"I always wanted to fly," ecoed Cadet Harder. "And the Air Force is the way to do


Neither cadet has set their sights on any long-term career planning, instead they agree that just putting their best foot forward during their initial seven-year committment will keep them busy

'Cops' of yesterday are today's defenders

In 1949, a young airman third class, one of many standing in the basic training formation, was selected by virtue of his position in line. What was he chosen for?

His new career field! The security police or as it was called at the time, the air police. He was issued a weapon, told how to use it, was instructed to shine his boots and was then put to work. Is it that easy to become a security police officer? Well, not anymore. The requirements are more stringent and the training is much more in depth.

In 1984 the new security police

recruit is selected by using higher standards and trained to a higher degree. He or she is extensively trained in the use of weapons, tactics, military law and jurisdiction, community relations, patrol procedures, and many more police related subjects while attending the required Security Police Academy.

In the early years, the "cop" on the beat, was just that, the "cop" who was more interested in making the good bust, writing the most tickets and making the most apprehensions. Their job was to look for violations and correct

Today our police officers on the same beat use a selective en-

forcemnt approach. They do not judge, they just report the facts. They are now interested in the security and protection of "their" community. They believe in helping the people of the community, believe in their way of life and most of all like their job. They now go out of their way to help the stranded motorist, find the lost child, or help the new person on the installation. They are more dedicated and more than willing to do that little extra.

The airman is also the one who must be able to, at one moment, be a close friend and at the next, the firm and impartial police officer. These "cops" are also the foot soldiers of the Air Force.

They must be trained extensively in the use of combat techniques and weapons. They are the first line of defense for the base on which you live and must be capable of immediate deployment to defend any base in the world.

It is the security police officer who must put their life on the line to protect the readiness capability of the Air Force. It's their job to engage any unfriendly force and stop them before they reach you. It's a difficult task, but one that is required of every security police officer.

The Mexican-American -- a survivor

Our generation today is indeed entering a new frontier - a new creation. I am referring to that ethnic group we call the Mexican-American people—a human grouping that has survived the long struggle for life, identity, human dignity, equality, and freedom. It is this cultural frontier that is at the heart of every human grouping and individual, for one would not be able to survive except by confronting the unknown, the unexpected.

Who are the Mexican-Americans? What is to become of them as a people. It is my firm belief that the identity and mission of these people can be fully appreciated only by one's own awareness of his or her historical and existential situation. My own experience is that of a native American citizen born of Mexican-American parents in Mathis, a city near Corpus Christi, Texas. I grew up speaking both English and Spanish. Being Mexican-American, I have lived and shared the basic language and culture belonging to the bilingual bicultural reality of the southwest. I am a Roman Catholic by culture and by adult free choice. Studying for the priesthood, I continue the human quest for the truth that has shaped my life to this point and will shape my future. I journey in this lifelong search, critical of both my church and my country while loving them both as I do my

We trace our origins to two great invasions and conquests: the Spanish and the Anglo-American. Both conquests ushered in an era of colonization, oppression, and exploitation. These confrontations of our parent cultures produced a new people the Spanish-Indian confrontation gave birth to the Mexican people and the Anglo-American and Mexican confrontation gave birth to the Mexican-American people. Mexican-Americans were no longer simply "Mexicans living in the United States." As a distinct people, they were, and are, an autonomous variant of both Mexican and United States history. They are not simply a "compound" of the two, but the issue of a unique historical process that included aspects of both, but with an originality of its own-the uniqueness of a newborn ethnic strain.

Their historical odyssey can be seen as a passage from death to life. Many have begun to question the socio-cultural reality of their environment. One can recall the liberation movements in the early 1960's when Mexican-Americans began to dig into their past, to penetrate to the development and meaning of their historical process. They no longer wanted to be told who they were; it was time to search their own past in order to discover for themselves who they were as a people. Without any written history available

to guide them, they came to rely on oral history. Their Mexican-American cuentas, leyendas, y corridos (narratives, legends, and stories), their art, poetry, and dances, kept their history alive, as seen and experienced by themselves.

We are a people marching toward the future that has already begun. With dances, music, food, games, and jokes, we celebrate who we are. The tragedies of our history have not obliterated laughter and joy, warm friendship and the capacity to love. Anyone who has attended a Mexican-American fiesta knows that a celebration has taken place. Our fiestas are life because we celebrate the journey from death to life. In the fiestas we encounter the mystery of life-the mystical affirmation that life is a gift and worth living. It is in the fiesta that the Mexican-American rises above the quest for the logical meaning of life and celebrates the very contradictions that are of the essence of the mystery of human life.

As a people we have survived, we have grown. Hope has enlightened us and has led us to a transformation. With growth, we have become open to change and have allowed ourselves to live the pain and the joy of life. We have experienced the mystery of freedom, now able to walk the path with the ability ot make choices and assume responsibility.

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Housing, moving cash loans available through aid society

Housing and moving assistance loans are, although fairly new, available at Reese and 54 other stateside bases. The loans are made through the Air Force Aid Society.

Career-minded Air Force members can apply for interest-free loans to help cover the cost of moving into rental property or buying a new house, according to retired Air Force Gen. Louis T. Seith, AFAS director.

AFAS housing and moving assistance programs are designed to ease the financial burden of reassignment for career-minded members.

General Seith said moving assistance loans can be used to pay travel expenses, transportation, advance payments for rent, utility deposits and purchase of minimal essential household appliances such as washing machines, refrigerators and beds. MAP loans cannot be used to purchase TVs or living room furniture.

Since July, when Reese first joined the program, there has been only one moving assistance loan approved for approximately \$800. There have been no approvals for housing

assistance loans here to date.

Housing assistance loans cover a variety of expenses connected with buying a new home such as legal fees, closing costs and taxes. While loans can be made for up to \$5,000, they cannot exceed the closing costs. Loans may not be used to cover down payments or mortgage payments.

HAP loans must be used for a personal residence located within a reasonable distance of the member's duty station. The loan cannot be used to purchase investment property.

To qualify for a HAP loan, the member must have at least two years retainability since most loans must be repaid in two years. Exceptions can be made for members with less than two years who have demonstrated responsibility and are considered good prospects for retention, the general said.

HAP loans are intended for noncommissioned and junior officer grades, but can be made to officers above the grade of captain if the member can demonstrate financial need.

General Seith is confident that the programs will be expanded to all stateside bases in the near future.

"Since their introduction a year ago, HAP loans have been made to 299 people for over \$600,000, averaging a little over \$2,000 each," he said. More than 300 people have received \$282,854 in MAP loans averaging just under \$890.

Local procedures for approving loans may vary

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Laws toughen child protection

How many thousands of children die needlessly in car accidents every year? How many children are killed, or nearly killed, by simply being left alone in the car?

The Texas legislature feels that any number is too many. The legislature recently passed two acts for the protection of young children in motor vehicles.

Under the first act, it is now a criminal offense for a person to intentionally or knowingly leave a child unattended in a motor vehicle for longer than five minutes. The act applies to all children under age 7. Children can be left in the car as long as they are accompanied by a person over the age of 14. An offense under this act is a Class C

misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$25-200. The act becomes effective Oct. 2.

Child restraints are the subject of the second act. Children under age 2 must be restrained in a child passenger safety seat during the operation of a motor vehicle. If the child is between 2-4 years, he or she must be restrained, but parents have the option of using a seat belt or a safety seat. It is also a violation of the act if the safety seat is not being used according to the manufacturers instruction.

Violation of this act will result in a \$25-50 fine. However, the court will dismiss the charges if the violator acquires a child safety seat by purchase, loan, or rental within 10 days of the offense. This new act goes into Law Oct. 31, but will not be

enforced until Jan. 1, 1985. The legislature provided for a two month grace period so that the public may obtain the child passenger safety seat.

