## Marijuana smoke may be really harmful

(ATCNS)-Marijuana smoke may be even more harmful to the lungs than tobacco smoke, says the American Lung Association.

Compared to tobacco, marijuana produces a smoke that contains 50 percent more of the cancer-causing agents benzpyrene and benzanthracene, according to the association. Marijuana smoke also contains 50 substances called cannabinoids, not found in tobacco smoke, which are respiratory irritants.

In one study involving college students who smoked five marijuana joints a day for two or three months,

highly significant effects on lung function were found. The researcher, Donald P. Tashkin, M.D., professor of medicine at Los Angeles School of Medicine, stressed the surprising degree of damage that developed after such a short period of marijuana smoking.

"If lung function continued to deteriorate at the same rate that was observed during the course study," Tashkin said, "individuals who continued to smoke an average of five joints a day would become disabled by respiratory insufficiency in a few years."

Among the damaging effects he listed were impaired

short-term memory and slowed learning, impaired lung function and interference with ovulation and prenatal development. In males, there can be interference in sperm production and levels of testosterone.

Although there are few studies on long-term effects, researchers suspect that marijuana smokers-sixteen million adults, four million teens - like cigarette smokers, may increase their chances of developing such long-term lung diseases as chronic bronchitis and emphysema. ## Smith wins Rightwrench award

64th Field Maintenance Squadron, recently earned \$50 for developing a tool to simplify the adjustment and preloading of the T-38 rudder servocylinder valve. The innovative tool also earned him the Project Rightwrench suggestor of the month award for April.

The servocylinder acts as a power steering type mechanism for the aircraft.

Smith's Project Rightwrench idea is being evaluated through normal Air Force Suggestion Program channels and, if approved, could be eligible for an even more substantial cash award.

Project Rightwrench began as a test program in January scheduled to last six months, but because of what Air Training Command officials have called a

Wing, Williams AFB, Ariz., is the unit award winner for submitting 20 suggestions during the test period. Eight other ATC bases have also submitted suggestions.

The one major change in the program is the office responsible for managing it. The inspector general's flight safety division at ATC headquarters, Randolph AFB, Texas, designed and ran the program during the test period. But now that the program is permanent, the deputy chief of staff for logistics will be the manager.

"It was decided the program belonged under logistics because we're the experts in the field of maintenance and we're evaluating the suggestions anyway," Captain Perrone said.

The Air Force Suggestion Program will continue to be the vehicle for recommending new hand-

tremendous success, the program became a permanent ATC maintenance safety program June 1.

During the five months it was a test program ATC maintenance technicians and supervisors submitted 47 suggestions for new or redesigned handtools to develop better, safer ways of doing their jobs. Twenty-three of those suggestions have been approved and are being applied command wide.

According to Capt. Keith Perrone, Rightwrench project officer, the objective of the program hasn't changed since its beginning in January. "We're trying to prevent mishaps caused by inadequate or insufficient specialized tools," he said. "Project Rightwrench is designed to encourage our maintenance people to correct these deficiencies before accidents occur.'



For one thing, alkies are very sensitive people, we developed this sensitivity out of necessity, while we were out there being active drunks.

So we can sense or feel any peculiar behavior around us. We also have a highly developed magnifier within our heads. We can take any very small statement, situation, or look and just turn it into one huge problem for ourselves.

Also I have come to realize that I cannot expect anyone to understand me unless he or she is an alcoholic. That's one reason I attend

AA meetings. There I have people I can relate to as they have the same problem hence the understanding and caring I need. The most important and kindest way to act around the recovering drunk is to be yourself. You see, after releasing me from the bondage of self, I must continually strive to discover self and be able to be comfortable with me. So by you being yourself you are giving me an example to observe and also you are allowing me to be me. This I con-

sider to be the greatest gift that a person can give to me. It's what I call an unselfish gift of existence and it fulfills one of my greatest needs. Another benefit of this is that along with AA it helps me, once a seemginly hopeless alcoholic, stay on that path of recovery and to look into the tomorrows with hope instead of despair and fear.

#### Safe vacationing begins at home

Memorial Day marked the beginning of the summer season and ensuing summer vacations. Whether you plan on several "minivacations" or a two-week cross-country trek; safety is an essential part of any vacation plan.

Home preparation is important to insure the safety and security of your home and possessions. Joining or organizing a neighborhood watch group is a good security measure. You should also contact the security police or your local law enforcement agency and advise them of your departure and return dates. Stop newspaper deliveries. Arrange for mail pick-up or have mail held at the Post Office.

