## New pilot trainer unveiled

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas—The first of the Air Force's newest aircraft, the T-46A Next Generation Trainer, has rolled off the assembly line at the Fairchild Republic Company's plant in Farmingdale, N.Y.

The shiny new trainer, unveiled Feb. 11, was greeted with applause by more than 700 civilian, industrial and government officials, including Secretary of the Air Force Verne Orr, Gen. Andrew P. Iosue, commander of Air Training Command here, was also present, representing the command that will ultimately become primary user of the aircraft.

The T-46A will replace the 28-year-old Cessna T-37, currently used as the primary trainer for undergraduate pilot training conducted by the Air Force at six Air Training Command bases.

Reese AFB, began using the T-37 in March 1961.

The first T-46 will be assigned to the Air Force Flight Test Center at Edwards AFB, Calif., where the first flight is scheduled this spring. In mid-1986, Fairchild

will begin delivering the new aircraft to ATC's 47th Flying Training Wing at Laughlin AFB, Texas, where the first T-46 squadron will be formed.

ATC plans to begin using the T-46 for undergraduate pilot training in January, 1988. A total of 650 trainers are expected to be built for the Air Force by 1992.

Although the new trainer resembles its T-37 predecessor in appearance, the T-46 can fly higher, faster and farther.

Key features include top speed of more than 400 mph, a pressurized cabin, modern avionics and an expanded flight envelope which will better prepare new pilots for graduation to high-performance aircraft. A 350 mph cruise speed will reduce transit time to training areas, thus allowing more practice time per training flight.

The twin-engine trainer has a service ceiling of 45,000 feet to permit safer training because it can be flown above the weather and general aviation traffic.

