Weinberger: \$305 billion budget sensible

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—A \$305 billion budget proposed to Congress by Secretary of defense Caspar W. Weinberger is sensible and will provide a reasonable response to threats to national security.

This assessment of the proposed fiscal 1985 budget was made by Gen. John W. Vessey, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of staff, while speaking before the Senate Armed Service Committee this month.

In support of his statement, General Vessey discussed the state of national defense. He outlined threats to national security, modernization of

American Forces, arms control and people in the Armed Forces.

Threat

"Reductions in the President's requested budget this past year have slowed the momentum of revitalization," said General Vessey. "This slowed rate of growth in force capabilities will affect readiness and retard responsiveness in a crisis. The Joint Chiefs of Staff have looked at the threats to our nation's security and at our strategy. We believe this year's budget is sensible; it is a reasonable response to threats to national security and to the re-

quirements of military strategy of the United States.

"While we are restoring our strength," he continued, "the Soviets are not standing still. Over the last 10 years, the Soviets have produced three times as many aircraft and four times as many tanks and other tracked vehicles than has the United States. They have deployed a large and powerful navy. In 1982 alone, they (the Soviets) deployed more than 1,200 intercontinental ballistic missile warheads . . . and another 200 ICBM warheads in 1983. All this is taking place and we have not yet deployed a single peace-keeper missile. Soviet military power impedes the peaceful resolution of third world problems and con-

tributes to regional instability in ways that could promote wider conflict," he said.

General Vessey also pointed out that instability in Central America and the Middle East are "dangerous situations" that the United States must address.

Modernization

"Because U.S. Forces will likely remain small relative to the requirements we have for them, they need to be as effective and flexible as possible," he said. "Our forces must be fully equipped with modern equipment to give them the necessary technological edge over a numerically superior enemy. Our forces must be well trained.

"The Joint Chiefs believe that the proper balance has been struck—the balance be-

tween providing for present needs in readiness and sustainability and ensuring future capabilities through modernization. The modernization programs are jeopardized by Soviet successes in acquiring western technology. The nation urgently needs to protect the technology which gives our forces an edge over potential enemies," he said.

Increasing the capabilities of military reservists and improving a coalition among American services and Allied Forces were also cited by General Vessey as essential to national defense.

Arms Control

"The Joint Chiefs fully support efforts to gain genuine, mutual, equitable and veri-

Team recruits local dogs

The Department of Defense is looking for a few good dogs who want a rewarding career in the military and will pay up to \$400 for each one they accept.

Reese is hosting a dog buying team from the Department of Defense Dog Center through Saturday. Requirements for four-legged recruits are that they be predominant German Shepherds, Rotweilers or Bouvier des Flandres; either sex; one to three years old; weigh at least 55 pounds, stand at least 22

inches at the shoulder; and that the legal owners consent to the sale or donation.

If the dog meets the breed and other physical standards it will be considered for recruitment, but must satisfactorily complete a series of evaluation.

First and most important is gunfire. Several blank rounds are fired into the air from a distance of 100 feet decreasing to 30 feet. A dog that is afraid of the noise has no future with the Department

of Defense and is rejected on the spot.

The second area is aggression. Never touching the dog, but only acting in a suspicious threatening manner, the evaluator tries to agitate it. Will the dog stand its ground and dare the agitator to come closer, or will it be at the end of the leash snarling and snapping to get at him? If not, the dog is termed under-aggressive and rejected. If it does, the military can use him.

CARE Line

The CARE Line is prepared by Col. John R. Hullender, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, on a weekly basis. All information provided to the CARE Line will be held in strict confidence. Callers are urged to give their name and duty telephone number so that a personal reply may be made; however, neither are mandatory. Callers should use the CARE Line only after all possible means to air their views or complaints through the chain of command have been exhausted. The CARE Line number is 885- (Ext.) 3273.

A caller asks why the hospital pharmacy requires written prescriptions from doctors downtown, and why they never seem to have the medication she needs.

Air Force regulation states that "medications are dispensed from the pharmacy only on the receipt of a prescription or bulk drug request signed by the appropriate authority." This prohibits the pharmacy from accepting called-in prescriptions. It also says that "prescriptions are honored if they are written by civilian practitioners for routinely stocked drugs." If a practitioner

authorizes alternate produce selection, then the pharmacy may generically substitute if they have an appropriate product available. If the practitioner specifies "Dispense as written", then the item must be filled as written by the physician. If that brand is not in stock, the pharmacy cannot fill the prescription nor may they call the practitioner for an alteration of the prescription.

The caller further inquired as to why she is responsible for CHAMPUS payments when she was referred off base by the flight surgeon.



When a military physician has primary responsibility for patient care, then civilian consultations may be obtained from civilian sources when necessary. However, when a physician can no longer provide treatment or the facility does not have the care available, the patient will be released and referred under the CHAMPUS program to a civilian provider or another military medical facility. The latter situation pertains to this care.

Does limiting the Officers' Wives' Club scholarship program to dependents of officers constitute discrimination, asks a CARE Line caller.

Our legal folks say no because organizations can limit scholarship recipients to any group of people they want. However, the OWC has now opened the applications to dependents of both officers and NCOs.

Top cop explains base parking

The Reese population is very fortunate to have few traffic problems. Being "isolated" from major traffic routes allows each driver to concentrate on driving and distractions are minimal. We escape the hustle and bustle commonly found in large metropolitan areas. However, parking has become a premium and the source of intense aggravation.

Wing Supplement 1 to Air Force Regulation 125-14 outlines the rules of road for Reese. The supplement tells us what constitutes legal and illegal parking. Parking tickets will be issued by the Security Police when violations are observed. Parking against the flow of traffic, next to a yellow curb, next to a red curb (fire zone), or in a reserved parking place not assigned to you are examples of illegal parking. These violations are easy to enforce because

they are commonly understood and highly visible violations.

Yet, other technical violations occur which are not quite as visible. Did you know you can be issued a parking ticket for parking a vehicle within 20 feet of an intersection? Did you know you can be issued a parking ticket for parking a vehicle within 10 feet of a fire hydrant, even if the curb is not painted red? These are technical violations and are outlined in the Wing Supplement.

The parking problem is recognized. Within the next few months, we will begin repainting the reserved and prohibited parking areas. In the meantime, the Security Police will continue to exercise as much leniency as possible. We ask you, the driver, to assist us by parking with care and caution. We solicit your support, in following traffic laws and helping alleviate parking hazards and complications.

He did professional work and everyone noticed. He had the look of a fast burner and an excellent chance for below-the-zone promotion.

He had a very nice assignment to one of the California bases. The paper work for his medal was on my desk. He could have easily made staff sergeant in four years.

But he won't. He was in correctional custody for the holidays. He was fined \$200 and received a suspended reduction to airman basic. The assignment was cancelled.

Why? He smoked marijuana.

He didn't think he'd be caught. He listened to a "friend" tell him how to beat the urinalysis. Of course it didn't work.

Was I surprised? No. I have heard the same story many times.

Was I sick? You bet. He had it all going this way—all the way—until he threw it away.

Intelligent? Yes he is. He learns quickly and is very capable. Lucky? Very. He has another chance—most don't. If he stays lucky, it should take six years to be where he should have been in four.

It probably didn't cost more than several thousand dollars, his assignment, 30 days of freedom, the respect and confidence of his superiors and the extra years he must work to regain some of that.

The cost could have been much higher.

Patriotism lifts souls, minds, bodies

Patriotism is the spirit that lifts men's souls, minds and bodies to the lofty regions of super human effort in war and in peace. It is love of homeland, of government, of people, of institutions, of laws, of symbols. Patriotism is a force citizens of a nation must have and foster if they are to remain a sovereign nation.

Patriotism is the raging fire that turned gentle colonial farmers into ferocious warriors who built America. It is the spirit that's brought America victorious through war and tribulation over the last two centuries. It is many things to many people, but it will always be the foundation for national survival. All other elements of national resolve and power spring from patriotism; it is crucial to national defense.

The American Creed, written by William Tyler Page and adopted by the U.S. House of Representatives in 1918, captures the essence of American patriotism.

"I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic, a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect union one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes. I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support

its Constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies."

Douglas MacArthur emphasized the importance of patriotism to a strong military in the annual report of the U.S. Army chief of staff in 1933.

