DOD adopts tougher DWI policy

In a recent memorandum to the secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force, the Secretary of Defense stated that "any service member, dependent, or civilian employee convicted of driving while intoxicated (DWI) by civil court, court-martial, or punished under Article 15, of the UCMJ, will be prohibited from operating a private motor vehicle on a military installation or facility for a minimum of one year." As part of the education effort, "first time offenders will complete an alcohol education program as a prerequisite to re-instatement of base driving privileges."

The authority for this position is found at AFR 124-14, part 4-5b, which lists four specific alcohol and drug enforcement counter-measures including "denial of installation driving privileges to personnel whose use of alcohol or other drugs

demonstrably jeopardizes their capacity to operate a motor vehicle safely."

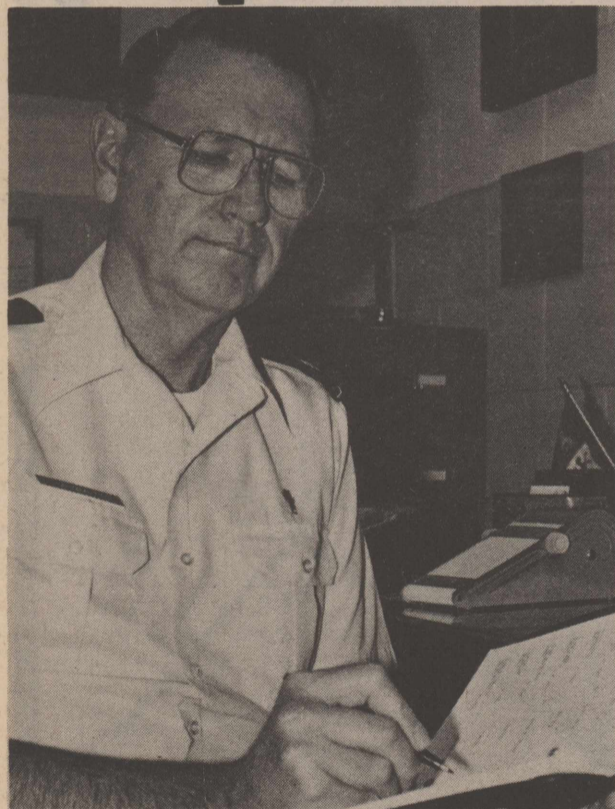
This very tough approach emerges as part of a growing national consensus on DWI offenses, including demands for action from citizen groups. The Congress, and most state legislatures, are replying with tough, comprehensive laws. As for the Air Force, our goal is to reduce DWI injuries and deaths among Air Force personnel as much as possible.

During this first of the summer's three-day holidays, this is an appropriate time to keep the secretary's statement in mind. Keep your weekend drinking to a minimum. Visit the Olympic Academy at Texas Tech or the NAIA College Baseball World Series at Lubbock Christian College where we have Air Force Bands, Color Guards, and Navy Parachute Demonstration teams performing. Enjoy your weekend. Don't drink and drive at the same time. Get back to work safely and healthy on Tuesday morning.

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I RECEIVED MANY CALLS concerning the base siren system going off accidentally earlier this spring and I'm well aware of the results that these accidental activations caused. We were lucky that these incidents occurred during periods of relatively stable weather. Because of the importance of the base siren system, and it's effects on the base community, an explanation of the system is necessary. The base siren system is more complex than most people realize. This is due to the fact that the system was developed in stages with different triggering points and sirens added as necessary. Two work orders are now in progress to modify and upgrade the reliability of the siren system. Another factor complicating the system is the use of telephone lines to transmit the signal. This introduces the possibility of a malfunction in the telephone system setting off the sirens. Also, stray current from the base power network could affect the telephone system and trigger the siren. The base civil engineers checked out the siren system after each accidental alarm and found it to be working satisfac-

torily. The experts down at civil engineering now believe that the problems in the system have been resolved. Apologies are in order for these accidental alarms and I urge everyone not to become complacent because of them. We have been extremely lucky so far this spring and have not had much severe weather, but we are still in the thunderstorm season, so be cautious and observe all weather warning systems. **AIR CONDITIONERS WERE THE SUBJECT** of another call. A person commented that his air conditioner in base housing was not turned on when some of his neighbors' were. Due to the fact that we are experimenting with doing away with the no heat/no cool period at Reese, there was some confusion as to when the air conditioners in family housing were to be turned on. The housing maintenance contractor is now in the process of inspecting and starting up all units in the housing area. **AN NCO CALLED IN** to find out why his family was "bumped" from transit quarters

