Reese graduates 35 new AF pilots

This morning's graduation ceremony of the Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 82-02 will mark the end of a year's intensive study and work for 35 new Air Force pilots.

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Guest speaker

Guest speaker for the event will be Maj. Gen. Andrew Pringle Jr., chief of staff, Headquarters Strategic Air Command, Offutt AFB, Neb.

General Pringle enrolled in the aviation cadet program and was commissioned a second lieutenant in June 1950. His first assignment was at Castle AFB, Calif., with the 93rd Bombardment wing. From 1954 to 1960, he served at the 90th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing at Forbes AFB, Kansas, and the 100th Bombardment Wing at Pease AFB, N.H.

Through 1963 he served as a pilot evaluator at Barksdale AFB, La.

During the period of 1969 to 1972 General Pringle held various operations positions including, being a plans officer at Headquarters SAC, was assigned as assistant deputy chief of staff for operations and deputy commander of the 99th Combat Support Group at Westover AFB, Mass.

General Pringle assumed his present duties in August 1980.

He is a command pilot with 9,000 hours in SAC aircraft, including more than 440 combat hours in the B-52 Stratofortress. His military decorations and awards include the Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award ribbon with "V" device and Good Conduct Medal.



A benediction by Chaplain Grimmett and the honor guard's retiring of the colors officially ended the 1981 Enlisted Awards Banquet.






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Craft takes award



recently was named as 1981 Wing NCO of the Year.

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
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New tax package explained

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The administration's tax package will affect gift taxes, those earning publicutility dividends, heirs to an estate, and people who own oil royalties.

The annual tax exclusion for gifts from one person to another will increase to \$10,000 - \$20,000 for couples - in 1982. Before the increase, donors could annually transfer up to \$3,000 to individuals and not pay a gift tax. Married couples could transfer \$6,000.

The increase means wealthy grandparents could give up to \$20,000 each year to each of their children and grandchildren, and thus reduce the value of their estates without incurring a tax liability.

Also effective in 1982, payments made in behalf of an individual for school tuition or medical expenses will not be subject to gift tax. There is no limit on this exclusion but such payments must be made directly to the institution or person that provides the service.

Payments made directly to individuals as reimbursement for such services do not qualify for the exclusion. Beneficiaries need not be related to the donor.

Stock shareholders will be allowed to exclude up to \$750, or \$1,500 on a joint return, of dividends in stocks of public utilities from 1982 to 1985. Profit on the sale of such stock is generally treated as capital gains but, if the stock is sold within one year, the gain will be treated as ordinary income. The top tax rate on investment and dividend income was reduced from 70 to 50 percent and effectively reduces the maximum longterm capital gain to 20 percent.

It has been estimated that taxes on 95 percent of all estates now being taxed will be eliminated. The old provision exempted estates valued at less than \$175,625. Tax rates ranged from 32 to each will be treated as owning half of the property for estate-tax purposes. This is regardless of the purchase price each may have paid.

An example would be if a couple married and owned a home jointly. With the right of survivorship, each spouse would be considered the owner of half of the property for estate-tax purposes. This is even if it was paid for by only one spouse's earnings.

Royalty owners are now given added protection against a windfall tax imposed on their royalty oil. The old rule allowed a maximum credit of \$1,000. The new provision increases that amount to \$2,500 for 1981; a two barrel-per-day credit allowed for 1982, 1983 and 1984; and a three barrel-perday credit thereafter.



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70 percent for estates values at more than that amount.

In 1982, the provision will raise the minimum to \$225,000 and will continue to increase it to \$600,000 by 1987. In addition to the increase and exemption, the rate will be reduced over four years to the range of 37 to 50 percent.

In addition to these changes, the legislation now permits a surviving spouse to inherit an unlimited amount tax-free. Because of this change, many married people are advised to reevaluate their estate plans — particularly those with marital deduction formulas in their wills or trusts.

