General Flynn speaks here Thursday

Lt. Gen. John P. Flynn, U.S.A.F. retired, will be the guest speaker at Thursday mornings National Prayer Breakfast at the officers' club beginning at

The breakfast line will begin serving at 6:30 a.m. Tickets for this year's National Prayer Breakfast are \$3 each and are available at the chapel.

General Flynn will arrive Wednesday afternoon via a T-38. The retired Air Force officer is now the director for the National Bank of Fort Sam Houston. He is also the National President of the Daedalians and the chairman of the Advisory Council to the administrator of the V.A.

General Flynn's military career has been long and varied. He entered military service in February 1942 as an aviation cadet.

Commissioned in May 1944, he flew combat missions in World War II, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Conflict. Eventually he moved through the ranks to become the vice commander of the 388th Fighter Wing stationed in Thailand. He was shot down over Hanoi on October 27, 1967 and remained as the senior prisoner of war for 5½ years.

During his more than 24-year Air Force career General Flynn held numerous staff and operational assignments in the Washington D.C. area. His total service overseas is 16 years and two months.

General Flynn left active military service in November 1978. His position at that time was as the Air Force Inspector General.

The general is highly decorated. He has earned the Air Force Cross, three Distinguished Service Medals, Silver Star, three Legions of Merit, Six Distinguished Flying Crosses, Bronze Star for Valor, 17 Air Medals, and two Purple Hearts for wounds sustained in combat and prison. His awards go on, over 50 more.

Since his retirement, General Flynn has moved to San Antonio where he is active in several veterans and military organizations.

General Flynn and his wife, Mary Margaret, have five children and six grandchildren.

The drug scene

In light of our recent drug-related problems at Reese I think that it is important for you to understand not only some of the health problems associated with smoking marijuana, but also how drug abuse impacts on the leadership in this wing.

The following is an excerpt from a speech given by Everett J. Grindstaff, president of Lions International.

"Drug abuse is among the most serious" criminal and social problems we face in the United States. Marijuana is the most widely used illegal drug. Some of the known effects of marijuana include: a reduction in one's ability to think, to focus, to concentrate, to create, to learn, to communicate and to conceptualize.

"A person smoking marijuana gets involved in some pretty complex chemistry that includes some 421 known chemicals. Most of the research has been done on a single chemical-THC (the hallucinogenic ingredient). Almost no research has been done on the long-term effects of absorbing over 400 other chemicals into the body.

"There is overwhelming medical evidence that marijuana is a powerful, damaging drug. It causes permanent damage to the major organs of the body, including the brain, lungs, reproductive process and the immunity system.

"Marijuana stays in the body, lodged in the fat cells, for an extended period of time. One week after smoking only one marijuana cigarette, 30 to 50 percent of the THC remains in the body. It takes four to six weeks to eliminate all THC from the body. Mental and physical performance is subtly downgraded during this entire period of

"Five typical marijuana cigarettes have the same cancer-causing capability as smoking 112 cigarettes. Using the stronger forms of marijuana - senisnella - one cigarette is equivalent to roughly 110 conventional cigarettes in producing carcinogens (cancer producing products)."


In addition to the health hazards, smoking

marijuana is against the law. As you know, offenders here at Reese are dealt with swiftly and severely. However, the purpose of this article is not to try to scare anyone, but rather to tell it like it is.

Former spouse legislation

Recent legislation, Public Law 97-252, extends medical care benefits and commissary, exchange and theater privileges to certain former spouses as of Tuesday. This new law authorizes unmarried former spouses to these benefits provided they satisfy all of the following conditions:

Divorce from the member must have occurred on or after February 1, 1983;

Former spouse must have been married to the member for a period of at least 20 years;

And during the period of marriage the member must have performed at least 20 years of service which is or was creditable in determining eligibility for retired pay.

Teeth can be Texas tough

(Editor's note: During February the Roundup will run articles regarding dental health care in support of Children's National Dental Health Month. The dental tips are prepared by Dr. (Capt.) Randy Barkley, assistant base dental surgeon and Preventive Dentistry officer)

Every parent knows that children can play pretty roughly. Clothes get torn, and at times teeth are accidentally knocked out. But these teeth can be saved if you act quickly.

The best thing to do is to quickly pick up the tooth by the crown section, rinse (not brush or scrub) with cold water, and place it directly back into the empty socket or inside the mouth between the teeth and cheek. If your child is very young and this is impossible, then wrap the tooth in a moist towel or place the tooth inside your mouth, and then seek immediate dental treatment.

Be very careful not to let the tooth get dry. Furthermore, avoid touching the root section so as not to disturb the delicate fibers required for reattach-

Teeth can be Texas tough, but the possibility of successful replantation decreases the longer the tooth is out of the socket and/or the drier it becomes. The first fifteen minutes are critical, so it pays to be prepared.

• An impressive flyer ends career as an ace Becomes youngest Nat. Guard brigadier gen.

David Lee "Tex" Hill. Even the name has an impressive ring to it.

The man. Even more impressive.

Born in Korea the son of missionary parents, "Tex" Hill began his flying career as a U.S. Navy torpedo and dive bomber pilot. But when Gen. Claire Chennault put out the call for volunteers to form his Flying Tigers in Burma in 1941, Hill was one of the first in line.

Japanese pilots saw a lot more of the business end of "Tex" Hill than they'd bargained for.

Operating their tiger-nosed P-40 Tomahawks from grass and dirt strips, the Flying Tigers, facing unbelievable hardships and swarms of Japanese aircraft, wrote a chapter in military aviation history without parallel.

Chased from one location to another by Japanese air and ground forces . . . getting their fuel, ammunition and supplies in a haphazard manner . . . performing aircraft maintenance under the trees. From then until he left the Flying Tigers took to the 23rd Fighter Group. The 23rd China three years later, air again and again to was probably the only air unit devastate the Japanese air ar- in American history to be acmadas.

During an eight-month period, a handful of swift,

heavily armed P-40s, piloted by courageous and skilled aviators, destroyed 297 Japanese aircraft. Twelve of those fell from the sky under the guns of "Tex" Hill's Tomahawk.

After America's entry into the war and the deactivation of the Flying Tigers in the summer of 1942, Hill accepted a spot promotion to major in the Army Air Corps from General Chennault and remained in China to activate ... living in small enclaves the 75th Fighter Squadron under constant enemy attack, and later to command the tivated in the field, under fire.

Before returning to the states in late 1944, "Tex" Hill

and his P-51 Mustang scratched another six aircraft from the Japanese inventory. It is believed that he was the first to down a Zero with a P-51. Altogether, Hill destroyed 18 and one-quarter enemy aircraft to place him among today's top living American fighter aces.

During the closing months of World War II, Hill commanded the 412th Fighter Group, the first jet unit in the Army Air Forces. The group flew the Bell XP-59 and later the Lockheed P-80.

In July 1946, "Tex" Hill and country.

resigned his commission and left active duty. Shortly thereafter, he joined the Air National Guard and became the youngest brigadier general in the history of that service. He retired from the military in 1968.

Today, he resides in San Antonio, in the heart of the state that gave him his nickname when he flew the Flying Tigers.



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
