

ATC says Reese is best-looking in command

Reese has received two awards for excellence from Air Training Command Civil Engineering and Morale, Welfare and Recreation directorates. The awards for Best-looking Base Officer's Club in ATC were presented at the ATC Commander's Conference, Randolph AFB, Texas.

Gen. Andrew P. Iosue, ATC Commander, began the programs for best-looking base and best clubs earlier this year, say inspection officials, and he plans to present the awards annually.

For best base, Reese earned the award by showing pride and adding "the extra touch," said Col. G.A. Romero, Assistant DCS, for Engineer-

ing Services at ATC. Colonel Romero commented about the inspection process and how Reese was picked best-looking in ATC.

"We used a scoring system for different areas to be inspected. The areas were divided among four inspectors," said Colonel Romero.

"We inspected base and base housing appearance strictly by scoring on exterior appearance of all buildings, functional management signs—including traffic signs—numbers posted on buildings and family housing, litter, lawn maintenance and appearance in general." "It was just really nice inspecting Reese. The base was nice looking and it showed that

Reese personnel went to a lot of effort. It was the extra touch that helped our decision," Stated Colonel Romero, adding, "The team feels that Reese personnel also displayed the best military courtesy they have ever seen."

The inspection team included Colonel Romero, Col. Ron Baker, Lt. Col. Nancy Sanford and Maj. Frank Sanders, all from Randolph.

Along with Reese being inspected for best-looking base consideration, the Officers' Club was inspected by another Randolph team for the Best Club in ATC.

The Officers' Club was inspected in six categories, according to Mr. Noel Win-

dham, Randolph Open Mess directorate.

The categories included building condition and appearance of dining room, food and decor of the facility. Also under consideration was the kitchen layout and design, and preparation, production and service quality. Food quality was judged by the inspectors with appearance, taste and presentation in mind.

Not only was the facility and food judged but the personnel as well. Waitresses were inspected for their quality of food service and the officers' club administrative personnel were also under consideration for the award.

"We found the officers' club

to have exceptionally high quality. The food service was exceptionally good and we found the club presented a pleasant and relaxed atmosphere", commented Mr. Windham.

Also inspecting the officers' club was Capt. Lenna K. Leming.

According to Lt. Col. Elton Brian, Deputy Base Commander, Reese will retain the plaque for the best-looking base award, but the best club award will be a traveling plaque.

"We would like to thank all Reese personnel for their hard work and to the members and management of the officers' club for making these awards possible," commented Colonel Brian.

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LUBBOCK, TEXAS

64th FTW is an outstanding unit!

The 64th Flying Training Wing — and its subordinate units — is among a number of Air Training Command units recently picked to receive the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award.

The award will be presented officially by ATC Commander General Andrew P. Iosue in a ceremony outside wing headquarters (Bldg. 800 today at 1:45 p.m.

The award period runs from April 30, 1981, to April 29, 1983. Persons officially assigned to any of the designated units during that period may wear the award.

Units subordinate to the wing which also share in the award are the 35th Flying Training Squadron, 54th Flying Training Squadron, 64th Student Squadron, 64th Air Base Group, 64th Civil Engineering Squadron, 64th

Field Maintenance Squadron, 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron, 64th Supply Squadron, and the USAF Hospital Reese.

"This unit qualified for the award by its record of sustained superior mission accomplishment," read the nomination letter signed by General Thomas M. Ryan, former ATC commander and submitted to Headquarters, Air Force Military Personnel Center at Randolph AFB, Texas, where the selections were made.

The nomination went on to cite some of the noteworthy accomplishments of the 64th FTW:

An excellent rating on the ATC Standardization/Evaluation Inspection for the second straight year. The inspection team noted that the Reese program was the strongest

they'd seen in two years of inspections.

The ATC inspector General also gave the wing high marks — highest in the command — on its Management Effectiveness Inspection in November 1981.

•The wing won the General Frank P. Lahm flight safety award for 1981, with more than 200,000 hours of accident-free flying since the last Class A or B mishap.

