**I** wish everyone a safe and happy Christmas and New Year's holiday season. I realize that this is a little selfish, but I want every member of the Reese team back to work in good health in 1985.

Everyone saw the safety film Dec. 13. It briefly touched on the effects of alcohol and dwelled on the humiliation of the arrest and detainment of individuals caught driving while intoxicated. The point is clear. Our society will not tolerate any misuse or abuse of alcohol this holiday season.

And if all this talk of DWI doesn't get the message across, consider this:

In Texas the first DWI offense is a misdemeanor punishable by confinement in the county jail for not less than 72 hours nor more than two years; a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$2,000; deferred adjudication cannot be granted; the violator can be placed on probation and ordered to undergo alcohol treatment as a condition for probation; and the violator gets a mandatory driver's license suspension of not less than 90 days nor more than 365 days.

The second offense nets violators a misdemeanor punishable by confinement in the county jail for not less than 15 days nor more than two years; a fine of no less than \$300 nor more than \$2,000; deferred adjudication cannot be granted; the violator can be placed on probation, but a prerequisite to probation is 72 hours confinement in the county jail and that the violator be evaluated for alcohol dependency; and the violator's driver's license is mandatorily suspended for no less than 180 days nor more than two years.

Third offenses net a felony punishable by confinement in the county jail for a minimum of 30 days and a maximum of two years, or

by confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for not less than 60 days nor more than five years; a fine of \$500 to \$2,000 and deferred adjudication cannot be granted. The violator can be placed on probation, but a prerequisite to probation is serving 10 days in jail and evaluation for alcohol dependency. The offender also gets a mandatory suspension of driving licenses for not less than 180 days nor more than two years. Is it worth the risk?

**O**ne caller felt he and other credit union members were being taken because "they give you a card and then charge you to use it," referring to the 24-hour teller bank card available to credit union customers.

There are no monthly charges for having the card in question, and if customers use the machine in the credit union parking lot, there is no charge.

Customers are charged for transactions at similar machines around the area because the machine owners charge the credit union usage fees: withdrawals, 75 cents each; and balance inquiries and transfers, 25 cents each.

The credit union is also charged by these machine owners for deposits, but does not pass those charges along; however, for information on the service and charges of the credit union, stop by or call 885-4591.

**I** received a call concerning a lack of food for swing shift workers going to the Caprock Cafe after 6:30 p.m. The dining facility now closes at 6:30 p.m. but is required to have a sufficient amount of food for serving until closing.

I have directed the quality assurance

evaluators to monitor the situation closely and I assure everyone, there is plenty of food for our folks to eat.

The dining facility began closing at 6:30 p.m. Monday for a test period of 60 days. The new closing time is good Mondays through Fridays so adjust your eating schedules if you work the swing shift.

**C**an I get someone to fill a pothole on 4th Street and George Avenue? No, the civil engineers cannot work on late highways but we have given the matter to the north-west maintenance section of the Texas Highway Department. The person there indicated she would pass the information along and the maintenance foreman would have the necessary repairs completed. Thanks for the call.

**F**ailure to pick up garbage in the village led to another call. Refuse collection for the Village is scheduled for Mondays and Fridays, between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.

On the Monday in question, the contractor had two separate maintenance problems which put collections behind. Part of the trash collection was done that afternoon and the remainder Tuesday morning.

In the fall season, a larger than normal amount of refuse, fills the dumpsters such as raked leaves and grass. If the dumpster is filled between collection days, or another problem arises, contact SSgt. Rick Morehouse or Charles Nance at Ext. 3929.

# It could happen to anyone

It has been 32 years since that early Christmas morning phone call, but every year the burning memories creep back which were embedded in my mind as an 8-year-old boy back in Georgia.

Only two days 'till Christmas and our house was brimming with excitement and anticipation of what new things would be ours with Santa's arrival. Then the news came that Uncle Irvine had a heart attack and might not survive. Mother and dad quickly arranged for grandma and grandpa to come stay with my two sisters and myself for a few days so they could be at his bedside. Christmas without our parents wouldn't be as much fun but they assured us that Santa Claus would come on schedule. They left hurriedly but not before promising us a quick return.

My 8-year-old eyes couldn't

believe all the good things I saw under our tree on Christmas morning. And, there was the wrist watch I so badly wanted. Such fun toys, ribbons, wrappings, boxes and a phone call. Grandpa answered the phone and suddenly our happy celebrating came to a frightening halt. His voice trembled and tears rolled down his face.

He called my sisters and myself close to him and hugged us tight. He explained to us tenderly that mother and dad would not be coming home again, ever. They had been murdered, killed by a drunk, with a deadly weapon—an automobile. We're told that the accident happened early Christmas Eve just on the outskirts of New Orleans, my parent's destination.

The police report confirmed that a man had left his office Christmas party, crossed six lanes of traffic in his car and hit mother and dad's car head on. Witnesses testified that dad probably saw him coming

because he veered right off of the road in an effort to avoid the inevitable crash of the vehicle traveling at 100 mph.

The identification process of my parents was slow on that Christmas Eve. Their wallets, clothes and the wedding rings on their fingers were stolen at the scene. And, there certainly wasn't much left of our 1951 Ford to help in the identifying the victims. So, my mother and dad laid unclaimed in a cold morgue on Christmas Eve as Mr. and Mrs. John Doe.

Within hours after the notification, my grandpa had a massive heart attack which he survived; but, he was retired immediately from federal service. My Uncle Bob, to this day, has flashbacks of his attempt at identifying his only sister with only half a face left after being thrown through two windshields. I, too, have empty memories of a lifetime without parents. In fact, just recently I welcomed a young man into my

squadron who comes from the same small town as the drunk driver who killed my parents. This recent recollection prompted me to record my true story as a plea to all who read this.

This is only part of this tragic story as it affected my family and continues to touch us every day. Today, I'm sure the drunken driver must have the same waves of nausea as I do—unless he attempts to dull his memory and paralyzed body with alcohol.

Does it occur to you that this could be your story? Human nature dictates that this sort of thing happens only to others; never could it happen to me.

Remember the Air Force Communications Command bumper sticker slogan, "It's Ok Not To Drink." I take this slogan one step further to encourage you not to drive if you do drink.

I bid each of you a merry and safe Christmas and to all of those you love.

# Correct settings save heat, money

This thermometer-chart shows the relationship of temperature to the operating cost of heating and cooling our homes and offices. As you can see, a change of one degree can make a drastic change in the cost and amount of energy we use.

This chart re-emphasizes the importance of maintaining

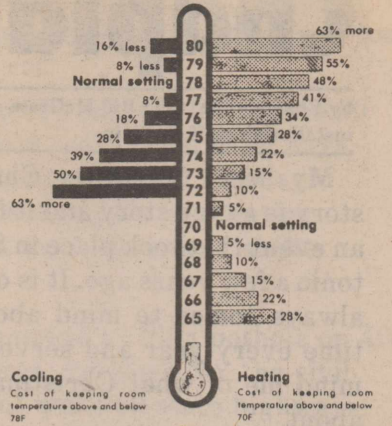
the correct thermostat setting everywhere. We could reduce our energy consumption drastically if each individual will become more energy conscious.

Individuals can help their building managers and myself by leaving the settings in the correct position and quickly reporting any deviations in thermostat settings. Air Force guidelines require that

thermostats for work areas and homes be set at 65-68F for heating and 78F for cooling.

For industrial work areas like the hangars and warehouses, the heat setting is 55F and cooling is 78F. These temperatures are not unreasonable, nor unbearable. We do not want to make work areas unbearable, but do want to identify and correct energy problems wherever they happen.

Civil engineering cannot correct the problems unless we point them out and submit the paperwork through the energy conservation office, 64ABG/CCXE Stop 3. I encourage everyone at Reese to do their part to conserve energy. If you do have a problem that no one seems able to correct please call me at Ext. 3310. I'll be more than happy to assist you.

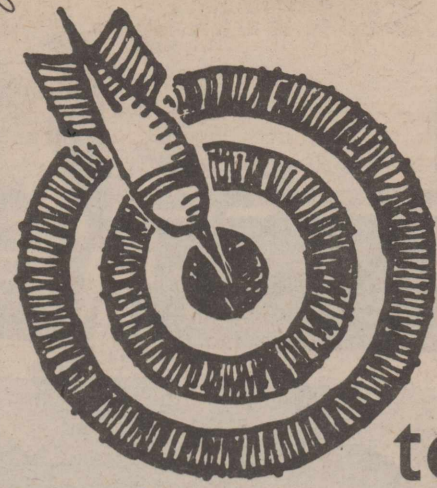

## 85-02 marks end, beginning



Thirty-three Air Force officers join the ranks of military pilots this morning at 10 as they cross the Simler Theater stage to accept their silver wings.

Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 85-02 will accept their wings before their family, friends and Air Force supporters. Among those supporters, guest speaker Brig. Gen. Richard E. Hearne, the former 64th Flying Training Wing commander.

General Hearne is the deputy chief of staff for plans at Air Training Command Headquarters, Randolph AFB, Texas. He moved to ATC Headquarters duty in November 1983 after Col. Bob Hullender accepted the reins of command for the 64th.

The battle for aviator ratings began in January for the team called UPT Class 85-02. The class spent hours studying and practicing the techniques required to use and land with a parachute. The class followed their desires for pilot status into the aerospace physiological training unit, better known as the altitude chamber.

Altitude chamber technicians gave the students a flight to remember taking the class to 35,000 feet, yet never leaving the ground. Since they were "up there," the class got a first-hand feel for high altitude flying with and without oxygen—a lesson that could save their lives someday.

To illustrate the point, chamber technicians allowed a student to remove the oxygen mask at 35,000 feet and another at 30,000. Having seen two of their peers experience physiological affects of flying without oxygen, the remainder of 85-02 removed their masks at 25,000 feet.

At 18,000 feet, the students found that even flying at low level could be dangerous without oxygen. Masks off, students took a visual acuity test and watched as the colors began to blend, but with oxygen, the colors were distinctly separate.

Basics complete and ready for jet flight, the class began training in the T-37. All UPT students spend 75 hours training in the T-37 and complete three check rides before moving on to training in the supersonic T-38.

Check rides for pilots and flying personnel amount to tests for everyone else. It is here that the instructor watches to insure that all procedures for flying are followed and correctly completed. Each student has to complete each check ride successfully before going any further in the program.

UPT students spend 100 hours in the T-38, capable of Mach 1.2 speed and an altitude of 50,000 feet. As in the T-37, students must pass the three T-38 check rides to complete the program.

The aircraft are not the only places for training, all student pilots spend numerous hours in classroom situations learning accident prevention and about aircraft systems as a whole.

The graduation ceremony, like today's, marks the end of training here, but only the beginning for most of the new Air Force pilots off to fly all types of aircraft here and around the world.

# Wing notes Reese suggester as best in program for '84

TSgt. John A. Schwarting is the 64th Flying Training Wing Suggester of the Year. That announcement came during the Dec. 12 wing standup.

Sergeant Schwarting received the wing honor for his continued support of the Reese Suggestion Program. In fiscal 1984, the noncommissioned officer in charge of the 64th Field Maintenance

Squadron Nondestructive Inspection Lab made seven suggestions. Each of the seven received favorable consideration and were approved and put into use.

The result was exactly what the Air Force and Reese Suggestion Program is all about—saving money. The Air Force realized a \$24,000 savings in the first year alone. And, while the Air Force

saves money, the service also rewards those like Sergeant Schwarting for coming forward with their ideas. The Reese NCO received \$1,463 in suggestion award money.

Sergeant Schwarting earned the wing honor in 1982, too. The NCO's program support reaches into his lab and has resulted in the NDI Lab being a consistently high contributor to the Reese program.

Another recent suggestion adopted, discontinuing the use of one of the hydraulic systems at the instrument flight simulators, while allowing the second system to do the work for both. SMSgt. Larry Byrd will get \$2,891 for the idea.

The Reese flight simulator maintenance quality assurance evaluator's idea will save the Air Force \$76,000 in the first year alone. The savings will be realized in the energy conservation area, where it is expected to have a direct impact.

# Falcons win big 23-7

Air Force's powerful ground attack showed why it is one of the nation's top rushing offenses as the Falcons churned out a 23-7 win over the Virginia Tech Hokies in the ninth annual Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La., Saturday evening.

More than 41,000 people watched the Falcons run through the Hokies' number two ranked defense for 221 yards, well over the average of 71 allowed by Virginia Tech in its previous 11 games.

The win was the Falcons' third straight bowl victory and gave Air Force an 8-4 season. The loss dropped the Hokies to 8-4.

Air Force won last year's Independence Bowl and is the first team ever to defend its title there. The Falcons also won the 1982 Hall of Fame Bowl against Vanderbilt, 36-28.

Air Force Quarterback Bart Weiss rushed for 93 yards on 29 carries and passed for another 49 yards with a 6-for-7 performance. He was named the game's most valuable offensive player.

"We just ran our basic offense like we've done all season," said the junior signal caller. "We made no effort to run away from Tech's Bruce Smith. In fact, I don't feel that we were intimidated by him at all. Sure he was big, but so were a lot of other guys we played this season."

Smith, a 283-pound defensive tackle, won the 1984 Outland Trophy as the nation's most outstanding lineman. He had been ruled ineligible for post-season play by the NCAA, but a Louisiana judge issued a restraining order Dec. 14 that let him play.

The Falcons used nine plays on their se-

cond possession in the first quarter to set up a 35-yard field goal by Carlos Mateos.

The Hokies went on top their next possession, marching 72 yards in 10 plays to lead 7-3 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the Falcons capitalized on a Hokie fumble on their own 2-yard line. Halfback Jody Simmons scored in the next play and Mateos added a point to give the Falcons a 10-7 halftime advantage.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, even though Air Force controlled the ball over 11 minutes.

In the fourth quarter, Air Force Halfback Mike Brown capped a 62-yard drive sweeping left from the 2. Mateos added the extra point.

On Virginia Tech's next possession the Falcons recovered a second fumble, this time on the Hokies' 30-yard line. Four plays later, Weiss skirted left from the 13 to score.

"We came here to play football and that is just what we did," said Falcon Head Coach Fisher DeBerry. "Our guys love a challenge, especially when it's against the nation's number two rushing defense.

"When this season started not many people gave us much of a chance for a successful year. Now, we've won three bowls and even made it three wins in a row over Notre Dame, something many bigger schools have never done," DeBerry said.

"Everytime Virginia Tech looked like they were ready to make a serious scoring threat," the coach said, "our defense just shut them down. When we held them at their 2-yard line and forced a turnover, I thought that was a super effort."

"This team couldn't have ended the season on a happier note," DeBerry added—SHREVEPORT, La. (AFNS)
