Frazier's Radio and Record Shop completed moving during the weekend to their newly-relocated building on the west side of the courthouse square.

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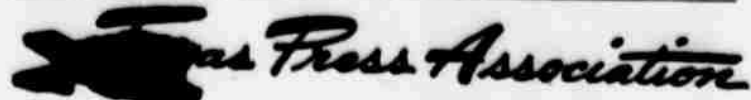

## Safety Rules for Kite Flying Time

Kite flying time will soon be here again. It's one of the oldest and best of juvenile diversions. But there can be danger in it, as well as fun.

So eight safety rules of kite flying recommended by the Pacific Gas & Electric Company of San Francisco should be emphasized to every child. Here they are: 1. Don't fly a kite with metal in the frame or tail. 2. Don't use tinsel-string wire or twine that has any metal in it. 3. Don't fly a kite near electric power lines. 4. Don't fly a kite over radio or TV aeri-als. Never pull on a string or climb a power pole to loosen a snagged kite. 5. Don't touch fallen electric wires. 6. Don't run across streets or highways while flying kites. 7. Don't fly a kite in the rain.

## PEOPLE, PLACES AND THINGS

The prolonged spell of wintry weather, which has prevailed almost continuously since the first of the year, has had an adverse effect on almost every type of business—from farming and ranching to automobile retailing and banking. Probably the hardest hit, as a class, because they depend on outdoor business, have been the camp operators at Lake Stamford.

It's been too cold to fish, even if the fish had been biting (and they hadn't), also too cold and windy for boating, out of season for hunting of any kind, and entirely too disagreeable for outdoor picnics at the Park.

One operator of a fishing camp at the lake told us the other day the past two months had been the quietest he'd ever known since the Park was opened to the public.

Perhaps the coming of Spring weather will stimulate a boom in fishing and boating with a consequent pick-up in business for the numerous well-equipped and modern camps at the Park and Lake.

Building of the new stretch of Farm-Market road to provide all-weather access to WTU's Paint Creek Power Plant will also be a boon to the Lake and Park.

The new road will extend to within a short distance of the Park, and eliminate a stretch of road that was almost impassable during wet weather, thereby cutting off a lot of traffic to the Park during unseasonal periods.

Concerning the WTU Power Plant, few people in this section realize that the Paint Creek installation is the largest generating station in the vast WTU system. It represents an investment of several million dollars and has one of the largest payrolls in the county.

A visit to the plant is a revelation in itself, with the complex layout of machinery ranging from three-story boilers and generators weighing hundreds of tons to intricate switchboards and control panels with their maze of wiring and flashing lights.

Visitors, especially groups, are always welcome to visit the plant, but preferably by appointment. The Lions Club recently planned to visit the station, carrying sack lunches and holding their meeting at the plant. However, a sleet and snow-gal Toss...People, Places... storm canceled the visit, which will be re-scheduled later.

Club groups and school teachers who would like to take their classes on a tour of the big power plant should contact Chief Engineer C. O. Holt, who will be glad to arrange for their visit.

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Since beer became legally available across the west county line, there has been a noticeable increase in beer cans and bottles littering roads and highways.

This has put more work on highway department employees who have to keep the highway right-of-way as clear of litter and rubbish as possible.

The coming of warm weather, bringing a seasonal upswing in beer consumption, will mean more "empties" for workers to clean up.

One highway worker was philosophical about the problem. He commented that notwithstanding the fact the wet weather had resulted in more "empties," picking them up had been made easier. Instead of tossing out one or two empties along the road today's beer guzzlers frequently set out a case at a time. Makes it a lot easier when you gather 'em up by the case, he commented.

Two Haskell men were jarred and badly shaken up the other night when their car left the highway, plunged across a deep barrow ditch and came to rest about 50 yards inside a field.

ing the County Superintendent Miss Jessie Vick tabulate the county school census for Austin. Mrs. Foy is going to check our tabulations, and I am sure we have made some mistakes, but give and take a few, here is a final count.

Carney has 109 boys and 92 girls making a total of 201. Haskell has 516 boys and 446 girls making a total of 962. Mattson has 41 boys and 42 girls making a total of 83. Paint Creek has 62 boys and 78 girls making a total of 140. Rochester has 142 boys and 130 girls making a total of 272. Rule has 204 boys and 184 girls making a total of 388. Sagerton has 37 boys and 26 girls making 63 in all. Weinert has 92 boys and 94 girls making a total of 186. The county total of white students is 2265.