•Reese personnel won a number of individual awards including:

The Lance P. Sijan Leadership Award, won by Captain C. Edward Herron, former chief of Security Police here. The Sijan award is given to just eight people throughout the Air Force each year.

The Air Force Association's Citation of Honor, won by Reese Senior Enlisted Advisor CMSgt.

Jerry L. Price. The chief received the award for his service as maintenance supervisor.

The Air Force Outstanding Contracting Senior NCO Award, won by SMSgt. Sedrick DuRousseau, formerly of the Reese Contracts Division.

ATC Airman of the Year, won by Sgt. Melvin Maxwell, also of contracts.

The wing also won the awards for ATC Airman of the Year, Commander's Professional Maintenance Supervisor, Outstanding Resource Advisor, Outstanding Budget Civilian and the Outstanding Cost and Management Analysis Officer, Company Grade and Noncommissioned Security Police Officers of the Year, Fuel Manager of the Year, Outstanding Supply Junior Technician of the Year

and Outstanding Supply Technician of the Year.

The Transient alert section won the Rex Riley Award for service excellence for the seventh consecutive year.

And, the Christmas Classic High School Basketball Tournament won the Air Force Recruiter Assistance Program special project award for both 1981 and 1982.

Perhaps most important, the 64th FTW graduated 680 undergraduate pilot training students between April 30, 1981, and March 1, 1983, completing all syllabus training on or ahead of the programmed completion dates. This was done despite a number of adverse conditions, including weather, runway resurfacing, the air traffic controllers strike and increases in the student-to-instructor pilot ratios in both the 54th FTS and the 35th FTS.

Fire Prevention week kicks off

Reese officials plan to kick off the annual observance of fire prevention week beginning with a parade in Reese Village Saturday at 11 a.m.

According to Reese fire department officials, Reese will observe FPW from Sunday through Oct. 15. Open House at the fire department will be held week long from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. daily.

Going under the theme "Learn not to Burn Throughout the Year", fire department personnel have planned several activities for the observance.

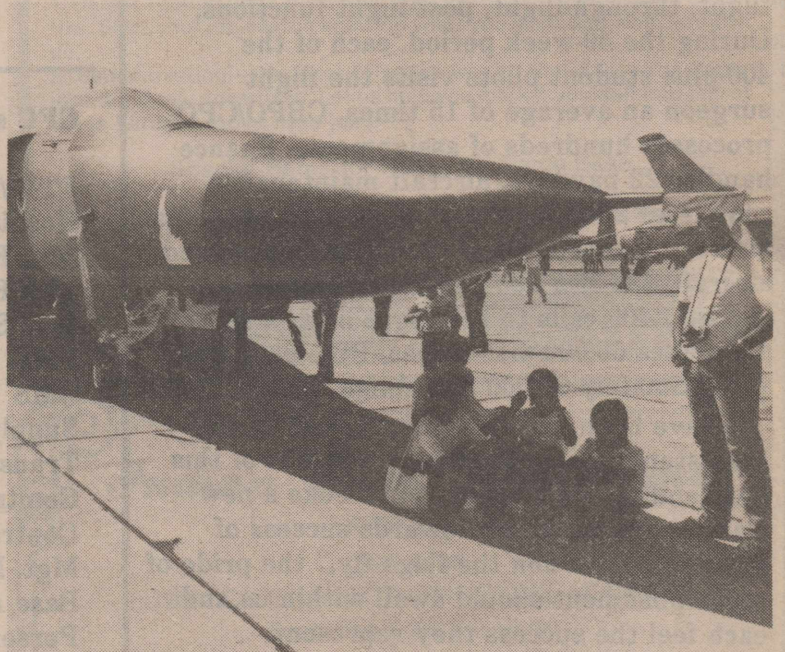
On Tuesday there will be a parade at Reese at 10 a.m. On

Wednesday Reese Elementary School students will work on fire drill procedures at 9 a.m., followed by films being shown to third through fifth grade classes. Also there will be a poster contest where the NCO Wives Club will judge the best Fire Prevention Week posters drawn by the elementary students. U.S. Savings Bonds will be awarded to the top three winners. At 10 a.m. Fire Department personnel will talk to first grade classes and at 1 p.m. to the kindergarten class. At 1:30 p.m. Reese hospital will be the site for a fire drill demonstration.

