County Has No Traffic Deaths in 1959 But Heavy Increase Shown In District

Although Haskell, Dickens, Stonewall and Throckmorton Counties had no traffic deaths in 1959, motor vehicles in the 20-county Highway Patrol district 5-A and 5-A1 increased 20 per cent from 1958 to 1959. Captain E. L. Posey of Lubbock said this week. Captain Posey, well-known commander of this Highway Patrol district, said that during 1959 "We had 155 people killed in rural traffic accidents compared to 124 rural fatalities in 1958." During the year, highway patrolmen in the district investigated a total of 2,738 rural traffic accidents. This traffic accident experience not only caused the death of 155 men, women and children, but also injured 1,599 people and caused property damage estimated at \$1,878,437.

Fifteen of the 29 counties in this Highway Patrol district showed an increase in the number of motoricides for 1959. Four counties—Haskell, Dickens, Stonewall and Throckmor-

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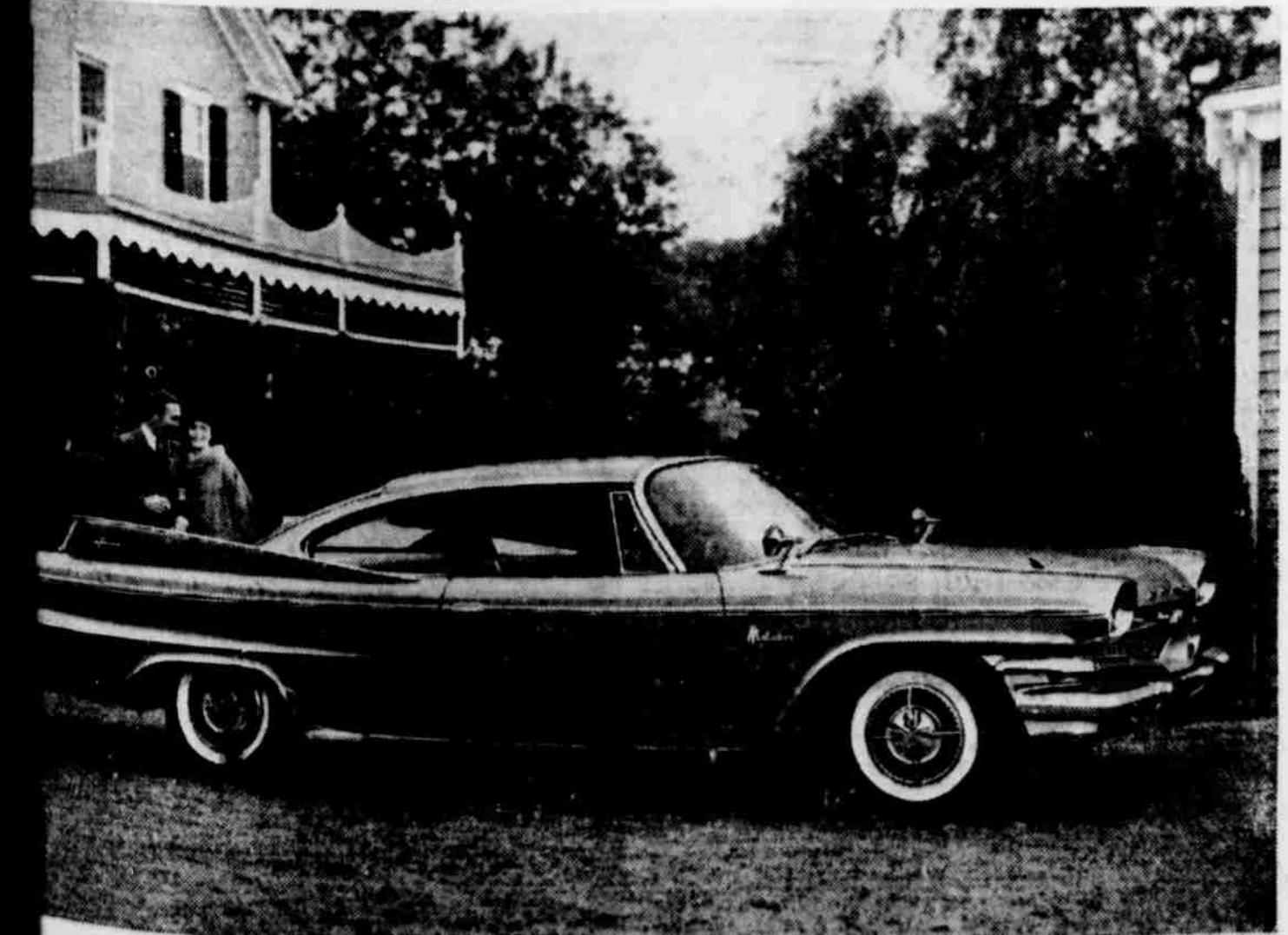

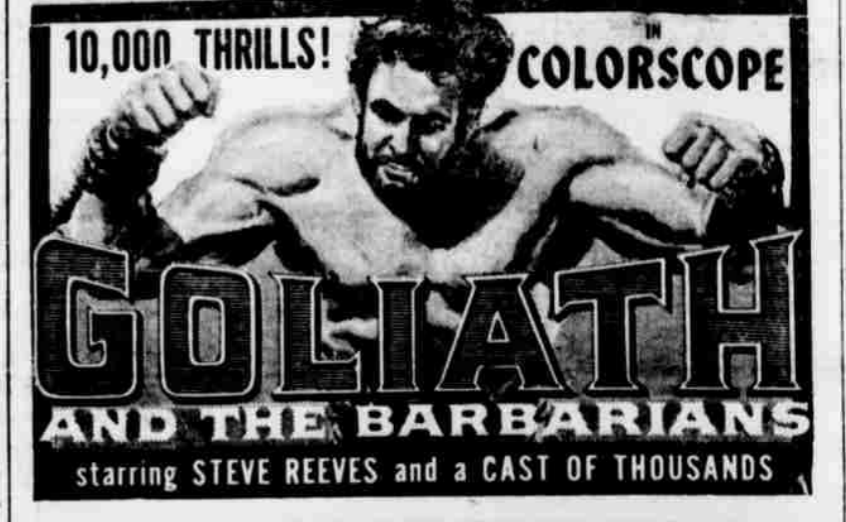

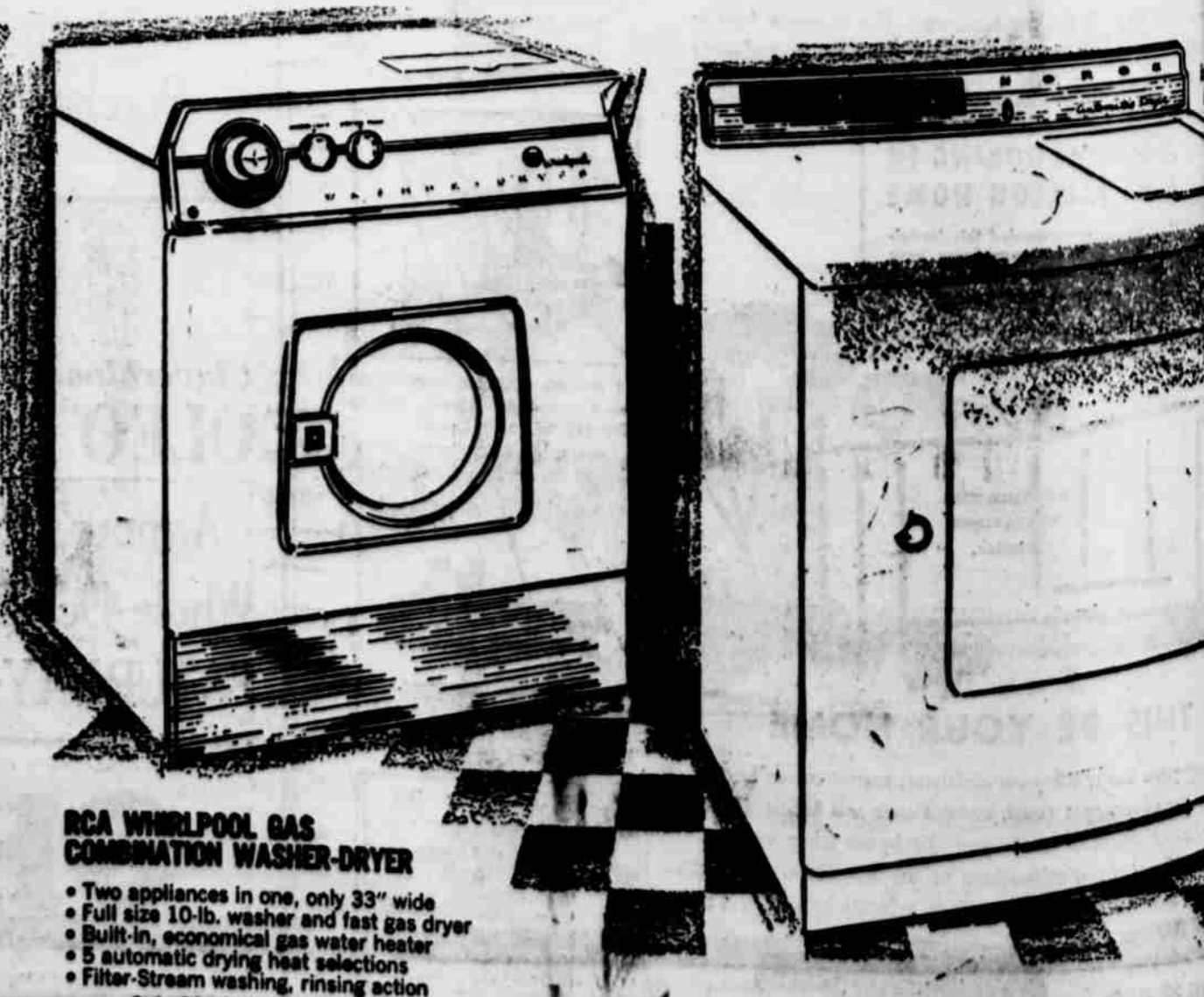