A pending revision of AFR 125-14 will require child passenger safety seats for all children under age 4 and weighing less than 40 pounds in vehicles operated on-base. The base legal office staff urges the use of approved child passenger safety seats both for the child's safety and to avoid a violation of Texas law and Air Force regulation.

When purchasing child passenger safety seats, make sure that the seat has been approved by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. A limited number of safety seats are available for loan at no cost at Family Services, Ext. 3305. Hospital begins an evening program



Appointments for the Primary Care Evening Clinic may be made by calling the appointment desk at Exts. 3245 or 3488.



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

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

It is hard to get people to realize there is danger in going out in a small boat. The things people do that result in drownings certainly indicate they don't think of

According to information gathered by the Outboard Boating Club of America more than half of the drownings in boating accidents are from "operator negligence." This includes standing up in the boat, reckless operation and overloading. People guilty of these acts certainly were not aware of any danger.

There are rules to prevent drownings. Learn to swim and teach the kids. Don't swim in unknown waters and don't swim alone. Don't stand up or fool around in a boat. Most of all, use your head and be a little scared of water. A person only has to be submerged two or three minutes to drown.

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

AF takes note of missing children, now finger prints for protection

At least 1.5 million children are reported missing from their homes each year.

Between 20-50 thousand of these cases remain unsolved each year. This group includes victims of criminal abduction and foul play; small children stolen by individuals to raise as their own, or to sell; and the victims of accidental deaths.

Each year at least 3,000 persons are buried unidentified in "John" or "Jane Doe" graves. Hundreds of these unfortunates are children.

"No one can argue that this is not a national problem," said Sgt. Rudy Hernandez, crime prevention specialist. "When only one child disappears, it's a tragedy." The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, in cooperation with the Air Force and the 64th Security Police Squadron, is fighting

One preventive method of fighting the problem of missing children is keeping a record of their finger prints.

Sergeant Hernandez finger printed children Saturday at the Youth Center.

The children were finger printed and the prints given to the parents. No record is kept by any origization or other authority.

"The prints can help in the search, should the child become missing," Sergeant Hernandez. "Only then would the prints be turned over to authorities, for identification purposes."







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Record review-

Tennille's 'More Than You Know'

The '30s and '40s pop revival began with Carly Simon's "Torch" album in 1981, and hit full stride when Linda Ronstadt's "What's New" went platinum last year. Now there are plans for another Ronstadt revival album, and Barry Manilow is even releasing an album of old pop standards. In the meantime, there is the new record by Toni Tennille, "More Than You Know.

Tennille's previous fame came as half of the '70s pop duo, "The Captain and Tennille," and as the hostess of a syndicated TV variety show. "More Than You Know" could be viewed as her attempt to get back in the limelight by

grabbing onto Ronstadt's coattails. It is actually somewhat different than What's New," however.

The main difference lies with the vocal make-ups of the two singers. Toni Tennille has a more full-throated woman's voice, with none of the little girl cuteness that spoiled "What's New." She displays her impressive credentials right away on the title tune, with a gusty, emphatic treatment of the lyrics. A good voice is not enough to carry a record, though.

"More Than You Know" has two main problems. One is that Tennille just can't seem to put her past behind her. She falls a little flat on some of these old pop songs, and it's all too easy to remember her

singing "Love Will Keep Us Together." The other difficulty is the vocal arrangements, which allow Tennille to stray too far away from the central melodic core of the songs. On "Day Dream," for instance, her husky voice and the deliberate pacing make the listener wonder if the record isn't being played at the wrong speed.

Ultimately, "More Than You Know" must be considered a failure. The only bright spot is the ochestra, conducted by Sammy Nestico. They move through these Porter, Gershwin, and Ellington classics in an enchanting way, leading to the conclusion that we'd be better off listening to a non-vocal ver-




A bass tournament will be sponsored by the Rod and Gun Club Sept. 15 at White River Lake.
