





**APPROVES EMERGENCY CRP HAYING** AND GRAZING FOR TEXAS

USDA

(Stratford, TX) - January 23, 2006 - in continuing response to this year's widespread drought, Hemphill, Rebecca Executive Director for the Sherman County Farm Service today announced Extended Education program and approval for emergency haying Stinnett Emergency Medical and grazing of Conservation Services will offer a Basic Reserve Program (CRP) acreage

Emergency haying of CRP is authorized until May 1, 2006 and emergency grazing is authorized until June 1, 2006. Producers must file a request to hay or graze CRP acreage and visit the Natural Resources Conservation Service to obtain a modified conservation plan prior to haying or grazing the

CRP participants who do not own or lease livestock may rent or lease the having and grazing privilege to an eligible livestock producer located in an approved

"In Sight of recent weather patterns, it is imperative that USDA offer the Emergency CRP haying and grazing program to Texas producers. Availability of forage is literally a matter of survival in the unpredictable and often unforgiving agriculture industry," said Hemphill.

CRP offers annual payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource-conserving cover or eligible land, USDA will monitor producers to ensure the land is hayed or grazed damaging conservation covers,

additional USDA offers programs to assist droughtstricken producers, including emergency farm loans the emergency conservation program and the noninsured crop disaster assistance program. 

The 8th grade Lady Elks beat White Deer 21-15. Chelbye Ellis was high point with 7 points followed by Channing Zieman with 6 points.






