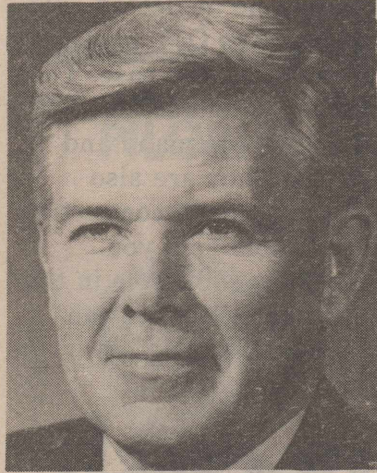

### General Hickey

The guest speaker at tonight's formal dining event is Maj. Gen. Thomas J. Hickey, deputy chief of staff, technical training, Headquarters Air Training Command, Randolph AFB, Texas.

General Hickey, who put on his second star only a week ago, began his Air Force career in 1956 after earning a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering through the ROTC program at Iowa State University, Ames.

A command pilot, the general

began primary pilot training at Bartow AFB, Fla., and in July 1958, after basic flight training at Goodfellow AFB, Texas, he received his wings. He spent the next few months at Randolph for KC-97 transition training before reporting to Westover AFB, Mass., for duty. The KC-97 was a propeller driven aerial refueling plane — the forerunner of the KC-135.

In August 1967 the general moved to Davis-Monthan AFB, Ariz., for F-4 combat crew training. After his training, he reported to the 366th Tactical Fighter Wing "Gunfighters" at Da Nang AB, South Vietnam, 480th Tactical Fighter Squadron as an aircraft commander. The squadron was moved to Phu Cat AB in April 1969. During his tenure in Southeast Asia, the general flew 220 combat missions — 63 of which were over North Vietnam.

His career lead him to the Personnel Plans Directorate, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel at Air Force Headquarters, Washington D.C., in July 1969.

In June 1974 General Hickey was assigned to the 27th TFW, Cannon AFB, N.M., as the assistant deputy commander for operations. Just over a year later he became the 27th's deputy commander for operations, but in April 1976 he gave up the position for that of the vice wing com-

mander at Cannon. Four months later he became the wing commander for the 27th.

The Iowa native was named deputy chief of staff for personnel for Tactical Air Command in November 1977. In June 1980, he became the deputy director of personnel programs, Office of the

Deputy Chief of Staff, Headquarters Air Force.

Just prior to his current assignment, the general received his first star (May 1981) and became the DCS, technical training, ATC, in July 1981.

He is married to the former JoAnn Davis of St. Louis. Father

of two boys, Tom Jr. and Christopher, he has been decorated with the Silver Star, Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with 13 oak leaf clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters and others.

## Reese joins campaign to increase seat belt usage

This summer the National Safety Council, in conjunction with civilian and military organizations, is asking the public to make a special effort to wear their safety belts.

"Make It Click - Buckle Up and Drive Defensively" is a national campaign in which volunteers across the country will be asking people to sign pledges promising to buckle the safety belts and put their children in child safety seats.

According to National Safety Council statistics, every year an estimated 1.8 million motor vehicle occupants are injured and more than 35,000 are killed in motor vehicle crashes.

Lt. Col. Darrel Phillip, chief, Wing Safety, says the national campaign will focus on the "101 critical days" from the Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. During this period more persons are injured and killed in motor vehicle crashes than at any other period of the year.

Colonel Phillip says a pledge to buckle-up is the first step toward commitment. "Our record indicates that over 95 percent of our people wear seat belts while driving on base. Our goal is to reach the remaining five percent. We hope that people will make seat belt usage a lifetime habit - on and off base."

The National Safety Council points out that about 12,000 of the 52,600 people killed in 1980 might have lived if they had been wearing safety belts or were protected by approved child safety seats.

# Editorials

## OJT — more than 'book learning'

According to the books, the Air Force On-the-Job-Training Program is "a systematic, reportable application of the craftsman-apprentice relationship, by which trainees acquire the job skill and knowledge to become skilled workers."

Throughout the Air Force, OJT is an essential and significant part of our integrated training program. It is a part of every unit's mission and requires the vigorous support of commanders and supervisors at all levels. Even though the responsibility to conduct OJT is delegated to specific individuals, the overall OJT program is of concern to everyone.

At Reese, we have enjoyed two and one-half years of exceptional success with our OJT program. The pass rate on career development courses has continually ranked above AF and Air Training Command

averages. This success, of course, can be attributed to each airman's individual concern. However, I also realize the personal attention each supervisor and trainer gives to the program. Supervisors realize the importance of having a team of skilled individuals available to accomplish the mission of the wing. Training provides that team.

