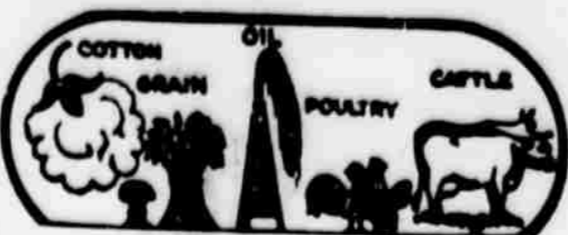

January Bond Sales in County Total \$35,440

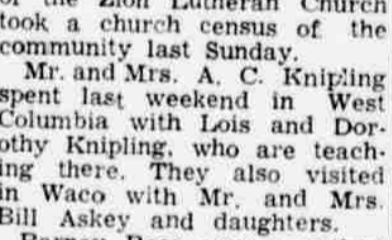

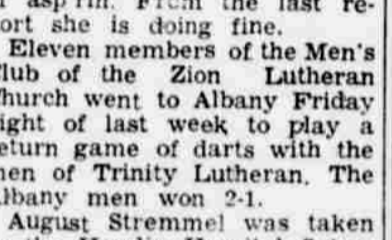

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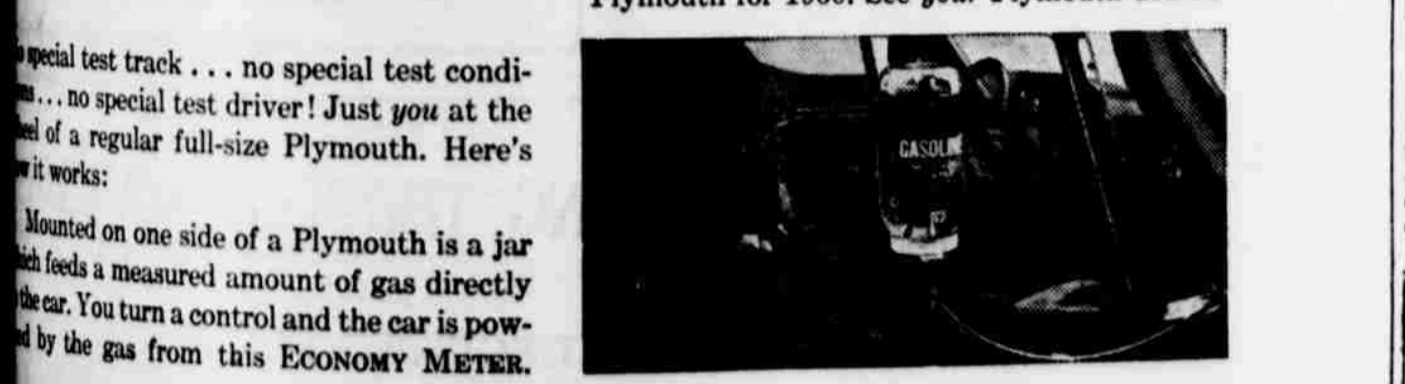

New Bird Book On Texas Birds Now On Sale

Austin — Distribution of A FIELD GUIDE TO THE BIRDS OF TEXAS, written and illustrated by Dr. Roger Tory Peterson, is now being made by the Texas Game and Fish Commission, according to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary.

This book covers 542 species of birds found in Texas. It is fully illustrated with 13 full pages of silhouettes. There are 60 pages with a total of 36 in full color. The book at the present time can be purchased only from the Game and Fish Commission, at a price of \$3.95 per copy. The Commission contracted for 25,000 of the books through Houghton Mifflin Company of Boston.

Dr. Peterson has been compiling the book for the past four years, with the assistance of a number of Texas ornithologists. The pocket size book is similar to other Peterson books, such as A FIELD

GUIDE TO THE BIRDS, and A FIELD GUIDE TO THE WESTERN BIRDS. This book according to Mr. Dodgen, is the most complete work of its kind on the Texas birds, and will be widely used by bird watchers, libraries, and public schools in the study of a great number of birds found in Texas. Persons desiring the book should send their orders with \$3 directly to the Game and Fish Commission, Walton State Building, Austin, Texas.