On Thursday the fire department will perform a structural exercise using ladders, first aid, and more during a Main Exchange fire drill at 1 p.m.

On Oct. 14 the Child Care Center will undergo a fire drill with the fire department using their rescue and pumper trucks. At 1 p.m. there will be a structural exercise performed at 306 Mitchell in Reese Village.

On the final day of FPW, Oct. 15, the fire department will be open to all Reese members and families to tour and learn about fire department personnel jobs.

Editorials

All of us involved in pilot training

On Sept. 16 my family observed for the first time the colorful, double row of flags flying on Main Boulevard from Fifth Avenue to the flagpole in front of wing headquarters.

This impressive display had caught my attention and interest when I arrived in March. Since my family did not arrive until the summer they had yet to hear what I learned when I questioned, "What is going on?" I learned this is one of many special occasions which are honored and celebrated on Reese AFB. In fact, these flags represent one of the most tangible signs of mission accomplishment that I have seen anywhere in the Air Force. It is graduation day for the undergraduate pilot training senior class.

Certainly the wing historian and base commander could give a better detailed and accurate chronology of the flag tradition. However, I would like to share a general understanding with some meaningful "gee whiz" statistics which I believe will be sufficient for the majority.

The flags represent the 50 United States and applicable foreign countries of the undergraduate pilot trainees. Graduation day culminates 49 weeks of hard work on the part of the students, as well as more than three thousand of us military and civilian support personnel. It is certainly a special day in the life of the young men and women graduates, their parents and friends. I now know it is a special day for each individual in the wing. It means everyone did their job — training pilots for the future.

To mention everything it takes on the part of the student and each individual throughout the Wing is too cumbersome and possibly boring to address. However, some significant areas and items I consider most noteworthy include the 320 classroom hours completed, plus 51 (25 T-37 and 26 T-38) simulator and 153 (57 T-37 and 96 T-38) aircraft sorties flown per student.

There are eight classes in training simultaneously with an average class size of 55. This requires the aircraft maintenance complex to generate more than 1,500 sorties per week, which require more than 6,000 pre-flight, through-flight, post-flight functions. During the 49-week period, each of the 400-plus student pilots visits the flight surgeon an average of 15 times, CBPO/CPO processes hundreds of assignments, finance handles 22 paydays, aircraft maintenance completes 264 major periodic (5 to 9 days per aircraft) inspections on the 190-plus assigned aircraft, the fire department responds to almost 1,400 calls to the flight line, base supply makes 66,000-plus issues, POL supports approximately 90,000 refuelings, etc.

I have been favorably impressed by the high standards and valued traditions of this outstanding wing. Every six weeks a new class starts the climb towards success of graduation. "When the flags fly," the pride of accomplishment should swell within us and each feel the success they represent.

Looking at new energy year

Fiscal 83 is now history, but the need to conserve energy is still here.

As we begin fiscal 84 our need for continued energy awareness and conservation is greater than ever before. The Reese facility energy goal, as set by ATC, is 17.5 percent less consumption than the base year of fiscal 75. This goal will be extremely difficult to meet unless we have the complete cooperation of every person who lives and works at Reese AFB.