by TDY personnel prior to his departing PCS from the base. At the time of his CARE Line call, the base did not have a designated transit lodging facility and people department the base were allowed to use the VOQ and VAQ on a "space available" basis if the rooms were not needed by TDY personnel. Hopefully this problem has been eliminated with the opening of our new temporary lodging facility. This 25-room facility is available for families coming to and departing from the base. Incoming families can use the facility for up to 30 days and members and their families departing the base can stay for up to seven days. **A CIVILIAN EMPLOYEE** called in recently to ask why he couldn't have his vehicle inspected for a state inspection sticker at the base service station. At the time, exchange employees at the service station said that the inspections could only be done for people authorized to use exchange services. After discussions with the Texas Department of Public Safety, clarifications to the inspection policy were made. All vehicles bearing a Reese registration sticker may be inspected at the base service station. If the vehicle fails the inspection and must have repairs, civilians not authorized exchange privileges must have their vehicle repaired off base. They can then return within 15 days to have their vehicle inspected free of charge. **PERSONAL CALLS AT THE HOSPITAL** were the subject of another call. A male patient at the hospital felt that patients should not be made to wait while hospital personnel were making personal telephone calls. I regret any inconvenience the person might have had due to his wait. All hospital personnel have been instructed to keep personal telephone calls to those of an emergency nature. As a reminder, the hospital has a Patient Affairs representative that may be contacted if you feel you are getting less than satisfactory service at the hospital. **KUDOS TO AVERY GRIFFIN** of the Records Section in the CBPO. A caller recently had his records reviewed and discovered some mistakes in them. Griffin did an outstanding job in assisting the individual in correcting his records. Thanks for the super job. **FINALLY, MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND** is upon us and with it comes the long awaited three day break. Reese units will be appearing at two local events on Monday. The first will be the opening ceremonies of the Olympic Academy VII at the Texas Tech track field at 4:30 p.m. and the second will be the opening ceremonies of the NAIA World Series at the Lubbock Christian College baseball stadium at 7 p.m. The Air Force Band of the West and the U.S. Navy Leapfrogs parachute jump team will also be appearing at both ceremonies. I encourage everyone to visit both events. The Olympic Academy admission is free. There is a charge for the world series ball game at Lubbock Christian. I also want to urge everyone to enjoy the long weekend, but to enjoy it safely. Remember to use those safety belts, and don't drink and drive.

The high point in the general's career which he related to the new pilots was serving as the lunar pilot for the Apollo 16 mission—the fifth scientific expedition to inspect, survey and gather samples of the moon.

Col. James P. Ulm, deputy commander for operations, then presented 2nd Lts. Michael S. Fry, Michael E. O'Boyle, Stevens B. Peale and Gregory P.

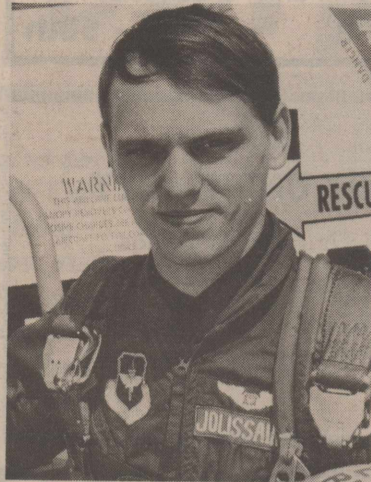
stage to accept the Flying Training Award. The new F-15 pilot topped his class honors as

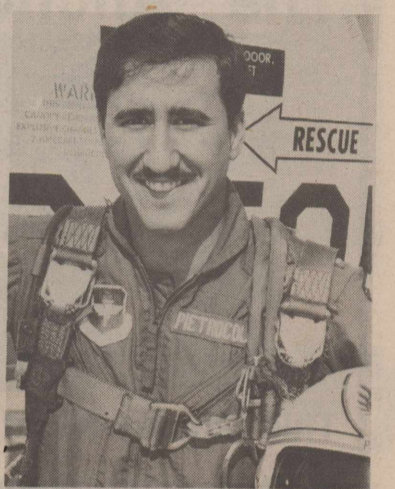

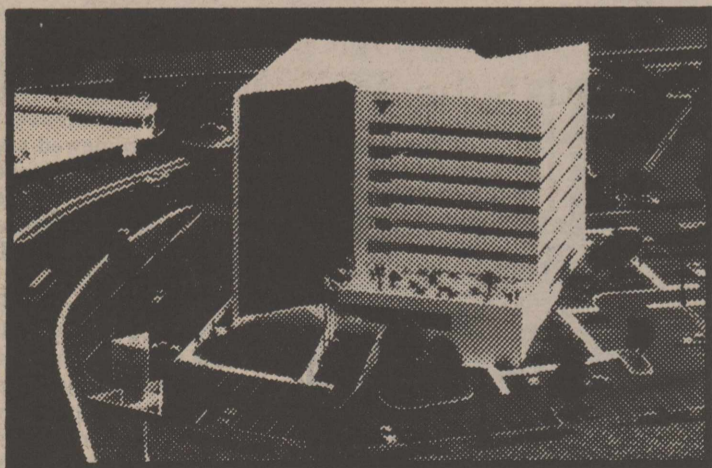

Military units and individuals will spend an active Memorial Day supporting two events of national scope that are being sponsored in the Lubbock community.

Activities start Monday afternoon at the Student Recreation Center at Texas Tech University where A1C Gene Bell will demonstrate the art of powerlifting between 2 and 3 p.m.

Airman Bell will demonstrate the squat, bench press, and deadlift events for powerlifters as part of the U.S. Olympic Academy VII that is sponsored by Texas Tech Monday through June 3.

Airman Bell is participating in the academy under the sponsorship of the Headquarters Air Training Command and the Reese Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division. He is the 1983 U.S. Air Force 165-pound class powerlifting champion. He is also the 1983 Interservice Powerlifting Champion in the 165-pound class and was named the Best Lifter at the Interservice Championships.

Airman Bell is assigned to Davis-Monthan AFB, Ariz., where he also reigns as the Arizona State 165-pound Powerlifting Champion. He will be competing in the Olympic trials starting June 4.

At the Texas Tech Student Recreation Center, Airman Bell will be joined by two proven Olympic athletes; Nancy Thies Marshall and Debbie Meyer Reyes. Thies Marshall competed in the 1972 Olympic Games as America's youngest (15 years old) gymnast ever. She will demonstrate her gymnastic routine from 1 - 2 p.m. From 3 - 4 p.m., Reyes will demonstrate the skills that enabled her to win three gold medals in Olympic swimming during the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City.

All demonstrations by the Olympic athletes at the Tech Rec Center are open to the public free of charge.

Monday at 4:30 p.m. the official Opening Ceremony for Olympic Academy VII will begin at Fuller Track Stadium on the Texas Tech campus just south of the Municipal Coliseum.

