Gen. Ryan bound for MAC

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)-Gen. Thomas M. Ryan Jr., who has commanded Air Training Command since July 30, 1981, will become Commander in Chief of Military Airlift Command, headquartered at Scott AFB, Ill., the Air Force announced in Washington, Thursday. General Ryan is replacing Gen. James R. Allen, who retires July 1.

Before he assumed command of ATC, General Ryan served as Vice Commander in Chief of MAC.

General Ryan's successor as ATC commander will be Lt. Gen. Andrew P. Iosue, currently Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff for Manpower and Personnel. The president has nominated General Iosue for appointment to the grade of general.

The ATC change of command will be held here sometime in late June, the Air Force said.

In a related announcement, the Air Force also disclosed plans for a reorganization of Air Training Command.

The realignment calls for the Air University, which is headquartered at Maxwell AFB, Ala., to be separated from ATC effective July 1. At this time, AU will be designated a major command.

Air Force officials said the change in status for AU is part of an Air Force effort to increase the emphasis on professional

military education and research and doctrine development, which are conducted at AU.

Major functions under AU are: Air War College; Air Com-mand and Staff College, Squadron Officer School; Senior Noncommissioned Officer Academy; Center for Aerospace Doctrine, Research and Education; Air Force Institute of Technology; Leadership, Management and Development Center; Civil Air Patrol and the Extension Course Institute.

The Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps, head-quartered at Maxwell, will remain under ATC's jurisdiction.

None of ATC's other major responsibilities-flying, technical and basic military training as well as officer/enlisted recruiting – will be affected by this reorganization.

Even though there may be some reassignments of key personnel, the number of people at Randolph and Maxwell AFBs will remain approximately the same.

For General Iosue, this will be his third key assignment with ATC. In 1975-76, as a brigadier general, he commanded the U.S. Air Force Recruiting Service here. After he was promoted to major general, he took command of the Air Force Military training Center at Lackland AFB.

General Iosue was promoted to lieutenant general on April 1, 1979, at which time he left Lackland for his present assignment in Washington.

T-birds tap Hamilton for team



Sgt. Randy L. Hamilton, a San Antonio native and Reese job controller for aircraft maintenance, arrived here just short of four years ago, and is now within a week of joining the Air Force's aerial demonstration team, the Thunderbirds.

Sergeant Hamilton and his parents are excited about the opportunity. Expected gains from the assignment: "lots of travel and professionalism," said Sergeant Hamilton.

Gurges you to take the initiative

The reduction of fraud and inefficiency in all federal programs is a major commitment and priority of President Ronald Reagan. The Department of Defense has instituted committees, hot lines and awareness programs to help deal with these problems—but what does all this mean to you and me?

First and **foremost**, lack of effort on our part regarding this effort may eventually result in our finding ourselves in a society less free than the one we now enjoy because we may waste so many resources that the pie is not big enough to purchase the high-cost technology needed to defend our way of life. We can get so complacent about our work routine that even if we recognize fraud or waste we just don't want to "waste" our time getting involved to correct these abuses. Let me give you an example of concern and you will see that these savings really affect us all.

"A bench stock NCOIC ordered pitot tube covers at \$9.60 apiece. They were placed on back-order for 60 days. By the time the covers arrived, the price had risen to \$28 apiece. Local management was not responsive to the NCOIC's query concerning the price increase, so he called the hotline. An inquiry was conducted and it was determined that the stock number used on the requisition was for a Navy item rather than an Air Force item. The base in question was given the correct stock number and, as a result, covers are now ordered at a cost of 83 cents apiece. The base operation and maintenance fund realized a savings of approximately \$13,500 annually." As you can see, the hotline works, but what about your local shop procedures – why can we not discover and correct these issues locally? I ask 'U' all to take the initiative now; get involved, get concerned. The savings truly benefit us all.

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sonal reply may be made; however, neither are mandatory. Callers are urged to use the CARE Line only after all possible means to air complaints through the chain of command have been exhausted. The CARE Line Ext. 3273.

"I'D LIKE TO KNOW why there isn't a phone on the second and third floors of Dorm 420, when there are phones on all three floors of Dorm 320," stated a caller recently.

This topic was discussed in the CARE Line of the March 25 Roundup, where the answer was that "At one time, Dorm 420 had Class 'C' (on-base only) phones on each floor, but all of them were removed because of the cost of repairs resulting from vandalism."

In addition, and perhaps more important, is the upcoming renovation of Dorm 420, set for about mid-July, in which the entire building will be reconfigured with outside entrances. Upon completion of this renovation, a phone system compatible to the new dorms will be scheduled for installation.

WE HAD A RATHER LENGTHY CALL from someone who wanted to know, first, if the names of the Child Care Center Advisory Committee aren't published somewhere so everyone can know who the members are and have some other point of contact than the center director or the CARE Line.

Second, the caller was concerned about a recent CARE Line call we had that dealt with the smell of dirty diapers at the center.

Finally, she asked about the rules pertaining to parents visiting, picking up or dropping off their children at the center. She said she's heard that sometimes the parents aren't allowed to pick up their children in the rooms, but then that at other times parents are "wandering in and out of the rooms and everything else."

To begin: Advisory committee minutes are posted on the Parent Bulletin Board at the center; member names are included in the mintues. However, since the committee isn't an oversight or regulatory body, it can only advise the Morale, Welfare and Recreation staff on operating policies. The center director and the MWR chief are available to answer any questions. (See the "Family News" section for a list of present advisory board members.)

As far as the diaper problem is concerned, the center did have a problem with the washer and dryer recently, and the odor may have originated from some standing water in the washer. We've bought new machines to take care of that problem. Also, it's unlikely that mildew was the culprit in that instance because the center cleans its bedding, etc., too frequently for mildew to occur.

A MOTORCYCLIST SCHEDULED for the MOST II course ran into a hangup when he was also scheduled for NCO Leadership School at the same time. He knew that he would need an extension of his temporary license to continue to ride his bike on base and that the base commander is the person to grant these extensions. This was okay except for the fact that he wasn't sure if, by being in leadership school, he'd be able to get away for enough time to get his extension. He therefore thought the security police should arrange his extension.

Last year, we established the policy that the security police would grant no extensions of the temporary motorcycle passes for personnel who didn't complete Traffic Safety Course VII and MOST II when scheduled, unless the base commander approved such an extension. We felt this policy was necessary in light of the large number of people abusing the temporary motorcycle privilege by not showing up for scheduled motorcycle safety courses. All this was explained to this caller a couple of weeks ago.

The problem was that the caller believed that Pass and **Reese Births**

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Registration Section should get his extension approved, but that's not the way the program works. Each person must secure his or her own extension.

Incidentally, the caller was granted his extension to expire after he completes leadership school.

AND, SPEAKING OF MOST II, another caller asked why the gate guards check riders' MOST II cards day after day, even though the guards know the riders have their cards. He feels this defeats the purpose of the MOST II stickers.

We're doing this to identify those people operating a borrowed or rented motorcycle and those who have purchased a bike with a sticker already on it. The system is working, too, because we've found and cited several individuals for operating motorcycles illegally. By the way, we're not checking the same people every day.

"I'D LIKE TO KNOW WHY they took down the clocks from the chow hall," questioned a recent caller. He also wondered about a change in the "nosmoking" areas.

The dining hall clocks were taken down because of the renovation of the air conditioning system. We've since replaced these with two new clocks.

Also, we're required to set aside 10 percent of the dining hall area for non-smokers. We've set aside 12 of our 50 tables for non-smokers, six on each side.


A MILITARY MEMBER soon to be assigned overseas wonders why those of us in uniform can't get free passports through the Air Force or, at least, discounts on those we get through normal channels.

The only free passports issued through the Air Force are those issued to people whose overseas duties require them. This excludes just about everybody since military people assigned overseas on official orders normally don't require passports. Passport fees aren't adjustable, either, which rules out any discounts to military people. However, with the recent increase in fees has also come a doubling of the period of validity of a U.S. passport, from five to ten years. This helps make the investment in a passport a little more attractive.

Shipping a POV overseas not required

"Are you shipping a privately owned vehicle overseas to your next duty station?'

A related misconception that can and should be dispelled by CONUS TMO is that a military member must ship a private vehicle overseas in order to have an entitlement to ship a POV back to the CONUS upon completion of the overseas assignment. This misunderstanding contributes to the growing problem of "junkers" being shipped overseas and subsequently abandoned in the port. Clear, concise response to your questions is imperative and a goal for the Traffic Management Office here.

Also any POV being imported into the CONUS must meet the standards in effect for the year of manufacture, as evidenced by the manufacturer's certificate on the date plate of the vehicle being imported. POVs (including motorcycles and mopeds) not meeting standards will not be released by United States Customs without the member being required to post a bond. The bond is based on the value of the vehicle plus estimated duty charges. After posting of the bond, the member will then have only 120 days in which to submit evidence that the vehicle has been brought into conformity. If acceptable evidence is not submitted within the specified time, the member will be subject to forfeiture of the bond, and the vehicle will have to be exported or disposed of, which could double or triple the cost of the POV. Members are advised that the one-time waiver being granted by the Environmental Protection Agency for vehicles not in compliance with emission control standards is not, repeat not, to be considered as a waiver for Department of Transportation safety standards. There is no waiver for compliance with safety standards.

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





POW-MIA Day '83 at Reese









Several Lubbock area former prisoners-of-war and many families of the area's servicemen listed as missing-in-action were here April 13 for the special POW-MIA retreat ceremony.

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
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AF uniforms get names Reese honors secretaries

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)-The guesswork has been taken out of what to call the different uniform combinations.

According to manpower and personnel officials at Randolph, all numerical references to uniform combinations are being dropped. A simpler, easier to understand description will be used instead.

The changes are now in effect, personnel officials said, and will be included in a revision to Air Force Regulation 35-10.

"Service dress" will be the new name for the men's combination 1 and the women's combination 1 and 1A.

•"Light blue shirt with long sleeves" and "light blue blouse with long sleeves" are the new terms for men's combination 2 and the previously unnamed women's combination.

•"Light blue shirt with short sleeves" and "light blue blouse with short sleeves" will be used instead of the previous men's combinations 2A, 4 and 4A and women's combinations 2 and 2A. The men's uniform should specify "with or without epaulets" and "with or without tie.

•The "dark blue shirt" is the new name for men's combination 3. •Women's combinations 5 and 5A will be known as the "maternity smock.'

•The new name for the subdued work or field utility uniform is now simply "fatigues." It should be specified whether the fatigues are "work" or "field."

•The term for formal evening dress has been shortened to "formal dress.

•There is no change in the use of the term "mess dress."

•Semiformal dress, which is worn by enlisted personnel, has no change.

•The former informal uniforms-white or black-will now be known as "ceremonial dress."






NCO Leadership School Class 83-E will be honored April 29 at the Enlisted Open Mess during a special graduation banquet beginning at 6:30 p.m.


