Reese plans Mini-Open House

Reese will celebrate Armed Forces Week, Sunday through May 21, with a Mini-Open House May 20.

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The Mini-Open House is being sponsored in conjunction with the graduation of Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 83-05 in the base theater at 10 a.m. and Tactical Air Command Career Day at Reese. The pilot training graduation is open to the public, but seating in the base theater is limited and preference will be given to families and friends of the graduates.

About a dozen Tactical Air, Command aircraft will be on static display on the Reese flightline and open for the general public to visit during the hours of 1-4 p.m.

The static display aircraft will include some of the Air Force's latest fighter aircraft such as the F-15 "Eagle", the F-16 "Fighting Falcon", and the A-10 "Thunderbolt" and some "old-timers" such as the A-7, the RF-4 and F-4 "Phantom". Also on display will be the F-111D, the O-2, OV-10, OA-37, the T-33, an AT-38 and Reese's own T-37 and T-38.

The Mini-Open House format was adopted by Reese of-

ficials when the 1983 schedule for the Thunderbirds, the U.S. Air Force's crowd pleasing Aerial Demonstration Team was announced and Reese was not on the schedule. There will be no flying activities during the Mini-Open House, but visitors will be able to visit the static display aircraft up close.

Reese will sponsor a second Mini-Open House on September 30, 1983, in conjunction with Undergraduate Pilot Training Career Day. That event will also feature aircraft from the Tactical Air Command, but with the addition of as many as two dozen other multi-engine aircraft from the Military Airlift and Strategic Air Commands.

Although Reese Air Force Base, Texas, is not one of the bases scheduled to host a Thunderbird aerial demonstration, the Public Affairs Office has received many calls for information about their 1983 schedule.

This is the first year that the Thunderbirds will be flying the F-16, the Air Force's newest fighter aircraft. Due to the great interest in the Thunderbirds, the following

AF Aid Society accepts applications for school

The Air Force Aid Society is accepting applications for guaranteed student loans for the 1983-84 academic year for undergraduate, graduate and advanced technical training. Application forms may be obtained from Air Force Aid Society Sections and Education offices here, or by contacting AFAS National Headquarters, 1735 N. Lynn St., #202, Arlington, VA 22209, (202) 696-5238. From military installations calls may be made to Autovon 226-5238.

The society sponsors Guaranteed student Loans under 2 programs. The General George S. Brown Senior Student Loan Program is available to active duty members, retirees, reservists, spouses and selected categories of individuals working toward commissioning in the Air Force. The General Henry H. Arnold Student Loan Program is available to children of Air Force members. Each program offers loans to cover educational costs, including tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, personal needs and transportation.

The minimum loan under these programs is \$500. The annual loan limits are:

\$1,250 for an undergraduate

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undergraduate student and \$25,000 for a graduate student. The aggregate amount for graduate students includes outstanding amounts which the student borrowed as an undergraduate.

Loan repayment begins after a six-month grace period following the student's graduation or termination of studies. Interest on the loan is paid by the government on behalf of the student until loan repayment starts. Currently, the interest rate for all new borrowers is 9 percent. It is probable that this will drop to 8 percent in October 1983. Interest rates for those with prior loans remains the same as for their earlier loans. There is also a 5 percent origination fee that is deducted from the loan proceeds prior to the student's receipt of the loan check.

Under federal rules, eligibility is based on need. When the student's family has an adjusted gross income of less than \$30,000, the student is automatically eligible for loans to cover the cost of education up to the annual loan limits. Where the family's adjusted gross income is greater than \$30,000 an expected family contribution is calculated by the school financial and officer; and tribution is the amount of the • \$2,500 for a full-time loan. AFAS officials encourage interested students-regardless of financial position-to apply and discuss their eligibility with the school's financial aid officer.

Arnold applicants must be enrolled as full-time students and Brown applicants must be enrolled on at least a half-time basis. The institution must be approved by the U.S. Department of Education.

Aggregate or accumulated loan limits are \$12,500 for an check.

AFAS officials expect many applications and advise candidates to submit completed applications as soon as possible. Although the processing time varies, applicants should expect to wait at least 12-14 weeks from the date of application approval by AFAS headquarters to receipt of their first



Supervisors, can you pass?

As a Social Actions officer, I have found that the most repeated questions I answer come from supervisors who want to know what to look for in their personnel concerning alcohol and drug abuse.

There is no specific signal that flashes like a neon light when drug or alcohol abuse is involved. We are all individuals who react differently to various stresses, pressures and daily occurences. One person abusing a substance might deteriorate into a sub-standard performer who is constantly in trouble, while another person might show few if any indicators.

This is where your role as a supervisor becomes critial. You must know your people. Maintaining only a superficial relationship with your workers can affect you, your personnel and ultimately the mission itself.

The following quiz is provided for you to use as a general reference when you suspect alcohol or drug abuse. It is by no means to serve as the final authority for you to determine if a substance is involved or as a judgment against a worker. It is intended for you to use as a tool; a point at which you can start with some specific questions. Remember, too, that it doesn't include all indicators of a substance abuse problem. It would be impossible to list them all since we are all individuals and behave differently.

