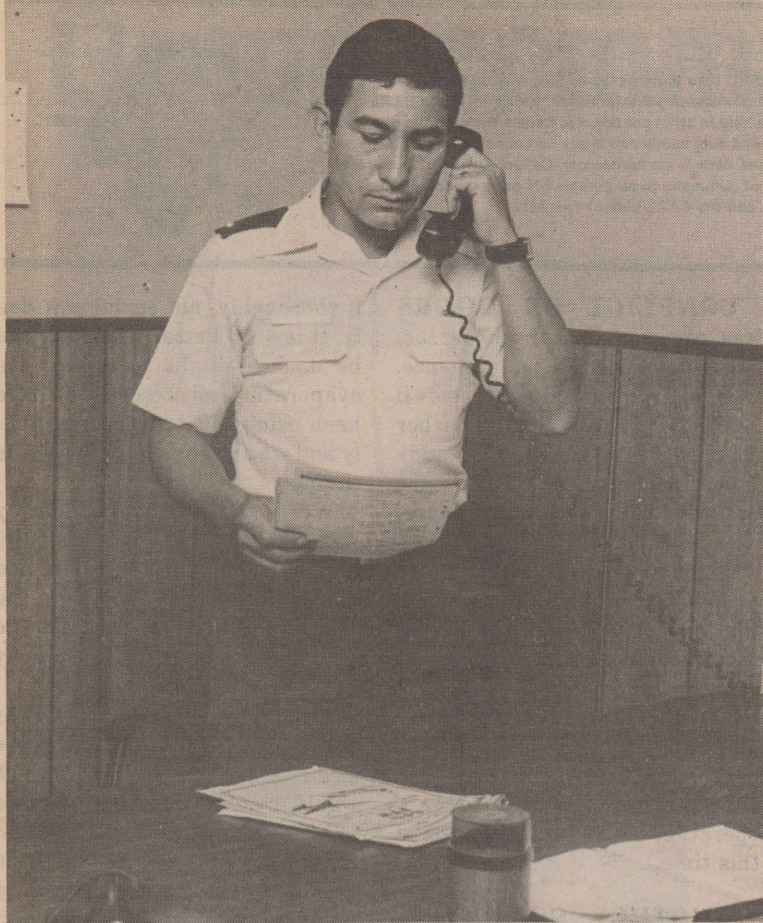

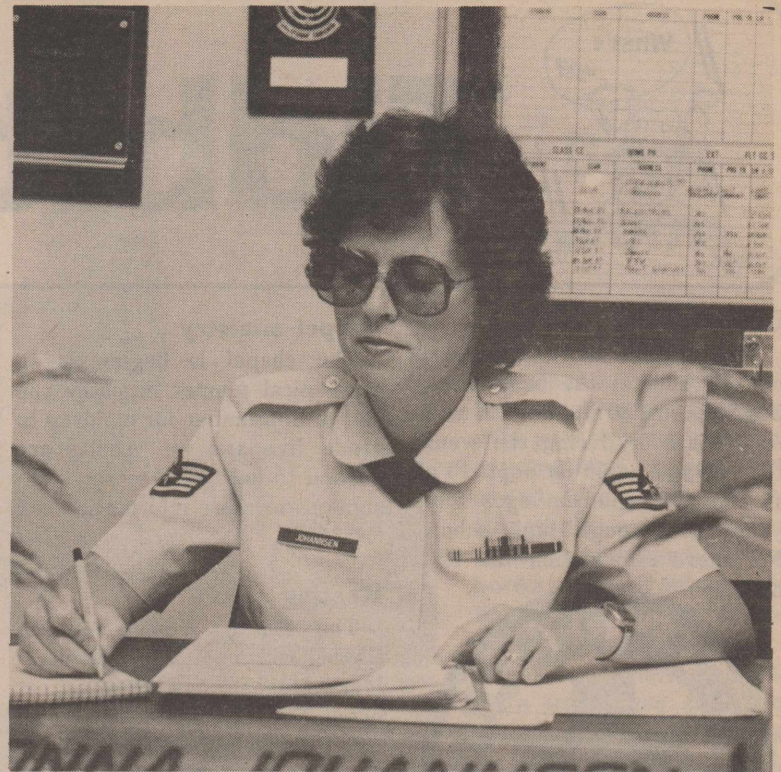

CHAMPUS amends definition

The Department of Defense has amended the definition of medical emergency in the CHAMPUS regulation to include

emergency maternity inpatient care.