The 539th U.S. Air Force "Band of the West" from Lackland AFB, Texas, will begin the academy with a musical Prelude from 4:30 - 5 p.m.

The U.S. Navy Parachute West Demonstration Team (The Leapfrogs) will then perform a 15-minute parachute demonstration as they jump (weather permitting) from a C-130 two miles high above Lubbock into Fuller Stadium.

By 5:20 p.m., the Reese Color Guard will hold center stage as they present the National Colors while the 539th Band plays the National Anthem. The band will play for the parade of international flags and a procession by Olympic athletes.

Following welcoming comments by various local and Olympic dignitaries, the Olympic Academy VII Opening Ceremony will continue with performances by the Miss Lubbock Dancers, a series of gymnastics displays, the lighting of the Olympic Flame by Texas Tech track champion James Mayes, and the swearing of the Olympic Oath led by Jarvis Scott, Texas Tech Women's track coach and 1968 Olympian. The ceremony will conclude with a rhythmic gymnastics display.

The Olympic Academy VII Opening Ceremony is free and open to the public. The Olympic Academy itself will consist of a week-long series of academic and social activities. For more information on those events, contact

the Texas Tech Physical Sports and Recreation Department at 742-3371.

The 539th U.S. Air Force Band, the Reese Color Guard, and the U.S. Navy Leapfrogs are also scheduled to perform during the 7 p.m. Monday opening ceremony for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) National Baseball "World Series" Championship tournament at Lubbock Christian College's Chaparral Field.

The opening ceremony is scheduled to precede the featured game of the championship's first day between Lubbock Christian College and Southwestern University of Georgetown, Texas. That game is scheduled for an 8 p.m. start.

The Leapfrogs will begin the opening ceremony by jumping into Chaparral Stadium at about 7:15 p.m. They will carry the ball to be used during the opening ceremony's first pitch with them while demonstrating their parachuting skills.

Following the Leapfrogs arrival in the stadium, the 539th Band will play appropriate music while the Reese Color Guard, with the National Colors and the flags of the nine states with teams participating in the tournament, and the participating teams march onto the field. Prior to the National Anthem, Capt. Charles A. Geller, the Reese Catholic Chaplain, will present the invocation.

Admission to the two-game (5 and 8 p.m.) session of the world series that includes the opening ceremony is \$3 for military personnel with IDs. A tourney pass — good for all world series games — is available to military personnel for \$16 at the Chaparral Stadium ticket office.

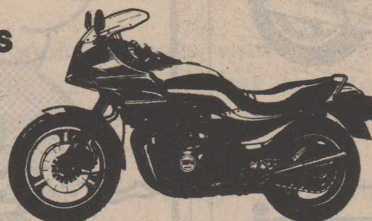
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Education keeps busy, supports students

THE GREAT SUZUKI PRICE BLOW-UP.

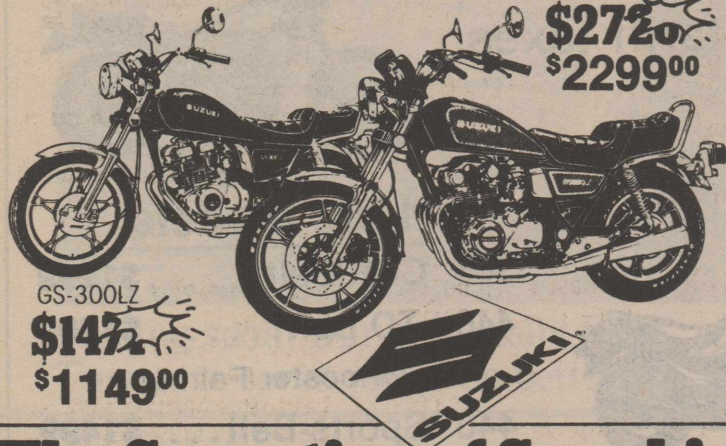


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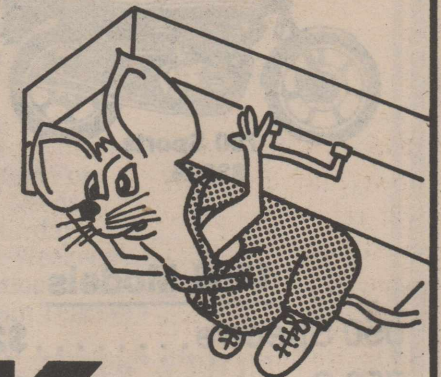
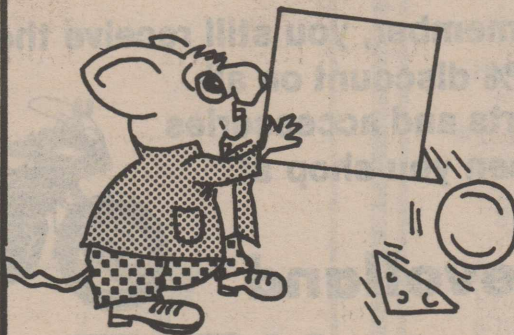
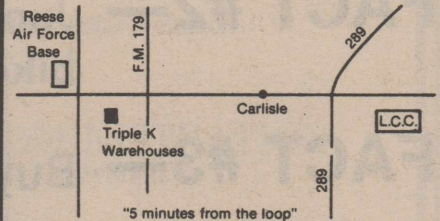
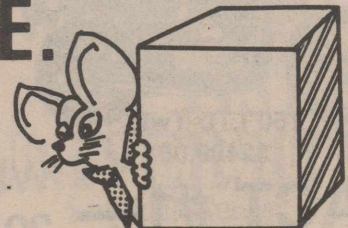

The Air Force is dependent upon computers to get its work done. With an inventory exceeding 2,000 owned or leased central processing computers, Air Force computer operations have become big business. These numbers do not include the many hundreds, if not thousands, of mini/micro or "small" computers that the Air Force is in the process of buying or renting.