"The unflinching formula for production of morale is patriotism, self-respect, discipline, and self-confidence within a military unit, joined with fair treatment and merited appreciation from without. It cannot be produced by pampering or coddling an army, and is not necessarily destroyed by hardship, danger, or even calamity.

"Though it can survive and develop in adversity that comes as an inescapable incident of service, it will quickly wither and die if soldiers come to believe themselves the victims of indifference or injustice on the part of their government, or of ignorance, personal ambition, or ineptitude on the part of their military leaders."

Adlai Stevenson in a speech in New York City in 1952 gave his views of patriotism.

"What do we mean by patriotism in the context of our times? . . . A patriotism that puts country ahead of self; a patriotism which is not short, frenzied outbursts of emotion, but the tranquil and steady dedication of a lifetime. There are words that are easy to utter, but this is a mighty assignment. For it is often easier to fight for principles that to live up to them."

Edward Everett spoke of the importance of patriots in times of distress in his Mount

Vernon Papers published in the mid-19th century.

"The days of palmy prosperity are not those most favorable to the display of public virtue or the influence of wise and good men. In hard, doubtful, unprosperous, and dangerous times, the disinterested and patriotic find their way, by a species of public instinct, unopposed, joyfully welcomed, to the control of affairs."

Surely, this is the day for the American patriot.

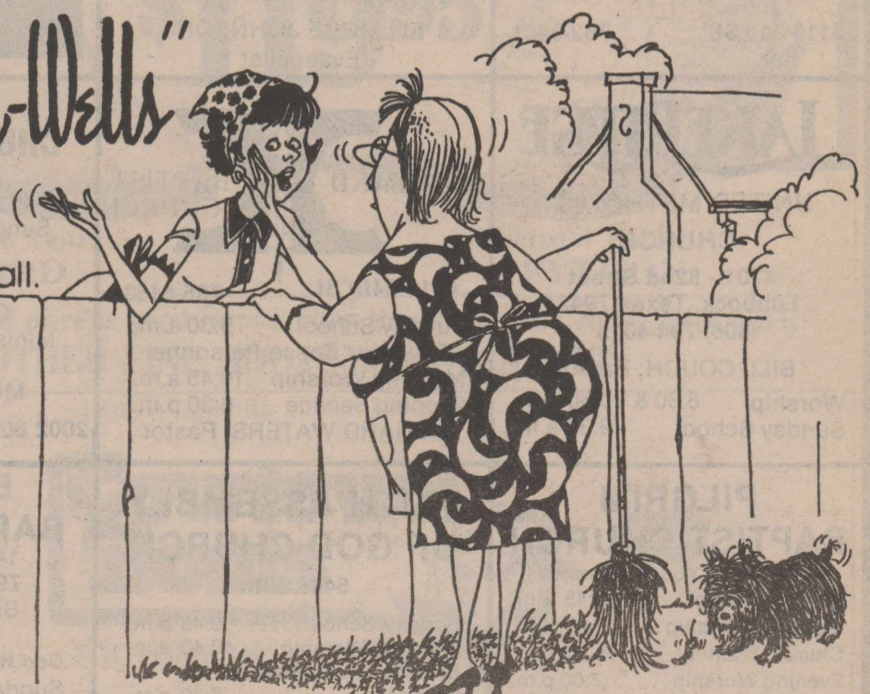

Weather

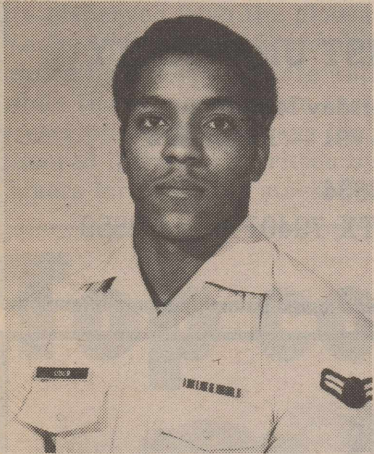
Amn. Heyward T. Whiddon topped all base January CDC results with his 98 percent score on his five-level test.

Society provides emergency aid

The Air Force Aid Society (AFAS) is "here for you in '84" to provide emergency assistance to Air Force personnel and their families in their aim. The assistance is primarily in the area of essentials for daily living (rent, food, utilities, etc.) and emergency expenses (funeral, travel, car repairs, etc.).

The AFAS also provides educational assistance for attending vocational or undergraduate schools. Two programs have been develop-

ed to help with these needs. The first is the Gen. Henry H. Arnold Program, which is available to dependent children. The Gen. George S. Brown Senior Loan Program is available to Air Force members and their spouses.

Both programs provide student loans at 8 percent interest and repayments need not start until six months after school completion.

The Reese AFAS provided \$59,721 to local personnel and their families in 1983. Interest free loans of \$55,001 went to 133 people, while \$4,720 in grants went to 5 people. All together 233 checks were written to 138 people at an average of \$256.31 per check.

Reese AFAS in this past year has worked with and assisted people in many different ways. One individual who needed to get home 'yesterday' to attend his

father's funeral received help from AFAS. Specifically, from the time he submitted the application to the time he was on the plane, was less than three hours. In yet another case, the widow of a retiree was given a loan to help pay for utilities while she was waiting for her finances to be established. An airman

on PCS orders, traveling through the Lubbock area to another base, had transmission problems with his automobile—the AFAS assisted.

The Society's involvement varies greatly but always entails the same genuine care for all customers in need of financial help. The AFAS is also prepared to refer people

to proper agencies when they are unable to help.

Persons in need of emergency financial assistance or are interested in educational loans should call the CBPO Personal Affairs at ext. 3643 for an appointment. No appointment is necessary for picking up student loan applications.

20 base members draw punishment

A senior airman was found guilty by court martial Feb. 15 on a charge of desertion and was sentenced to 10 months confinement at hard labor.

The airman from 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron also received a bad conduct discharge, a reduction in grade to airman basic, and a forfeiture of all pay and allowances.

The airman who pleaded not guilty to the charges, was apprehended by Miami, Fla., police during a routine identity check. At that time he had been gone from Reese for almost a year.

During December and January, 19 people received punishment under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

Five individuals were punished for wrongful use of marijuana. Two airman first class from Civil Engineering were reduced in grade to airman, assigned 45 days extra duties, and fined \$321 for two months. An airman first class from the hospital squadron was reduced in grade to airman, assigned 14 days extra duties, and fined \$150. A 1958th Communications Squadron sergeant was re-

duced to airman first class, assigned 14 days extra duties, and fined \$177. A sergeant from CE was reduced to airman first class, assigned 45 days extra duties, and fined \$381 for two months.

Three airmen were punished for driving while intoxicated. An airman basic from Air Base Group was fined \$286 for two months, but all in excess of \$100 was suspended. He also drew 30 days extra duties. An airman from Supply Squadron received a suspended reduction in grade, was fined \$160 for two months, and assigned to extra duties for 14 days. A Field Maintenance squadron airman was reduced to airman basic and restricted to the base for 60 days.

A charge of drunk on duty against an Air Base Group airman first class was punished with a reduction to airman basic, 14 days extra duties, and a fine of \$286 for two months. All fines in excess of \$100 were suspended.

Five airmen were punished for failure to go. An airman from OMS was reduced in grade to airman basic and assigned 15 days extra duties. A CE airman first class

