"The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. But while men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat and went away. But when the wheat sprang up and bore grain, then the tares became evident also" (Matthew 13:24-26). In this parable, the wheat and the weeds grow together until the harvest. The harvest is the end of the age or the final judgment. At that time the wheat and the tares will be separated, but not before. Jesus says this is how it is in the church.
