Sherman **County Tax** Office Closed September 8th

The Sherman County tax Office will be closed on Friday, Sept. 8, 2006. Valerie & Patsy will be in Amarillo attending an informational seminar on House Bill 4. which is the new standard presumptive value law that goes into effect on Oct. 1, 2006. This bill adds to the Tax Code section 152.0412, which changes the tax base for calculating sales and use tax of a used motor vehicle in a private party transaction. As of Oct. 1, 2006, the sales price of a used motor vehicle, for purposes of determining the tax due, is no less than 80% of the used motor vehicle's standard presumptive value, or an appraised value as established by a certified appraisal. If a used motor vehicle is purchased from a dealer, the sales price on the title application or dealer's invoice shall be used to calculate the tax due.