If you answered yes to any of the questions it's time to sit down and have a talk with this person. The problem could be simple and easily solved in your discussion. It is your job to go forward and confront. Workers will not always come to you with their problems.

Or, it could be an indicator of a substance-abuse problem. If you feel this is the case discuss the matter with your supervisor or unit commander. They can help make the final determination if Social Actions should become involved.

If you answered no to all of the questions do not be fooled into thinking that all is well. These questions are a reference and not an all-inclusive list of what might indicate a substance abuse problem. Use your own knowledge of the situation and ask some of your own questions.

Finally, if you answered I don't know to any of the questions you should sit down and have a talk with yourself. You're definitely getting shortchanged . . . and so are those you supervise.

National Transportation Week, Monday through May 20, the 64th Transportation Division will sponsor several events to make everyone more aware of the transportation mission.

The security police will pay close attention to each driver's record as they check their citations against those listed on each of the records at the base drivers' school to identify those individuals with bad driving

In conjunction with the increased emphasis on transpottation, the Traffic Management Office has provided the following PCS checklist to help those involved in a PCS move make it more easily.

□ Arrange an early appointment with your transportation office for a thorough counseling on rights, privileges, entitlements, and moving or storage re-

□ Go through the house from attic to basement-even the garage. Itemize needed items and those that can be discarded. Remember, you pay the packing and transportation costs of household goods in excess of your weight allowance.

□ Send out items for cleaning, e.g., rugs, carpets, draperies, and similar items. You might want to consider a contractor for general house-cleaning services.

Arrange to ship, take them to you for the carrier to find with you, or dispose of pets, plants, and perishables. The household goods carrier will not ship these items.

□ Assemble valuables such as cash, jewelry, and items from safe deposit boxes. These should be carried along with personal records. Separate these from household goods so the packers will not accidently pack them.

□ Obtain all family personal records such as medical, dental, school, birth, marriage, and other important documents that may be needed at the next duty station. Don't forget PCS orders, ticket reservations, travelers' checks, passports, and checkbooks. Packers have been known to pack these items, and it could be costly

them.

□ Call the local moving agent. Obtain the telephone number from the transportation office. and make arrangements for a premove survey prior to packing and pickup dates.

□ Complete change-of-address notices and mail them. Notify the local post office of your new address.

□ Close out local charge accounts, utilities, and other services.

Assignments for first-assignment instructor pilots

The fiscal 1984 block of aircraft for first-assignment instructor pilots has been released. The tentative dates for the FAIP-Other Board are:

May 25-26 with a PCS date in October-December 1983. The first week in September with a PCS date in January-March 1984.

The first week in December with a PCS date in April-June 1984.

The first week in March 1984 with a PCS date in July-September 1984.

The following block of aircraft are available for fiscal 1984 assignments: F-16 (21), F-15 (30), A-10 (17), F-4 (16), FB-111 (4), B-52 (9), KCC-135 (35), EC-135 (2), C-9 (7), C-141 (17), C-5 (55), C-140 (1), F-111 (1), EF-111 (5), RF-4 (15), E3A (8), Trainer (50), C-130 (41) and Helo (10).

All officers should be sure they have a current Air Force Form 90 that reflects their preferences. The updated AF form should be done at least 30 days prior to their board date.

Unfilled retraining objectives in shortage skills and the anticipation that airmen with a fiscal 1983 date of separation currently on the waiting list will not be able to reenlist in their present skills has led to temporary changes in retraining policy for first-term airmen in Career Job Reservation Waiting List Skills whose DOS is Sept. 30 or earlier say Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center officials at Randolph AFB, Texas.

There are approximately 350 shortage-skill technical school retraining seats yet to be filled for fiscal 1983. Retraining applications for those class seats will be filled on a first come, first served basis. Once the seats are filled retraining opportunity for these airmen will be over and it is highly probable that those without an approved retraining CJR will be separated.


Volunteen program seeks new applicants



Rabies on the rise

The National Society for Medical Research Bulletin reports that documented animal rabies cases in the United States have more than doubled over the last three years with total cases in 1981 numbering 7,211. Since January alone, 12 animal rabies cases have been documented in the Midland, Texas area.

Domestic animals accounted for only 15 percent of the 1981 rabies cases; the remaining 85 percent were cases of rabies in wild animals, with bats and skunks accounting for more than half of the cases.



Children should be warned never to approach any wild or stray animal, no matter how "cute', especially one that is acting strangely—showing no fear of humans is often a symptom of animal rabies.







Eye safety first!

Some 40 million Americans now play racquet sports-tennis, racquetball, squash, paddleball. In some of these sports the ball can come hurtling toward the eye at 140 miles per hour. Not surprisingly, then, these sports result in an estimated 70,000 eye injuries annually. Your best bet: Wear some kind of protective goggles.

"Without these goggles, available at athletic shops, or impactresistant eyeglasses mounted in a flexible sports frame, one is risking all kinds of eye injuries—even blindness," says professor of ophthalmology Ronald Burde at the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis.

An ideal eye guard with strong, lightweight polycarbonate lenses is available, says Burde. It costs about \$40 for a nonprescription lens. He cautions players to avoid the chaper eye guards that cover only part of
