The Rev. Ray Nobles, pastor of Meadowbrook Baptist Church in Fort Worth for more than four years, has accepted a call to the pastorate of Haskell's First Baptist Church and will begin his ministry here Sunday.

Rev. Nobles, as pastor of the local church, succeeds the Rev. M. D. Rexrode, who resigned Jan. 1 after more than 10 years in the ministry here to accept a place as Minister of Missions in the First Baptist Church in Dallas. Since Jan. 1 the Rev. Roy Davidson, assistant pastor, has filled the pulpit of the local church.

Rev. Nobles, during the more than four years he has served the Meadowbrook Baptist Church, has gained wide recognition as an outstanding young minister and evangelist. He is a graduate of the Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary and served as pastor of the Saint Jo Baptist Church before going to his Fort Worth pastorate.

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Two Supreme Court Cases Cited . . .

Under the laws of Texas, as interpreted by the State Supreme Court, only a public official may prosecute a suit to recover sums illegally expended under public contract, and private citizens are not authorized to maintain such a suit.

This was the basis for a ruling by District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman last week in granting a plea of abatement (dismissing) a civil suit filed by a citizens group against city officials of Haskell, at the conclusion of a pre-trial hearing in which attorneys for both sides took part.

Two cases decided by the Supreme Court were cited by Judge Chapman in making his decision.

In the suit, filed in July, 1961, the group of taxpayers sought to compel the mayor and city council to prepare a budget in compliance with state budget laws, asked recovery of money paid the mayor and several city councilmen for expenses on trips to Austin, as well as \$1,500 paid an Austin law firm, and asked an injunction restraining city officials from selling anything to the city and receiving payment for it.

At the outset, Judge Chapman explained to the attorneys and interested parties present the nature and purpose of a pre-trial. In concluding his explanation, he said: "As Judge, I am supposed to be fair and impartial. I am not supposed to take sides, and I'm not going to. Now as I said, I'm not interested in what Mr. Wilson (attorney for the defendants) or Mr. Williams (attorney for plaintiffs) have said in their briefs about things. I'm not interested in all the things you said about the factional fight between the Water District and the City, Mr. Wilson; and, Mr. Williams, I'm not interested in your brief, in which you brought those things up. I am interested in the law and the law alone. That's all I'm interested in and all I care anything about."

Taking up the first phase of the case, failure of the city officials to prepare and file a budget, Judge Chapman had Court Reporter Joe Williams read the statutes providing for the budget. Briefly, the laws provide that every incorporated city or town adopt a budget and comply with it in expenditure of the funds of said city or town. Also read was Art. 414b, which provides that any officer, employee or official of the State Government, or County Government, or of any school district who shall refuse to comply . . . shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000.

Then, Judge Chapman pointed out, concerning a budget: "There is such a duty to perform and if you don't do it, there is an Article in the Penal Code which defines the penalty. Now if the Commissioners Court fails and refuses to do it, or the School Board, there is a penalty provided . . . but the Legislature for some reason, left out the city. So under the present law we have just read to you that makes it a duty for the city officials to prepare a budget, but the only governing body that was left out of the article in the Penal Code is the city; and there is no penalty if the city doesn't do it."

Taking up the conflict of interest phase of the suit, the Court Reporter read Art. 373, which stated: If any officer of any county, or of any city or town shall become in any manner pecuniarily interested in any contract made by such county, city or town . . . or who shall contract for or receive any money or property in consideration . . . shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars.

THE COURT: I want it understood in the beginning, in discussing this it has been brought to the Court's attention by Mr. Williams of course that there was done and certain items were set out there which are too numerous to mention, in fact, items too numerous to mention, the check numbers and the amounts and explanations of them and so forth. I presume there is no question but what the checks were issued, but what the parties mentioned therein cashed them. I am just getting up to that phase of the matter, dealing with members of the City Council trading among themselves and the city buying merchandise from members of the Council.