Let's not forget that OJT is more than just "book learning." OJT is **Learning by doing**. It is concerned primarily with giving our trainees planned experiences that increase their skills. We must let them do the job, but not before we're sure they have the knowledge and skill required to do it successfully. Supervisors and trainers must explain, show, watch and help trainees do each job. If it's done to a supervisor's satisfaction, then and only then can trainees be turned loose on their own. Showing that you trust them to do a job, will not only increase their

job skills, but will instill a sense of pride in their being able to take part in the mission.

And last, let's not forget documentation. We cannot forget about crossing our t's and dotting our i's. In order to conduct an effective and efficient program, you must have a planned series of control documents for your level of operation. Training must be documented with a degree of uniformity to meet the immediate objectives of the unit. This responsibility cannot be neglected. To help you in this task, we have OJT managers assigned to every organization on base. They insure that your training is conducted in compliance with Air Force, command and organizational directives. They are also available to assist you in actually conducting on-the-job training. Let them help you.

Everyone on Reese plays some role in the OJT Program. Working together, we can continue to enjoy a successful program in the years ahead.

## Weather dampens quest for energy cash

Weather has always been a good topic for conversation in West Texas, and Fiscal 1983 has certainly provided its share of record breaking conversation pieces. Beginning with a record low 2 on Dec. 29, 1982, Reese experienced, for the next thirty-four days, the most severe weather in its history. On Jan. 3, Reese recorded a low of 1 and experienced below freezing temperatures for 25 of the 31 days in January. These temperatures, along with a record snowfall of 16.9 inches in a 24-hour period and 25.7 inches for one month caused Reese

to exceed its January facility energy goal by more than 25 percent. February, March and April continued the abnormally low temperature trend set in December and January, and has resulted in our losing much ground in our energy goals for Fiscal 1983.

The charts below show where Reese ranked at the end of April in the energy categories tracked by ATC. Motor vehicle fuel goals (MOGAS and diesel) remain zero growth from Fiscal 1980. While the facility goal is to use 15 percent less energy than the base year of Fiscal 1975.

As you can see by the charts, Reese has fallen from among the leaders in ATC in energy conservation. At -5.8 percent in facility energy, Reese must make up 9.2 percent in the next four months in order to make our goal of -15 percent. As I write this column today, May 31, we have set yet another temperature record for the Lubbock area with a recorded low of 43 degrees. Unfortunately, we cannot control the weather. We can, however, control our thermostat settings in our facilities and abide by the guidelines set by Air Force and ATC to conserve energy. We are continuing to upgrade our energy systems on the base with energy saving facility projects, but you, the individual energy users, are still the most important factor

in the energy conservation process. We are approaching the most critical portion of our energy year as the weather becomes hot and air conditioning must be used. Our current facility energy position is critical. We need your help. Become actively involved in energy conservation at Reese by making sure that your working and living areas maintain the prescribed 78 degrees temperature for the summer months. Let's take pride in once again making Reese a leader in energy conservation. Suggest ways to conserve through the suggestion program. Remember, **energy conservation** is up to you. No one else can do your part.

**CARE Line**

**TWO CALLS RECENTLY CAME IN** concerning the possible misuse of government vehicles. The first caller noticed a small Air Force pick-up truck in front of a local store where the driver was purchasing some personal items. As it turns out, this vehicle is used by the Housing Referral Office to visit various off-base housing areas and personnel using the vehicle for this purpose during all day trips, are allowed to stop at local establishments for lunch and break periods.

The second call involved a security police vehicle that was seen parked in the base housing area. Although the driver of the vehicle seemed to be visiting a resident of the housing area, the patrolman was actually dispatched to obtain needed information from an off-duty patrolman concerning some official actions.

In these two cases, investigations showed that both these vehicles were being used in a proper manner. I would like to compliment both the callers on their alertness for possible abuse of government vehicles. It is the responsibility of everyone here at Reese to ensure that government equipment is not misused. I encourage anyone who suspects a possible case of fraud, waste, or abuse to report

it to their supervisor or place a class to the CARE Line.

**ANOTHER CALLER WANTED TO KNOW** why the bowling center is not open later on the weekends. At the present time, there does not seem to be the demand to keep the bowling center open during the evenings, but the MWR Division is willing to keep the center open later if there are enough requests. Also, with the completion of the new snack bar and amusement center it is expected that the hours at the bowling center will be extended.

**ANOTHER CALLER WONDERED** why the library required a patron who participated in the paperback swap system to bring in a paperback book for exchange instead of just giving the paperback to people.

The paperback swap system is a tried and proven procedure in military libraries. With the investment of one paperback book, library patrons can have access to over 1,300 paperback books available in the library. The library will accept any paperback in reasonably good condition and does not require the paperback to be of equal value. On an average day, approximately 100 books are swapped. If the library just gave the

books out instead of requiring a swap, the total collection would be depleted in just two weeks.

**VETERINARY CARE ON BASE** was the subject of a recent call. A caller asked why the base veterinarian could not see her pet, which was ill. The caller said that she was directed to take her pet to a civilian veterinarian downtown.

I realize that this could be an inconvenience, but the practice of veterinary medicine by Air Force Veterinary Officers is severely limited by regulation. In fact, Congress has passed new legislation, which becomes effective October 7, that says no Air Force Veterinary Officer will be allowed to care for any animal. Currently the Veterinary Clinic is allowed three hours a week to care for pets until October. The services that are available are routine pet vaccinations, evaluation of skin problems and neutering of pets. All other pet care must be referred to a civilian veterinarian.

**A CALL CONCERNING THE HOUSING AREA** came in recently. The caller felt that it was a disgrace that the housing area has been allowed to disintegrate like it has.

I agree that the family housing area is showing its age after over 30 years of use by hundreds of families, but I do not feel that it has been allowed to disintegrate. The condition of the housing units depend on many factors, some of which are beyond our control. The extremes in temperature, low humidity and severe sand storms rapidly degrades the outside of the homes. The condition of the grounds in the housing area depends on the occupant who can make them pleasant or not.

Many people are involved in maintaining the housing area and they are doing a good job as reflected in the positive rating they received during the recent IG inspection. We can expect to see some improvements in the look of Reese Village with two projects that are planned to begin later this year. The first of these projects will be the installation of steel siding and additional insulation in all family housing units. The second project will be the repair and repainting of the carports through the housing area. Also, the civil engineers have identified 18 other housing projects and have submitted them to Headquarters ATC for funding.

# Housing to meet electric codes

The National Electric Code requires a minimum of 10 feet of space where electric cables enter a residence as a result it will be necessary for contractors to be working in the base housing area. The project should bring Reese up to code.

Residents with children are urged to keep them away from areas where work is being done and those with pets in their yards may be required to find new places for them while the work is being done.

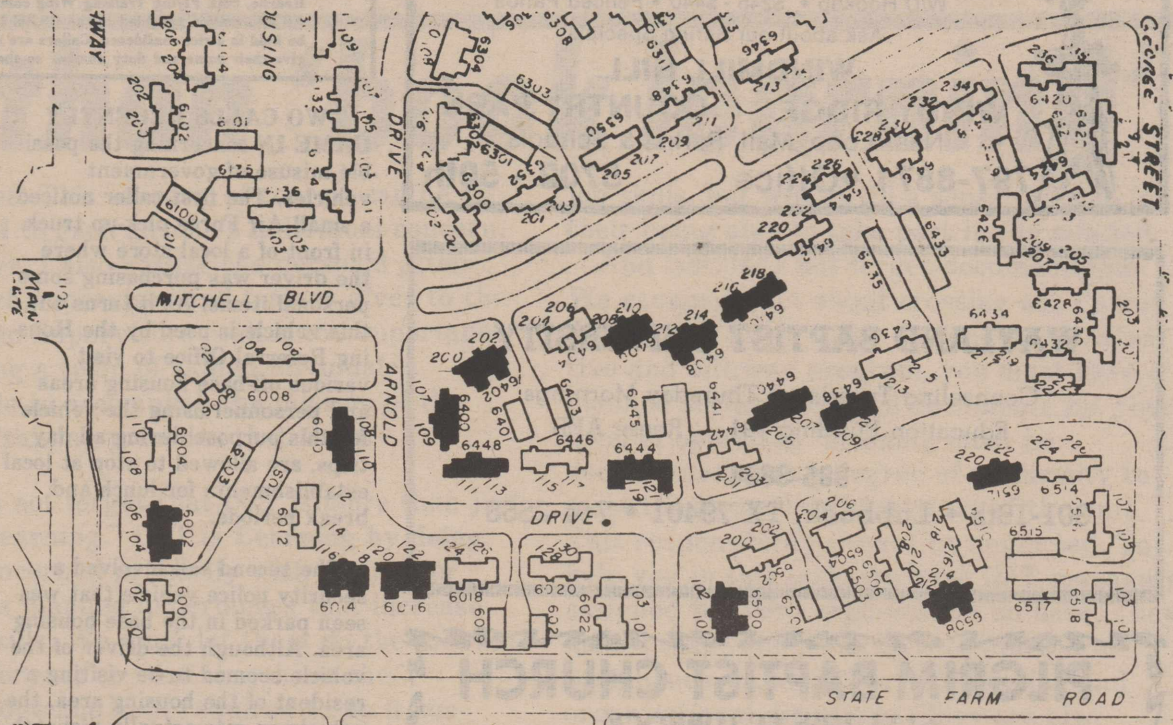
Since the work will require power outages in some housing areas, residents will receive notes on their doors letting them know when the workers will be in their area.