Carney has 13 colored boys and 5 girls. Weinert has 4 colored boys. Paint Creek has 1 colored girl. Rule has 20 colored boys and 15 colored girls. Rochester has 13 colored boys and 7 colored girls and Haskell has 55 colored boys and 46 colored girls making a county total of 179 colored students.

That makes our grand total 2474 school children.

This Is Little League

(Note this is the first of several articles dealing with Little League Baseball, which has been inaugurated in Haskell as a summer activity for young boys. Purpose of these articles is to better acquaint parents with the aims and operation of Little League.)

Framework of Principles and Rules

The officers, Board of Directors and other personnel concerned with the administration of the local league must be thoroughly acquainted with the policies and rules of Little League Baseball, and must be prepared to pattern the operation of the league in the framework of these principles. In subscribing to the terms of the league charter, the league president assumes the responsibility of seeing to it that policies as well as rules are faithfully carried out. His signature on the league application for charter pledged his intention to do so. Haskell Little League received its charter for 1960, and has requested that 1960 tournament for Areas I, District 6 be held in Haskell this summer. Leagues which fail to comply with Little League policies are subject to revocation of charter and the resulting loss of right to use the Little League name and insignia. The policies of Little League are spelled out as "Regulations" in a manual and the Rule Book. They are reviewed by the Little League Congress and subject to such refinements as the growth and security of the program may dictate. Having implied acceptance of these policies or Regulations, local leagues must project leadership toward full understanding by all the people of the community and particularly by those who volunteer to help Little League as active workers. Many leagues conduct seminars or clinics for adult volunteers at the start of each season. Haskell Little League is now having a clinic each Tuesday and Thursday night at the City Fire Station at 7:30 p. m. This will continue through April. All parents and others interested in Little League Baseball are invited to enroll for the umpire training course. Guy Harris is in charge of this training course. He will be assisted by Dede Mercer. It is Haskell Little League aim that this procedure will pay handsome dividends in widening the scope of parent participation, securing additional volunteers and in general, stimulating community interest.

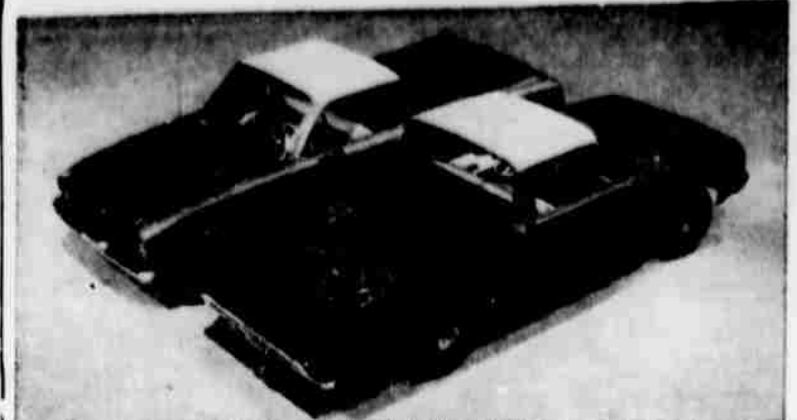

provided for an operator should be avoided. Such power equipment should be kept in good working order so that no additional assistance will be needed when the equipment is in operation. Driving or pulling a farm tractor at night on the highway without lights, and even with lights has often resulted in fatal accidents.

Accidents on our farms far outnumber those of other industries. Safety programs in industries and business train and teach employees safety and provide safety working conditions. On the individual farm there is no rigid safety program, and the individual farmer or operator should recognize and do many unsafe practices.

No serious farm have been reported. Koehler concluded. He urged a reminder to all farmers of machinery operators of their precautions during period of peak farm use is upon us.

## Rules of Safety Important In All Farm Operations

People when driving their cars on the streets or highways will respect a red traffic signal at the intersection simply because common sense indicates danger exists from cross traffic. Red traffic lights do not exist for the many hazards which people encounter daily on farms.

Farm people cannot avoid accidents or bodily injury by looking for the red light of Safety on farm tractors, combines, cotton harvesters and other power equipment. You must practice safety rules and use common sense. A few moments of clear thinking can keep that hasty impulse from becoming an injury or a fatality, stated Harry G. Koehler, Conservation Aide for the Haskell Soil Conservation Service.