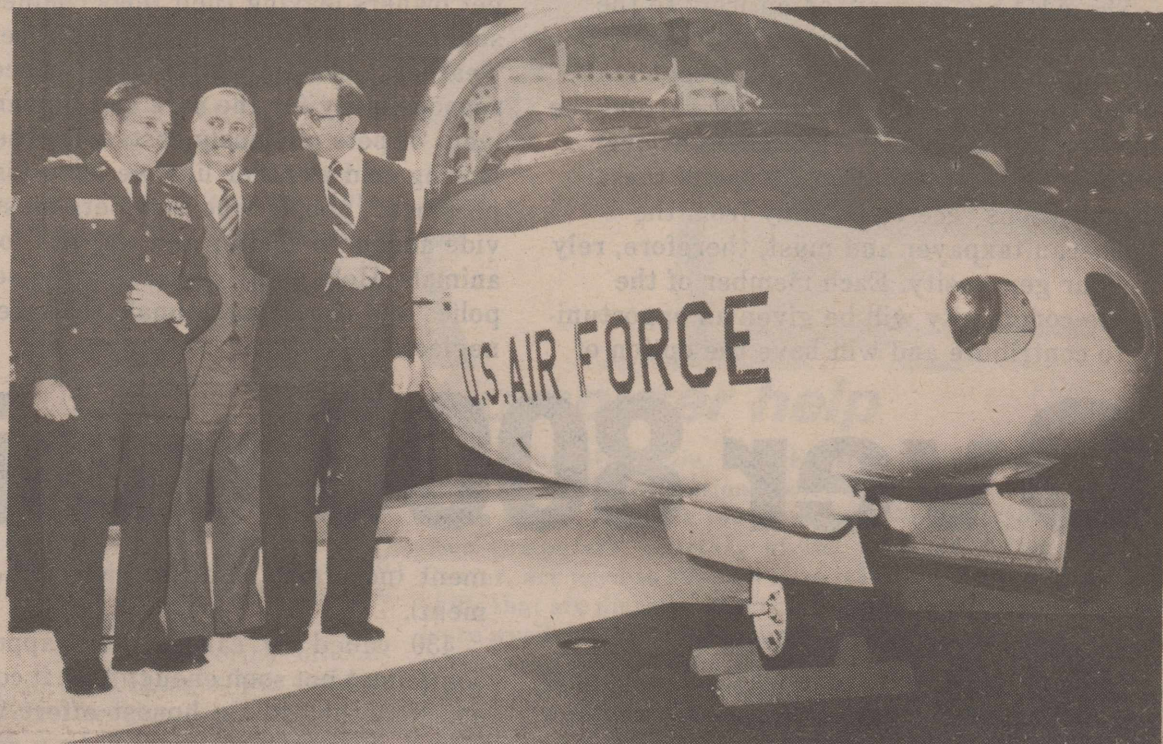
The T-46 is powered by two

Garrett F-109 advanced turbofan engines, which provide maintenance, safety and operational advantages, as well as greater efficiency, reliability and durability. Each engine produces 1,330 lbs. of static thrust.

Fairchild officials estimate the trainer will reduce fuel consumption by 60 percent compared to the T-37, and that, when required, engine replacement should take no more than 30 minutes. In addition, the T-46's engine noise

level will be below FAA noise-pollution standards, unlike the noisy T-37.

## AFAF drive begins Monday

Reese members will be asked to renew their commitment to caring, to the tune of \$17,932, as the 1985 Air Force Assistance Fund Drive nears.

The AFAF campaign kicks off Monday and continues

through March 29. Contributions to the annual fund drive are used to support three charitable organizations. Two of these organizations have residential communities for retired Air Force members,

their dependents and surviving spouses.

The Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows and Dependents Home Foundation, Inc., has one facility in Fort Walton Beach, Florida and another under construction near Eglin AFB, Fla. It is oriented toward the needs of retired enlisted personnel and their spouses and dependents.

The Air Force Village is located in San Antonio, Texas, and is oriented toward the needs of retired officers, their spouses and dependents. Air Force Village II, planned for 1986, also in San Antonio, will provide a nursing facility and additional apartments.

The third Air Force Assistance Fund group is the Air Force Aid Society. It is the official charity of the Air Force and is chartered to assist in relieving financial emergencies of eligible active-duty, retired and reserve members on active duty. Surviving spouses also are eligible. Ad-

ditionally, the Air Force Aid Society includes three educational loan programs for eligible Air Force people pursuing vocational, under-graduate, or graduate studies.

Air Training Command's target this year is \$436,077—\$4,000 short of last year's \$440,044, but is less than half of the \$951,004 figure that ATC members actually contributed to the AFAF drive last year.

The command goal is further broken down into individual goals for each center and wing, based on numbers and grades of people assigned.

This year's Air Force goal is \$4.2 million; this is up from \$4.0 million a year ago. More than \$6.4 million was donated Air Force-wide in 1984.

Appeals will go out to all Air Force people on active duty, in the Air National Guard, the Air Force Reserve and to retired Air Force members.

Remember, Air Force Assistance Fund activities rely largely on voluntary contributions by Air Force people. Neither the Air Force Aid Society nor the retirement communities receive taxpayers' support. Nor are they supported through the Combined Federal Campaign.

The dining facilities will be closed at both clubs, but the bars at the clubs will be open for normal use.

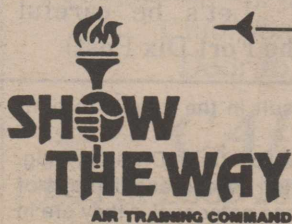

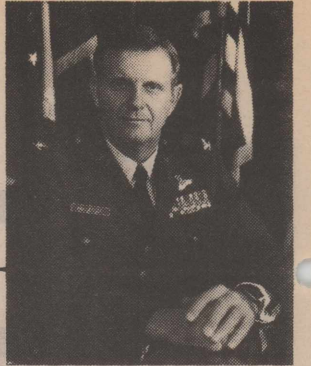

I am honored to be the chairman for the 1985 Air Force Assistance Fund Campaign which begins Monday. The wife of an active-duty member asks why she has to pay for medical care not provided by the base and not covered by the Civilian Health and Medical Program for the Uniformed Services, better known as CHAMPUS. She feels that the government makes a promise of "full medical benefits" for military members and their families.

