# Reese earns high MCI marks

The people of Reese, whether military, civilian or military dependent, should be proud of the superior rating the base earned in last week's Air Training Command Mission Capability Inspection, said Wing Commander Col. Bob Hullender.

The MCI team, 11 members from the ATC Headquarters Inspector General's office, watched as Reese implemented various war contingency plans in support of ATC readiness.

The team assessed the 64th Flying Training Wing's overall ability to get the job done. They checked the wing out during the Attack Response Exercise, the Major Accident Response Exercise, mobility and resource protection.

And, although the effort was not rated, the MCI evaluators watched as Reese's Prime BEEF (base emergency engineering force) worked in field conditions at Sheppard AFB, Texas.

Throughout the inspection, MCI team members were on the watch for exceptional people, and during the team's outbrief Saturday morning 12 Reese individuals were recognized as Professional Performers.

# College registration

# Fall term nears

The fall semester for college is just about to begin. For South Plains College class begins Aug. 30, while Wayland Baptist University classes don't get to academics until Sept. 4.

Registration for South Plains, WBU and Houston Baptist University courses begins in two weeks. South Plains students register Wednesday and Thursday from 2-4 p.m. and 6:30-8 p.m., respectively.

WBU students register Aug. 28 and 30 from 4-7 p.m. and Aug. 29 and 31 from 9 a.m.

HBU students should stop by the Educa-

tion Office today between 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.
For students new to the Reese education programs, South Plains offers association degree programs, Wayland offers the bachelor's and master's programs, and

Houston offers students master's degree programs.

Students in the lower four enlisted grades and officers can apply for 75 percent tuition assistance, while staff through chief master sergeants may apply for 90 percent tuition assistance. The forms, available at the Education Office, must be complete when registering

For complete listings of the courses offered by these educational institutions, stop by the Education Office in Building 920, CBPO.

Counselors from each of the schools are also available to help students select the course, or courses, of instruction best suited to their degree goals. The education staff, however, does suggest that students call ahead to insure a counselor is present before stopping by. The number is Ext. 3634.

# Fires • ATC losses total over • \$1 million during 1984

Fires throughout Air Training Command caused well over \$1 million in damage from January through June.

Forty-five fires were reported by 12 ATC bases in that six-month period. Reese was not immune to the fires.

March 12, an electrical short in the number two chiller, part of an air conditioning system for Building 930, began burning. As the short burned, it created enough smoke to set off the smoke detector. The smoke detector worked with an automatic shut off system to shut down the air conditioner.

Although the fire was contained to a metal cabinet it did \$2,985 in damage to simulator building's air conditioning system.

Fire reports are sent

throughout the command, says Reese Fire Chief Bob Hitch, "ours was due to a mechanical failure, but most of the others during the period were caused by individuals and unsafe fire practices."

March 12, an electrical Three other ATC fires short in the number two caused nearly 95 percent of chiller, part of an air condithe total damage.

The blaze which gutted the clothing sales store at Lackland AFB, Texas, in May, cost nearly \$930,000. The Air Force, the Army and Air Force Exchange Service and AAFES customers all lost property in that nighttime fire.

The fire was caused by an electrical short in a portable radio power cord which ignited nearby clothing. Fire officials say the radio should

Fires throughout Air Train-throughout the command, have been unplugged before g Command caused well says Reese Fire Chief Bob the store closed for the day.

Spontaneous combustion of oily rags caused the April clothing sales store fire at Chanute AFB, Ill., according to investigators. AAFES lost nearly \$26,000 in property in the blaze.

Jet aircraft parts were among the \$71,450 in supplies destroyed after a cigarette butt started a fire on the cargo bed of an Air Force truck. Investigators believe either the driver of the truck or a passing motorist unknowingly flipped the cigarette into the back of the vehicle. That fire occurred at Williams AFB, Ariz., in April.

Well over half of the 45 fires could have been prevented, according to Billy Continued on page 13

I understand the airman's disappointment, because it realy was quite a good show. Unfortunately, they could only stay long enough for one show.

Pay telephone service at Reese drew fire from an airman who says the machines are taking quarters on a fairly frequent basis.

Losing coins to telephones is not a fact of life. At least not if you remember to:

•Get a dial tone before depositing a quarter.

•Dial all seven telephone number digits. Should money not return when the attempted call is ended before completion, lift the receiver and hang it up again. If you do not hang the receiver up twice, the next individual to use that phone will get your money.

When a telephone keeps money unjustly contact the operator immediately and leave a name and address. The phone company will refund the money by mail.

General Telephone Company makes daily checks on their pay telephones, but sometimes even when the phone is working it will not function properly.

The best way of getting lost money back and telephones fixed is by calling an operator. When making such a call be sure to give the pay telephone number where the money was lost.

An Avionics Branch Technician recently suggested that Reese money spent on ROTC orientation flights might be better spent on morale boosting orientation flights for Reese technicians. In addition to boosting morale, the NCO believes the rides might help maintenance technicians better understand the importance of their job.

The NCO went on to say that if orientation rides were not possible perhaps simulator orientation missions might be.

The sergeant is right. The flights would boost morale, and it would be desirable for the rides to be made available to technicians. However, as Deputy Commander for Operations Col. Bill Grosvenor wrote in his July 20 editorial, Reese is authorized only a limited number of orientation flights to outstanding

base personnel. The 64th Flying Training Wing is funded, manned and equipped to give the ROTC orientation flights as part of recruiting and training programs.

On the other hand, Reese does have a larger number of flight simulator rides available. A majority of these sim rides are offered to interested personnel during the Christmas break in pilot training. Simulator rides are also offered to students in the Professional Military Education Center's NCO Leadership School.