Manufacturers build farm machinery with all the safety features possible, without impairing the operating efficiency

of the machine. It is often necessary to remove safety shields to hook up drag type equipment. These shields cover spinning shafts, V belts or roller chains. Many times these protective shields are not replaced because it takes a little extra time, or often the shield hides a grease fitting which is difficult to service. The manufacturer does not provide safety shields for the sake of appearance of the equipment. These safety devices have a definite purpose—keeping operators from coming in contact with spinning shafts or belts. Loose or torn shirt sleeves and trouser legs should never be worn when operating power equipment, Koehler insisted. Loose ends of clothing can become entangled in a spinning shaft, V belt or drive chain. Results: bodily injury, possible lifetime impairment, or death.

Koehler gave other unsafe practices which seldom are thought of as being unsafe. Permitting another person to ride on the tractor other than the operator becomes even more unsafe when pulling drawn equipment at high speed or over rough ground. Riding or standing on drawn equipment of a power nature where there is not a platform or seat

## Crime In Texas Shows Marked Increase

Major crimes in Texas during 1959 showed a marked increase according to figures released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

In a report from Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the most marked increase over the year 1958, crime in all categories increased 3.9 per cent over the previous year.

Of the remaining six major crimes — murder, rape, robbery, burglary, theft and auto theft — only robbery showed a decline. According to the estimates, there were 45,827 burglaries in 1959 as compared with 44,822 in 1958, an increase of 2.2 per cent. Offenses in the automobile theft category totaled 15,830 as compared with 15,402 in 1958.

The crime report showed that on each day of the year 1959 there were 125 burglaries, 43 automobiles stolen, 266 thefts other than automobile, 32 aggravated assaults, 7 robberies, 3 rapes and 3 murders.

On a ten year basis crime in Texas percentage-wise by far outgained population. During the last decade the population of our state increased 24.4 per cent while crime increased 73.2 per cent.

Of other information in the report, the department's Identification and Criminal Records Section received 72,434 sets of criminal fingerprints in 1959, compared with 110,531 last year — an increase of 52.59 per cent. In the year 1959 identifications were made on 35,649 fingerprints, while 66,961 were identified in 1959; this was an increase of 87.73 per cent.

As was true in all phases of law enforcement work, activities in the department's chemical laboratory showed tremendous gains. In 1959, 2,500 chemical examinations were completed, last year there were 10,179.

### Get Ready Now For Needs of Baby Chicks

Before those baby chicks come the successful poultryman has several things to do. The performance of these chicks, when mature as broilers or layers, will depend on the care they receive during brooding.

The most important thing is to have the brooder house prepared, says Ed Kosarek, poultry supervisor, Texas A&M Poultry Science Department. Several steps should be followed carefully. Kosarek explains them as follows:

Clean out all old litter and disinfect the house and equipment before putting down new litter. This is a good way to stop disease outbreaks before they occur.

Turn on the brooders a day or so in advance of the chick's arrival to check for needed repairs and then adjust the hover temperature to 95 degrees. Thereafter cut the heat down each week until it reaches 70 degrees or until heat is no longer required. Also, set chick guards up about 3 feet from the brooder edge so chicks can spread out.

After the chicks come use paper plates or filler flats to provide one and one-half inches of feeding space per chick for the first few days. A high quality mash is recommended for deakbeak chicks for the first few days. It is easy to eat and should be plentiful.

Provide plenty of fresh, clean water, Kosarek emphasizes. In winter, warm water should be used. Two one-gallon waterers per 100 chicks is sufficient.

Keep the chicks warm but be sure there is enough fresh air in the house. Gosarek points out. And last but not least, a good disease preventative measure is to keep chicks at least 300 feet away from older birds.

If more information is desired, see your local county agent.

Z. Oswald, president of the board of directors of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, and Homer Scott, treasurer for the drive, urged all residents of Haskell to watch for their Easter Seals and to respond generously to the appeal.

### Plant Diseases Cut Livestock Profits

The prevention and control of plant diseases are important in livestock production because profits depend on maximum yields from pastures and crops.

In many instances, says Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist, the weather, soil or planting seed get the blame for low production when plant diseases cause the losses. Too, he adds, poor quality feed or forage often result from damages caused by plant diseases. Such feed does not contain the vitamins, minerals and other essentials necessary for good animal health, says the pathologist.

The fungi, bacteria and other germs which cause plant diseases cannot be seen with the naked eye. And plant diseases are difficult or impossible to control once they have infected a crop. However, says Smith, many can be prevented. For example, the treating of planting seed with a good fungicide will aid in controlling some feed and forage crop diseases.

The pathologist suggests that