Computers, as a tool, help us to process our payrolls, conserve and regulate our resources, calculate and analyze our budgets, control our weapons systems and perform many more functions. Virtually all Air Force activities and organizations are supported by and depend upon computer systems and products.

The bottom line is that Air Force computer systems help to defend our country. Unfortunately, many users of the computer systems are involved in activities which are in violation of U.S. laws. Computer crime is usually classified as a "white-collar" crime. We use the term "computer crime" instead of "computer fraud", because it is a term which includes all types of crimes involving a computer. Computer crime has been estimated, nation-

wide, to cost the country from \$300 million to \$3 billion annually.

With the increase in the number of computer systems in the Air Force, more people will be needed as operators, programmers, and users. Unfortunately, with the increase of computer users, we can also expect an increase in computer crime. AFOSI has established a specialized Computer Crime Investigative Assistance Program to help combat computer crime in the Air Force. Personnel selected for this program have received extensive training and have years of experience in the computer career field.

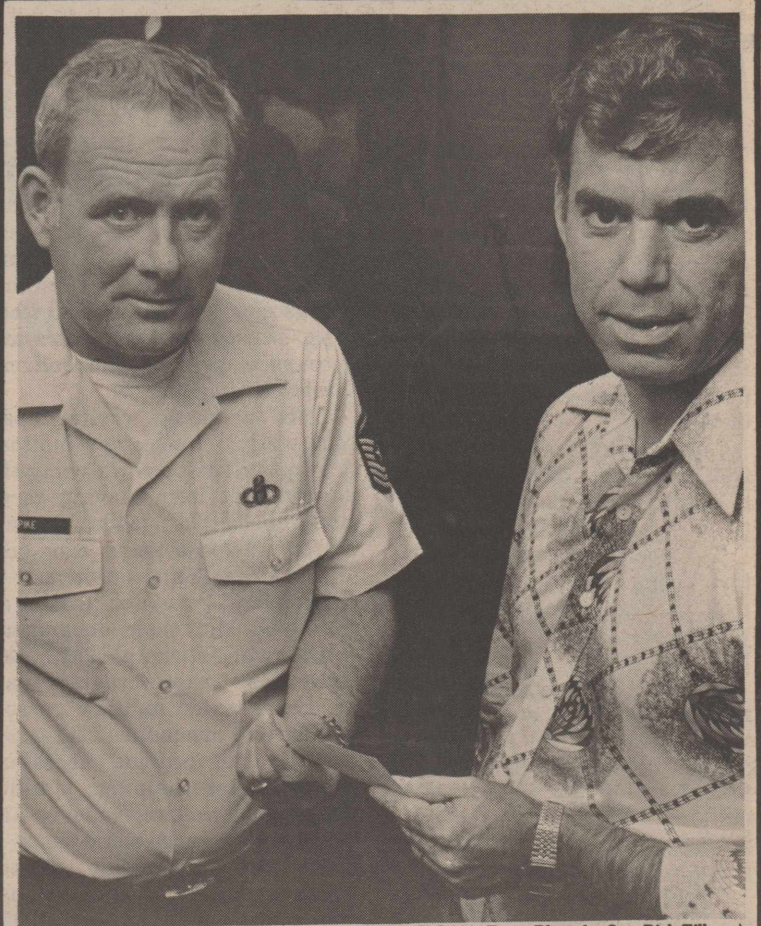
These individuals have been assigned specific geographical areas to provide AFOSI field elements with both the technical and general computer expertise necessary to successfully investigate and resolve computer-related crime. Since these specialized investigators have geographical or regional responsibilities they have been given the title of Regional Computer Crime Investigators (RCCIs).

There are currently eleven RCCIs in the program, with nine stationed in the continental United States, one in Hawaii for the Pacific area and one in Germany for the European area. Even though the RCCIs' primary duty

is in supporting criminal investigations, they also act as computer consultants and advisors to AFOSI and non-AFOSI activities. Our statistics on computer crime in the Air Force have shown that 80 percent of all persons involved in these crimes are authorized users of the computer systems. In addition, most of the major Air Force computer systems have been used to commit fraud, waste or abuse, or have been targets of criminal activity.

We have found that many of our AF computer systems have elaborate internal audit controls which help to reduce the opportunity for misuse, however, the best internal controls are only as good as the people who use them. The best deterrents to fraud, waste, and abuse are effective and practiced management controls, procedures and computer security awareness training for all personnel who have access to, or use, computer resources.

The RCCIs are available to provide awareness training on computer crime and what we all can do to deter it. 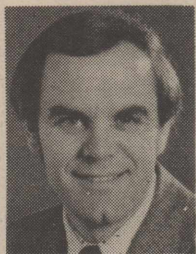

National Transportation Week 1983 is over now, but the service the 64th Transportation Division provides Reese may never slow down.

During the week, May 16-20, transportation officials worked hard to set up displays and events to honor their mission.

The open hood vehicle inspection performed by Col. John R. Hullender, base commander, was won by the Fuels Branch with an R9 refueler.

But what of transportation during the other 51 weeks of the year?

The Traffic Management Office, Building 26, is staffed by military and civilian employees performing a number of transportation related tasks.

There is the packing and crating section of TMO responsible for building boxes and crates for materials and cargo shipped anywhere in the free world.

Then there is the constant moving associated with the military way of life which can require a couple of TMO services. Military members and their dependents

getting ready for a permanent change of station move find things go a lot smoother when TMO schedules the packers and movers to pick up and deliver household goods.

