Joe Rumaldo Fuentes, age 79 died Sunday, September 10, 2000 in Dumas, TX

Mr. Fuentes was born in Genova near Gallegos, NM on June 30, 1921. He moved to Dalhart in the 1950's and worked at the Ice Plant in Dalhart. He worked for the late Dr. Thompson as a veterinarian Assistant at the Dalhart Animal Hospital. He later worked for Mr. & Mrs. Webb Whorton until their deaths in 1961. He later moved to Stratford where he lived until his death. Mr. Fuentes was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church and was a Knights of Columbus, In 1985 he received the Pro Ecclesia Et Pontifice Medal from Pope John Paul II for his zealous work in the church.



# **Pointers For Parents**

### **New Books Teach Parents How To Help Children Learn**

(NAPS)—What's the best way for parents to help young children learn? "Drill and grill routines"? Flash cards? Not according to nationally-renowned educator Samuel Meisels, Ed.D.

He recommends parents involve their children in engaging, creative activities that fit easily into daily living.

Not only is this approach more enjoyable, experts say it has proven to be more effective in reinforcing what's taught in school than have the "packaged" learning programs sold for home use.

Rather than flash cards, Dr. Meisels suggests parents engage in activities such as:

• Finding counting opportunities wherever you can. For example, for a three-year-old, try counting the number of bears or flowers on your child's shirt or the buttons on the front,

· Putting different food coloring tints in separate glasses of water. Add stalks of celery and watch the celery change color. Ask your fouryear-old why this happens,

· Encouraging your five-yearold to arrange toys into different groupings, such as by color or size.

· Asking your six-year-old to perform small writing tasks for you, such as a note to the teacher, • Creating add-a-line stories

with your seven-year-old, and Working with your eight-yearold to make up the words to a

 Wash hands frequently, especially when handling raw meat. Use warm, soapy water, and dry hands completely with paper towels like Sparkle® or Coronet® so you can wipe off and throw away the germs.