This action corrects a "catch 22" situation which has prevented some eligible women from obtaining CHAMPUS inpatient maternity coverage for emergencies associated with their pregnancies.

John H. Moxley III, M.D., Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health Affairs) explained that through an oversight, the current CHAMPUS definition of medical emergency omitted any reference to maternity care. The amendment clarifies CHAMPUS policy on this point and establishes that a nonavailability statement is not required for maternity-related inpatient care when the care meets the definition of a medical emergency.

Dr. Moxley stated, "As with any other emergency, in the case of pregnancy a medical emergency must involve a sudden and unexpected medical complication which puts the mother, or baby, or both, at risk."

Examples of medical emergencies related to pregnancy include, but are not limited to, hemorrhage, ruptured membrane with prolapsed cord, shock, unconsciousness, heart attack, stroke and injury (as from an automobile accident). Pain alone would not qualify a maternity case as an emergency, nor would insipient birth after the 34th week of gestation unless an otherwise qualifying medical complication is present.

The policy clarification concerning emergency maternity admissions is retroactive to 1 June 1977, the date the current regulation was implemented. Therefore, any beneficiary who has been denied CHAMPUS benefits for a maternity admission which occurred during this period and which

she believes could qualify as an emergency should resubmit the claim(s). Such claims should be sent to the CHAMPUS Fiscal Intermediary serving the area where the admission occurred, with a request that the case be reopened and reviewed.

Due to the retroactive nature of this policy clarification, the filing deadline on such claims is extended to 31 December 1981. The deadline on claims for care received in 1981 is 31 December 1982.

When filing a CHAMPUS claim for emergency care (whether maternity or other) beneficiaries are advised to —

- provide as much detail as possible about the circumstances of the emergency and

- obtain a statement from the attending physician telling why immediate hospitalization was required and why the patient could not be transported to the nearest Uniformed Service hospital. If the emergency involves a maternity case, the physician's statement must include a certification that he/she had not been seeing the patient during her pregnancy.

Falsifying information on a claim form (such as a fraudulent residence address) in order to circumvent the 40-mile rule applicable to nonavailability statements not involving an emergency is considered to be fraud. Such actions will, at a minimum, result in the government recovering any payments made on such a claim.

For further information about emergency maternity care, pregnant beneficiaries who are contemplating travel, particularly during the last six weeks of pregnancy, should contact the health benefits advisor at a Uniformed Service medical facility.

School registration begins

The days are getting progressively shorter, the weather has turned milder, new clothes are being bought and children seem to be more intent in their

play. These are all sure signs that summer is coming to an end and a new year of school is about to begin.

In fact, registration for the 1981-82 school year for Reese students is Monday from 8:30-11:30 a.m. The first full day of school will be Wednesday.

For parents enrolling kindergarten children, up-to-date shot records must be brought to the enrollment. Requirements are: Polio-three doses, one after age four; DPT-three doses, one after age four; Rubeola (red measles)-one dose after age four; Rubella (German measles)-one dose after age one; Mumps-one dose after age one.

Buses will be operating the day of registration, arriving at school at 8:30 a.m. and departing to

return students home at 11 a.m. The three buses that will go through Reese Village are: Bus 6 will turn right off War Highway onto Mitchell Blvd. and proceed to Arnold. It will turn right on Arnold to McGuire St. and turn left. From McGuire it will again intersect Mitchell and turn left, returning to War Highway.

Bus 11 will turn right on Andrews off War Highway and proceed to Yount, where it will turn right. From there it will go to Harmon and turn left, continuing to Mitchell and turning right. Bus 11 will then return to War Highway.

Bus 16 will turn right on Mitchell from War Highway, then right again on McGuire. It will travel down McGuire to 4th St. and proceed to the school.

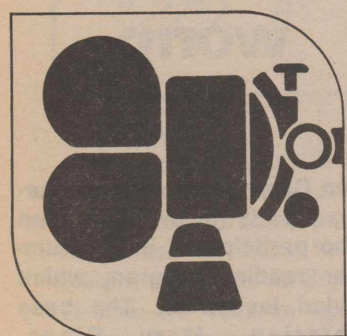

AF requests \$1.7 billion O and M budget increase

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force has requested a budget increase of some \$1.7 billion for fiscal 1982 operations and maintenance, Brig. Gen. Richard D. Murray, Air Force budget deputy told the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Defense.