Lastly, commanders can forward orientation ride requests to Colonel Grosvenor. When the simulators are not fully booked by student pilots, outstanding personnel from around the base can be projected in for a flight.

Pet control was the subject of another call. The question about pet ownership responsibilities seems continual. Yes there are guidelines Village pet owners must adhere to.

The following is an excerpt from 64th Flying Training Wing Regulation 125-6, Control of Animals:

"Animals will be kept penned or on a leash at all times while outside the confines of the human dwelling. The length of the chain shall not allow the animal to enter the adjacent yard(s) or come within three feet of a sidewalk or six feet from the nearest roadway. The length of a leash used for exercising an animal shall not exceed six feet. Cats are exempt from leash requirements; however, owners will not allow thier cats to run freely in their neighbors' yards. Loose animals will be considered "strays" and will be handled in accordance with Paragraph 4. Owners are responsible for any damage caused by their animals. In cases where owners repeatedly refuse to obey the leash or pen requirements or refuse to maintain their animals' yard space in a sanitary manner as well as in cases where animals create nuisance by loud barking, the animals will be ordered removed from government premises as directed by the air base group com-



"You can feel proud, anywhere in America you go, to wear your uniform (today)," General Harpe told the class.

He recalled his graduation day when, as a fresh young pilot, he never considered the idea of actually flying into combat. The general ended up in Vietnam.

# Responsible motorcyclists know how to ride; do you?

Motorcyclists have bigger responsibilities when riding than most imagine. They not only have to maintain the skills and alertness to keep him riding down the road safely, but must also keep a constant watch for other vehicles.

More than half the time, when a motorcycle and a four-wheel vehicle are involved in an accident, the driver of the four-wheel vehicle replies, "I just didn't see him." That's the primary reason motorcyclists have to take the precautions and the actions necessary to be as conspicuous as possible. They must indicate their intentions to other vehicles.

There are obvious positive actions a motocyclist can take to make him or her look more responsible. Being conspicuous requires cyclists to wear bright clothing, use the headlight, turn signals and brake light, and the horn. All these are obvious measures to make motorcyclists seen and indicte your presence to other vehicles.

A cyclist can also maintain at least a two-second following distance behind other vehicles. This will allow a little breathing room for scanning the area for upcoming hazards and doing head-checks in both directions. The rider has just short of two

seconds to decide and make an evasive maneuver in a possible accident situation. This is worth remembering every time there's heavy traffic, or when approaching an intersection.

People can go on and on about ideas that would be good accident prevention measures to implement, but still there is the most feared opponent to contend with—the other vehicle.

At present, Reese is pushing for command lead in motorcycle mishaps; six so far this year. Every one of them could probably have been prevented.

It's your decision to ride responsibly or not. It may determine whether you become a statistic or not!





# Music review-

The one-man band is an ageold tradition that has taken on a new look with the era of synthesizer pop music. With the expanded opportunities offered by a device that can duplicate virtually any sound or instrument, rock artists can now develop their musical concepts totally alone.

Howard Jones is the most exciting and original one-man band to come along in quite a while. His new album, "Human's Lib," features Jones playing every instrument and singing all the vocals. What really separates him from other solo synthesizer artists, though, is the ability to write captivating hit songs. His lyrics are

unassuming and his tunes are catchy, where the others (like Thomas Dolby) get bogged down with flashy sound effects and generally goofy behavior.

Lately, Jones has been generating a lot of audience appeal with his nationwide tour and a July 7, appearance on American Bandstand. On stage, he is honest, energetic, and sometimes even funny. His Flock-of-Seagulls fluff hair style and space cadet uniform make him look like a New Wave cliche, but his music speaks for itself. Jones can also lay claim to being the first New Wave artist to be accompanied by a mime on tour. The mime is Jed Hoile, who illustrates various as-

pects of Jones' music through body and hand movements.

The type of zeal Jones brings to his concerts is also evident on "Human's Lib." It is easy to get caught up in the infectious enthusiasm of "New Song" and "What Is Love?" Those songs are also well designed for dancing, as the eager response of the American Bandstand audience demonstrated. In one more important area, the rock videos from Jones are entertaining and worth repeat viewings.

Howard Jones is already a big hit in England, and it won't be long before his fame spreads in the U.S. "Human's Lib" shows that there is a good reason for all the fuss.

Ferrell, chief of the Fire Protection Division, ATC head-quarters. "Many of those fires were caused by individuals who just weren't thinking fire safety. When a person leaves oily rags laying around or allows their vehicle to leak fuel, they're not considering the possible consequences," he says.

There was one injury caused by the on-base fires. An individual at Keesler AFB, Miss., burned his hand as he tried to unplug an air conditioner cord from the wall. The fire was caused by a short in the plug.

Off-base fires, however, have taken the lives of three ATC members so far this year.

Faulty electrical wiring led the list of causes for base fires. Other causes included unattended cooking, improper disposal of matches and other smoking materials, children playing with matches or lighters, and leaking fuel from vehicles.

•An open can of gasoline tipped over in a base housing storage room and the vapors were ignited by a hot water heater

•A child set fire to a chair while playing with matches and a lighter

•Wind blew over a barbecue grill and set fire to the outside wall of a base house

Ferrell says there are bright spots among the statistics. There were 68 percent fewer fires in the dorms and 23 percent fewer fires in base housing compared to last

"I think the word is getting out that people will be held responsible for fires caused by their negligence or misconduct," he says.

Chief Hitch believes that not only is individual responsibility cutting back on fires, but increases in fire safety knowledge is helping too.

Reese is fortunate that the people here know what to watch for and are fire conscious, adds Chief Hitch.

Vance AFB, Okla., was the only base in ATC not to have a reportable fire during the first half of this year.
