Work to bring back the Statue of Liberty's former grandeur after nearly a century of steady deterioration is well underway. The great lady is expected to be fully restored in time for her 100th birthday in two years.

Until that time, the statue and its pedestal will remain closed so that major renovation, which began in January and is about 20 percent completed, can be made on the statue's corroding iron framework and copper skin. She is encased in scaffolding and is not carrying her torch.

as guided tours of Liberty Island, immigration films and lectures are continuing. Circle Line ferries make hourly trips to the island from downtown Manhattan at Battery Park, and from Liberty State Park, N.J. Visitors will be able to watch craftsmen making a new 21-foot high torch in a workshop being built in front of the statue.

The original torch, which became over the decades almost as important a sightseeing attraction as the statue itself, has been controversial. Frederic Auguste Bartholdi, the French sculptor who created the statue, never did like the way the statue's base remains the torch was lighted. In fact,

A caller wanted to know why the commissary has a 5 cent per dollar service charge. "Why is it necessary?" she asked.

The commissary must operate on a breakeven basis. To meet expenses, the commissary products are sold at cost; however, a 5 percent service charge is added to the patron's bill at the checkout stand.

The surcharge pays for store supplies, equipment, and overhead expenses such as paper bags, plastic bags, and utilities. A portion of the surcharge will be directed to fund new, or renovate, commissaries throughout the Air Force. Knowing the surcharge's background, it becomes increasingly obvious why it is needed.

The important thing to remember is that

even with the surcharge, shopping at the commissary is cheaper than shopping in town. Market basket surveys indicate savings to be around 24-26 percent for the average Air Force family.

A Reese Village resident phoned to complain about the loud music being played at the Enlisted Open Mess patio Oct. 6. She indicated that she called the security police before the CARE Line, but got a less than satisfactory response.

The person to call, should a similar situation arise again, is the enlisted club duty officer in charge.

In the future, the club will monitor the volume of noise produced during such festivities. It is the club staff's intent to provide quality entertainment to its membership, but not at the inconvenience of others.

A nother caller wanted to say that we needed "better plumbers," because of a recurring drain stop up. She unwittingly caused her problem with grease, which she kept pouring down the sink.

Because her washing machine drain and sink drain ended up in the same area, each time she poured the grease in the sink, it stopped up the washer drain causing an overflow of water.

I would like to point out to all housing occupants and other food oriented establishments on base should not pour grease down the drain or disposal. Only soft foods and small bones should ever be placed in garbage disposals, and then only if properly flushed with water for at least 30 seconds.

Confusion surrounded a parking area used by civil engineers recently. It seems the security police ticketed several vehicles for parking in an "unauthorized" area. 0

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Later it was determined that the area was authorized for parking, and all issued tickets were voided.

Advance notice is always given when there is a change in traffic rules, parking, or traffic configuration, before tickets are issued. In this case, the security police were responding to complaints of parking violations around Building 551.

A nother caller wanted me to clarify the Christmas leave policy. He was particularly concerned about the policy at the CBPO.

The caller said a previous death in the family would make this Christmas particularly difficult for the member concerned. Additionally, the person assigned to the CBPO had been denied Christmas leave for the past two years. He felt that these circumstances should be taken into consideration when prioritizing a section's leave schedule.

Ordinary leave is applied not only at Christmas, but throughout the year. The availability of other personnel and the need to continue customer service throughout the holiday season has to be considered before any leave is granted.

As for my policy, as in the past, a letter encouraging liberal leave authorizations will be published prior to the holiday season. However, commanders and supervisors are still the normal approving officials for leave requests.

You can be sure that the member's family situation will be taken into consideration when leave dates are approved by unit commanders. Thanks for the call.

There are limits on powers of attorney

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Breaking the barriers of distance is easy with a power of attorney. Power of attorney is, by definition, a legal instrument that authorizes one individual to act as another's agent.

In this day of a mobile Air Force and remote assignments the power of attorney gives spouses, normally the agents named by the legal documents, the ability to make decisions to buy and sell items. But that power is limited only by the power of attorney itself.

There are two types of powers of attorney; general and special. A general power of attorney grants the named agent almost limitless authority to make decisions in his or her behalf.

Drawbacks to the general version include deliberate abuse risks, as well as unintentional good faith errors. General powers of attorney essentially leave the granting individual at the mercy of the authorized agent. Because of the risk, such powers of attorney should be granted only to people well known and trusted by the person he or she will represent.

Special powers of attorney are usually preferred by the agent and the grantor. This type of document specifies exactly what is to be done in the grantor's absence. The limit on authority granted to an agent decreases the margin for error and potential abuse. It is also more readily accepted by commercial institutions.

A power of attorney is not a

cure all; however, no one is required to honor the agent presenting the document. Many refuse to accept the documents because they are not sure of their validity or what they mean. Some businesses will take them only if they are prepared in a fashion accustomed to that company.

If the document grantor is deemed legally incompetent, or dies, the power of attorney is voided. The power of attorney is not a substitute for guardianship authority.

Texas has what is known as "durable" power of attorney. Such powers of attorney include a disability clause, which allows the agent to continue exercising his or her powers even though the originator is deemed incompetent.

To safeguard using either

type of document-include an expiration date. The date should be the earliest possible moment that the document's use will no longer be needed.

The Qs' trademark is the strong vocal harmonies of Jeff Calder and Anne Boston, but they also have a consistently fine guitar player in Bob Elsey. His work reminds me of Lindsay Buckingham, who has always been able to cut through to the essentials.

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Instructor digs up bone

A dying creature lay beside a river. Its final breath is shallow as it falls into endless sleep. About 200 million years later, a Reese technical sergeant unearths a portion of that creature.

The upper jaw bone of the creature, identified as a phytosaur by Texas Tech University scientists, was found by Professional Military Educatoin Insturctor TSgt. Donald Minnis.

He and friend Tom McGuire were attending a couples retreat with their wives when they went on an excursion to try and locate indian arrowheads. During the search, they discovered the tip of the phytosaur's bone uncovered. Out of curiosity, the pair removed the bone from its age old resting place.

They took the mineralized bone to Texas Tech University's Natural Science Department for identification. Department head Dr. Sankar Chatterjer identified it as the upper jaw bone of a phytosaur, which, he said, was native to this region some 200 million years ago.

The phytosaur resembled the alligator, according to Chatterjer. It was 16 feet long with a three-foot long mouthful of teeth.

Other phytosaur bones have been discovered in this region, but this one was very well preserved, he said.

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Hoping to find the remainder of the pre-historic creature, Chatterjer and an excavation team went to the other major parts. discovery site at Ceta Canyon


Sergeant Minnis displays the 200 million-year-old phytosaur jaw bone he recently found, while on a retreat.