The rules and regulations that govern your benefits as a military dependent are established by Congress. If you are displeased with the current policy, you may want to voice your concerns to the appropriate agencies that recommend changes to directives affecting uniformed services medical facilities.

## Over 8000 visit clinics

January 1985 was somewhat of a banner month for USAF Hospital Reese. We all knew that it had been a busy month but none of us had any idea that we had set a record-8100 outpatient visits in the clinics. Researching available statistics revealed this to us. Naturally, we were pleased that we had been able to provide this much health care to our beneficiaries.

While reviewing the statistics for the month, I came across some facts that were quite disturbing—we could have done even better if so many of our patients had been more considerate! Here are some of the disturbing facts that I feel compelled to share with you:

170 patients failed to show for their appointment

(no effort made to cancel the appointment).

430 called to cancel their appointments, sometimes not soon enough that it could be filled. Nonetheless, an honest effort was made. This is greatly appreciated. As a result of no shows and cancellations there were 180 unused appointments.

These figures clearly show that if we are going to be able to see more patients, you, our beneficiaries, are going to have to be more considerate and committed to making our system of health care work better. The Primary Care Clinic is operating with one physician short of authorization. We are promised that this short fall will be rectified by August 1985.

Just in case you are not aware of the fact, the appointment phone is covered by a recording device which will permit you to call in

after hours and on weekends to cancel your appointment. Please help us in this area.

Many of you are aware that there is a construction project taking place within the hospital. The entire floor in the surgical and obstetrical suite is being replaced. Unexpected problems have come up which have delayed the completion date until around 1 April 1985. Consequently, elective surgeries have to be delayed. Emergencies are being referred to the different community medical facilities. We apologize for any inconveniences that this has caused. When completed, we will be better able to serve you. Our goal is to provide the very best medical care to our beneficiaries. Won't you please help us in making more appointments available by calling 3245 or 3488 to cancel your appointment if you are unable to meet it. Help us to help someone else.

# Telephone deposits waived for some

An agreement between the General Telephone Company of the Southwest, and Reese AFB has resulted in the waiver of telephone deposits for military personnel here with good credit after March 1.

The waiver will apply to

persons using GTE service, whether residing on or off base.

To obtain the waiver, a form letter must be filled in and submitted to GTE. The letter is available at Building P-20.

The letter can be submitted

by either handcarrying it to the GTE agency located in the Prescription Shop, 708 Clovis Road in Shallowater, or mailing it to their business office at 614 W. Tate, Brownfield, Texas 79316. The GTE agency in Shallowater is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Even with the letter, an installation charge and one month's advance basic fee will be charged. The monthly local service charge is \$17.30.

Persons who have already paid a deposit for telephone service through GTE will have to wait until their

12-month period expires before the deposit will be returned.

Persons who are granted the waiver, and fail to pay their bills on a timely manner will be promptly assessed the standard deposit and/or have their service terminated.

# Simplified Quarters Termination test begins

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—“Just pay and walk away” is the way one official summed up a new Air Force test program that should make checking out of military family housing much easier for departing families.

An investigation in 1983 found that many Air Force families leaving government quarters felt the clearing process was a hardship, according to Maj. Barbara Bartley of the Air Force Engineering and Services Department in the Pentagon.

Five test bases are changing procedures this month to see if members are willing to pay to make it easier. If successful, the new method will be expanded Air Force-wide, Major Bartley said.

The test introduces for the first time a government-sponsored cleaning contract that occupants of military family housing will be offered when moving out. For the first time, said Major Bartley, the government will accept

total liability for cleaning of a house if the member is willing to pay for the services.

Two options are presently available to families—clean the quarters themselves or hire a cleaning service that is not government sponsored. In both cases members are liable for the house, even if they employ a power of attorney with their contractor.

With the government-approved cleaning contract, people will be allowed to pay the Accounting and Finance Office for cleaning and repairs and “just walk away,” Major Bartley said.

The test will run for an indefinite time at Bolling AFB, D.C.; Edwards AFB, Calif.; Homestead AFB, Fla.; Plattsbury AFB, N.Y.; and MacDill AFB, Fla. Bases in Europe and the Pacific are expected to join the test soon, Major Bartley said.

The test will run until we can determine its success,” she said. “It may take three

months or maybe a year.” The test bases are accepting contract bids this month and the program is expected to be under way by May.

The idea started with a Functional Management Inspection in 1983 that found procedures “cumbersome and stringent” and cleaning standards “not uniformly or consistently applied.” As a result, there is a growing perception among Air Force families that termination of government quarters is “far too difficult and sometimes traumatic,” according to an Air Force Engineering and Services memo.

“There is a very real possibility that the test will fail,” Major Bartley said. “If families don't use the option, we'll scrap it. The program has to be cost effective and that will be up to the families at our test bases.”

Civil Engineering officials in the Pentagon will monitor test results.

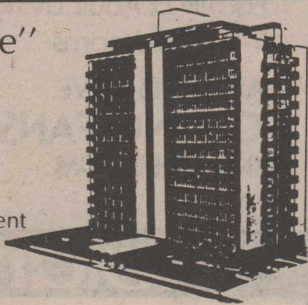

# AAFES inspectors sign names

Now customers can find out who inspects Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) merchandise—by name.

Each inspected item AAFES sells now carries the name of the person who performed the inspection. In the case of military and civilian clothing, the inspector's name is stamped on blue cards which are hung from hangers or inserted into pockets.

Black and gold stickers are used for other merchandise.

"It's a visibility thing," explained Sid Poindexter, Chief of the General Merchandise Inspection Branch of AAFES Quality Assurance Division. "We want people to know that we're proud of our work, proud enough to put our names on it."

AAFES has 61 inspectors that work at manufacturing plants and central inspection

points around the world. They perform random inspections of merchandise lots using the same inspection methods as those used by better civilian retailers.

An unacceptably high number of defective items in a lot means the entire lot is rejected. Finding a personalized card or sticker on an item means it was checked and cleared as part of the inspection process and the entire lot

was accepted.

"Some customers may get concerned when they see merchandise packaging that appears to have been opened before sale," Poindexter said. "If a black and gold sticker appears on the package or box, that was opened during inspection."

Inspectors check for "serviceability, saleability, and customer acceptance," according to Poindexter. They look

for defects like open seams, broken zippers, and tears for clothing and missing parts, dents, and broken switches for small appliances. Inspectors look for visible defects and obvious malfunctions.

They never use a product over an extended period.

"That's done in our testing laboratory in Dallas. Merchandise that is "Torture Tested" is not sold to our customers," Poindexter said.

## Criminals provide funds to victims

The Victims of Crimes Act of 1984 provides federal assistance for victims of violent crime.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice's newsletter, "Criminals—not innocent taxpayers—will provide the funds for the program."

The article explains that funds for the program will be

provided mainly through criminal fines collected from convicted federal defendants.

Monies collected will be paid into a Crime Victims Fund administered by the attorney general.

The act contains a "Son of Sam" provision that prohibits federal criminals from financially profiting by selling the

rights to the story of their crime. Proceeds from such sales are to be paid to the attorney general and held in escrow in the Crime Victims Fund for five years. During that time, the money is subject to victim, legal and court claims. After five years, the profits may be retained by the Victims Fund.

# Most have dental disease

Today, more and more people are keeping all or almost all of their teeth well into their adult lives. Unfortunately, many of these same people do not see a dentist regularly.

"Why should I see a dentist?" many people ask themselves. "My teeth don't hurt. When they start hurting, I'll make an appointment."

Whether they know it or not, the chances are good that they've already got a problem—periodontal disease. Three out of four adults are affected by at least the early stages of this disease, which is the major cause of tooth loss among adults.

Often periodontal disease doesn't hurt at all, even when serious damage has been done to the structures supporting the teeth. The disease usually

progresses slowly, over the course of many years. In the early stage only the soft tissue of the gum has been affected—the disease is still reversible.