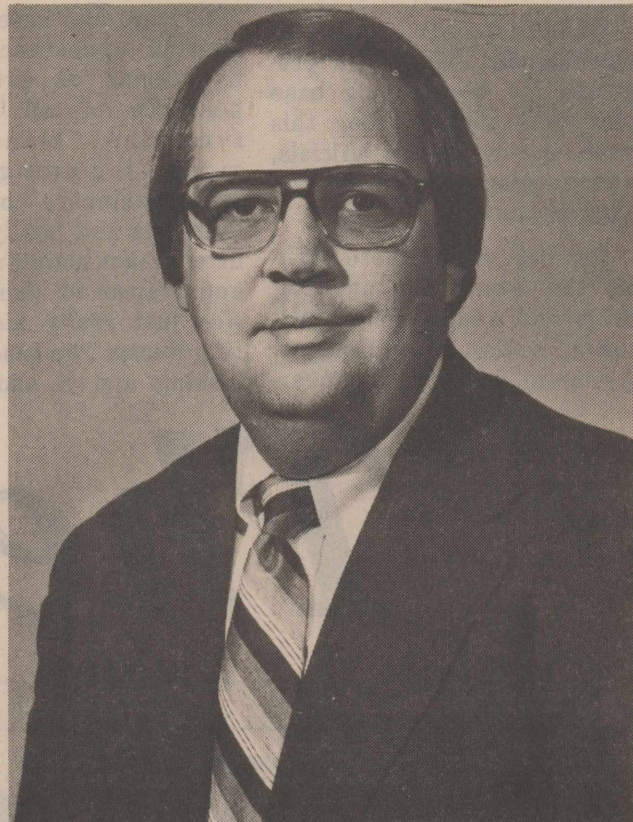
Ideal weather conditions have never and never will be a reality at Reese. Therefore, we the energy users cannot take anything for granted or depend on warm winters and cool summers in fiscal 84 to help us meet our energy goals.

Fiscal 83 was a good example of just how uncooperative West Texas weather can be as we set records during the year for snowfall, and both cold and hot temperature readings. Largely as a result of the unusually cold winter and spring as well as the record snowfall in December and January, Reese fell short of its fiscal 83 facility energy goal by almost 7 percent. This means that in order to reach our FY84 goal we must now reduce our present energy consumption by almost 10 percent in fiscal 84.

This seems like an almost impossible task, but with your daily cooperation we can make great strides these first few months towards our FY84 energy goals.

Again we don't intend to do anything that will hamper the health and welfare of our employees and families at Reese. We do, however, intend to take a firm stand on the implementation and enforcement of energy conservation policies and procedures both in the work areas and in Reese Village. Your total cooperation in both areas is essential for the energy conservation program to be successful.

Reese currently has ten energy projects totalling approximately \$840,000 that have been approved by the Base Facilities Utiliza-

tion Board that will greatly enhance our energy conservation efforts upon completion. However, even with retrofits and repairs of present systems and replacement of obsolete ones, the key to a successful energy conservation program still rests with the individual energy user.

We have done well in the past at Reese, but the past is history. We must realize that where energy consumption is concerned, the future is now. We cannot rely on past successes or future promises to assure us of the energy supplies we need for the present.

The last week in October (24-29) has been designated by the Department of Defense as Energy Awareness Week. Let's begin now to not only prepare for this special week, but also for all of fiscal 84, by beginning to do our part to conserve energy today so that we may be assured of a sufficient energy supply for tomorrow.

A CALLER THOUGHT THAT cashier hours at the commissary were being cut and thought this was a bad idea.

On the contrary, three additional cashier positions have been allotted and are now being used. Also commissary management is training commissary personnel to fill in as relief cashiers during

peak operating periods.

The commissary service's standard waiting time for patron check out is six to 12 minutes. When patron waiting exceeds 15 minutes, the store is required to have all registers operating. When shoppers find waiting times to be more than 15 minutes, they should notify the management to insure that all registers are working.

A SHARP-EYED PERSON spotted me driving off in my staff car without buckling my seat belt recently.

Thanks for the call. We all need to be reminded once in a while about the importance of using seat belts. At times I've caught myself moving 50 to 60 feet before buckling up, which is probably the case at the time this caller mentioned.

A CALLER RELATED AN unusual occurrence that took place at the commissary recently.

It seems that she was standing in line behind a man without a shopping cart or basket. "Every once in a while," she said, "he would look back and let a customer in front of him and proceed to wait in line. Just before my turn to be checked in, at about 11:20 a.m., he looked back through the commissary and asked his wife (who had been shopping) if she was finished.

"She said, 'Just about,' and pushed her basket of groceries to the head of the cash register line. Now, he had been in line with no basket or anything while she had been shopping through the commissary which most of us do before even thinking of getting in the line.

When the caller protested to the woman, she replied that no regulations prohibited her husband from saving place in line while she shopped.

The caller was—I think justifiably—upset over the behavior of this couple.

It's true that there are "no regulations prohibiting" this kind of behavior, but it doesn't take a lot of common sense to see that it is discourteous and unfair to other shoppers who have to

spend their own time in line. All cashiers have been instructed to inform customers that they must have their shopping carts ready and in place for check out before getting in line. We hope this helps to eliminate such occurrences.

A CALLER ASKED why, with such short manning in so many duty sections on base, the Honor Guard has to practice during duty hours. Why can't they do it on weekends, he asked. And, why aren't the supervisors brought in to the section process? Finally, why are so many people assigned to the group?

First, the Honor Guard practices during duty hours because of the members off-duty commitments, such as education or part-time employment in addition to Honor Guard details. In order to keep the members at a high level of proficiency, they must practice during duty hours. Also, it doesn't seem fair to expect Honor Guard members to spend Saturdays practicing while Honor Guard details already often occur during off-duty hours.

Second, supervisors are consulted during the Honor Guard selection process. Application letters for Honor Guard include a space for supervisor approval.

Last, there are so many people in the group because of the large number of details to be pulled: 10 to 15 each month. Of these details, a funeral requires at least 19 members and possibly more depending on the amount of honors authorized. With a 50-member Honor Guard, we can handle all details and actually insure they take less time off, since there are more people to choose from.

It's fortunate that the importance of the Honor Guard is often misunderstood. When we are called upon to pay tribute to those who have served our country honorably, it is only right that we do this in the same professional manner that they served.

In light of the significance of the military funeral, we shouldn't complain if we have to suffer some inconvenience. Whether the inconvenience is appropriate should not be the question, rather we should ask if the honors rendered are sufficient.

Former employee sentenced

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — A former employee of the Defense General Supply Center, Richmond Va., was sentenced as an accessory in the theft of government property, announced Department of

Defense inspector general Joseph H. Sherick.

Robert Earl Boone received a sentence of one year and one day and was ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$4,830. Boone admitted he knowingly introduced a person in possession of stolen government flight jackets to a dealer in stolen goods, with the intent to aiding in the illegal sale of flight jackets.

The investigation, conducted by the FBI and the Defense Criminal Investigative Service, recovered government property valued at more than \$11,000. Investigative officials announced that Boone was convicted as a result of a joint undercover operation by officials in two countries and the Richmond Va., police department.

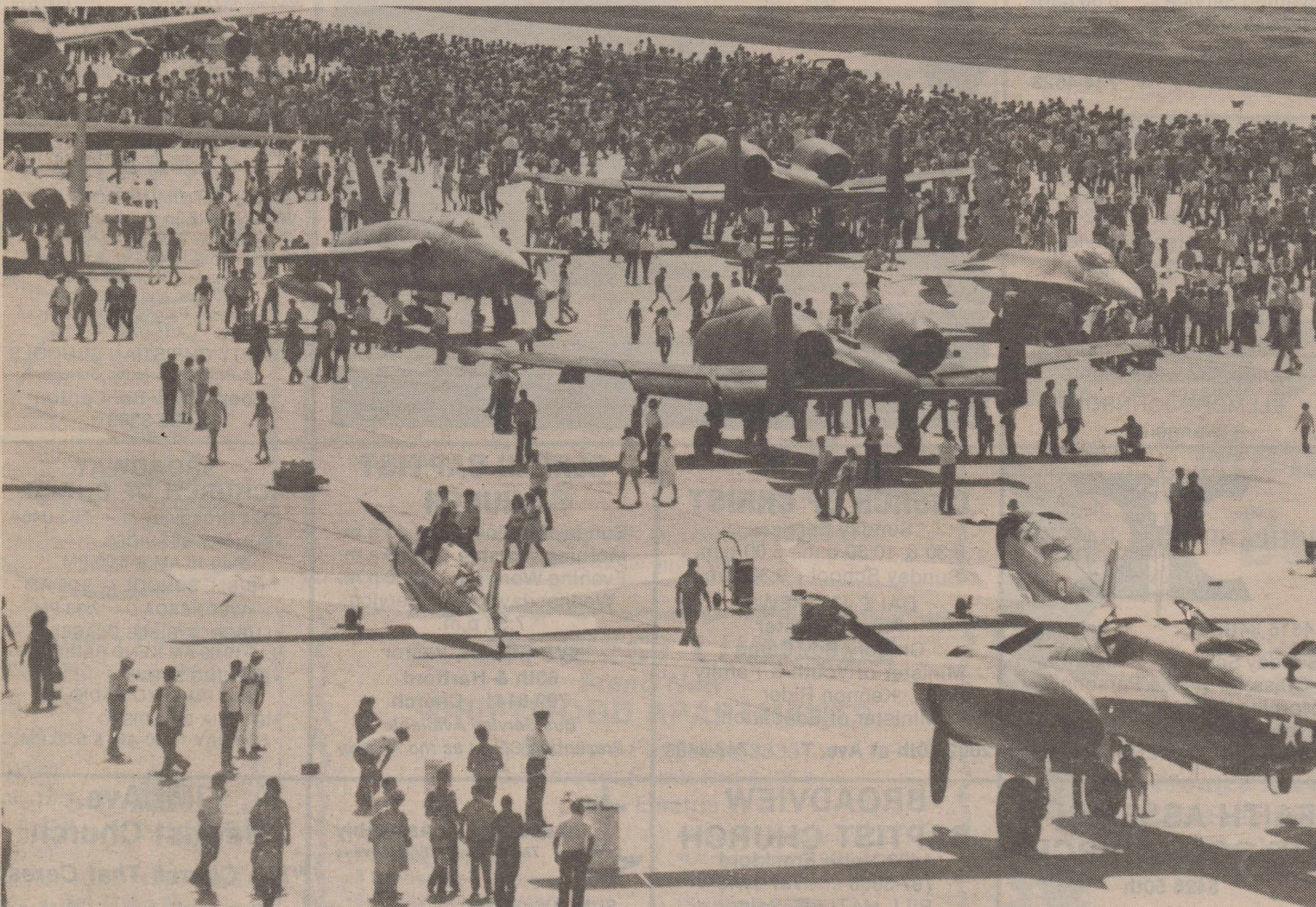

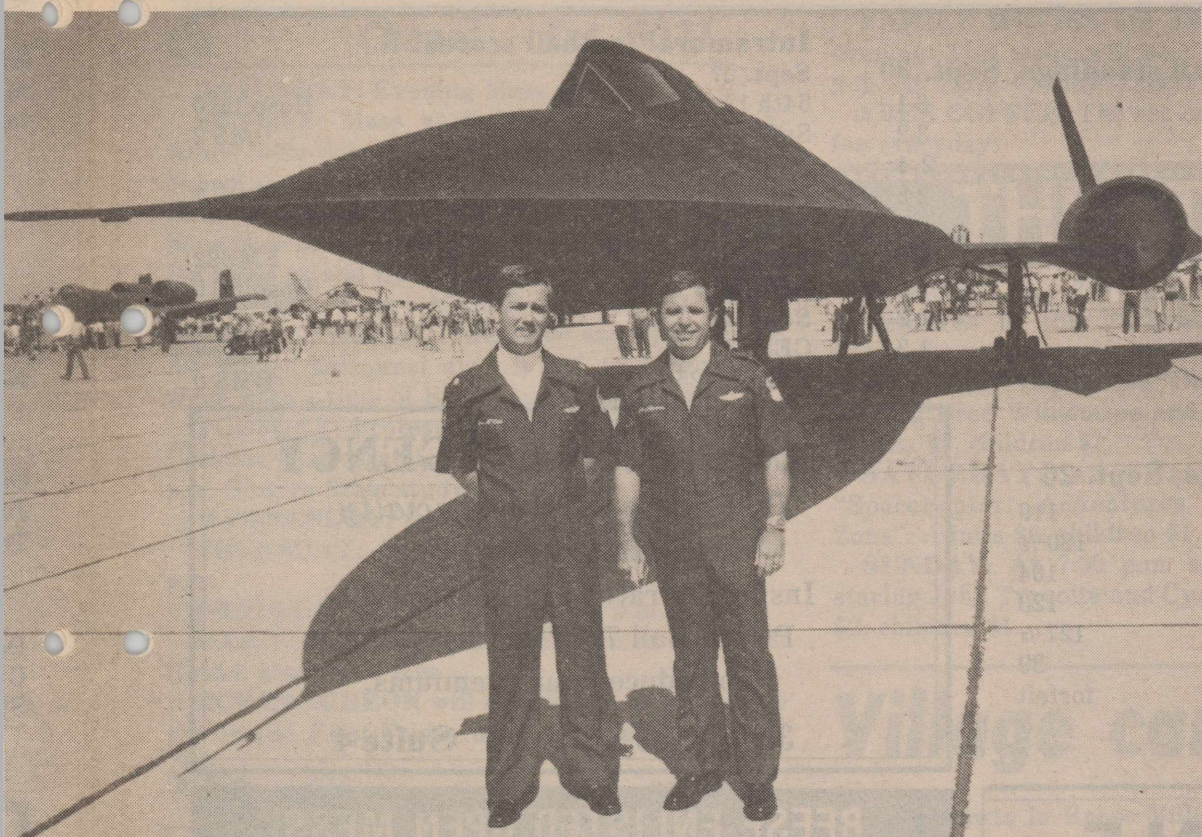

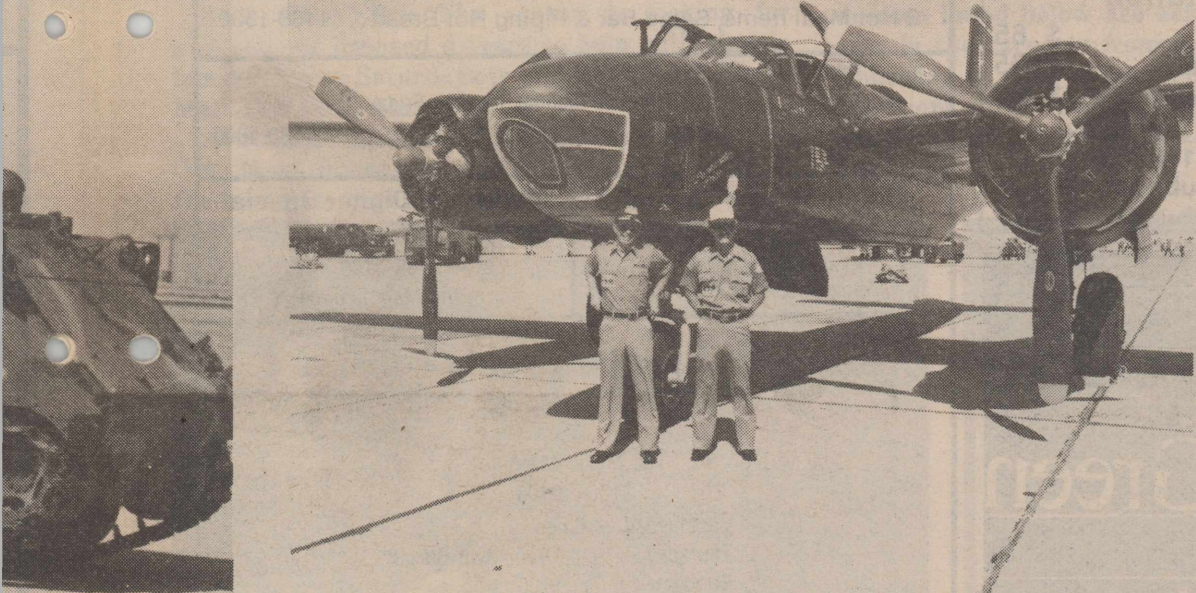

