

#### Water Problem Is Statewide

We may have a muddy spring this year . . . but will there be enough water for Texans in 2010?

This is not a fantastic question, but one that Texas' state and local officials, engineers and water planners are grappling with now. Out of their efforts come these items of news and views:

1. Gov. Price Daniel told a farm convention in Austin that Texas has made great progress in statewide water management in the past three years. But, he said, "much more remains to was broken.

Water planning and development, said the governor, is essential to the state's growth and prosperity in the years ahead.

2. A series of three meetings will be held during March along the Colorado River and its tributaries to discuss water needs of those areas for the next 50 years.

3. State Board of Water Engineers called for a "time out" untill March 8 on the longest-ever water hearing. At issue in the hearings which began Nov. 2 is whether the Trinity River Authority and City of Houston shall be granted permits to build the approval of a Fort Worth two downstream reservoirs on the Trinity. In far-ranging testimony, water engineers discussed the probable water needs of here. Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth in 2010, and the possibility that Texas might be subjected before 2010 to a drought worse than ter containing a check and a that of 1950-57.

All in all, it adds up to the fact that the water problem is going to remain in the forefront as one of the most pressing needs facing Texas for years to come.





# Concerning The Water Authority

My first impulse is to say "THANK YOU" to R. W. Herren who as a member of the NCTM Water Authority and on behalf of the Water Authority issues "AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PEOPLE OF HASKELL" calling on certain men as named in his letter, to deliver to the City Council of Haskell, definite firm commitment from reliable contractor and firm or reliable engineers, bonded to the City of Haskell guaanteeing that they can deliver water to Haskell within one year at a price not to exceed \$650,000 for the complete installation for all facilities necessary to the contract.

I have recently contacted a Bond Broker and a Firm of Engineers. Men whose volume of business enters well into the millions of dollars per annum.

MEN WHO KNOW THAT THEY KNOW

These men give me their word of promise the contract can be consummated as above outlined and that they will be ready to enter into negotiations with the City Council of Haskell as soon as that Body is released from it present obligations to the N.C.T.M. Water Authority and authorized to provide water for the City of Haskell.

The Bond Broker says that the entire issue can be carried in Revenue Bonds against the Water and Sewer Department of the City of Haskell. With a final maturity of thirty-one

All maturities through the first ten years bearing 4 per cent interest, the next three years 41/2 per cent, fourteen years and later at 5 per cent, with the City of Haskell holding an option to redeem the entire issue at the end of fifteen years if money is available at a cheaper rate of interest.

In Bob's open Letter he stated that Lake Stamford water would cost us 40 cents per thousand gallon. That sounds high; in that we have been told through the years that we pay 30 cents per thousand gallons for Miller Creek

We know that the price of Miller Creek water cannot be less than the cost of creating and maintaining the lake. That Haskell's proportion of the bond issue for that is one million, nine hundred thousand dollars, that 5 per cent interest on that amount is \$95,000.00. We must add to the interest a sufficient amount to pay the entire bond issue in forty years. This will necessitate a payment well over \$100,000 per

We don't have Engineer's figures substantiating Bob's estimate of \$744,954 necessary to connect us by pipeline and other facilities for using water from Lake Stamford. I have a lesser estimate but for safety I am glad to have his Engineer's figures and will use them.

The Fond Broker assures me that this amount will be easily handled against Revenue bonds of our Water and Sewer Department and that average annual payment required to retire them in thirty-one years will be \$47,900.00 per year. Add to this amount the cost of water at the lake and we will have the entire annual payment required.

I am not prepared to discuss here the costs of filtering and transporting the water but it is presumed that there will be an economic saving in pumping the water 11 miles from Lake Stamford rather than thirty-three miles from Miller

There are some people of Haskell who say that they prefer to build the Miller Creek Lake that they may leave it a heritage to their children. To these I would say, "The life of West Texas lakes do not average forty years." If you should go before that time your descendants would inherit the tax burden.

In this connection I quote to you, Mr. S. W. Freese, from page 14, Engineering report on Miller Creek Water Supply, to N.C.T.M. Water Authority:


