Get your career in high gear

Some months ago, I wrote a few words concerning promotions. Since then, I have been asked "how can I be more competitive—how can I increase my chances for promotion?" The answer is not a short one and the method is not easy. Probably the bottom line is self-improvement—doing everything you can to be more valuable to our Air Force.

Air Training Command's goal is to promote only quality people. This means monitoring Airman Performance Report ratings and overweight status; requiring promotion recommendation for all grades; insuring only deserving airmen are recommended; checking duty performance, training progress, and UIF; and soliciting unit supervisor comments.

Well, what can I do, you say? First and foremost, you can continue to perform your duty to the absolute best of your abilities, then you can concentrate on your Specialty Knowledge Test and Promotion Fitness Examinations and study! The most recent statistics from ATC reveal the following average test scores: staff sergeant: SKT-62.3, PFE-61.36; technical sergeant: SKT-63.75, PFE-59.51; and master sergeant: SKT-67.92, PFE-60.75. These are scores of selections! Are you close or should you start your study program now? Start anyway.

For senior master sergeants and master sergeants, the average supervisory exam scores are 60.6 and 56.65, respectively.

What other areas can I concentrate on, you say? Professional Military Education! Here is what our PME commandant, MSgt. Loyd Sheppard, has to offer: "PME has been referred to as a 'square filler' by many enlisted personnel over the years. An NCO who has completed all availabe PME courses normally scores 10 to 15 points higher on his Promotion Fitness Examination, enhancing promotion op-

portunities considerably. The PME curriculum itself—leadership, management, military studies, communicative skills and world affairs—broadens an NCO's outlook and helps him see more of the 'big picture.'

"PME also helps the Air Force by helping develop quality personnel who know what's required of them, and know how to accomplish the mission. Subordinates gain because their supervisors are better prepared, more capable, and more knowledgeable about the Air Force and their responsibilities. Professional Military Education benefits everyone—the individual, their subordinates, and the Air Force. Yes, it's a square to fill, but possible the most important square in the NCO's career."

To support Sergeant Sheppard's comments let's look at some more statistics: Senior master sergeant selections need 33 out of the 35 available points for PME, and the chief selectees need all 35! For those unfamiliar with the point system, the NCO Academy is worth 15 points, and the Senior NCO Academy is

worth 20 points, whether taken in-residence or by correspondence. Of the 1195 chief selectees, 1192 had the SNCOA. Get the picture? What else can help me get promote, you ask? Education!

The whole person concept includes education—the level and utilization. Community College of the Air Force is a program for our benefit. A tremendous advantage is that you can continue wherever your are stationed and you do not lose any credit. You can get an associates degree in your career field area and increase your promotion potential in one program. The Air Force selected 22.6 percent of eligible senior master sergeants for chief and 72 percent of them had two years of college or more.

Let's look at the whole person concept and how the senior master sergeant and chiefs promotion boards evaluate each:

Followership as important as leadership

EDITOR'S NOTE: Brig. Gen. Robert P. McCoy, Air Force Logistics Command's deputy chief of staff for maintainence, recently spoke to the graduating class of AFLC's Noncommissioned Officers' Academy at Robins AFB, Ga. Following is a condensed text of his speech.

If I gave each of you a few minutes to think about the one thing you believe the Air Force expects from you—I believe I'd have a list of answers that would be liberally sprinkled with "leadership" and "management" with perhaps an "integrity" or two thrown in.

Let me tell you what the Air Force has expected of me for more than 25 years. "Followership" is the hands down answer! That's right—the ability to follow. I am not unique. Whether you're a flight chief, load-master or supply specialist—whether you're in accounting and finance, personnel, avionics or recruiting—whether you're a tech sergeant, chief or general, we all follow orders.

Followership is not second nature to us. As we are thrust into roles of leadership and management, we find ourselves torn and begin to rationalize away the guidance, the regulation, or the order—"My unit is special" or "This regulation doesn't apply to us" or even "Those guys who wrote this policy are typical headquarters people; they don't know what it's like in the real world out here." We selectively

follow our leaders or—even worse—believe that we are above the law because we know more than those misguided souls at the top.

Is that a harsh assessment? Perhaps so, but let me tell you what comes across my desk: IG reports, aircraft accident investigations, safety incidents. One can do sophisticated analysis and tabulate reasons and causes, but I submit to you that the underlying fault in nearly every case is not so much a fault of leadership but the "failure to follow."

Units are rated marginal or unsatisfactory by our command IG team because the people in that unit failed to follow prescribed policy and guidance. An aircraft crashes on a training mission on the bombing range at Nellis-one fatality and a \$21 million aircraft destroyed. Cause: The pilot failed to follow the ordnance launch parameters and flew the aircraft beyond safe recovery conditions. We lost an F-4G due to a mechanic's error. He failed to follow the tech order. Result: A national treasure lost-fortunately the aircrew escaped. Last year a civilian employee was fatally injured at one of our air logistics centers. He was using a forklift as a work platform and fell nearly 15 feet. What caused the

accident? Failure to follow basic safety precautions.

That's day to day followership at your level and my level. It's not romantic. It's not exotic. And it calls for us to put others above ourselves. But it is precisely that last role of followership that sets us—military men and women—apart from other professions.

We have dedicated ourselves to a life of followership. The oath of enlistment sets us apart—"To support and defend the Constitution of the United States." There are no qualifications to that oath. It doesn't say "support and defend the Air Force or the Department of Defense or just part of the Constitution. We have sworn to support and defend every ideal embodied in that document.

Be sure to think of your followership responsibilities as you move through your careers, as you continue to advance in rank and responsibility. You'll be challenged more and more with leadership roles. But remember how much of your day's acitivities end up in the followership category.



When an item is not returned on time, another person is denied the opportunity to use it. This can be an especially bad situation if the article needed is for a child, such as a porta-crib or car seat, according to Family Services officials.

The same holds true if something is returned in poor condition, they say. Borrowers are financially liable for all damage to an item while it is in their possession.

The Family Services loan locker offers a variety of kitchen and house-hold items for loan-out to any military member on a firstcome, first-serve basis.

The goods are available to PCS and TDY personnel

The Family Services of- for one month with a copy of orders. Permanent party personnel may borrow items for two weeks. Infant and toddler car seats may be borrowed for one month. Extensions may be given on a case-by-case basis.

When an item is overdue, the military member is called by the Family Services staff. If that call produces no response, the borrower's first sergeant or squadron commander is called. Family Services officials say they will pursue the matter until the item is returned.



Dealing with child abuse

It is an unfortunate fact of life that there are people out there who abduct and molest children. Tragically, 50,000 children; were affected last year. Although it is difficult for many parents, talking to their kids about the problem is one of the best ways to reduce the chance of their becoming victims.

Here are some guidelines that have been recommended by many authorities to help protect children from abduction and molestation.

• First of all, don't scare your children. Let them know that most friendly adults really do like them. However, just because most houses don't burn down doesn't mean you don't need a smoke alarm and regular fire drills.

• Tell your children to avoid going alone to isolated places - short-cuts through the woods, down the alley,

• Teach your children that no one should touch their bathing suit parts: except for legitimate hygiene purposes.

You might want to talk about "good touch" and "bad touch." Even very young children can sense "bad touch" -it makes them feel uncomfortable. Encourage them to tell you about any "bad touch" experiences.

• Don't dress your children in clothing with their names on it. Young children can be taken in by a stranger who calls them by their first name.

• Some potential abductors will tell the child, "Your mother is in the hospital - she asked me to get you." Have a special code word that only you and the child know, and tell the child not to go with anyone unless they use the code. In fact, it is a good idea

· Some molesters will ask for some kind of assistance, something as seemingly innocent as asking for directions. Tell your child to tell them to ask an adult for help.

· Most molesters are relatives or are known to the child. Be suspicious of adults who seem unduly interested in your child and who want to spend a lot of time with him or her. If a young child wants to avoid a particular relative or babysitter, try to find out

 Children who look unkept and uncared for, and young children who smoke or hang out in video arcades are particularly vulnerable.

• Adolescents can be lured by the promise of a highpaying job, with interviews often held in a secluded place. Tell your teen-agers you want to know who is interviewing

• Teach your children to run or scream "No!" or even "Fire!" if they are approached or touched by a molester. Most say they will flee if the intended victim runs or







Advance pay not so good

Advance pay is designed to be taken in conjunction with a PCS assignment to help defray the additional costs incurred as a result of a change of station.

Advance pay is exactly that—an advance payment of your salary. And it normally will be paid back in six mon-

Before you go to the Accounting and Finance office to request advance pay, you should ask yourself three important questions: Do you really need the money at this time? Will it actually be used to defray PCS costs? And will you be able to repay it and have enough money left to defray costs at your new duty station?

Advance pay should never be used to purchase nice-tohave items that normally can't be fit into the budget.

When you arrive at your new duty station you will have several expenses not normally incurred. Each one must be considered and budgeted for carefully.

You'll need a temporary place to stay, as well as advance rent and security deposits, phone installation and deposit, deposits for home utilities, and many other miscellaneous costs including

your first trip to the commissary there.

You arrive at your new assignment and receive your check with the advance pay taken out and it looks small compared to previous checks, doesn't it?

You have rented a place to live and obligated your money based on what you received previously and now you don't have enough money to go

Money can be very limited or non-existant if not budgeted carefully.

As the Air Force Aid Officer, I see many cases where advance pay was taken, used unwisely, and now set-up costs at the new assignment can't be met. In many of these cases, individuals requested advance pay just because it was available and not because they really needed it.

If you're thinking of taking advance pay, think about it real hard, take a close look, and make sure a real need exists. Be aware that you'll have a reduced income at your next duty station.

These problems know no age or grade restriction. It can happen to anyone.

Advance pay is a loan; it must be repaid. Plan and budget for the unexpected, and if you don't need advance pay don't take it.

If you do, spend it wisely.


OER changes take effect





Teeth don't heal, need help

strongest material in the repair itself once it has been visibly damaged.

Because of this, one of the primary responsibilities of a dentist is to restore teeth injured by accidents or decay. Without the dentist's help, damaged teeth would keep getting worse.

To restore teeth, dentists must first prepare the cavity; removing not only the decayed area, but the area immediately around it. This area may have been affected by the decay. The cavity is then shaped to hold the filling material.

Depending on where the filling will be in the mouth, they can be made of tooth colored porcelain and plastic materials, or metal such as gold and silver amalgam.

Toward the front of the mouth, amalgam or composite resin, in a soft mass, is tamped into the prepared cavity. In the back of the mouth, where looks aren't so important, an inlay or onlay is cast to fit the prepared cavity. These are usually made of gold or silver amalgam.

When a tooth is badly decayed and little of the structure remains, or is weakened by a large filling, the dentist may opt to use a crown, which covers the exposed surfaces of the tooth. Crowns strengthen and improve the color and shape of badly damaged teeth. Porcelain, metals, and even porcelain fused to metal can be used to make a crown.

In some cases, if a tooth is badly fractured or has a deep

cavity, the pulp within it dies. Nerves, arteries, veins and other vessels make up the Tooth enamel is the pulp in a tooth. When it dies. an infection called abcess can human body, but it can't spread to the tissues that surround and support the tooth in the jaw.

Root canal therapy, or endodontics, is used to treat teeth with dead pulp. This is done by first making an opening in the crown of the tooth, then carefully removing the dead pulp.

The root canals are cleaned, enlarged, and shaped to be easily filled. After the infection is eliminated, the canals are filled, and sealed with a material that will keep bacteria out. The crown of the Month.)

tooth is then restored usually by using either gold or porcelain crowns.

General dentists may perform the root canal therapy, or may refer the patient to a specialist in the area.

Damaged teeth don't get better by themselves. In fact they usually get worse. If you suspect that your teeth need professional treatment, don't delay. By calling your dentist immediately, you can save yourself time, money, and discomfort.