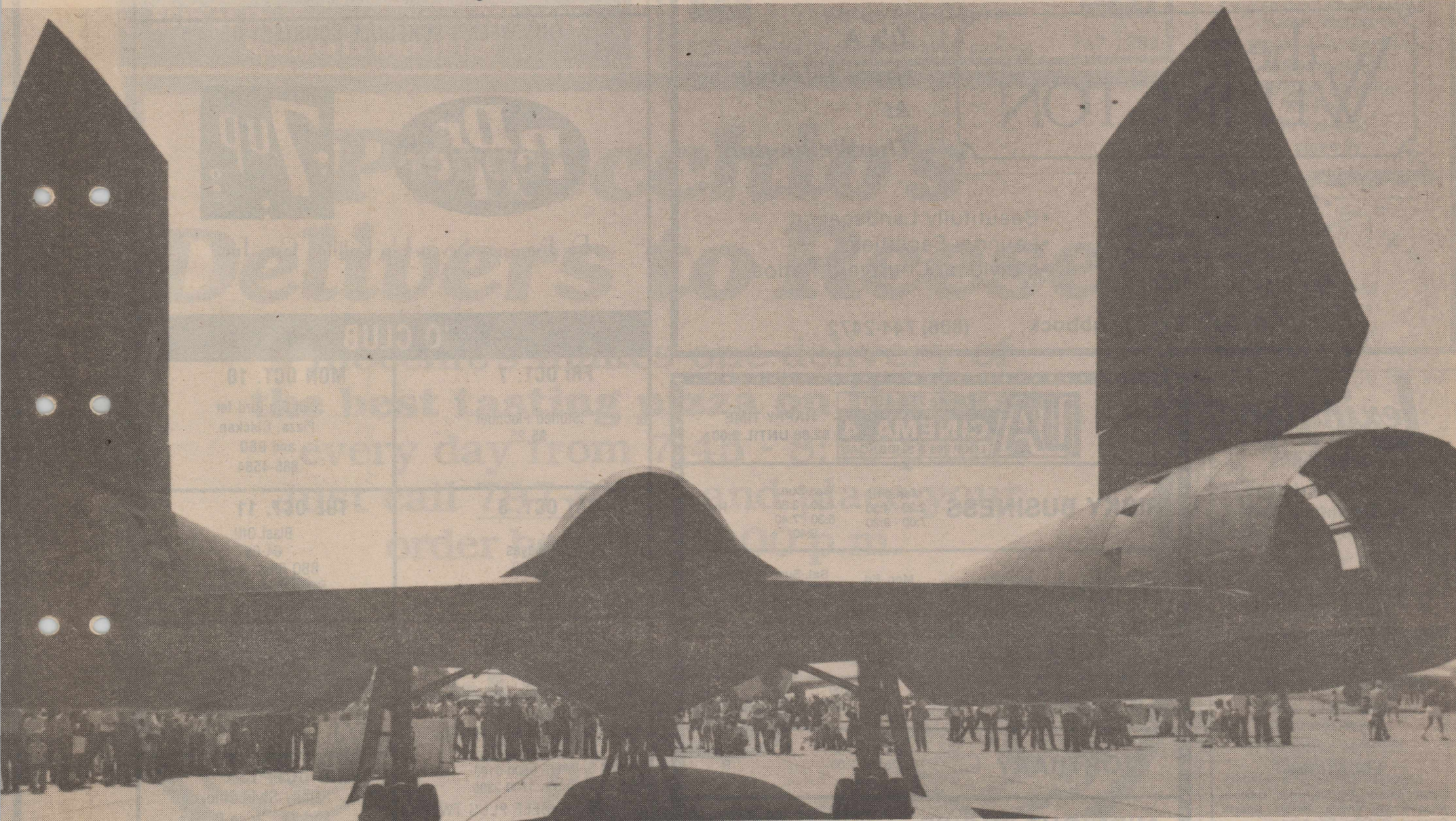