Arrange for lawn care if vacation extends over a week. Install a timer device on a lamp, porch light or clock-radio. A dark, quiet seemingly empty home is a prime invitation to would-be burglars and vandals. Put valuables in a safe deposit box for your vacation period.

The refrigerator should be cleared of all perishable items. Any opened containers should be either emptied or tightly sealed.

Insure bathroom and kitchen faucets are completely turned off and unplug all unnecessary electrical appliances (TV, stereo, toaster, microwave, etc.)

Limit storage of gasoline, kerosene and other flammable liquids to absolute minimum. Store in well ventilated areas. Store oily rags in separate, fireproof metal containers. Spontaneous combustion can reduce your home to ashes.

By following these pre-vacation safety tips, you can effectively reduce the chances of returning from your vacation to a disaster area.


**ANOTHER CALLER** wanted to know why he wasn't notified when the sexual harrassment classes for May were changed.

#### 1980 X-Body cars being recalled

Officials of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and General Motors have completed preliminary discussions on a recall of 240,000 1980 X-Body cars because of possible brake

The agency said the rear brakes in these cars has a tendancy to lock up in moderate to hard braking, which could cause the cars to spin out of control without warning. Involved in the recall are all manual and some automatic transmission 1980 models of the Chevrolet Citation, Pontiac Phoenix, Oldsmobile Omega and

Specifically included in the agency's continuing investigation are an estimated 243,000 automatic transmission cars which are equipped with the brake system proportioning valves found in all X-Body cars built prior to August 29, 1979.

Owners of the vehicles involved in the recall will be notified by GM when to take their cars to dealerships for free corrective ac-

#### What about jury duty

Occasionally an active-duty-service member is summoned to perform jury duty in the state in which he or she is assigned. In Texas, however, the Attorney General's office has stated that "an active member of the United States armed forces, acting under federal law and pursuant to the valid orders of a superior, may not be compelled by a state to engage in jury service." This statement of course is not an excuse to escape from jury service, but instead a means to provide an out when necessary. Active duty personnel on leave may collect compensation for participation on a jury. This is to include money for jury expenses, such as transportation costs but will not include other out-of-pocket expenses. Those personnel not on leave status, and acting as a jury member who collect compensation, must turn it over to the accounting and finance office. #### BX recalls unsafe MTD riding lawn mowers

Exchange customers who own a MTD riding lawn mower (model 133-504A) should be aware of potential fire hazard due to the improper battery installation by themselves or the dealer.

The manufacturer has advised that a short circuit may occur if the battery cable fittings at the positive post come in contact with the mower's metal battery hold-down bracket. The result can energize the throttle control cable and melt the fuel line.

The hazard can be corrected by installing a new insulated replacement bracket available free from MTD. Owners of the models affected should not use their mowers until they have obtained and replaced the brackets.

All MTD mowers manufactured after April 19, 1983 have the new bracket and do not need replacement.





## Storm damages exceed \$1 million

A severe set of storms ravaged Reese and the surrounding area late June 8 leaving behind over \$1 million in damages to several base facilities and near-by civilian housing areas.

As the night fell, the skies began to get cloudy—almost like a typical spring thunderstorm builds—then it happened. A tornado was sighted around Shallowater.

The heavy storm and twister moved from the small West Texas town to within four miles of Reese. At 10:20 p.m. the base sirens sounded and all were advised to seek shelter. As the storm neared Reese Village, the funnel lifted and moved over the village, 10:46 to 11 p.m. Trees were mangled and stripped and personal items left outside were tossed around, but because the storm had left the ground there were no serious injuries, said Reese safety officials.

After 14 minutes over the village, the twister and storm moved just west of Carlisle down Highway 179 just east of Wolfforth twisting off the tops of three telephone poles in its path. At 11:30 p.m. the Reese area tornado warning was cancelled, but residents were urged to beware of the bad weather conditions, according to SMSgt. James Radtke, base weather detachment first sergeant.

#### Second storm hits

Ten minutes after the tornado warning ended, a second storm arrived delivering hail pellets ranging from a half to an inch in size. The heavy rains and hail persisted for 16 minutes laying a four inch blanket of hail all over the base. The blanket got messier as 3.7 inches of rain continued falling. The rain and hail combined left puddles up to 10 inches deep

all along the Reese flightline parking ramp. The high winds of the second storm pushed ice drifts of four and five feet deep along the west sides of many buildings.

Reese weather officials reported that the main track of the storm hit the southern and central portions of the base before moving to the golf course and the intersection of 19th Street and War Highway.