The increase would set the O&M budget total at \$19.2 billion and would "support the modernization of our tactical forces, increase flying hours, and reduce the backlog of maintenance repair of our real property," General Murray said.

Key parts of the O&M package include:

— \$16.8 billion to the active Air Force. This represents a \$998 million increase from fiscal 1981, after accounting for inflation. According to General Murray, this budget would support an additional 17,800 military and 1,100 civilian personnel.

— \$681 million for the Air Force Reserve, \$79 million more than the Reserve budget in fiscal 1981. Much of the increase would go to convert Reserve units to more modern aircraft.

— \$1.7 billion for the Air National Guard, a \$155 million increase over last year. The change would cover inflation and force modernization.

Under the budget proposal, 101 aircraft will be added to the active inventory, bringing the total to 6,479 planes. Most of the additions would be F-15 and F-16 fighters and A-10 attack aircraft.

The flying hour program would increase by 113,000 hours. Basic flight training hours and tactical fighter activities would benefit most from the increase.

"If inflation does not significantly exceed the rates reflected in the budget, we will achieve important improvements in readiness," General Murray told the subcommittee.

Senior NCOs need school record update

(ATCNS) — Master sergeants and senior master sergeants should update their education records well in advance before the Dec. 31 promotion board cutoff, remind Community College of the Air Force officials.

Persons who have completed an additional 30 semester hours of college study since their education records were last updated can increase their academic education level by one year. This includes credit earned through CCAF.

The college will issue transcripts on request for promotion records, but members are asked not to wait until the last minute to make that request.

Those individuals wishing to update their student records with additional military course completions or CLEP/DANTES examinations should forward them to CCAF by Nov. 1. New credits

reported before that date will be posted to CCAF transcripts so that individuals' personnel records can be updated before the Dec. 31 cutoff date.

Most Air Force course completions are automatically fed into the CCAF computer banks, but CCAF internship credit for on-the-job training can be awarded only to registered students.

The college awards credit for internship based on successful progression to each skill level. Four semester hours can be earned for each skill upgrade completed. Registration requires just a trip to the local education services center.

Nevertheless, many NCOs have not taken advantage of this benefit, college officials reported. About 48 percent of eligible master sergeants and 33 percent of the E-8s remain unregistered with CCAF.

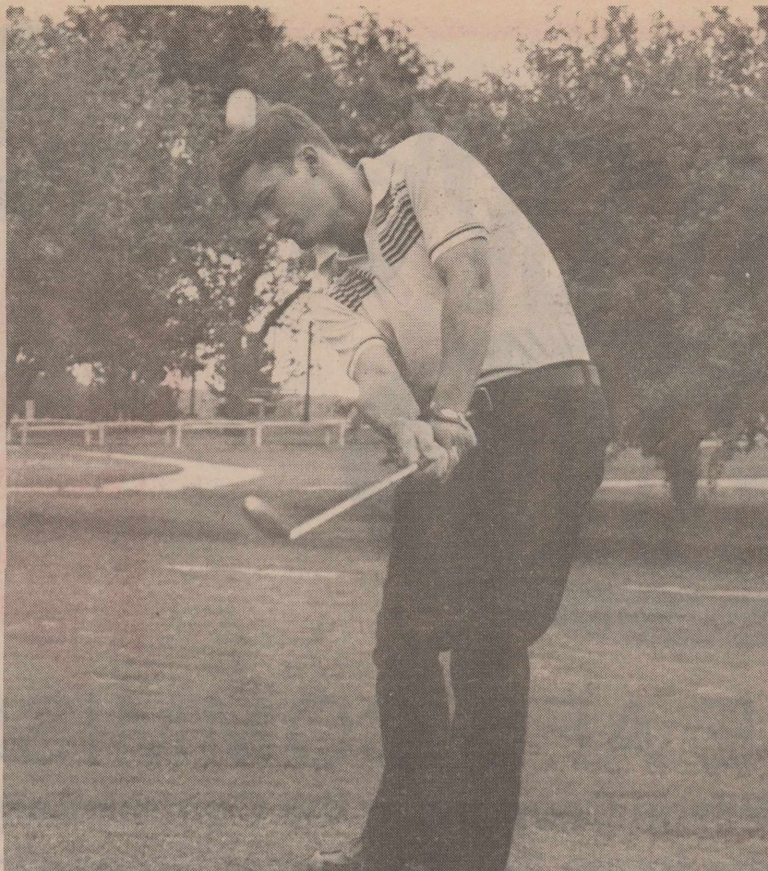