Now I don't think there is any question but that the law of Texas is that they are not supposed to do it. If I am wrong on that, every Attorney General's opinion that has ever been written and every case that has been decided by every appellate court, and every kind of case in any way has been decided wrong, if I am wrong on my assumption on that. That is the law. My opinion of the law of the State is that, whether you are on the City Council, gentlemen, whether you are

on the school board, or whether you are on the Commissioners Court, you are not supposed to sell merchandise to or have any kind of contract with the governing body of which you are a member. There is no question on that.

Attorneys for both litigants agreed.

THE COURT: No question on that; you are not supposed to do it, gentlemen. Don't misunderstand me; I'm just the judge, I'm telling you the facts as I see them.

Now Mr. Wilson says because this previous group traded with the city or those previous administrations traded with the city, why are you coming in here now, Mr. Williams, and saying we couldn't trade with the city? As I said before, two wrongs don't make a right.

MR. WILSON: I beg your indulgence a minute. That was not the position that I took, but that my clients didn't know that was the law.

THE COURT: They have a City Counsel, one of the best lawyers in Haskell; they have had him for years and he has advised them on the law and they knew the law.





The literature deals with vocational guidance and several types are available for students. One, called a "Career Kit" has individual folders on a wide range of occupations. The content includes history of the occupation, work performed, hours, earnings, training requirements, promotional opportunities, working conditions, advantages and disadvantages of the job, and sources of further information. Also, there are charts which give information about college admission requirements and costs, and a listing of scholarship announcements. The Career Kit is in a file on wheels so that it can be moved into the classrooms with ease.

Another type of information being used is a collection of simply written articles on a variety of careers called "Your Future Occupation." These articles are secured in the folders and distributed to the students. With each article the teacher receives a guide giving suggestions for related class activities and discussions. One advantage of this type of material is that the child can take his folder home and the parent can participate in discussing his various vocational interests.

Of special interest is a series of pamphlets written for boys and girls in language teen-agers understand, and well adapted to their experiences and interests. The subjects include vocational and educational planning.

Film strips are popular with the boys and girls and several are available for stimulating vocational interests.

Another useful tool in vocational planning is vocational tests. Recently the ninth grade students made charts indicative of their vocational aptitudes from results of the Flanagan Vocational Tests which they took several weeks ago.

The main purpose of vocational guidance in high school is to encourage the student to think ahead about his future and to begin to make plans to achieve his goals. Today's world is changing rapidly and many new and interesting horizons are opening. Boys and girls must be informed in order to select intelligently how they spend their adult years.

A secondary gain resulting from vocational guidance is that the school subject matter becomes more meaningful. Mr. Horton commented that the school faculty had shown considerable skill in incorpor-

ating vocational content into their subjects and the interest of the pupils was rewarding.





is no criminal case filed in this court or any other court that I know of. Both lawyers concurred with the Court. THE COURT: We will cross the other bridge when we get to it. Now after the payment is made, what is the remedy? For example, dealing with Mayor Walling here, it may be that he probably sold them some gasoline cheaper than they could get it anywhere else in town. Some member of a previous administration may have done the same thing. That doesn't do away with the fact that it is a violation of the law. That's just the sad part about it, about being on the City Council, you can't do that. Now what is the remedy? The law in Texas is that even if it could be rescinded that the courts would make each party do equity. . . I don't know how in the world you could return gasoline after it is used. If it has to be returned, to do equity, how could you do it? I see no way in the world you could do that.

Payment of Fee to Legal Firm

Dealing with the payment of \$1,500 to an Austin legal firm and payment to Earnest Yeatts, for some purpose as an engineer, the transcript shows: THE COURT: No wactually, from a lawyer's standpoint, which is not in this lawsuit, I will say that in view of the

law of the case, from a lawyer's standpoint, it would be interesting to explore this thing further and see whether or not the payment of attorney fees to Mr. Wilson's firm and the payment to Mr. Yeatts were such payments as would be authorized by law to be made for the city's benefit. . . "We are going to hire a lawyer to make you do this or make you do that." You get into a very interesting legal aspect of the case.