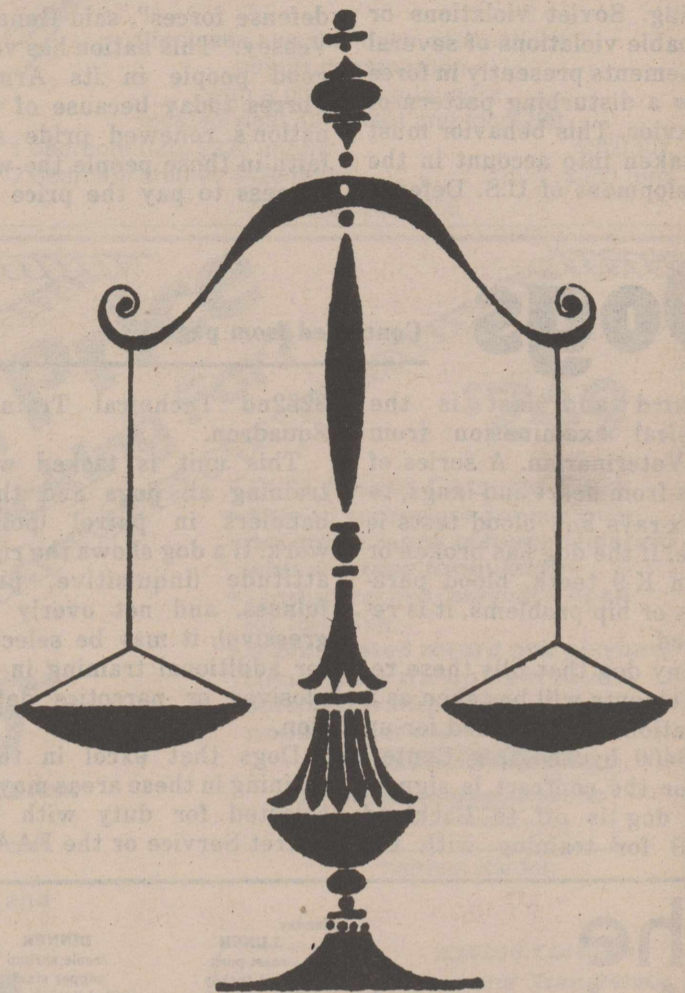

The second offender from the hospital was busted to airman, fined \$150 and assigned 14 days extra duties. The ABG member received a suspended bust to airman, 15 days extra duties, and a fine of \$50 for two months.

Two airmen first class were punished for disobeying a lawful order. An individual from OMS received a suspended reduction in grade to airman, was fined \$50 for two

months, and was assigned 15 days extra duties. An individual from the hospital was

busted to airman, fined \$150, and assigned 14 days extra duties.

fiable reductions in armaments," he said. "Arms control should not be viewed as a substitute for force modernization; rather, arms control and other defense efforts should be mutually reinforcing. Soviet violations or probable violations of several agreements presently in force show a disturbing pattern of behavior. This behavior must be taken into account in the development of U.S. Defense

programs and approaches to arms control.

People

"No matter how good the strategy or how excellent the equipment, good people will remain the heart of our defense forces", said General Vessey. "This nation has very good people in its Armed Forces today because of the nation's renewed pride and faith in those people the willingness to pay the price for

adequate security.

"The men and women in uniform need to know we will give them the best possible equipment and training for their difficult tasks. They need to know this nation will provide reasonable pay and compensation for them and their families. The Armed Forces need to have confidence that trends will not be set in motion that will erode pay and other benefits."

Third and last is the physical examination from the Veterinarian. A series of tests from heart and lungs, to hip x-rays and blood tests is done. If the dog has broken or worn K-9 teeth, blood parasites or hip problems, it is rejected.

Any dog that fills these requirements will be taken as a donation, or purchased for up to \$400 by the Dog Center. After the contract is signed, the dog is off to Lackland AFB for training with the

3282nd Technical Training Squadron.

This unit is tasked with training all dogs and their handlers in patrol (police) work. If a dog shows the right attitude (inquisitive, playfulness, and not overly aggressive), it may be selected for additional training in explosives or narcotics detection.

Dogs that excel in their training in these areas may be selected for duty with the Secret Service or the FAA.

A dog recruited for the DOD Dog Center is a valuable and expensive investment. Because of this, the dog will be placed on a high protein, maximum stress diet that will be tailored to its needs for the rest of its career, groomed constantly and will be given a complete physical twice a year by its assigned veterinarian.

Interested dog owners should call 885-3535 from 7:30 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. for an appointment.

Dental tips help 'sweet tooth'

(This is the final in a series of articles on "Going Through Life With a Smile," presented in observance of National Children's Dental Health Month.)

Ask a hundred people what foods are bad for their teeth and they'll all say "sugar." They're right. The bacteria in our mouths that live in dental plaque use the sugars in our foods to produce acids that attack the tooth enamel. But what exactly is meant by the word "sugar"?

There are many different types of sugars. In the past, dental researchers thought that only one type—sucrose—was harmful to teeth. The white or brown refined sugar found in sugar bowls or used in cooking is sucrose, but sucrose is naturally present in many foods, too, including bananas, beets, melons,

peaches, and sweet potatoes.

Today, studies have shown that all types of sugars can promote tooth decay. These sugars include sucrose, fructose (fruit sugar), glucose, lactose (milk sugar), and maltose (grain sugar). Many natural foods contain one or more of these sugars—for example, apples, pears, grapes, raisins, and even milk.