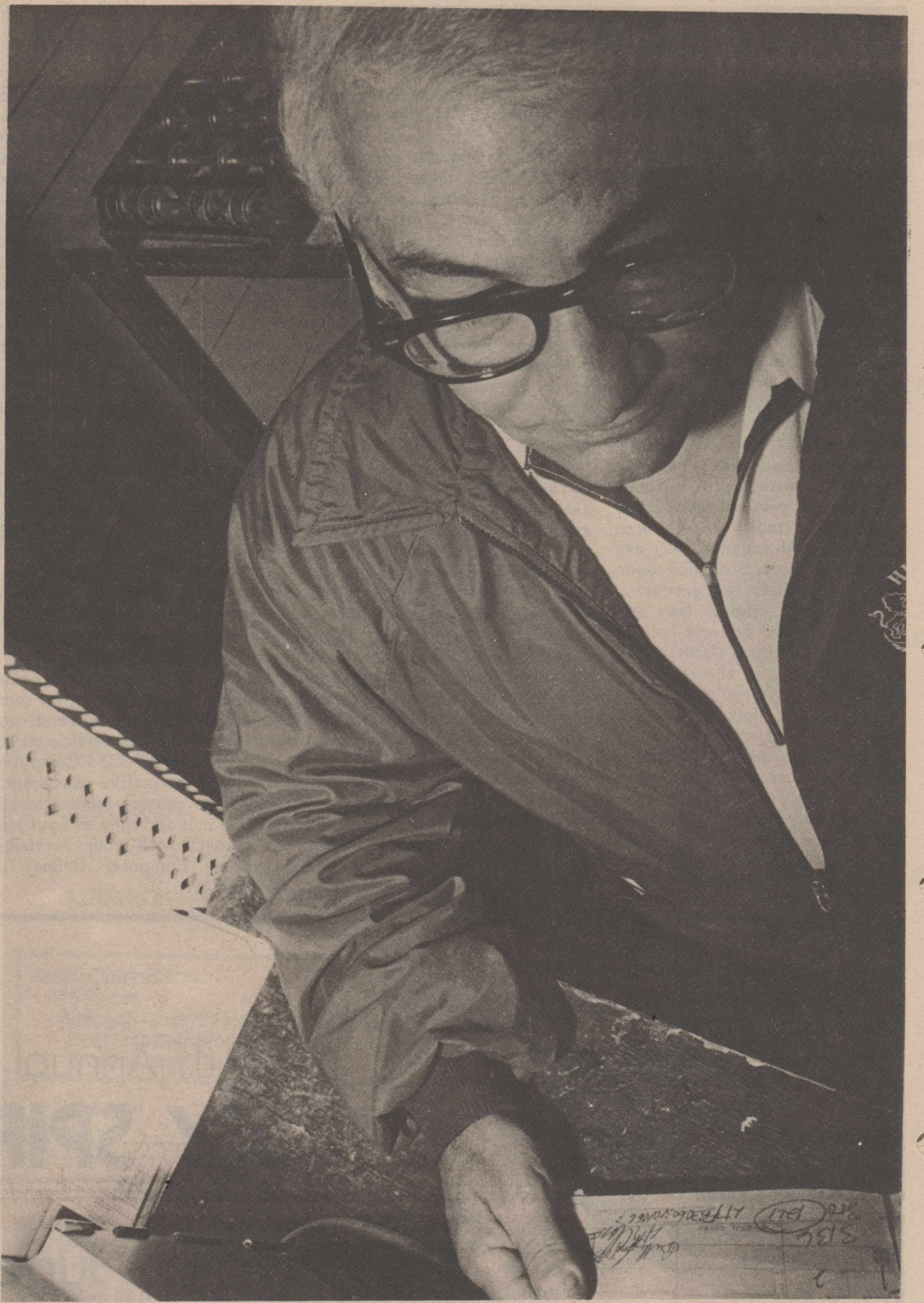
TMO personnel verify departure weights when a new military family arrives by reweighing the load. Aside from moving cargo and household goods around, TMO staff members can take down airline information and in minutes provide military members and their dependents with airline tickets. TMO also provides transportation arrangements for military personnel moving around on TDYs.

TMO can provide necessary services for helping families make "do-it-yourself" moves and save money at the same time.

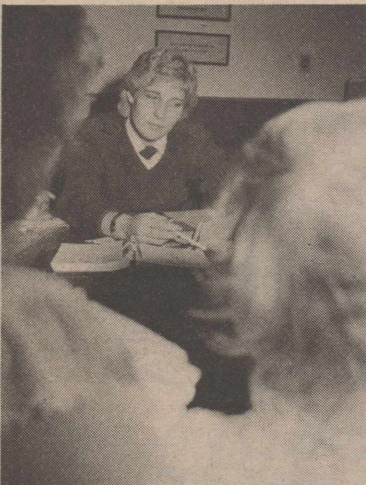
On the other side of the transportation division things run a little differently. TECOM, the firm contracted to handle Reese vehicle transportation needs, pretty well runs the show.

Except for the quality assurance evaluators, the vehicle operations area is all contract. To fulfill contract requirements

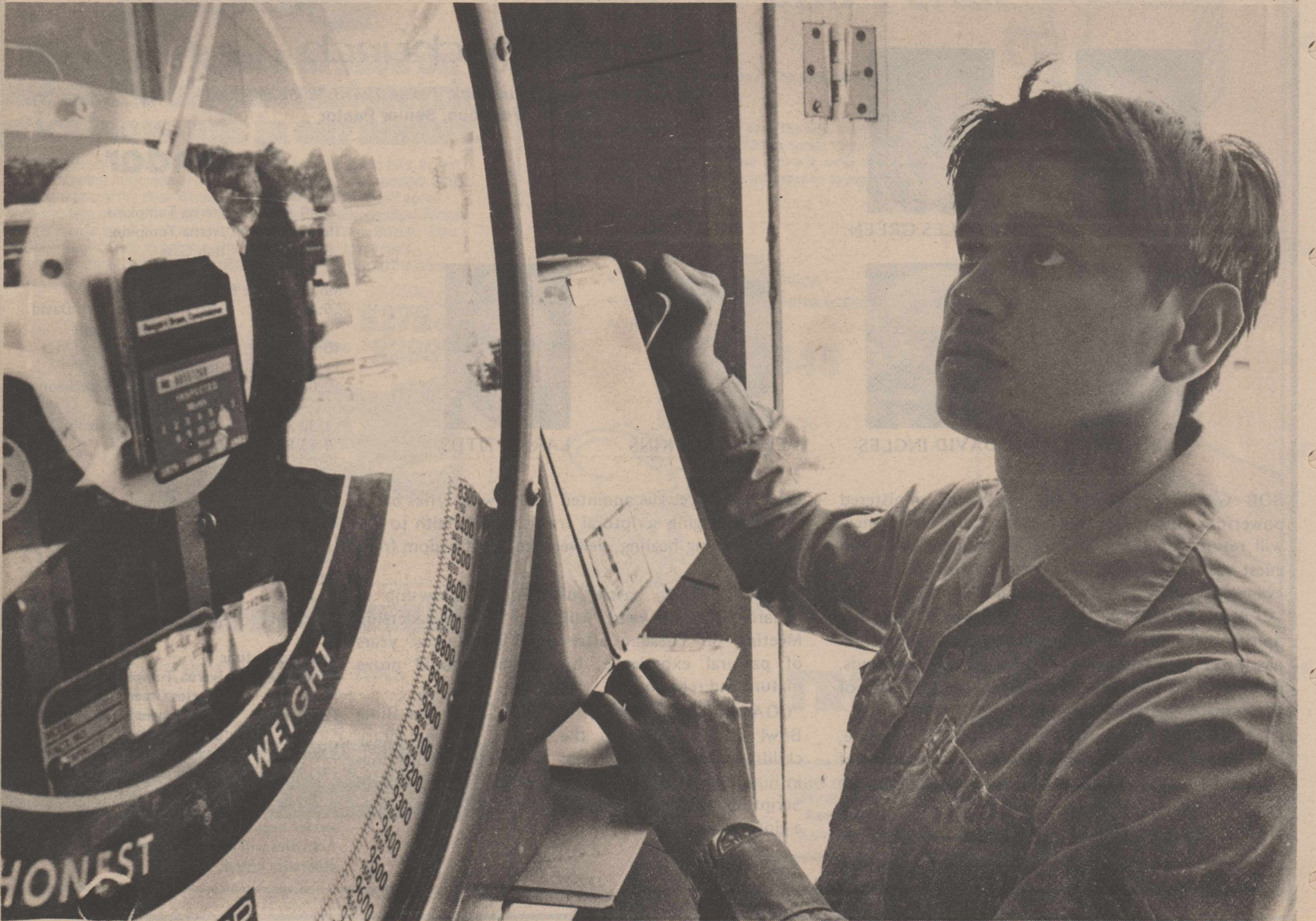

TECOM provides a drivers school for helping military members who are qualified to drive government vehicles. They also offer the base an on-base taxi service for official business.

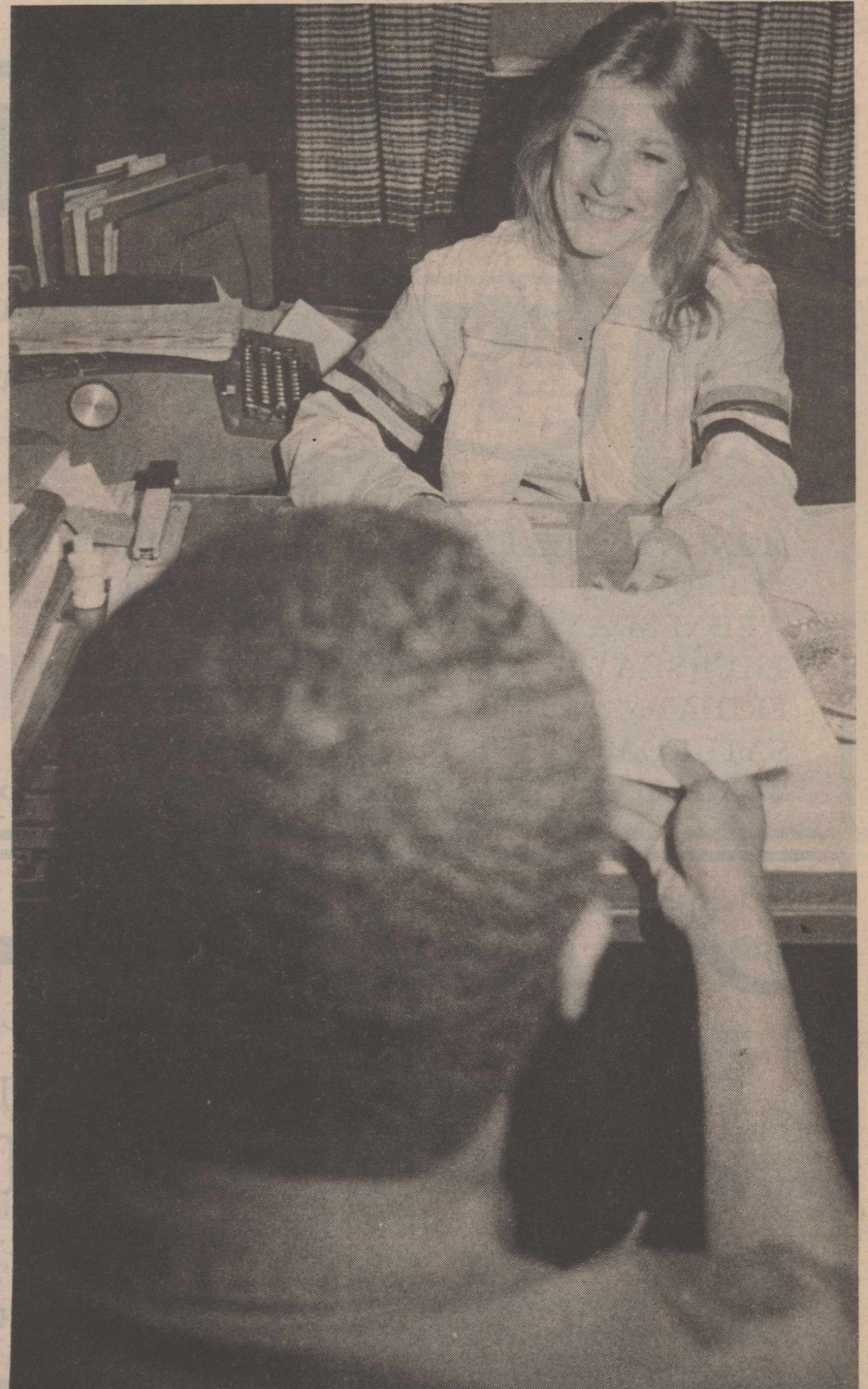
TECOM mechanics are responsible for maintaining not only the division's vehicle fleet, but also the flightline and street sweepers, the refueling trucks and the fire trucks too.

SUBARU recalls more than 84,000 unsafe cars

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has announced that Subaru of America, Inc., at the agency's urging, will conduct a safety recall campaign involving 84,253 model year 1980 vehicles to replace the seatback frame in the driver's position.

The federal safety agency said seatback frames in these vehicles have inadequate weld joints. When the welds break, the seatback can twist and bend rearward resulting in the potential for the driver to lose control of the vehicle.

The vehicles involved in the recall are the DL, GL, and GLF models which include hatchbacks, sedans, hardtops and stationwagons, as well as four-wheel drive vehicles.

Subaru will notify vehicle owners of record after it stocks its dealerships with new seatback frames. Repairs will be made at no cost to the owner.

Form can help rate household goods carriers

The following item is from TIG Brief, number 6, 1983, "You are an influential shipping customer."

You, the Air Force member, have influence. When your household goods are shipped at government expense, you can influence your household goods carriers participation in future government-sponsored business.

Document the type of service you receive on your move by completing the Customer Satisfaction Report (DD Form 1781). This form must be returned to the transportation officer within five days after the move is completed. If you fail to return the DD Form 1781 in a timely manner, the transporter may not be able to properly score the carrier on your estimate of loss or damage to your shipment. Remember, DD Form 1781 is used to rate the efficiency of the carrier. The estimate of damage shown on the form will have no bearing should you claim for loss or damage to your property. You are in a unique position. You can influence the quality of household goods service you and other Department of Defense members receive.

Use this influence. Help identify those carriers providing quality service and weed out those who consistently provide substandard service.

The three Lubbock high school seniors who have been selected to

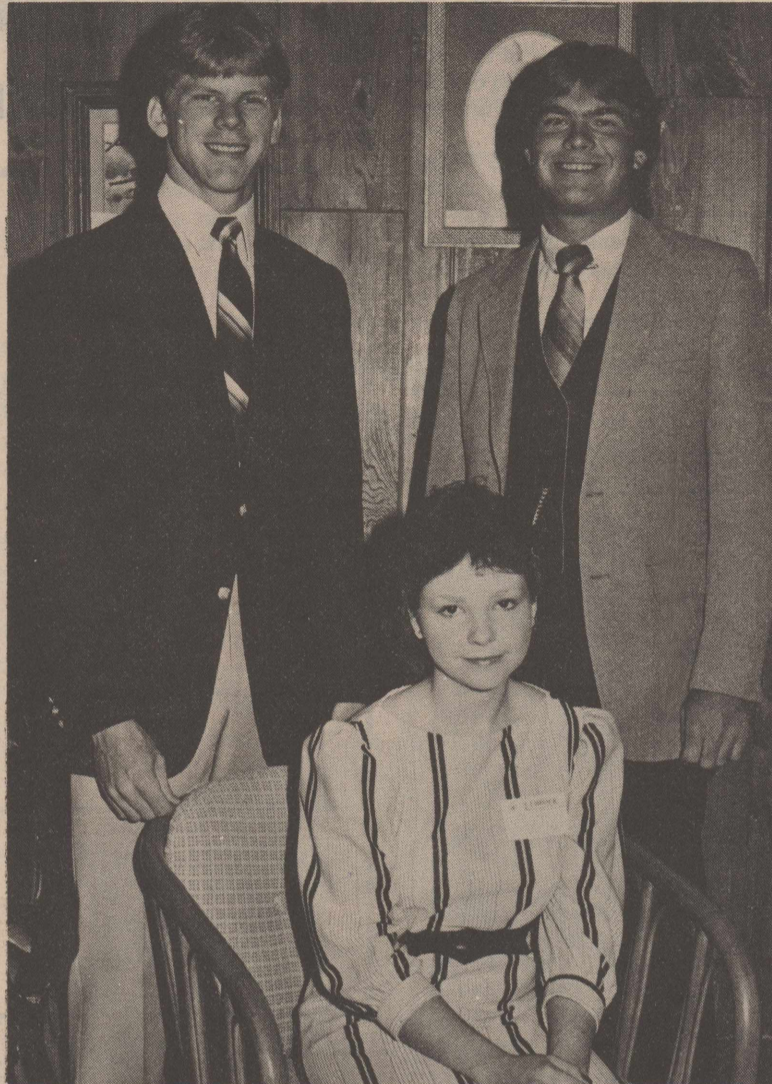
receive \$500 scholarships from the Reese Officers' Wives' Club were introduced at the May 12 OWC meeting.