If not treated by a dentist, however, periodontitis, the later stage of the disease, may develop. In this stage, the gums, bone, and other structures that support the teeth become seriously damaged. If the disease doesn't receive extensive treatment, teeth may be lost.

As the disease progresses, the tissue that attached the gums to the teeth is destroyed. The gums pull away from the teeth, forming small pockets. Plaque moves down along the roots of the teeth, making the pockets deeper. Eventually, the bone supporting the teeth may be destroyed and the affected teeth become loose and fall out or

must be removed.

So much for the bad news about periodontal disease. The good news is that this disease can be treated. Often, in the early stage of the disease, the only treatment needed is removing the calculus deposits on the teeth and smoothing the root surfaces so that the gum tissue can reattach.

If pockets are deep (over 5mm), it is often difficult for the dentist or dental hygienist to remove calculus deposits from them. It is also almost impossible for patients to keep deep pockets clean and free from plaque. As a result, these pockets often become sites of infection, which may lead to bone destruction. Consequently, in advanced periodontal disease, surgery is sometimes a necessary part of treatment.

The goals of surgery are to remove calculus from deep pockets, to reduce the pockets, and to arrange the soft tissue into a shape that will be easier to keep clean.

Take a good look at your mouth in a mirror. Are your gums red, swollen, or tender? Do they bleed easily? These are some of the warning signs of periodontal disease.

Don't wait until your teeth hurt to call your dentist. Make regular appointments for professional dental care, and avoid losing teeth to periodontal disease. They're meant to last a lifetime.

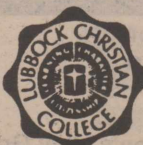

# Investigates fraud, waste & abuse

RANDOLPH, AFB, Texas (ATCNS)—Fifteen allegations of fraud, waste, and abuse were confirmed and 19 others were partially confirmed by the Air Training Command Inspector General's office in 1984.

A total of 172 allegations of fraud, waste and abuse pertaining to ATC installations and activities were reported through the ATC, Defense Department, and Air Force hotlines. Of the total, 105 of the allegations were unconfirmed and 17 are still being investigated.

As a result of the investigations, command officials discovered \$111,080 in waste and prevented \$16,933 in materials or money from being lost.

The most costly case dealt with the Air Force's paying

\$82,760 for contract painting not performed. This occurred after a unit incorrectly estimated the amount of painting to be done by the contractor.

When the actual work accomplished fell short of the estimated amount, the contractor filed a claim to recoup costs and profits that would have been realized from the estimated work.

According to the command inspector general, steps have been taken to prevent this from happening in the future. One of the recommendations was for an Air Force representative and the contractor to jointly measure the area to be painted before the contract is signed.

In another case, an allegation was made against an Air

Force member who operated a private business which sold clothing items to the individual's unit.

After reviewing the case, the ATC staff judge advocate said it appeared there was a violation of the Air Force's Standards of Conduct. There was the "appearance of using public office for private gain," it was noted.

The overall inadequate performance, the individual was relieved of duty with the unit, given a letter of reprimand and received a unfavorable information file.

Other confirmed or partially confirmed allegations include:

- Waste while renovating an old building to house a museum (Waste—\$14,220)
- Salvage of usable equipment (Savings—\$14,733)
- Improper disposal of an aircraft wing spar (Waste—\$2,292)
- Waste due to use of improper roofing materials (Waste—\$6,051)
- Wasteful lawn watering practices
- Excessive roofing repairs (Waste—\$5,500)
- Fraudulent claim for quarters allowance (Savings—\$1,671)
- Misuse of a government vehicle.

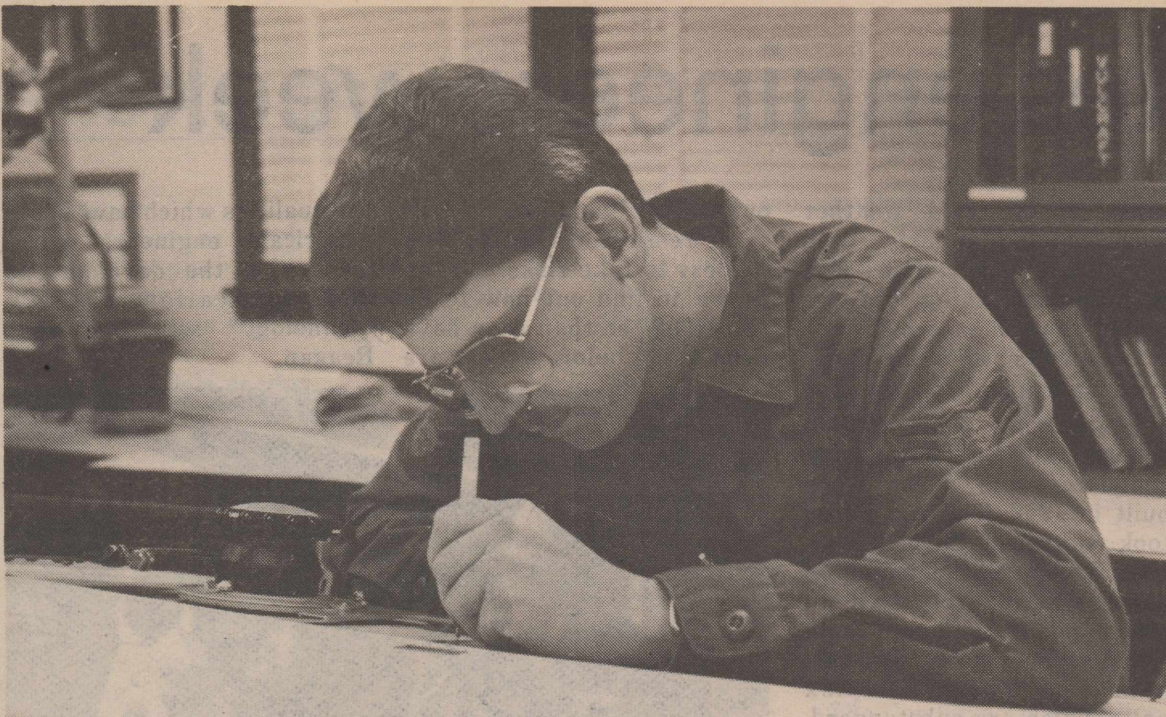

# Treasury delays ruling on homeowners deductions

Washington (AFNS)—The Treasury Department has delayed, at least until Jan. 1, 1987, its decision whether or not to reduce military homeowners' current income tax deductions for mortgage interest and property taxes, according to the office of the Secretary of Defense.

Treasury postponed implementation of Internal Revenue Service Ruling 83-3 in response to requests by Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger and other defense officials, the Feb. 5 announcement said.

The question being studied is whether service members are entitled, under the current Internal Revenue Code, to these deductions while

receiving tax-free allowances, officials said. Treasury previously said it would protect the deductions until Jan. 1, 1985.

The IRS said it "Has not concluded its study of the question" that involves the Armed Forces, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the Public Health Service.

Real estate tax deductions for about 300,000 military homeowners are valued at about \$300 million, officials said.

This two-year delay gives the Defense Department additional time to seek permanent legislative relief in congress. Two bills have been introduced in the 99th Congress that

would prevent implementation of the ruling against military people.

Here at Reese AFB, the Engineers and their shops have been operating at peak levels in each of their specialties in order to meet a March 31 deadline for all 1985 fiscal year projects. Some of these projects are repainting the water tower to match the base color scheme; renovating the Enlisted Club and the Of-

ficer's Club; putting up a new T-38 static display and installing a granite, state of Texas display in front of the headquarters building. They are to be completed by June 15 for the Reese Reunion.

Other projects, whose designs will be finished by March 31, include: A new three stall car wash, a basewide landscaping plan, replacement of several sections of the taxiway apron, construction of new flightline shacks and a new golf course snack bar.

