New Year Traffic Toll Record Seen

By The Associated Press A record New Year traffic toll was predicted Wednesday -hard on the heels of a Christmas death total that set a new high

on the neels of a Christmas death total that set a new high for any holiday. The National Safety Council said 490 Americans will be kill-ed in motor vehicle accidents during the four-day New Year week end "unless there is a sharp improvement in the driving ha-bits that shocked the nation over Christmas." Traffic fatalities during the four-day Christmas celebration zoomed beyond the 700 mark for the first time during any holiday period in U.S. history. The Christmas toll soared be-yond the 680 in the Council's advanced forecast. The current record of motor vehicle fatalities for a New Year period is 407, es-tablished during a four-day ob-servance of the switch from 1952 to 1953. The new estimate raised the

to 1953. The new estimate raised the possibility that the combined Christmas-New Year traffic death totals may pass the 1,000 mark for the first time. The final Christmas tabula-tion, including belated returns, totaled up new highs in both the traffic and all-accident col-umns

Fatalities totaled 705 in traf-fic, 53 in fires and 124 in falls and other accidents for an over-

and other accidents for an over-all total of 882. Motor vehicle deaths during the four-day Christmas period from 6 p. m. Friday to midnight Tuesday — shot up far beyond the previous record for any holi-day period. That was the 609 to-tal recorded during the three day Christmas observance last year.

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



Most business establishments are as cooperative as possible about this annual American pastime, but before getting into arguments with a reluctant clerk or manager, better take a look at the legal situation involved. You may find that persuasion is more in order than demands for adjustment. Department stores are under no legal obligation to take back a purchase and refund your money or deliver other goods in exchange just because you changed your mind. Most stores do make refunds and exchanges, but that is because it is their policy to do so — not because they are required to. 

In addition to the above, I assisted in holding Four Inquests; and processed 58 Birth Certificates and 28

Death Certificates.