Power outages will last no

longer than six hours at a given time, but should they need to, the contractor will provide a generator for the residence involved. This does not mean that if your power is off for five hours, on for an hour and off again that the contractor will provide a generator — only those whose electricity is off for six hours or more without ever being returned.

In addition to the notes on the doors, civil engineering officials will provide weekly work schedules to the Roundup for the coming week. The map to the left is the area work is scheduled for next week.

## Want to stay healthy? Eat right

Want to stay healthy?

Establish a good diet. When establishing that diet consider that many good ideas often turn sour because of a lack of goals.

When considering a diet, think about these common goals for prudent dieters:

The first goal of any diet is to meet daily protein, vitamin and mineral requirements.

Controlling calories to achieve and maintain a desirable weight might rate second; while increasing the intake of carbohydrates and decreasing the amount of sugar consumed follow.

The next step is cutting back on foods with saturated fat and cholesterol. Use more polyunsaturated fat foods instead.

And, there is the sodium fac-

tor—it should be used as little as possible.

The goals are not too tough, but the typical American diet is rich in cholesterol and saturated fats. The saturated fats and cholesterol are commonly found in eggs, meats, butter, cream and whole milk. Constant, continued use of these foods may raise the serum cholesterol level thus contributing to the possible development of arteriosclerosis—hardening of the arteries.

For many people enjoying the "typical" American diet, evidence of developing heart disease may be present. Their risk of having a heart attack may increase too. To combat the risk of heart disease and heart attack plan your meals carefully reducing or eliminating cholesterol and saturated fats.

An additional risk factor to the

development of heart disease is hypertension—high blood pressure. The typical American diet calls for around six to eight grams of salt. To cut your salt intake down, avoid foods like potato chips and pretzels with salt visible.

One last recommendation for beginning a healthy diet for Americans: Increase the consumption of carbohydrate food to 55-60 percent of the total calories in the diet.

Increasing fruit, vegetable and grain product consumption (as sources of carbohydrates), while decreasing the intake of fats, refined sugar and sodium will improve your diet and health.



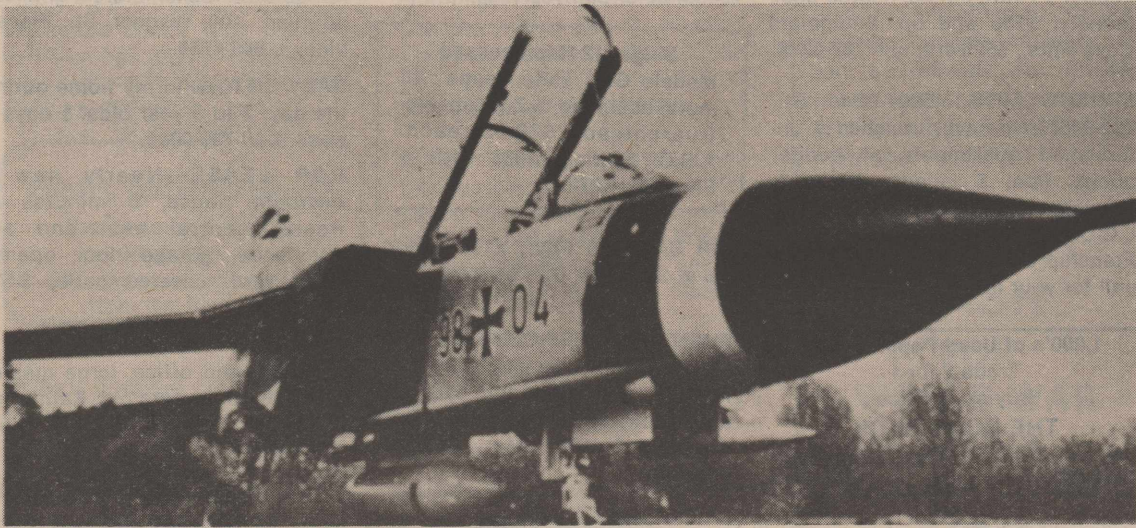

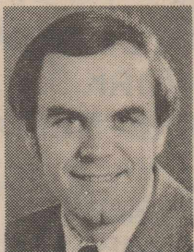