Winds during the storm were monitored at 68 miles per hour, but downbursts of wind were estimated to be as high as 92 mph. For this reason Sergeant Radtke said, "it was not the tornadoes, but the downbursts of

wind at high speeds and the hail that caused Reese the most damage."

Downbursts of wind are caused when storm winds begin blowing one direction, stop for a brief pause and begin blowing from a different direction.

Damage from the second storm was tremendous. The roof of an


area apartment unit was completely torn off, two mobile homes were repositioned so that their roofs are now floors, trees were split—apparently like dried toothpicks. 30 telephone poles were downed and flood damage was high.

Heavy rains and hail collapsed some area roofs, broke several

hundred windows and damaged most outdoor mounted air conditioning units here. Reese lost all electrical power at one point, but not telephone service.

Cost estimates for replacing and repairing materials and facilities damaged by the storm are still coming in, but a Tuesday

estimate by the budget office quoted \$1,226,700. Since there were no serious injuries, duty time was not affected by the late night thunderstorm. Damage to 64th Flying Training Wing jets is expected to cost only around

Clean up details began work

immediately June 9. Reese pulled as a team to clean much of the obvious debris away Thursday and Friday. Even with the fallen trees, leaves, damaged signs and fences repaired or cleaned up, it will be several weeks before the results of June's icy grip are completely forgotten.





## AF wants to eliminate housing need

(AFSINC)—It will take seven years to eliminate the Air Force's worldwide housing need for approximately 15,000 units, if programmed funding levels are approved by Congress. That's what Maj. Gen. Clifton D. Wright told a subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee.

General Wright, director of Air Force Engineering and Services, said that the family housing program request for fiscal 1984 is approximately \$947 million. A partial breakout of this total shows \$171 million for new construction. improvements, and planning and design. There also is \$661 million for operations and maintenance.

The request proposes 1,075 new housing units at seven locations. These include two new strategic training range bases in Montana, 55 units; Lejes Field, Azores, 150; Camp New Amsterdam, the Netherlands, 50; RAF Upper Heyford, United Kingdom, 300; RAF Greenham Common, United Kingdom, 250; and F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo., 270. General Wright told the sub-

committee that the major portion of the 140,000 housing units in the Air Force is more than 25 years

old. Most have insufficient space and poor functional layouts for modern lifestyles, he added.

"Kitchens and bathrooms are antiquated and lack features such as dishwashers and garbage disposals common to comparable civilian housing. Energy conservation was a limited concern when most of the units were constructed," he said.

The proposed program for fiscal 1984 has 45 improvement projects for 8,603 units and 12 energy conservation projects for 7.931 units.


"For the last three years, we have had to reprogram funds from maintenance to operations to cover 'must-pay' costs. This is self-defeating and undesirable," he said.

The housing operations and maintenance request includes "must-pay" costs to operate and maintain existing housing and increased costs for new units that will be constructed. Also included are the transfer of Air Force housing units to the Army for operation and maintenance under the Oahu, Hawaii, consolidation plan and a reduction in furniture and appliance backlogs.

He noted that the Air Force obtains housing through lease programs in overseas areas, when it is more economical than building. 'We are requesting authorization for 8,772 units. This includes 500

new units in Okinawa, Japan, and 200 in Greece," he said.

General Wright said the domestic program for leasing is being phased out. It has gone from 1,000 units in fiscal 1980 to less than 100 units in fiscal 1984. Remaining leases will be dropped as tenants are reassigned, he said.



of 10 feet of space where electric cables enter a residence. Because of this requirement, contractors will be working in the base housing area to bring the Reese units up to code.


Children and pets should be kept away from the work areas. In some instances, residents may need to find another place to keep their outside pets until the job is done in this area.

Notes will be posted on the doors of homes to be worked on during the coming week. The advance notice will be given because the electricity will have to be shut off. Power outages are expected to last less than six hours, but if the loss of electric power will be longer the contractor will provide the residence with a portable generator.

Generators will be provided only if the power in a residence is off for six hours or longer. Home electricity can be off several hours, brought back up and then shut off again by the contractor. In this case an electric generator would not be provided.





## Learn to swim

The swimming pools on base are now open. For many who do not know how to swim, however, the refreshingly cool water may be one pleasure they want to enjoy, but cannot.

The Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division has got the answer for nonswimmers-swimming lessons. The first set of lessons begins Monday and concludes July 8. The swimming instruction will be given at the Enlisted Pool behind the base gym.

Novice swimmers, 6 and older, may choose one of two daily classes: 10 to 10:45 a.m. or 10:45 to 1:30 a.m. There is a \$10 charge to be paid in cash at the time of registration.
