WOULD YOU LIKE TO MANAGE YOUR OWN BUSINESS?

The Sherman County Development Committee is searching for someone that has retail and/or management experience; someone that has the drive to manage and eventually own a business; someone that if given the chance – will take the business and work hard to make it grow.

The SCDC's Retail Committee is putting together a Retail Business Incubator Program. Nearly all incubators in the Panhandle area are industry-based but Stratford needs a retail store so we are devising our own plan for a Ben Franklin store. For those of you that don't remember, Ben Franklin is about the same as a Duckwalls or Alco, with maybe a few higher-tag items. Many of you may think they sell only arts & crafts but we will open a Ben Franklin Hybrid Store. This type of store carries clothes, cards, school supplies, sewing notions, laundry detergent, and many more items, too numerous to list.

A business incubator gives a person the ability to own their own business, with help and guidance along the way from the Director (Retail Committee). The SCDC owns the property and the fixtures and rental leases would be signed by both parties. The Retail Committee will assist with business tasks like bookkeeping, ordering through vendors, floor plans, tax returns, etc.

Like the Director/Retail Committee, the Manager will have duties and criteria also. A packet will be available on March 15th at the SCDC Office for all serious applicants but a few of the requirements are listed below:

Business goals and sales quotas will be an important part of the program. The prospective owner will be able to own a percentage of the business through an incentive plan based on meeting these goals.

is the emphasis made by many on mystical experiences involving inner impressions. The great seventeenth century evangelist, George Whitefield, followed such impressions. Whitefield had the distinct impression his son would also be a great preacher. The son died. Obviously this : impression was not from God. Too often we are told : to yield to such impressions. This is how we yield to God. However, Romans 6:13 says, "Yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto : God". What does it really mean to yield to God? Yielding to God does not involve inner mystical experiences. Yielding to God refers to our actions. We yield to God's commands. We obey God. When you : see a YIELD sign on the highway, you obey by slowing down. The same word is translated 'present' in Romans 12:1, "Present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God". You present your body to God by obeying His word given in the Bible. As the gospel song says, "Trust and obey, for there's no other way to be happy in Jesus, but to trust : and obey". As the Bible says, "Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice" (1 Samuel 15:22).



That is not too shabby for a kid who swapped weight classes midway through the season. He started the year at 152 pounds, and though he never weighed more than that, he finished at

"Seth (Stephenson) was wrestling at 160, and he didn't weight more than 147 pounds," Kyler says. "So I bumped up, and Seth didn't have to give up so much weight to his opponents. But I never weighed more than 152 the whole year."

The 160-pound class suited Kyler, who was excited to win her first two matches at state. In his previous two years to qualify, Kyler lost is 1st two matches and was eliminated from the medal

Kyler beat Jake Lashley of Benjamin Russell with a 10-2 major decision in the opening round, pinned Tripp Otis of Gardendale in the second round of the semi-finals then lost 9-2 to Ben Barrontine of Fort Payne in the finals.

"Againt Lashley, I controlled the match," Kyler says. "I didn't wrestle to the best of my ability, just well enough to win.

"In the second round, Otis was really tough," he adds. "But at the start of the second period, he chose down and when he tried to stand, I crawled on him. After that, it took me about 25 seconds to pin him."

Kyler wasn't happy at all with his performance in the finals. He had beat Barrontine earlier in the year, but lost their last two battles.

"I was very disappointed in myself." Kyler says. "I didn't wrestle well at all.

"If I had the match to do over, I'd be much more aggressive," he adds. "I was wrestling very defensively. I'd also try to stay calm. After he had me down the first time, I just lost my cool. Everybody was watching, it was the state finals and I lost it. I should have wrestled like it was just another match."

The AHS junior completed the season at 32-13 and is 88-39 for his high school career. He went 32-16 as a freshman and 24-10 his sophomore year.

He is the son of Mike and Debra Kirkwood and Larry and Kay Lynn Doss.

In addition to wrestling, Kyler has been an integral part of the Knights' football team for the past two seasons.
