Pheasant

The leaves are changing color, mornings and evenings are cool, combines are in the fields, and the. fall hunting season is approaching. The Stratford Chamber of Commerce is actively seeking property to promote for our annual Pheasant Hunt. The Pheasant Season is December 14-29, 2002.

The Chamber Hunt generally comprises of CRP Grass, Corn and Milo stubble with the drought this year, many acres of dryland milo have been 'Totaled' by insurance and would make prime habitat for pheasant. The price paid to the landowner is as follows:
