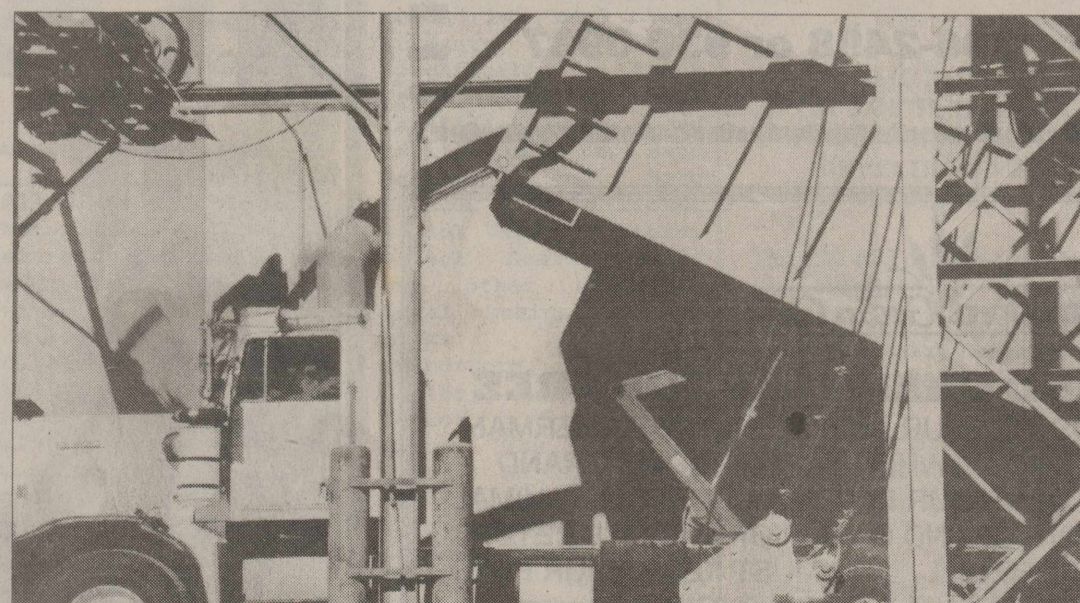

The Stratford ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session on Tuesday, October 12, 2004 in the High School library.

President Joe Reinart established a quorum was present and called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM.

Mr. Gilliland led the invocation.

Mr. Taliaferro gave the district's monthly recognition. It was as follows:

Several employees have received additional certifications. They are: Beth Bench - Certified Food Manager, Tiffany Confer - Master of Education in Administration, Desine Garza - Master of Education, Misti McBryde - completed a degree program in Administration. Josh King was selected as the Class 1A Player of the Week by the Amarillo Globe News for his efforts during the Tulia game.

Ten Stratford Junior High students have been selected to participate in the Duke University Talent Identification Program. Students are identified based on their TAKS scores from the previous two years. The goal of the TIP program is to motivate, enrich, and academically challenge some of our community's brightest young people. Qualifying for this year's talent search are Roy Allen, Eric Burton, Kelsi Dennis, Shelby McDaniel, Janeth Reyes, Anthony Ruiz, Sunny Russell, Chrystal Thompson, Elias Terrazas and Channing Ziemann. Congratulations to these students.

The Stratford ISD Yearbook has been chosen as *Yearbook Yearbook* semi-finalist. Of the more than 8,000 yearbooks that Taylor Publishing prints, each year less than ten percent of them are chosen to be semi-finalist for *Yearbook Yearbook*. This honor is for the 2003-2004 annual and their sponsor is Tami King.

The Junior High Campus received a rating of Recognized with every sub group improving but one.

Mr. Haynes gave the High School report. He reported that the junior class set a record high for their magazines sales. Mrs. Riffe took her Spanish II and Spanish III students to Lubbock to hear a motivational speaker.

The trip was enjoyed by all. The ESL and Special Ed students toured the Liberal Area Vo Tech College on Tuesday. The senior migrant students will attend a scholarship awareness program on Wednesday. The Big Blue Band will compete in the Marching Contest on Saturday, October 16 at Dick Bivins stadium in Amarillo. They will march at approximately 10:24 AM. Mr. Haynes complimented the girls cross country team on their efforts this year. They will compete at the district meet in Amarillo on Monday, October 18 at 2:00 PM at Thompson Park. Staff meetings will begin on Wednesday to continue work on strategies for TEKS mastery. Mr. Haynes reported that the high school campus received a rating of Academic Acceptable.

Mrs. Williams gave the elementary report. She passed out the weekly bulletin. She explained that the elementary campus is participating in many partnership activities with the other campuses. The High School football team sends a student over once a week to help the elementary students by reading to them, helping in tutorials, etc. This benefits both the student and the football player by promoting positive role models. Each week two elementary students are chosen to walk in with the football team and sit with them in the pep rally. The elementary campus is also participating in a writing projects and sending them to OPSU and the 5th grade to be critiqued. The feedback has been very positive. Mrs. Williams reported that the elementary campus received a rating of Exemplary.

Mr. Taliaferro gave the transportation report. The cost per mile for transportation for the month was 31¢. He then gave the budget summary. Monthly expenditures are at 7.82% and revenue collected at 2.53%. Tax collections which are all delinquent taxes are at 95.3%.

Mr. Taliaferro then gave the superintendent's report. District enrollment was as follows: Mary Allen Elementary -256, Junior High -174 and High School -199 for a total district enrollment of 629. He reported on a break-in at the school over the weekend. Discussion was held on security systems. The district website was discussed. He gave an update on the search for an assistant band director. He then talked to the board about a program XIT Communications wants to start that would donate funds to the school.

Ricky Reed made the motion and Steve Hays seconded to accept the consent agenda. Discussion was held. Motion carried 7-0.

Joe Reinart read a letter of nomination from the Sherman County Appraisal District. Ricky Reed made the motion and Brent Spurlock seconded to nominate Patti Vincent to serve as the Stratford ISD representative. Motion carried 7-0. Ricky Reed made the motion and Patti Vincent seconded to nominate Chet Everett and Gerald Wilhelm for the other two positions. Motion carried 7-0.

Mr. Taliaferro went over the tax rolls received from the Sherman County Appraisal District. The amount of the tax roll is





USDA Creates Voluntary Register to Reach Minority Producers

October 18, 2004-The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) announces that minority farmers and ranchers in Sherman County and across the nation may now join a new voluntary register to receive information from USDA.

"The new Minority Farm Register is an outreach tool to reach underserved farmers and ranchers who are not currently enrolled in USDA loan, farm or conservation programs," said Rebecca Hemphill, Sherman County FSA County Executive Director. "The Register will create a shared outreach list that will help USDA, community-based organizations, and minority-serving educational institutions to communicate with minority farmers and ranchers."

By joining the Register, minority producers may receive outreach materials, newsletters and program announcements from USDA agencies. They may also receive information and assistance from other USDA-approved outreach partners, such as community-based organizations, faith-based organizations and minority-serving educational institutions. USDA will carefully control access to and use of the Register.

Individuals wishing to join the Register must sign and date a form that provides their name and address. Providing phone numbers, e-mail address, race, ethnicity, gender and farm or ranch location will be voluntary, although the additional information increased the producer's opportunities for receiving appropriate assistance.

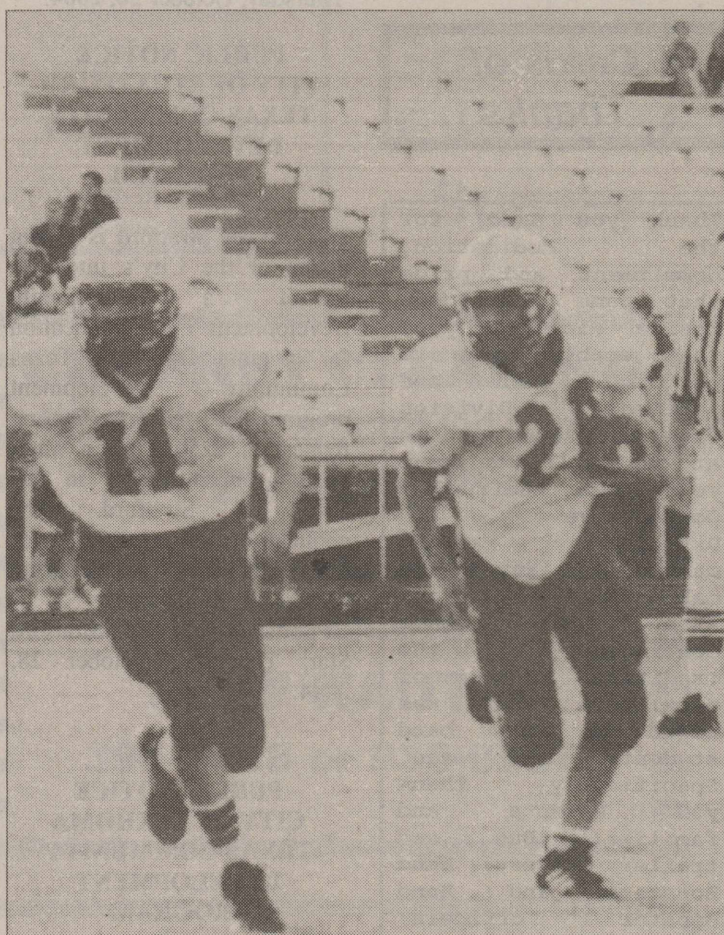
The Stratford Elks zipped past White Deer 55-14 on Friday, October 22nd.

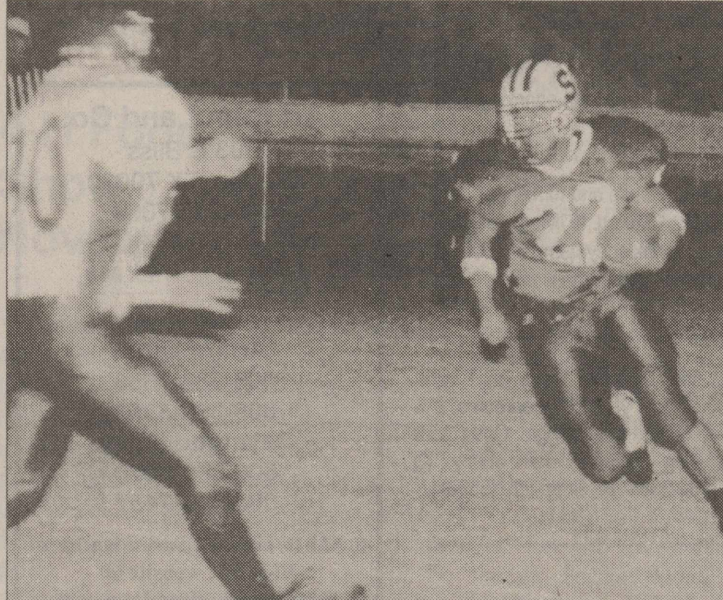

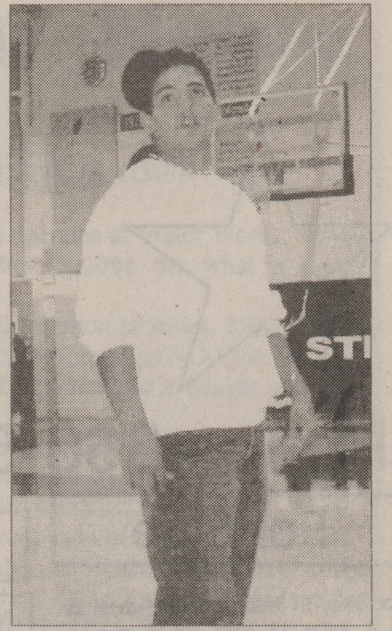

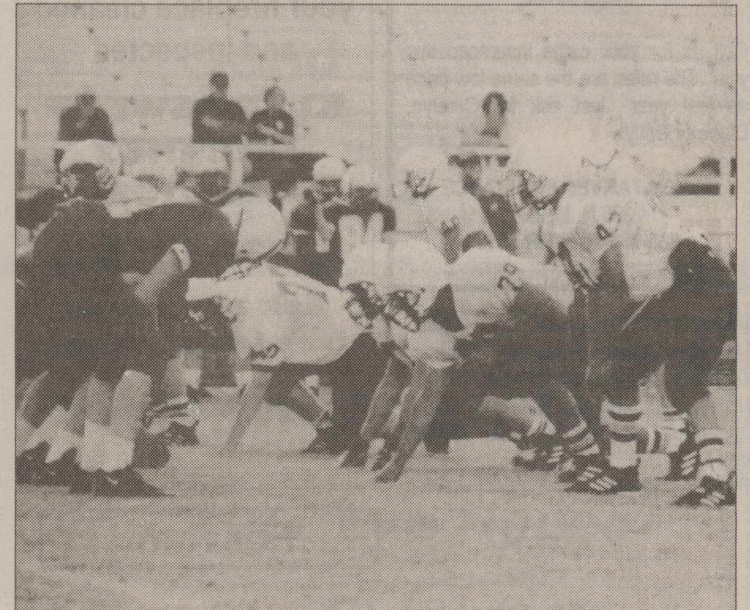