Engineering consists of more than just engineers and draftspeople. The most visible sections of engineering is the Operations branch which includes all the shops and special teams. The shops were responsible for much of Reese's rejuvenation and modernization last year which helped Reese get awarded "Best Engineering Squadron in ATC" and the "Supply Daedaleon Award."

Interior renovations at the Disaster Preparedness and the Headquarters buildings helped upgrade those facilities to provide working areas which can be utilized for better efficiency. Installing a forward supply point for aircraft parts at Hanger 92 aided maintenance by making the turnaround time for the aircraft even faster than before. Emergency repair of burst

pipes during cold weather was handled quickly with very little down time. And painting everything that was nailed down to match the color scheme is still being done.

Reese Village is also a part of engineering. There are 396 Wherry-type 2-3-4-5 bedroom adequate units which were built in 1952. The Air Force took control of them in Dec. 1958. The Wing Commander's home was appropriated in 1960 and is unique. Additionally, we have 10 one-bedroom Wherry duplex units which are substandard. These units are scheduled to be converted to five 3-bedroom single units in the near future.

All the housing units underwent a major renovation during the 1977-1980 time frame which modernized the units by installing central heat/air, dishwashers, disposals, storm windows, new cabinets, and other face-lifting work. Since that time, steel siding/insulation has been added; carport drives extended, fused disconnect protection installed, streets redone and gas/water laterals replaced. Future projects planned include installing new windows (interior), mini-blinds, install gutters and replace storm doors.

By fiscal 88 we hope to enter into the whole house concept to add more living space/baths to units to improve the "quality of life" for

our military families.

"A restless curiosity, willingness to take risks and the desire to find out how to do things better than they have been doing before—these are

the qualities which have made America's engineers world leaders in the development and application of new technology" said President Reagan.

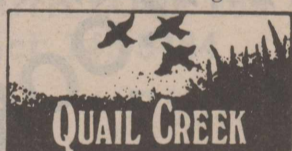

# MBAA adds fishing circuit

CYPRESS, Calif.—Yamaha Outboards has joined forces with the Military Bass Anglers Association in creating the Military Bass Yamaha Outdoors Grand National Tournament Circuit that will feature 161 tournaments in 21 states and a guaranteed \$100,000 first prize at the Championship Grand National Tournament at Lake Toho in Florida in November.

The tournaments are open to anyone who has ever served in or worked with the military, including the Guard, reserves, or any governmental agency. Eligibility includes dependents.

The circuit consists of 161 qualifying tournaments with 100 percent entry fee payback—75 percent at each tournament with 25 percent passed on to the Grand National championship. The trail starts with 130 one-day Saturday tournaments. Then there are 21 one-day state qualify-

ing tournaments and eight one-day area qualifying tournaments, all offering members a chance at increasing their point total on the way to the \$100,000 guaranteed Grand Prize at the Grand National.

The circuit trail continues with two three-day eastern and western championships.

Each of these tournaments will award a \$20,000 Yamaha-powered Ranger 350V bass boat and trailer loaded with accessories. The top two hundred anglers will be picked from these two tournaments and invited to fish in the no-entry Grand National. Invitations will be based upon cumulative point standings.

The concept of the Military Bass Tournament Circuit was developed with the Military Bass Anglers Association. This group, with 10,000 members, conducts over 300 weekend tournaments at different sites across the coun-

try. Founded nine years ago, it has its own Grand National finals, with the top angler known as the Yamaha Military Angler of the Year.

This new tournament circuit isn't just for active military. In fact, Doug Gilley, winner of the 1984 \$100,000 Super B.A.S.S. III tournament, served in the Army for only six months, and he was one of the first to join the circuit. Joe McDaniel, founder of MBAA, said that many of the "big names" in bass fishing won't be able to fish this circuit, because they don't meet eligibility requirements. He says this means more opportunity for more anglers.

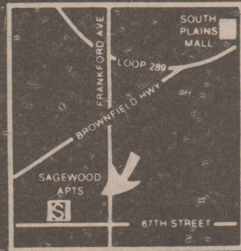