Processed foods often contain one or more types of sugars. Sugars are added to these foods to help preserve them, as well as to enhance their flavor. The list of foods that have added sugars includes some you might not guess, such as catsup, non-dairy creamers, lunch meat, peanut butter, and salad dressing.

Instead of refined sugars some people prefer to use honey, molasses, and corn syrup. They believe that these sweeteners are better

for their health or for their teeth. However, these sweeteners all contain fructose, glucose, sucrose, and other sugars that contribute to tooth decay. In fact, because these products tend to stick to the teeth, they may be even more harmful to the teeth than refined sugars.

Should you eliminate all foods containing sugars from your diet? That's not a good idea. Your body needs the

nutrients found in milk, vegetables, fruit, and other foods, as well as the calories these foods provide.

Here are some suggestions from the American Dental Association:

—Limit your snacks. By doing this, you will minimize the number of acid attacks your teeth receive.

—Avoid snacking on foods that contain sugars. These foods cause the bacteria in

your mouth to produce acids.

—If you're hungry for a piece of cake, wait until dessert. Research has shown that foods containing sugars are less harmful to the teeth when eaten as part of a meal.

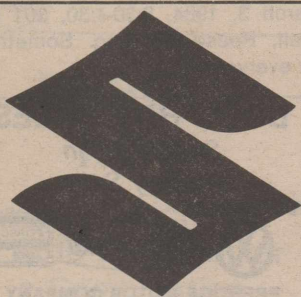

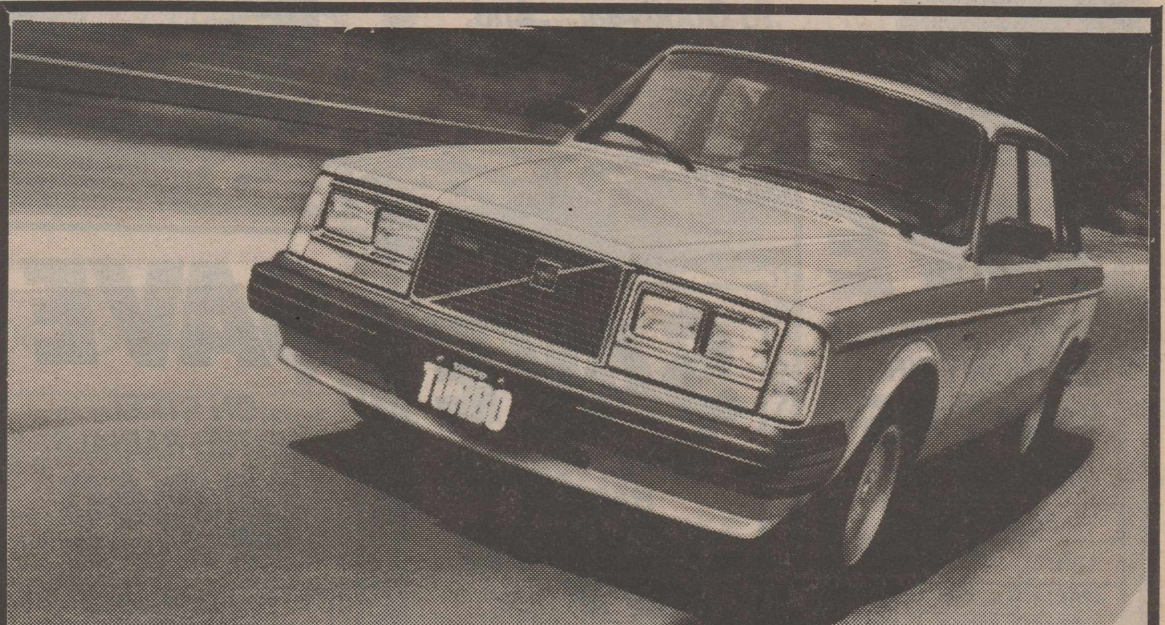

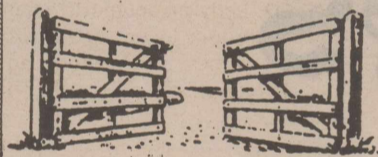