The tax package has changes for spouses who own property jointly as tenants by the entirety or as joint tenants with rights of survivorship. After 1981,





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CHAMPUS to pay for wigs

CHAMPUS will now costshare wigs bought between December 1980 and September 30, 1981, for the purpose of covering baldness which has resulted from some cancer treatments.

Retroactive to December 15, 1980, CHAMPUS will share the cost of one wig to cover hair loss resulting from cancer chemotherapy or radiation therapy. The benefit is limited to a single wig for the patient's lifetime and does not cover the cost of maintenance. Payments were authorized by Congress to extend through September 30, 1981 (FY 1981). Funding authori-

zation for FY 1982 and thereafter is under consideration by Congress. The new benefit was made

possible by a section of the FY 1981 Defense Appropriation Act which was signed

into law December 15, 1981, the effective date of the payments. The program

originally was estimated to cost approximately \$1.2 million for the first full year and would probably apply to a few hundred cancer patients each year.

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CHAMPUS users must apply for the cost of the wig under the normal CHAM-PUS claims procedure.

This new benefit does not apply to the purchase of a wig to cover hair loss caused

by treatment for diseases other than cancer, nor will CHAMPUS pay for hair

transplants or treatments to stimulate hair growth.


Free breakfast at rec center

Base ASMC chapter sets elections



Carbon monoxide: A silent killer

(ATCNS) – Carbon monoxide poisoning kills approximately 1,000 Americans each year, according to the National Safety Council. Among the latest victims were an Air Force staff sergeant, his wife and their infant child.

The family was discovered dead in an off-base apartment after the sergeant failed to report for duty Nov. 30. Police officers investigating the incident found an unvented natural gas space heater still burning in the bathroom.

In addition, all windows in the apartment were closed, and all but two were sealed from the outside with a plastic covering.

One of the dangers of carbon monoxide, safety officials say, is that poisoning can occur slowly and without any recognizable symptoms, especially if victims are asleep or relatively inactive.

When symptoms are present, they may include headache, irritability, confusion, dizziness, visual disturbances, drowsiness, nausea, closes at 9 p.m. Christmas Day, closed. 



Learn to prevent holiday fires

Christmas is a very special and happy time of the year for each of us. It is a time of rejoicing and family gathering. However, it can also bring many serious and unsuspecting fire hazards into our homes. Let's take a moment now to prevent a possible holiday tragedy.

Since the tree is an important part of Christmas, choose one that is firm and fresh. If you plan to store it for a day or two before putting it up, keep it in a cool, dry place and keep it in water to maintain it's freshness. When you bring it into your home, make a fresh cut at the base as this helps the tree to absorb water. The water level should be checked daily to prevent drying and never let your tree block an exit from your



LIGHTING:

When buying light sets for your tree, check them carefully for the Underwriters Laboratories Label. Also check last years lighting sets for broken wires, fraying, etc. If they are damaged, replace them. If you use extension cords, use them sparingly. If you plan to go out or retire for the evening, turn-off all lighting for your own safety.

DECORATIONS

Use non-combustible materials (glass, asbestos, etc.) if possible, or flameretardant decorations. Ordinary polystyrene foam or natural evergreens make fine displays but can be fire hazards. Remember, keep open flames and candles away. If you select holiday masks, whiskers and other costuming, be careful to select those that are "flameproofed". They could mean the difference between tradition and tragedy.

GIFTS

Electric toys should carry the UL Label to show they meet safety standards. Wrappings should be removed and placed in covered trash containers and never burned in the fireplace.

Smoking and children with matches are also a common hazard during any holiday season. Keep an eye on smoking materials—ensure adequate and plentiful ash trays are available and empty them frequently. Keep matches and lighters out of reach of children.

Finally, review your fire emergency plan; know your escape routes. If a fire begins, sound the alarm and call the Fire Department. If you can fight the fire safely, do so, but, keep near an exit. Remember, sound and timely planning by all of us will assure the achievement of a happy holiday season instead of a tragic one. HAVE MERRY A VERY CHRISTMAS AND A HAP-PY NEW YEAR.

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DOPMA affects promotions

RANDOLPH AFB. Texas (AFNS)-All active-duty reserve captains will have opportunity to be considered twice for promotion to major under the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act, according to Air Force officials.

In the past, active-duty reserve officers generally were limited to 20 years' active military service if at least 10 years were in commissioned-officer status. This caused reserve officers with more than 10 years'

enlisted service to be mandatorily separated when they first became eligible to retire as a commissioned officer. As a result, officers with 10 or more years' enlisted service were not considered for promotion to major in the primary zone.

Reserve officers commissioned prior to DOPMA have the choice of separating on their original mandatory date of separation or remaining in the Air Force until they have been considered twice for promo-

tion to major. This is in addition to below-the-zone promotion consideration. Officers affected by this policy will be notified by the personnel office and have until Jan. 1, 1982, to extend their date of separation to take advantage of this policy change.



Student squadron visits Lubbock nursing home





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

Consumer Buying Tips-

During the Yuletide season, the Better Business Bureau of Lubbock handles many consumer problems that could have been prevented. To avoid trouble this holiday season take precautions-save sales receipts of presents and who got it in case an exchange is necessary. Check into the refund policy of each store before making a purchase. Stores are basically required to grant a refund or exchange if the items is defective or sold through misrepresentation.

Keep all the original packing because most manufacturers require that returns be in their original containes or they will not be accepted. Finally, when selecting a gift, check it out before giving, then if a return is required it can be done so then.

Get New Exemption -

If base members are claiming New York, New Jersey or Oregon and have been exempt from paying tax during 1981, you must reaccomplish your exemption at military pay. Otherwise state taxes will begin being withheld.

Dec. 31 Deadline -

Air Force members claiming New Jersey, New York, or Oregon as their legal residence must recertify

their state tax exemption status by Dec. 31, say officials of the Air Force Accounting and Finance Center.

Members should fill out the state income tax exemption test certificate – DD Form 2058-1 – at the base accounting and finance office.

Failing to recertify will result in state income tax being deducted from members' pay beginning in January 1982.


aw Enforcement Specialist Billy J. Kidd, A1C, is 18 ears old and only joined the Air Force 9 months ago. However, today Billy was oing home again PCS-Permanent Civilian Status, s a result of a court martial. his is Billy's story:

After arriving at his first ermanent duty station, Bily heard from some of his riends that "shoplifting" vas the "in thing" to do. ome of Billy's "friends" vere people he worked with and a few were dependents f active duty personnel.

Billy became so good at hoplifting he became homewhat of a ring leader. Billy became "so profesional" at shoplifting he tarted "taking orders for is friends." At Christmas ime, Billy started charging is friends for items he stole or them.

Then one day as Billy exted the exchange facility, a nan who identified himself s a store detective asked Billy to come back into the tore with him. After enterng the exchange manager's ffice. the detective told Bilv he had watched him put a ew items inside his coat acket and walk out the tore without paying for hem. The detective also aid the security police vould be contacted and adised of this incident.

Billy started to feel sick, is stomach muscles started ightening and his throat elt very dry. A few minutes ater TSgt. Jim Friday,




Billy was then placed under apprehension. Prior to transporting Billy to security police headquarters, Sergeant Friday conducted a simple frisk of Billy's person, for safety purposes. From under Billy's jacket Sergeant Friday pulled out a 35mm camera, one AM/FM radio, one car stereo, one car

stereo equalizer and one cartridge needle for a turntable. All items were confiscated as evidence.

After a long and very thorough investigation by the Office of Special Investigations, all the names of the people involved with Billy were revealed. Billy's court martial was the first; a couple of his "friends" are still awaiting their court martials. Another two or three of Billy's dependent friends are pending action downtown in court.