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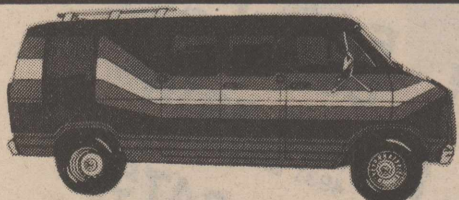

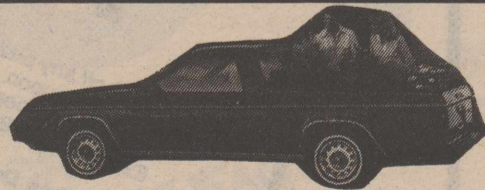

Studies show that certain physical conditions and living habits increase the risk of heart attack; and for everyone of these risks there is a practical step you can take to counteract it. All this adds up to a health program that can be followed by everyone in the family - children as well as adults. Children can benefit most of all, if they are trained from the start in eating and living patterns that may protect their hearts in adult life. Some of those patterns

and habits are listed:

Reduce saturated fat and cholesterol in the diet. Eat more poultry, fish and lean meats. Eat fewer eggs and use skim milk and skimmed milk products.

Count your calories - avoid excess weight. You must decrease your weekly calorie intake by 3500 calories to lose one pound. Food habits are formed in childhood, and overweight children tend to become overweight adults.

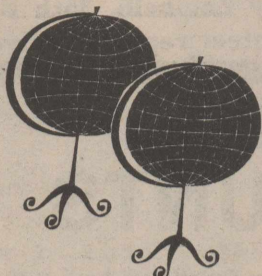
Control high blood pressure. If you have high blood pressure, you must treat it for life. Avoid sodium and take your medication.

Don't smoke. For those who give up the habit, the death rate declines almost to that of people who have never smoked. Set the example for your children.

Exercise regularly. Regular, moderate exercise is the key. Have regular medical checkups.

This is no sure thing and no guarantee that a heart attack can be prevented, but medical scientists say that reducing your risks will give you the best chance of avoiding a heart attack in the prime of life, and following the rules for risk reduction can mean good health and physical fitness for every member of the family.

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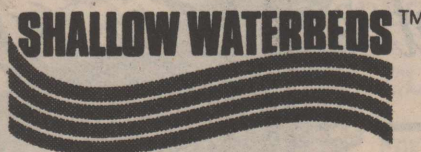

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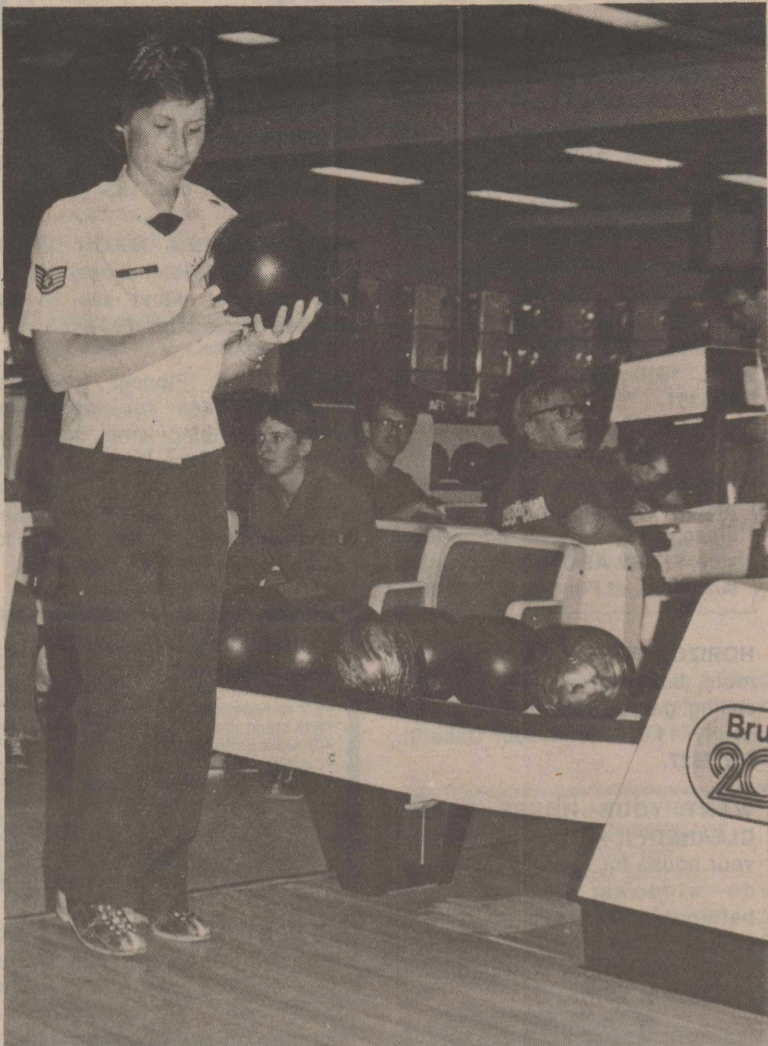


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Squadron fund rolls up a \$51 net
