"Our compensation system is complex, but it has served the unique requirements of the military well in the past. It will continue to do so as long as it provides our people and their families the security they expect and deserve and fulfills the committment made to them in return for the many sacrifices they are called upon to make for their country.'

Service in the armed forces dedicate their full attention to is not predicated on a formal,

written contract nor on rules of negotiation as in private industry. Rather, the military member accepts on faith that the institution will rpovide for his or her job and financial security and that reasonable living conditions will be provided for both the individual and his or her family. These characteristics have long differentiated the military profession from civilian occupations, whose legitimacy has been based upon exchange of labor for wages.

# Are you controlling your energy use?

Energy conservation! It's something we all need to be aware of, but how energy conscious are we as we go about our daily tasks?

•Do you have sufficient weather stripping or insulation in your home or office?

•Are leaky faucets immediately repaired?

•Are home and office temperature settings appropriate for the season?

•Is excess lighting turned off when no one is using the lighted area?

•Are doors and windows kept closed when the heating or air conditioning is on?

•Are unoccupied rooms closed off and their heating or air conditioning vents closed to direct the air to occupied rooms?

•Are heater and air conditioner filters replaced monthly or cleaned to get peak performance from the climate controlling equipment?

•Is the furnace or heater pilot light turned off during the summer?

•Is the water heater temperature set too high? Normally 120 degrees Fahrenheit is adequate. 140 F is sufficient for home dishwashers.

•Are clothes washed in hot water when

warm would suffice?

•Is the lint removed from the dryer's lint screen after each drying or left to make the dryer work harder?

•Are TVs, stereos, typewriters, electric fans, or other small electric appliances left on when no one is using them?

•Are posted speed limits obeyed when driving?

•Do you take a walk, bus or bike on a short trip or use the car?

•Do you report burned out flourescent fixtures immediately? Ballasts keep running even when bulbs are burned out.

•Do you use electric space heaters? They are extremely inefficient.

•As an employee do you limit the amount of energy you run at work like you do at home or is excess energy used because someone else pays the bills?

These simple, everyday questions are things we all need to ask ourselves continually. Little energy oversights add up to big wastes when multiplied by many thousands each day.

We can't control the weather. However, we can control our energy consumption by observing sound energy conservation prac-



tices as we go about our daily tasks at the office as well as at our homes.

Remember, no one else can do your part in the energy conservation effort. Be smart, apply your answers to these questions daily for a brighter, more energy efficient tomorrow.

Vision International. What he said went something like this: One obstacle we all face in attempting to reach our potential is the fear of making a mistake. Yet achievement is based upon failure, usually one failure after another.

After 700 unsuccessful experiments to develop the incandescent light, Thomas Edison encouraged his dejected assistants,

All Air Force members, particularly supervisors, are responsible for correct dress and appearance, yours and others. Just how you inform others, of course, will depend on your relationship with them.

Air Force Regulation 35-10, provides the guidelines, and you as an Air Force member should exemplify the guidelines. How well you illustrate these standards is actually a statement of yourself. Do you simply try to get by or do you try to excel?

This problem had already been identified by the Base Traffic Safety Coordinating Committee, which has requested that markings be painted. However, this may take time because of the number of higher priority jobs ahead of this one.

J'VE RECEIVED SEVERAL CALLS concerning the new policy on open mess usage, and I'll try to answer all of them, realizing that our people are due an explanation for this action.

First, the clubs are, by directive, membership organizations. As such, dues are required and any profit goes back into the club. A number of niceties are offered free, such as coffee, tea, hors d'oeuvers and bar snacks. Also, the clubs offer entertainment and special dinners at bargain prices for promotional purposes, thereby returning to the membership a portion of their dues. Since these are benefits returned to the membership, many of the duespaying members felt that they were subsidizing individuals who were otherwise eligible to join but who participated and paid no dues. Some calls were also received from civilians who wanted only to eat lunch at the clubs without becoming members. If civilians who are eligible for membership eat lunch as non-members, shouldn't we then grant military

personnel the same privilege? We get back to the same point mentioned above about unfairness to dues-paying

members. Everyone is eligible to join either the enlisted or officers club. Participation, like membership, is voluntary but the degree of participation is not important. Some have shown concern about the civilian eligibility for membership in the officers club. GS-7 and corresponding Federal Wage System grades were selected based on equivalency to warrant officer grades. Along with grade, the pay structure was considered.

Requiring club membership of those eligible for it before they can use the clubs isn't "forcing people to join" as some have suggested. It's simply getting us to the position we should have been in for a long time, i.e., if you want to use the club, support it by becoming a member. Eligible personnel are welcome to join and participate in all activities including the lunch hour.

THE EMERGENCY ROOM **AMBULANCE** team was the subject of another call, this from someone who thought they took an unreasonably long time to respond to an emergency at the motor pool recently. She said that the emergency room was called three times for this problem and took 20 minutes to get an ambulance on the scene, where a victim of heat exhaustion had collapsed.

I understand this person's concern, but, according to hospital records, what actually happened was that the ambulance was dispatched immediately when the call was received at the Emergency Room at 11:15 a.m. The patient arrived at the hospital at 11:30 and was seen by a medical provider. This allows about five minutes each way between the hospital and the motor pool, and six to seven minutes to examine the patient at the scene and place him in the ambulance.

The other calls the caller mentioned were made to the emergency room while the ambulance was enroute to the scene

## TV repair by telephone can be a risky proposition

Telephone solicitation is rapidly becoming a cheap and fast method of advertising by certain repair services.

An example is the TV repair business. In certain parts of the state, these services are being advertised to unsuspecting consumers by sometimes unethical and unqualified repairmen.

The operation begins with a phone call to the consumer indicating that a TV repairman will be in the area to provide necessary repair services. And, for a low price, they will pick up, repair and deliver the merchandise fully repaired with an unconditional warranty. Most of the time these individuals will quote the consumer a price for the services without even inspecting the television set and promise to return it in a "few" days, and in some instances will require a cash deposit.

What happens next sometimes turns into a frustrating sequence of events for the consumer.

First, the consumer, after waiting a few days, will call the repair service and ask about his set. The usual reply

is that the problem is more extensive than first realized and that it will cost more than agreed upon. If the consumer does not agree to pay the extra cost, the repair service will demand the payment agreed upon before delivery. If the consumer pays the agreed price, the repairman will promise to deliver the set immediately. Then, the repair service will not deliver the set to the consumer because they are not working that consumer's area at that time.

The consumer ends up having to go to the business himself, or perhaps has to hire someone else, to deliver the set to his home. If the set does not work properly, the repair service will usually tell the consumer to return it himself, or it will be picked up the next time they are in the area.

After several attempts to secure the warranty work and the free pick-up and delivery service, the frustrated consumer gives up his fight to either get his money back or obtain the warranty work.

The lesson to be learned from this sequence of events

is of course to deal only with reputable TV repair services, which most of them are. Also, be watchful of telephone solicitations for the repair of TV sets, especially when a price is quoted before the set is inspected.

The consumer should always obtain a written estimate of what is to be done and the price of such repairs along with a written guarantee and any additional charges for pick-up and delivery. All these items should be agreed upon in writing before the set is turned over to the repairman; then there should be no disputes as to cost or other services, and everything will work smoothly. It is only when costs and services are left to chance that problems and disputes arise.

As was stated, most TV repair services are reputable and do good work, but if you have any complaints, contact the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division of the Texas Attorney General's Office in Lubbock at 747-5238, or call the base legal office at Ext. 3505 for a legal assistance appointment.

It was a close game, with Comm. coming out in the first inning to take a 5-2 lead.


Supply came back in the second and scored six runs to go ahead 8-5.
