to talk coherently, apparently had been drinking to excess. the officers said. The woman had been beaten about the face and her eyes were swollen. officers said. After being taken to the Haskell Hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises on her face, the woman and the night that is convenient man were placed in jail here.

Sheriff Pennington and District Attorney Royce Adkins. who questioned the man and woman at length, said that Thompson and Mrs. Gallaher claimed to be brother and sis-

Officers learned that the trio had been in Tahoka, and District Attorney Adkins said that Thompson and Bunger had been in jail at Tahoka Friday night. Offficers theorized the three were on their way back to Graham when the altercation occurred in which Bunger was fatally injured.

In checking contents of the station wagon, officers found a 10-inch steel skillet, one edge of which was blood-covered, and officers believe this might have been the murder weapon. They pointed out that Bunger's wound was crescent shaped and apparently inflicted with a sharp-edged instrument.

Ranger Byron Currin of Vernon came to Haskell Monday and joined Sheriff Pennington and District Attorney Adkins in their investigation of circumstances surrounding Bunger's death.

Monday afternoon, Thompson was taken to Lubbock where he submitted to a lie detector test. Sheriff Pennington and District Adkins were accompanied by Ranger Currin in taking the suspect to Lub-

bock. Results of the Lubbock test were not revealed by the officers. However, murder charg-es against both Thompson and his sister were subsequently filed.



### State Launches Economy Study

With an eye on the growing cost of government and need for new taxes, a committee from the Texas Senate has launched an economy study.

Overall state budget for the present two-year spending is \$328,000,000 more than for the previous two-year period. It was an increase of about 11 per cent. There is every indication that the next Legislature will be faced with demands to raise salaries and expand and improve state services in approximately the same proportion

Some of the cost increase is attributed to sheer quantity With Texas population increasing an estimated 26 per cent from 1950-60, there are more youngsters to educate, more patients for state hospitals, more cars wearing out the roads.

More significantly, the percentages of oldsters and youngsters is increasing faster than the percentage of middle-aged people. Clder and younger people generally up revenue needs-for welfare benefits and schooling-but contribute less in taxes than income-earning middle-agers.

Some of the increase in costs results from a drive for quality better schools, hospitals and highways.

With undeniable money need so great, the Senate committee was set to seek out any indications of extravagance or waste and 'see if we are getting our dollar's worth for the money we're spending.

As a starter, the committee, headed by Sen. Ray Roberts of McKinney, agreed to hold its own expenses to the bare minimum.

### Government's Function

We live in an era in which, apparently, vast numbers of people regard the government as the proper source of almost every kind of handout, grant, and so-called "benefits."

So something that Henry Hazlitt has to say in Newsweek about government is important. In his words: "Its true function is to maintain peace, order, and justice; to protect life and property; to refrain from burdensome and inequitable taxation; to remove the punitive laws and deterrents that previous governments have imposed. Its function is to permit and preserve a sound currency. When it fails to do this, it must bear sole responsibility for the failure.

Once government breaks its historic bonds and goes beyond these functions, the result is always the same: Oppressive taxation, degraded currency, diminished incentive, and a steady whittling away of the freedoms of all citizens.



This traffic accident experience not only caused the death of 155 men, women, and children, but also injured 1,-599 people and caused property damage estimated at \$1,878,
